Junior trophy winners were Emma Leaney (most points under 6), Sophie Howard (most points in the 6 to 9 age group) and Natalie Simmons, who won both Junior Artist and Junior Photographer. Unfortunately there were no entries in the 9 to 12 age group.

Trophy winners in the adult classes include Cliff Hopkins, who won the Most Points in the Show Shield and the Hayden Trophy for the most points in the flower and plant section. Colin Brown gained best in section (crafts), The Ferguson Trophy, and Best in Show for Crafts, for his expertly carved head, Best Photograph was awarded to Steve France for his delightful study of a 'Lion in the trees' and Best Flower Arrangement, the Len Denson Trophy, went to R.B. Yates (Betty). Horticulture trophies were won by Cliff Hopkins, Margaret Smith, Keith Elsome and Tony Halsey, with Tony also taking the G & M Lucas Cup for the Best in Show (Horticulture). Members of the Gardening Club would not have been surprised by this, as they are familiar with the wonderful plants in his garden.

After the prizegiving, Roger continued in his more familiar role as auctioneer, once again persuading us to part with our money in a good cause. The afternoon was concluded with the grand raffle.

The committee would like to thank all those who worked hard to make the event possible, and those who sponsored the show with raffle prizes and financial support. This year we have raised approximately  $\pounds$ 500 for Cancer Charities in the local area.

Now we are looking forward to next year's show on Saturday 1 September 2007.

### From the Parish Council

#### Narrowing of the High Street – publicity for planning issues

The Council would like to thank Mr Fox for expressing concerns (no doubt felt by many) about the road narrowing in the High Street, and the underlying issue of publication of new developments for public comment. It appreciates this opportunity to respond to them.

Regarding the road narrowing, pavement extension opposite Bourneys Manor Close formed part of the planning permission for construction of the development. It was required under road access regulations, over which the Parish Council has no control. The other road narrowing, adjacent to the new zebra crossing, came as part of the 'package' on offer from County Highways including the zebra crossing. It was a case of 'no narrowing, no pedestrian crossing' – and the Parish Council considered that the new crossing was urgently needed, as well as being well-supported.



As far as advance opportunity for feedback goes, the Council did hold a public meeting on all the traffic calming issues including the zebra crossing in September 2005, which was advertised

in the September Parish Magazine, and also by posters on the Village Notice Board outside the Public Hall in the High Street, in the Library and in a number of local shops. In addition, the matter was discussed at the monthly Council meeting in October which, like all Council meetings, was open to the public, and had been advertised in advance on the Village Notice Board and in the Library. Regular planning applications are also discussed at Planning Committee meetings, which are open to the public and whose agendas are advertised on the Village Notice Board and in the Library.

The Council undertakes always to hold public meetings on major issues which affect the village, and to publicise them as well as possible. If the existing means of publicity are not reaching people, then it would appreciate feedback on what would be more effective. Certainly it has been aware for some time that there might be a more 'obvious' place for a Village Notice Board; and this is under active consideration.

#### Litter poster competition

The Parish Council is continuing to investigate ways to reduce the level of litter with which the village is so persistently plagued. Now that the school term has started, it is working with Willingham Primary School to organise a poster competition for the school



children to design an anti-litter poster for the village. There will be prizes for the winner and runners-up, and the winning poster will be printed and used for an anti-litter campaign.

#### **Metal thefts**

You may have heard a recent news item that the theft of metal is on the increase: copper pipes (including those being installed in building works), fuel tanks, manhole covers and the like. Not all metal items can be locked away, so the message is, lock up what you can, and for the rest, "be alert", and report any suspicious activity to the police.

#### Changes to bus timetable

The Council has received notification of changes to the no. 15 bus timetable, which will only affect anyone who uses the service between Earith and St Ives. From 3 September, the first journey from Earith to St Ives will depart at 7 56 am. The journey which previously departed at 3 50 pm from St Ives back to Earith now leaves at 3 10 pm.

#### New Parish Council Office hours

From the start of October, the Parish Council Office hours on a Monday will change from 9 00 am -12noon, to 130 - 430 pm. There has been little demand for contact with the Parish Office on a Monday morning, so it is hoped this will not cause any inconvenience. As usual, any messages left on the answerphone will be picked up and acted on when the Clerk is next in the Office.

### Jottings from your County Councillor

It was good to get some feedback about my somewhat irregular contribution to the parish magazine. The suggestion has been made that there is more information about planning matters and the road narrowing along the High Street was mentioned. Planning is a matter for the District Council, but the County Council, as the transport authority, will comment on the highway impact of any but the smallest planning application. These comments are made by officers and politicians generally do not get involved, unless it is a very large planning application - for example the new developments around Cambridge. Even the development at Saxon Way and Covent Garden would not be seen by members, partly because of the amount of work that it would involve if this were replicated across the county and partly because it is an operational matter, rather than one relating to policy. So I was not involved in the recommendations made by county council officers on changes to the highway that would be required to accommodate the new developments off the High Street. What I can say is that they would have been designed to slow traffic sufficiently so that traffic can enter and exit the new developments safely

The other area where feedback might be helpful is the recent problems of flooding in Pyrethrum Way. Generally gullies are cleaned every year and repaired if

necessary. There have been a number of reasons why there have been problems with gullies this year. First, the long dry spell allowed detritus to gather on the road edge, which was then washed into the gully by the exceptional heavy rain that we experienced over the summer. The new developments also mean that there is greater surface run off and the older drains simply cannot cope. It is very difficult to test the drains to see if there is a problem because it would mean a great deal of water would be wasted. So we wait until we have heavy rain and then try to act as quickly as possible. Unfortunately, in the case of Pyrethrum Way, the problem was compounded by the fact that one of the vehicles used for clearing the gullies broke down at a critical moment, so there was more pressure on the remaining vehicles. Hopefully, now that the summer is drawing to an end we will see less of the really heavy rainstorms and therefore less flooding.

