A Parish Plan

Villages throughout the country are being encouraged to create a parish plan. This is a document laying out priorities and long term plans for the development of the village.

It pulls together ideas covering all aspects of village life. It provides a framework around which future decisions can be made. It also acts as a guide for the District and County Councils as to what our priorities are.

It is very much a village plan and not a Parish Council plan. Although the Parish Council will be happy to help with the cost of devising and publishing the plan it is important that everyone living in the village has a chance to comment. The plan must be put together by a committee which represents a cross section of the community.

Geoff Turner has kindly agreed to chair and coordinate the process and now we need volunteers to work with him. Ideally we will need a committee of about a dozen people to design and distribute a suitable questionnaire, analyse the results and prepare the plan.

Parish Plan proposal

Parish Plans belong to the village not the Parish Council. However, the Parish Council wants to know how much support there would be in the village for such a plan – so please read and consider it carefully. Let Phil King or Geoff Turner know if you think you would like to get involved in making such a plan happen – or even if you think it is a good idea. Phil and Geoff would also be happy to answer any questions you might have about the process or the end result.

Missing street names

Over the past few months, a number of street names all over the village have been vandalised – broken or even removed entirely. If this includes your street, or if you see a broken or missing street name anywhere else in the village, let the Parish Clerk know and she will pass the list on to South Cambs District Council with a request for them to be replaced.

Oakington bomb clearance



You might have seen an article in the free newspaper early in December about the plan to dispose of a number of possible unexploded bombs on the Oakington Airfield site. Work is

currently going on to decide whether the items identified are actually unexploded bombs. If they are, disposal will start on Monday 8 January, and be finished by the end of Friday 12 January. The main effect on Willingham will be the route diversions which will be in place during that time. If they do turn out to be unexploded bombs, there will also be a few loud bangs!

Temporary road signs for community or charity events

The County Council has sent the Parish Council information on their new policy on temporary road signs for community and charity events:-

(County Council) staff will exercise discretion when temporary signs are erected within villages.....for a community or charity event, provided that they do not cause a hazard, are erected well away from junctions and accesses so as not to impede visibility or the passage of any highway user.

Signs should not exceed 0.5 sq. metres in area, should not be erected for more than 7 days before the event or remain in place for more than 48 hours afterwards. The signs should be erected within the village.....where the event is taking place. Normally, no more than 3 signs should be erected per event.

Organisers of community or charity events should inform their local highways divisional office at least 2 weeks before erecting any temporary signs.

Where more extensive signing or direction signing is required, communities should seek the assistance of the AA or RAC, following guidelines for commercial events.

The Parish Council requests the organisers of any such events to note and abide by this policy.

Profile: Alan and Amy Robinson

Anyone who lived in Willingham between 1951 and 1986 will know Alan Robinson. He came to the village as postmaster on 1 November 1951 – the same day as Dr Flower – and retired 35 years later. When he came, the Post Office was at 31 High Street. Alan and Amy moved it to 3 Church Street, and then, in 1963, back to High Street, to its present location.

Alan grew up in Over. On leaving school he worked for the Great Ouse River Board, and then for the railway, leaving in 1941 to join the RAF, as a wireless mechanic. He served in Egypt, Iraq and Syria, and then returned to the UK in 1946. He was de-mobbed in 1947. Then it was back to the railway, until he followed the career footsteps of his father, postmaster at Over, into

the job which brought him to Willingham.

Life was very different then. Alan recalls: 'We didn't have an alarm fitted for many years'. One of his abiding memories is handling every day ten or more telegrams about the price of fruit and vegetables. 'Few people had



telephones then', he explains, adding: 'In the 1950s everyone was growing flowers in their spare time – to make ends meet.'

When he retired, in 1986, Willingham still had only three postmen, only one of whom was fulltime.

Amy Robinson, from a farming family living in Hinxton, came to know Alan when their paths crossed at Cambridge station – Amy on her way to the Cambridgeshire High School for Girls (now Long Road), Alan to the High School for Boys (now Netherhall). An Over friend of Amy's was Alan's cousin.

In 1941, as Alan joined the RAF, Amy began training as a teacher (in Doncaster, where her London college was evacuated). Her first teaching job was in Essex. In those wartime

days teachers did not choose where to teach; they were allocated according to need. Her memories include teaching in underground air raid shelters; the war was still at its height, and bombing a feature of life in southeast England.

Pastoral Letter

I do thank God that the term 'Crimbo' seems to have died a deservedly miserable death.

