Teens march for Freedom Day



Did you really see a chain gang moving down the High Street. on March 24? Is it true on that day Willingham Auction's first lot was a group of young slaves? Yes this really happened in our village ... but fortunately just for publicity; 200 years ago such things were real. March 25 was the 200th anniversary of the abolition of slavery in the UK and throughout the nation local communities held special events to mark the day and remind us that, sadly, slavery is alive and well - even in the UK.

In Willingham a group of teenagers decided to join in the national campaign and organize their own event. They started meeting monthly from last summer and have looked at the sometimes frightening details of human trafficking. To try to raise awareness they created a publicity event in which they became slaves for a day to feel what it would be like to be herded around and even to be presented at an auction. The Co-Op supported by allowing the creation of a "Freedom Wall" outside the shop where people could read about the issue and sign declaration cards to let the government know that people care.

'With all the bad press teenagers get these days it's great to see one group doing something positive' said Phil King, Vice Chair of the Parish Council. Ruth Sanders joined the group after seeing it mentioned in the Willingham News. She said 'I am 13 years old and I have been campaigning within my church for 'Stop the Traffik.' I do have other activities but for a problem like Stop the Traffik I am prepared to drop other things and come running.' 16 year old Rob Phillips said 'I'm going to petition Tony Blair by email every day until he responds.'

Other events around the area included a thought provoking Labyrinth in the Octagon organized by Kathryn Wright.

The teenagers are part of a local group called "The Sunday Thing" and the organizers wish to thank the local organizations that provided support. The problem of human trafficking is a growing problem often hidden from view but with tragic consequences for those who are unwittingly caught up in it. From the Parish Council

Youth building proposal

Members of the Parish Council recently visited the new Youth Building in Milton. They were very impressed with the whole project. They are consulting with young people's representatives in Willingham, and looking into funding sources, to see whether something similar could be provided for our village.

Piper Lifelines

The Parish Council owns a number of Piper Lifelines – emergency call systems for vulnerable people (elderly and those with disabilities) providing an immediate link via a specialised telephone between the person's home and an emergency call centre 24 hours a day. It currently has one available for loan to anyone in Willingham who meets the criteria. If you think you could use this, please contact the Council Chairman Mrs Pat Daniels (contact details below), in confidence, and she will put you in touch with the scheme's administrator.

Vandalism issues



Following meetings during February with police representatives, as reported last month, the police have been seeking to provide more effective cover for Willingham. However, the Parish Council appreciates that **instances** of vandalism and rowdy behaviour

still occur. If you witness or suffer from any such instances, please do ensure that the police are informed. It is only through adequate reporting that they will know the current scale of any problems, and only through accurate reporting figures that the Parish Council has the means to negotiate any improved police cover needed.

Public Art appointment

We are pleased to be able to report that an artist has been appointed to work with the Willingham community to create a piece of public art which will be both attractive and beneficial to the village. She is Zoe Chamberlain, who is fairly local (she is based in Burwell), and examples of her work can be seen on her website, www.zoechamberlain.com.

Cambridge Dial-a-Ride

Cambridge Dial-a-Ride provides transport for groups and individuals over 16 who through disability, infirmity or age would otherwise have difficulty accessing public transport. They cover Cambridge City, most villages in South Cambs District, and some in East Cambs District. They can drive people to the shops, to visit friends and relatives, to the doctor, the dentist, or the hairdresser, to day centres (although not at present to hospital appointments). They call as near as possible to your front door, and are equipped with ramps and lifts for wheelchair users. They will take people to Tesco's at Bar Hill, or into Cambridge City centre, on alternate weeks. However, they can only offer these services to Willingham residents on Wednesdays.

There is an annual membership fee, and also a perjourney fare; bus pass holders get reductions, and anyone registered as visually impaired travels free. Journeys are booked in advance by calling 01223-506335 or E-mailing camdar05@hotmail.co.uk. Membership forms and details of charges can be obtained from the office (same contact details). Jottings from your County Councillor

I was delighted that, after a number of years of lobbying, work is finally taking place to replace the footway along Over Road. This piece of footway has long caused problems, partly because of the slope and partly because of its poor condition, but at long last funds have been found to re-build it.

This month seems to have been a month of petitions. The first, to the County Council cabinet followed the very nasty accident in January along the Willingham-Rampton Road. I fully support measures to improve safety for pedestrians, cyclists and horseriders along this stretch of road, which gets busier by the day. Whenever the A14 is blocked, which is an almost daily occurrence, Willingham becomes a magnet for rat running and I support any measures to make the road safer. Given that this is the route to get to Cottenham Village College, a cycleway linking with the one already in place between Rampton and Cottenham seems an obvious a logical solution.