#### Baby Pneumonia Vaccination The routine baby



vaccination program has now been altered to include pneumococcal vaccination for children aged under 2 years. It will be given as part of the routine injections at 2 and 4 months of age, with a booster at 13 months.

Over the next 6 months, we will be calling children under 2 years to come for their catch-up dose of this injection, when the supply of vaccination allows. Pneumococcal infection is a common cause of chest and ear infections in infants and possible cause of blood poisoning (scepticaemia). A booster dose of Hib and Meningitis C vaccination is also to be given at 12 months of age. If you wish to discuss this please make an appointment with your practice nurse. Flu vaccination Flu season will soon be upon us again! We have been informed that there is a manufacturing delay of the Flu vaccine this year. There is not expected to be a shortage, but we will not be receiving our vaccine until the end of October, so clinics can not be run until then. We advise flu vaccination for anyone over the age of 65 years, and all people with chronic conditions such as diabetes or heart, kidney or liver disease. People of any age requiring <u>regular</u> <u>treatment</u> for asthma or other severe breathing

As in previous years, we are unable to offer the vaccination to people under 65 years of age who are generally healthy. If in doubt, please feel free to discuss with your doctor or nurse.

**Pneumonia vaccination** continues to be offered to the same group of people as the flu vaccine, but for most people does not need repeating. (This vaccine is available all year round, so as you reach your 65<sup>th</sup> birthday, do come along for yours!!).

**Car Park Litter** We continue to have a problem with litter left in the car park, some of which is dangerous or a hazard to health. Please can we ask you not to empty your car litter and ashtrays in the car park. We particularly ask you not to



leave dirty nappies in the car park. We will shortly be installing a new baby changing unit in the waiting room toilet where there is already a bin for nappies so there should be no need to change baby in the car park. **Theft from car park** One of our young patients



recently had his scooter stolen from outside the surgery door. We are aware of the young persons who removed this scooter and would ask that it be returned to the surgery and

no questions will be asked. Please can we remind you all to be vigilant with your property. There is a cycle rack where you can lock your bicycles and you may be able to leave some items in the lobby for protection. Please ask in reception.

### Pastoral Letter

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"It would be very handy if I had wheels; I would not have to worry about locking up my bicycle"

That unforgettable quote came from a BBC programme on redesigning the human body. How could we be improved? Wheels would be better than legs in many ways. They are a much more efficient way of getting around on the flat. They are of course no use for going up stairs, as any Dalek will tell you. Also they are, it seems, biologically impossible. Veins, nerves & tendons just will not work in that way. All in all it seems what we have got is the best we can have.

The most obvious improvement I can think of would be for us to have a prehensile tail like some monkeys. It would be most useful on many occasions. You could hold the two broken bits together with your hands and use the tail to squeeze on the glue. At the moment I would use it for all the punctuation marks, leaving my fingers free to deal with the letters. I have never heard a convincing evolutionary explanation of why we lost a useful appendage we could so easily have developed. However I am sure there is some logical reason why it had to go; probably something to do with the way the brain processes information. Or maybe it is because then you could only wear a suit jacket with a single vent; an obvious social handicap.

All in all it seems that the way we are and what we have has a curious logic to it. And the result is frankly marvellous. It is also awe inspiring in its sophistication. As the Bible puts it, "I am fearfully and wonderfully made." Psalm 139.14

I think we should hang on to that sense of wonder and of gratitude.

I am not one of those Christians who feel that they have to insist that he world was made 6000 years ago. But I do think it important to struggle against the tendency to move evolution from the level of a useful biological theory to that of a life controlling myth. I do not think I am a mere accident. Nor do I think it sensible to deny that human kind is superior to mere animals. Neither do I see myself as potentially inferior to my computer. I do not think you can build a dignified civilisation on such views.

I do think there is a certain wonderful logic about our existence, a pull rather than a push in our formation. I think there is something unique and precious about the subtle way in which human attributes compliment and interact. We can reason both logically and intuitively. We can imagine, and we can sympathise. We can hope or we can despair.

Sadly I think we are beginning to despair. And largely because we have lost our grip on the final distinguishing human ability; we can worship.

We need the whole of the sentence I quoted above.

"I praise you, because I am fearfully and wonderfully made."

than we already spend actively seeking information from other villages.

### **Distribution of the magazine**

A number of readers have asked about the distribution process and why sometimes they do not receive their magazine until part way through the month.

The process is that once the print run has been completed ten large boxes of magazines are collected and brought to the Parish Church. Here they are counted, labelled and packaged into 28 bundles varying in size from 16 to 128 copies. These packages are then distributed to the volunteers who do the final doorstep deliveries through 1657 letter boxes. This happens every month of the year.

The bulk distribution usually takes place on the last weekend of the month. For example, the September issue was counted and packed on Friday 25 August and the bulk packages went out either the same day or the following day. The dates vary depending on the month end but the bulk deliveries always go out before the start of the new month.

Most of the final doorstep deliveries follow within a few days but delays do happen from time to time for



many good reasons including holidays, sickness and pressure of other commitments.

If you have repeated problems with late deliveries I will do what I can to improve things but please do remember that this is a

wholly voluntary process already running to a tight timetable.

Better still, if you can help with any stage of the delivery process that may help speed things up. Extra volunteers to share the load are always warmly welcomed.

If all else fails, you will find spare copies of the magazine available in the Parish Church, library or surgery on the bulk delivery day and if you come to help us count them you can take a copy home with you hot off the press!