Churches Together praying for the people of Willingham and Rampton

In the second full week in each month the Churches in Willingham and Rampton will be praying for the people who live in a particular area of the village. In January this is High Street, Stocks Terrace, Osbourn Close and Saxon Way.

History of the Fen-Edge settlements

2 - Iron Age and Roman

Last month we looked at the somewhat scattered evidence for settlement on the Fen Edge up to the end of the Bronze Age. It is unlikely that there was any break in population between the Bronze and Iron Ages. For the people at the time, the main difference would have been the improvement brought by the new, iron technology. As iron is a harder metal, giving more durable and sharper cutting edges, this led to better axes to clear woodland, and more efficient ploughs. Some Iron Age sites will have simply been continuations of Bronze Age predecessors which have left little trace. Others will have been expansions on to land which would have been impractical to farm using Bronze Age technology.

There is substantial evidence for settlement on the Fen Edge in the Iron Age (after c 700 BC), By then the Fens were very wet, but signs of occupation have been found on the slightly higher ground at the Fen Edge, including at Willingham, Cottenham, Over and

Waterbeach. There was a farmstead with round houses at Longstanton, and pottery manufacture at Swavesey. A reconstruction of such a farmstead can be seen in Hinchingbrooke Country Park, near Huntingdon.

However, better cutting-edge technology (in both literal and figurative senses) also led to more efficient weaponry. By the later Iron Age South Cambridgeshire was on the border between the tribal lands of the Catuvellauni and the Iceni (who were later ruled by the famous Queen Boudicca), a border marked by a line of distinctive circular forts. Belsar's Hill may have been one of these forts.

The Romans invaded Britain in 43 AD. Cambridge itself is a Roman foundation, first as a fortress in AD 61 after the revolt of Oueen Boudicca, and subsequently as the prosperous town of Durolipons. The A10 and A14 roads are of Roman origin, the A10 (Akeman Street) heading north-east past Ely, and the A14 linking Cambridge with the Roman settlement of Godmanchester. A system of canals was constructed, partly to drain the Fens, and partly for transport. This included the Car Dyke which, by linking stretches of natural waterways, enabled the transport of farm produce including grain, leather and pottery from South Cambridgeshire to the Roman army at Lincoln and possibly even as far north as York.

Roman settlements developed out of some of the Iron Age farmsteads. The best preserved one on the Fen Edge is at Bullock's Haste in Cottenham, which was a large village or a small town; and there were also settlements at Waterbeach, Landbeach and Willingham. At

> Willingham and Cottenham also there were small temples. Several hoards of coins and of religious objects have been found, including one of priestly regalia from the second century AD, and a fourthcentury group of pewter plates (one with a Christian symbol). However despite the richness of the farmland, there are no Roman villas on the Fen Edge (although there are a number on the higher ground to the south of the county). It is thought that the area was drained and then managed as an imperial estate, presumably to supply the Roman army. It would have been worked by tenant farmers living in the settlements, but none became rich enough to be able to afford to

build a villa. Horningsea was a major centre of pottery manufacture, this extending to the western banks of the Cam and through much of Milton.

Lost Property

If you are unfortunate enough to lose or have property stolen, want to increase the chances of getting it back and if stolen help the police to catch the thieves responsible then you should visit www.lmmobilise.com.

Immobilise is a national register and is part of a linked series of secure databases. It is the result of a continuing close working relationship between the Home Office, the Department of Trade and Industry, the Mobile Phone Industry and the Police. Designed originally to tackle the rising problem of mobile phone theft, the Immobilise Register is now capable of recording details of all identifiable property including car music systems, cycles, computers and of course mobile phones. The register currently has over 20 million items registered including over 750,000 cycles. So far nearly 15000 people have registered in the CB post code areas.

This site is searched frequently by police staff all over the country and can be searched immediately.

From April to July 2005 the Metropolitan Police alone had 1,624 positive results from searching this register.

Cambridge Constabulary strongly recommend that you visit www.Immobilise.com and see for yourself how easy it is to register your property. It is free to use and you may register as many items as you wish. You can also visit your account within the register and add and delete items and you can also post them as lost or stolen. For a cycle use the frame number usually found under where the pedals are attached. For all other items use the serial or registration number. The website is very clear and will guide you through a delightfully simple process.

This system is an excellent way to protect your property using the latest technology. Not only will it improve your chances of getting your property back but it provides an excellent audit trail and is a very useful tool in providing the evidence to bring criminals to a prosecution. Catching the thieves has got to be the most effective way to prevent theft.
