Willingham under water - 60 years on

For people who were living in Willingham in 1947, the floods remain a vivid memory. Much of the village – and many square miles of the whole Fenland region – were under water. The floods occurred in March, after the coldest February on record, with low temperatures combined with heavy snow, comparable with the situation in January 1814.

The severe conditions of 1947 took place in a year when Britain faced fuel and food shortages, two years after the end of the Second World War.

After the extreme cold of January and February 1947, a sudden thaw in March coincided with high spring tides. The ground remained frozen, and the flood water filled the rivers to the brim.

Mike Petty, well-known local historian, describes it graphically. In *Stories of Flood*, he writes that there was talk of calling in the army. 'The town criers at Haddenham and Swavesey are appealing for extra men to go to the aid of Willingham, just one of the danger points.'

Desperate attempts were made to stem the flood with sandbags, and volunteers worked in appalling conditions, as land and homes were flooded.

The main breaches of the river bank came on 17 March, after hurricane force winds had swept water over the tops of the banks. One of the breaches was at Little Thetford. It swamped the main railway line. To quote Mike Petty again: 'The other was way out in the fen near Earith where a 50 yard gap had been torn in the river bank and properties at Over and Willingham were flooded, the water flowing east until it was checked by the main Old West river bank alongside which runs the Earith to Willingham road.'

> After the floods had finally subsided, people were able to comprehend the full extent of the damage, to the land, and to their homes.

> After 1947, river banks have been strengthened, and more channels cut, but as we all know, the impact of global warming on sea levels already poses a threat to the coastal areas of East Anglia. For those who experienced the 1947 floods, that threat will reawaken memories of what did happen, not simply thoughts of what might happen.

Annual Parish Meeting

The search for a new cemetery site

Electricity use monitoring

Northstowe – a Community Development Trust?

Two members of Willingham Parish Council - Pat Daniels, the chairman, and Bill Kirkman - attended a consultation event organised by South Cambridgeshire District Council at Over Community Centre on 17 March. The aim was to explore and discuss issues raised by the possibility of establishing a Community Development Trust centred on Northstowe, and involving neighbouring communities.

It was unfortunate that the event took place a few days after the announcement that inspectors had overthrown the views of District, County and Parish Councils about the Northstowe development. Inevitably, many of those taking part felt disillusioned about this particular aspect of the working of democracy, and expressed our disillusionment strongly.

The officials from the District Council behaved with impeccable professional detachment, and the presentation of the issues, and the discussion, were handled well.

What emerged strongly was the fact that the formation of a Community Development Trust - a charitable organisation - could add value to the community which will grow in and around Northstowe. It could do this, for example, by generating income from the management of assets, by contracting to deliver services on behalf of other bodies (such as the Town Council), and by accessing external funding through charitable grants and loans.

Marilyn Taylor, an independent consultant, set out possibilities clearly, and presented some case studies of similar arrangements.

Most of us who took part were persuaded that a Trust could work, and could bring real benefits. It would be a major enterprise, requiring trustees of wide experience, and staff of ability.

Theft from Cars and the use of Immobilise to trace property

Lock your car - always.

Keep all your valuables out of sight – even a coat can tempt a thief as they don't know what is in the pockets. If you have to leave things in the car lock them in the boot out of sight.

If you see anything suspicious - note the registration number, write it down with a description of the car and occupiers as soon as you can, alert others to the potential problem and inform the police.

Items stolen from cars are usually sold quickly for cash. All over the country, police have stores of seized items that they would like to return to the legitimate owners. Unfortunately it is impossible to identify them. A FREE way to ensure your valuables are identifiable all over the UK is to register your property on www.immobilise.com. This site is searched thousands of times every day by British Police officers.

When registering an item on **www.immobilise.com** a user I.D. and password is generated which allows you to access the site and add or delete items at any time. There is no limit to the number of items that you can register. The recorded information can help you after loss, theft or fire to complete insurance claims, report stolen or lost property to the Police and mobile phone networks. Registered items can be identified anywhere in the country making it far more likely that your property will be returned. More importantly it may give the Police an audit trail to find the thief and bring about a successful prosecution.

Did you know that on 1 July 2007 England is going smoke free?

(From the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Public Health Network)

From 1 July 2007, virtually all enclosed public places and workplaces in England will be smoke free. This means that it will be against the law to smoke in the indoor parts of places such as pubs, bars, nightclubs, cafes and restaurants, lunch rooms, membership clubs and shopping centres. At work, smoking inside will become a thing of the past, and indoor smoking rooms will no longer be allowed. Public transport and work vehicles used by more than one person will also need to be smoke free.

