The Vardo – a memorial to the past

'*Vardo*' is the Romany name for a Gypsy caravan, and comes from the Iranian word '*vurdon*'. Bill and Elvey Coates (*pictured right*) are the proud owners of such a caravan which they keep at their home at Foxes Meadow.

This particular caravan is a Reading Dunton Upright Wagon, weighs one ton, and was built in 1857 at Reading, a specialised centre where non-Gypsies built wagons for Gypsies and showmen. Newlymarried couples commissioned caravans costing at that time from £50-£150. Each caravan took from 6 to 12 months to build. Different timbers were used for different purposes. Wheel hubs were made of elm, spokes of oak and wheel segments of ash; rear wheels had 14 spokes, front ones 12. The underworks, shafts and steps were made of ash; and the sides of the softer pine wood that was flexible enough to stand the stresses and strains without cracking. The caravans had elaborately carved porch brackets made from elm at the front and back. At the back of the caravan below the window is a cratch or hay rack. Below that is the kettle box for ironware. A



chimney pokes out of the roof on the right hand side, keeping clear of nearside trees and overhead bridges. Rainwater drains from the roof through brass spouts fashioned into lions' heads. Hanging under the caravan is an iron skidpan to slide behind the wheel to stop the caravan rolling downhill and a wooden 'Scotch' roller for going uphill.

Inside this caravan is a double bed for parents with another below for the children. Of course, families in general at that time were often much larger than today. Apparently, at one time, this caravan was home

From the Parish Council

Rubbish news

The Parish Council has employed someone to pick up litter, once a week, in Church Street, Long Lane as far as the surgery road, Short Lane and Silver Street. These streets look far cleaner and more pleasant



already. This round is on a trial basis for a month, after which it will be reviewed with a possible view to extending it. However, of course this service comes out of the precept, that is to say, out of the pockets of all Council Tax payers – the streets would look equally good at no cost to us all, if the litter was not dropped in the first place. Incidentally, litter-dropping is an offence under the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005, and anyone caught littering can be fined on the spot, or taken to court. (The same is true of graffiti.)



Users of the Co-op car park will have seen that there is now a CCTV camera sited there. This is to prevent fly-tipping of non-recyclable items in the car park, and particularly by the

recycling area. Fly-tipping in this context means dumping anything for which there is not a recycling bin – the bins are *only* for glass bottles and other glass items small enough to fit into the bins, and recyclable plastic. Two fly-tippers have already been fined.

Traffic in Over Road

Everyone who drives down Over Road, and probably many pedestrians too, will be aware of the problems of traffic at the approach to the Black Bull crossroads. County Highways proposes to extend the double yellow lines in Over Road at the crossroads from the end of the present restrictions as far as no. 4 on the north side of the road, and no. 1 on the south side. They have asked for any feedback on this proposal before they implement it. Please would anybody with a view on this proposal, either for or against, write to the Parish Council Office, by 24 November?

Annual Audit

The annual audit of the Council's accounts is now complete, and the Council has received the external auditor's certificate and opinion that its annual financial return is in accordance with the Audit Commission's requirements. The external auditor's certificate has been displayed on the Parish Noticeboard since 11 October, and will remain there until 11 November.

November Parish Council meeting

The November Parish Council meeting will be on Wednesday 1 November at 7 30 pm, in Willingham School. As usual, the agenda will be posted on Friday 27 October on the Village Notice Board outside the Public Hall, and in the Library; and there will be a slot in the meeting for members of the public to address the Council on any matters (whether on the agenda or not) which concern them.

for a family of eleven. There is also a cast iron stove for cooking and heat, along with built in cupboards and an imaginative use of engraved mirrors to give an illusion of more space and provide more natural

light – nothing new under the sun. Bill himself was born in an identical caravan at Orpington in Kent - but some time after 1857!

These caravans would have been drawn by a 14/15 hands cob, with another to share this task and also acting as a *'sider'* when help was needed on a steep hill.

The first owner of this caravan was Dony Upton. His 73- year -old grandson is still alive and living in Grunty Fen. The caravan was on the road until around 1950 when towing caravans were first used.

The caravan was based at Fen Drayton near Sam Johnston's farm for around 50 years. It then came into the hands of a Bill Barnett, who sold it to a pub landlord in Conington where it remained for about 30 years. The caravan was then moved to Oakington where Bill Coates acquired it in 1996 and set about the daunting task of restoring it. He carried out as much as possible of the work himself, and a friend did the numerous wood carvings that decorate every panel of the wagon sides. Elvey's hand is clearly visible in the intricate painting inside and outside.

Bill and Elvey look upon the caravan as a memorial to the past and something to look back on in a future when times will continue to change for us all.

Willingham Sports Council AGM

Who are Willingham Sports Council? The committee was formed independently of the Parish Council to raise funds for better sports facilities in our village. Our original aim was for a multi-use games area that can be used for all sports in all weather. However when we enquired about funding to our main funding bodies, we were advised that without better facilities ie showers and approved changing rooms - we were not in a strong position and other villages which have those facilities in place were likely to take preference.