The second petition, to the South Cambridgeshire Area Joint Committee sought enforcement of the 30mph limit along Earith Road. Although I was unable to be present at the meeting, the current situation is ludicrous. The interactive signs have never worked and I have lost count of the number of occasions I have asked for them to be repaired. Better enforcement, including proper enforcement by the police, is essential, but at the end of the day, the only real solution is for Willingham to have a full bypass.

We would urge anyone who is able to attend an afternoon surgery to use these new sessions if at all possible. We would welcome any feedback on how these new sessions are working for you.

Dr Gordon Hewlett's retirement - As I'm sure you all know by now Dr Hewlett retired at the end of March after 40 years with the practice. Our thanks to all who have left messages for Gordon in his Memories Book and who attended one of our Open Mornings. We will give news of how these went in next month's newsletter.

Willingham Pharmacy news - We have recently installed a **private consultation area**. If you would like to discuss any aspect of your medication or general health in confidence please ask to speak to Neil our Pharmacist. We can now offer you a **Medicines Use Review** to help you get the most from the medicines you have been prescribed. The review will allow our Pharmacist to establish a full picture of how you use your medicines to ensure

that you are getting the best possible outcome from your treatment. The service is provided free of charge to eligible patients.

Stile free parishes - creating access for everyone!

Would you like to help improve access to the countryside for everyone?

The Countryside Access Team is working towards this and continuing to make improvements to the network of public paths in Cambridgeshire. Officers are keen to work with local farmers and landowners in the replacing of stiles with kissing gates, where they are required for stock control.

Kissing gates provide easier access than stiles for people who are less mobile, disabled, and for those with wheelchairs and pushchairs. This removes barriers to the routes across the county and allows everyone to use the rights of way and enjoy the countryside.

In previous years access officers have carried out a gates programme using funding from the Local Transport Plan. Working closely with parishes, farmers and landowners, the parishes of Woodhurst, Caxton and Great Staughton are all now benefiting from new gates.

The Fen Rivers Way is also nearly free of stiles along its 17 mile route from Cambridge to Ely, and the parishes of Bourn and Horseheath are currently undergoing gate improvements.

The team are keen to continue this much needed improvement work in many other parishes and would appreciate the help from local landowners and farmers to do this.

Betrayal, stress, cruelty, injustice and violent death are not the sorts of thing you want to dwell on. Not unless you are making a Panorama documentary.

For the first few centuries the Church pretty well managed without it. But Easter was always the great celebration, the focus of the Christian calendar.

Restoration news Grant

for organ restoration work. The Heritage Lottery Fund



(HLF) has awarded a grant of £13,700 towards the cost of renovating the 1912 Harrison & Harrison organ at the parish church. The restoration work, mainly to the complex and sophisticated pedal pneumatic action, is to be carried out by a Norfolk firm of organ builders, Holmes & Swift, based in Fakenham.

Events at the Churches

The work is due to begin immediately after Easter. As part of the restoration process, the 582 pipes will be taken away for cleaning.

Bill Kirkman, who plays the organ at the parish church said: 'We are most grateful to HLF for this grant, which is a recognition of the high quality of the Willingham organ.' He quoted the comment of Dr Gerald Gifford, international recitalist and emeritus professor at the Royal College of Music, who lived for many years in Cottenham, and knows the organ well. Gerald said 'it was to my mind one of the finest examples of Harrison & Harrison's work in the field of small organ design of its era. Built just a few years later than the same firm's magnificent organ at Ely Cathedral, it bears a number of hallmarks of their larger instruments, and thankfully remains to this day as an essentially untouched example of their work.'

enthusiasm, based on long experience of scouting, that got it started in 1963, and built it to the flourishing state which it now enjoys.

The enthusiasm remains. 'In my humble opinion', Tony declares, Scouting is the greatest youth movement ever.'

The Scout movement was founded by General Baden-Powell in February 1907. Tony notes that it began, in Poole, Dorset, with 20 boys. There are now more than 28 million Scouts around the world.

Tony Fowler's own involvement began in 1943, as a cub scout at the Perse preparatory school. He moved to the Perse Upper School (then so-called) and was a member of the school troop. He also joined the Air Section of the Combined Cadet Force, and with that background entered the RAF in 1951. By the early 1960s Tony was Assistant Scout Master (the term now is Leader) of 29th Cambridge Scout Group, East Barnwell.

Moving to Willingham, he discovered that there was no troop in the village – and that many people wished there was. He cut his ties with the 29th, called a meeting in the (old) school, and things began to happen. At an early stage he recruited Lyn Curtis and as a result of Tony's remarkable powers of persuasion, she later became Cub Scout Leader – in 1969.

Meanwhile, he met the Parish Council, which agreed that the newly formed Scout Troop could use the Public Hall. It is still the meeting place for Willingham's Scouts.