Secondhand smoke is bad for health because it is a recognised carcinogen, which means that it is known to cause cancer in humans. Secondhand smoke can significantly increase a non-smokers likelihood of getting lung cancer or heart disease. And, because 85% of secondhand smoke is invisible and odourless, even though you think your workplace, pub or club is not a particularly smoky place you may be at more harm than you realise.

This problem, therefore, is not just an inconvenience to people who walk through the village – it is a health and safety issue. For more information on this please refer to *The Dog (Fouling of Land) Act 1996* in England and Wales.

We recently acquired a dog and found a perfect solution to 'picking up the poo' – a scooper from Pets at Home for just a couple of pounds. I am asking the dog owners of Willingham to please act responsibly and pick up after their dogs. I don't understand why some people think they should be exempt from this basic rule.

Memories of the late Frank Cook

Further to our letter to the Willingham News of 22 February 2007, which you were kind enough to publish, we are writing to record our happy memories of Frank Cook, who was our neighbour in Church Street for many years after we first arrived, in April 1981.

Soon after our arrival, requiring some renovations to our cottage, we asked Ann Vass, then proprietor of the Three Tuns, if she could recommend a reliable builder. 'Oh yes', she said, 'Mr Cook – but you must realise that he works at enormous speed – when I first came here, I asked him if he could remove a fireplace in the back room for me, and when I went in a few minutes later it had gone!'

In subsequent years we came to know Frank well and to fully appreciate this piece of early advice – he was an excellent all-round builder and an outstanding bricklayer as well as a highly respected undertaker, and his speed and efficiency were legendary. So much so that his phrase 'yes, I can do that for you' became a watchword in our house and remains so to this day!

Of course he also served St Mary and All Saints church as Church Warden for many years. Some years ago, when our neighbour Rendell Denson died, Frank Cook was responsible for his interment. Attending the funeral, but knowing few of the mourners well, Jane and I found ourselves standing in the churchyard a little apart, near to where Frank, in his black top hat and morning coat, stood talking to the vicar. As we had decided that we would like to be buried in the churchyard ourselves when the time comes, I went over to Frank and asked him if this would be possible, and if so, how to go about arranging it.

Well' he said, 'You will need to apply to the Parish Council'. I asked him how we should do this. 'You will need to ask the Verger', he said. 'Oh, who is that?' 'Me' came the reply. Then he looked me up and down as though sizing me up, and said, 'are you down for the whole week-end?'!

We missed Frank and his wife when they moved away from Church Street and were sad when he developed Parkinson's Disease so soon after his retirement. We miss him still, but his name lives on in our house whenever Jane asks me to do some job around the house, my automatic response is 'yes, I can do that for you'!

Memory is not nostalgia - or at least, not always

It was 1968 when my family came to live in Willingham, and in some ways it seems like yesterday. I certainly find that memory is often more a matter of the significance of what is remembered than pure chronology. One of the truisms often uttered is that 'everyone remembers where they were when President Kennedy was assassinated'. It is probably true; I certainly do remember. It is almost certainly not true, however, for anyone born in 1958 or after: five-yearolds are not usually focused on international events.

Another way of putting this is that memory is stimulated by change, and change is often incremental. I remember when I came to Willingham, because moving house and home is always a major event in one's life. Whether something happened in 1969, or 1970, or 1979, may well be much more difficult to recall.

This was brought home to me a few days ago in a conversation with a woman in her early twenties. How the village has changed in her lifetime, she remarked, and referred to recent new building developments. I agreed, and added: 'And of course Balland Field is another example of the village growing'. It is – for me

– but not for her. She had never known Willingham without Balland Field.

Sometimes, obviously, we yearn for something that is no longer. That, surely, should be the exception rather than the rule. Most of us have no wish to live in the past, and even when at odd moments we think it would be pleasant, we then remind ourselves that much of the gold of a golden age is likely to be tarnished.

If it is unhealthy to live in the past, it is certainly not unhealthy to know about it, and appreciate it, and see what we can learn from it. That is why anniversaries are useful; they encourage us to put things in perspective. Two hundred years since the abolition of the slave trade; 60 years since the independence of India; 50 years since the independence of Ghana, such things raise important questions about national life today.

The Old Willingham website, the Dennis Jeeps pictures in the Cambridgeshire Collection, and the profiles which we have been publishing in Willingham News all play their part in putting local change in perspective.