It was decided to press ahead with a major Sports Pavilion refurbishment first. The old Pavilion no longer meets modern criteria and is well past its 'sell by date' as all users are aware. Recently there have been a number of small thefts from personal belongings. The new building will be redesigned, more secure with segregated changing rooms, new toilets and showers, generally larger and completely overhauled, inside and out.

The Sports Council is working for the Parish Council and ultimately for our sports players. The Pavilion is on Parish land and as such needs support from the Parish Council. Everything in our portfolio/development plan is in place and with deadlines looming we need to receive the signed approved documentation from the Parish Council to proceed with our application.

Willingham Sports Council AGM will be on **Wednesday 8 November 8 oo pm** at the Three Tuns public house. We desperately need some more members to help continue the fundraising. To date we have raised $\pounds_{13,000}$ from our own events and village donations. If you have a child who will benefit from the facilities, are an

adult user or simply have some pride in our village please consider lending a hand.

The committee would like to give special thanks to our chairman Simon Nunn who has given many hours to this project. Due to a change in his



circumstances Simon has to stand down, therefore a vacancy for chairman exists. With most of the preliminary work completed, Simon will remain on the committee and is happy to give his knowledge to his successor. We value everyone's support and hope to see you at the AGM. Message from your local Primary Care Trust

We have been asked by Cambridgeshire PCT to help to circulate this message to patients:-

How can you help the NHS to use its resources wisely?

Wasted medicines in primary care cost the NHS approximately £1.3 billion a year. If you're not using repeat prescribed drugs, please discuss your needs with your GP.

Nearly 1,000 patients did not attend their GP appointment at just one practice in the last year (that's 34,000 wasted appointments if the same level of waste is taking place at all local practices). If you book an appointment and subsequently don't need it, please let your surgery know so people who do need to see their GP can.

If your GP prescribes you an alternative drug to the one you are used to in the coming months, don't be concerned. He/she will have made sure that the replacement is equally clinically effective. Do talk to your GP if you have any questions. This could save your local NHS £1.3 million in one year.

Unless you are seriously ill or have been involved in an accident, think before visiting your hospital Emergency Department – seek advice from your GP or Out of Hours service first. It costs twice as much to have a minor ailment treated by specialist A & E clinicians as it would to visit your GP or out of hours GP service. This could save your local NHS £2 million in one year.

Compost 'Tips'!

Having suggested in the last Willingham Parish Magazine that more people should write for it, I will over the coming months try to put in some short articles about a very unglamorous subject (but close to the heart of many gardeners or allotment tenants)..... composting. I have trained as a Master Composter, a scheme for volunteers to train via the organisation Garden Organic (formerly HDRA), as a promoter of home composting.

Autumn composting

Colder weather is creeping up on us and it is heat that drives the composting process - external heat from the sun and that generated by the microorganisms that decompose the material. In autumn and winter the process inevitably slows down but that should not stop you from adding the required 'greens' and 'browns' to your heap.

Greens are the softer moister things like kitchen scraps, shredded or cut up garden refuse and grass clippings. **Browns** are the drier woodier things like hay and straw from pet bedding, cardboard torn up, some shredded newspaper and paper towels etc.

In autumn you may have a lot of leaves and windfall apples. These can both be composted but with precautions. Leaves can be put into their own leaf mould container as they take longer to rot than other greener items but if you leave them on the lawn and shred them with your mower they can then be added to your normal bin. Apples are very 'green' and a large number can attract fruit flies so one way of dealing with this is to wrap them in bits of paper first and toss them in or bury them under the rest of the pile.

Greens and Browns should be in a roughly equal mix so keep tossing in those egg boxes and cereal packets to keep the balance right.

Many people ask... Why bother composting at home when I have my green bin? I say, so that you can get free compost to put back on your own flower beds and also at some times of the year green bins are overflowing. It is also one part you can play in the whole Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, philosophy which we are all encouraged to take on board in a positive way.

Lastly, I am by no means an expert but if anybody locally would like any advice on home composting I am happy to have a chat or look at a forlorn heap to give any help I can. Happy Composting!

Pastoral Letter

A true story

A young Salvation Army officer and his family were entertaining their line managers to Sunday lunch. Every care had taken to ensure that the home was presentable. The young children were told about the important guests, and given detailed instructions as to behaviour. Everything was prepared with military precision the day before, and the dining table was immaculate.

The meal started with grace and the company began to eat. The children were dutifully quiet while the adults engaged in polite conversation. All was going well until ... well, allow me to explain. Surprisingly, it wasn't any of the children, but the Colonel who, rather carelessly, dropped some food, which landed in the lap of his best Sunday uniform. Mrs Captain's reaction was spontaneous. She automatically rose from her chair, took a damp cloth and began to deal with the minor incident as any mother would.

There was complete silence at the table. The children hadn't noticed anything unusual, but the Captain and the honoured guests were clearly not accustomed to this experience. The look on the face of the host revealed his embarrassment but the Colonel responded with grace, slightly amused that this young woman officer was patting his leg with a damp cloth!