Parents raised money to buy old army wardrobes to store kit. Later, as the troop grew, other fund-raising activities were started. For several years in the mid-1970s Scouts, and a group of parents, went round the village on the first Saturday each month collecting waste paper for sale. They also organised a collection of saleable metal.

For a time Tony was the only Scout leader, but he soon recruited others, the first being Dave Daniels. Tony became Group Scout Leader.

Talking of people's willingness to serve, he emphasises that Scout leaders are volunteers. 'Some people', he remarks with surprise and disappointment 'even a few years ago thought that leaders were paid.' Tony's contribution to Scouting was not just in Willingham. He became the first Assistant District Commissioner for leader training across the District. He joined a training team, set up by Lieutenant Colonel Harry Mainwaring, then County Commissioner, as part of a plan to make Scouting more adventurous. Tony speaks warmly of Harry Mainwaring as one of the 'characters' in the Scouting firmament.

When Dusty Reynolds, who had a RAF background, became an Assistant Scout Leader, the Troop became Air Scouts (which chimed in with Tony's own National Service experience). With the help of Colin Dews, company service manager at Pye, who was Tony's boss, Willingham's Scouts were able to enjoy gliding.

Listening to Tony Fowler talking, still with huge enthusiasm, about the growth and development of Scouting in Willingham and beyond, you marvel that he actually had time for a career as well. In fact, he had joined Pye in 1951, left to join the RAF, but because of his father's illness ceased to be a regular, and returned to Pye after two years of national service. He joined Pye Telecommunications on 18 May 1953. Three months later his father, who had worked for Pye throughout the war, died.

After 21 years in the service department, Tony became the company's health and safety adviser in 1974. Health and safety regulations came in nationally on 1 April of that year, and Tony reflects wryly that, given the way in which the regulations have developed, the date was well chosen.

He retired (from Philips, as the firm had become) in 1991, after almost 40 years of service. In retirement he worked part-time for the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme in Cambridgeshire – an appropriate role, since, as he notes, Scouting has now embraced the Duke of Edinburgh's Gold Award, which is held jointly with the distinction of becoming a Queen's Scout. Tony takes particular pride in the fact that in 1985 his son Tim, Andrew Cook and Tim Curtis, were the first Willingham Scouts to win the coveted Queen's Scout Award.

Now finally retired,

Tony is still involved in County Scouting events. He was in Ely Cathedral for the celebration in February of the 100th anniversary of the founding of the Scout Movement. In 1996 he was presented with the Silver Wolf, which is the personal gift of the Chief Scout, in recognition of his services to Scouting in Cambridge and Cambridgeshire.



Hundreds of Willingham boys have enjoyed and benefited from Scouting, and Tony Fowler takes great pleasure from the fact that the foundations he laid have proved so solid and lasting. Why is it that Scouting continues to flourish? Tony's reply is clear: 'It offers a sense of fun, achievement and challenge'.

Has Scouting lost anything? Tony regrets that the extremes of health and safety legislation – and the fact

that so many people are now keen to 'make a quick buck by suing' – have made it more difficult to offer those things. He adds: 'Because of red tape many parents won't help because they're frightened'. In making this point, he also makes it clear that the Scout movement has always taken a responsible attitude. 'We were the first organisation to vet leaders, long before it was compulsory', he recalls.

Advice from Cambridgeshire Constabulary

SHED AND GARAGE BURGLARIES It is getting to the time of the year when the Police start to see an increase in this type of reported crime, now is the time to help prevent this. What can you do?

- * Put away all tools and equipment and lock up. Remember these tools could be used to break into your home. Don't leave ladders outside, or chain them up if you have to.
- * Replace standard hinges with strap hinges secured by coach bolts or use security screws on existing hinges.
- * Use good quality locks to secure your gates and doors. A tough pad bar (also called hasp and staple) fitted with a strong padlock and secured with coach bolts is the most effective way of securing a door. Some standard locks fitted to up-and-over garage doors are easily overcome. A padlock with a hasp and staple fitted on each side is very effective. Specialist locks for such doors are also available. Double garage doors with a rim latch should be supplemented with a mortice deadlock. If the garage is attached to the main building ensure that connecting doors are secure.
- * Install outside security lighting operated by either movement sensor or photoelectric cell (Dusk to Dawn light).
- * Check that your household insurance covers theft from your garden and outbuildings.
- * Mark your power tools etc. with your post code and house number or the first two letters of your house name. Alternatively, permanently mark them by scratching or painting: this will also reduce their value to the thief. Fit a batteryoperated alarm. These can cost less than you think.
- Fit a window grille and/or frosted window film to stop a thief seeing into your shed or garage. Chain tools cycles and other valuable equipment together using high security chain or cable and a good quality padlock.
- * Photograph valuable and unusual garden ornaments and keep these in a secure place.
