Turned out nice, again

Last year, *Willingham News* carried an item about the Percheron horses so successfully shown by Gordon Baileys and his team. Willingham is also able to boast of another equally successful family who too show Percheron horses, but in a different manner.

This team is known as *Hales Percherons*, and is led by Owen Garner, supported by his son Harry, his brother Raymond, and his sister Janet Wake; and ably assisted by Jim and Claire Easy. At show times, the whole family pitches in to help get everything up to scratch and ready for the big day. After the show, Owen's mother Evelyn washes all the ribbons. The team gets its name from buildings to the west of Hales Farm in West Fen where this enterprise first began. The team uses the names *E Garner and Sons*. When Owen's father died, a new business was set up with that name, and the 'E' stands for 'Evelyn'.

The main focus of the team is what is termed 'turnout classes'. Horses are hitched to carts or drays; and together are referred to as turnouts. Horses may by hitched in a pair side by side, in tandem where one horse



leads another, in unicorn where one horse leads a pair, in fours, or in sixes. All aspects of the turnouts are judged, including the standard of driving, the condition and appearance of the dray, the cleanliness and fitting of the harness, and the appearance and fitness of the horses. The rigs are pulled by all the different breeds of heavy horse, including Percherons.

East Anglia has always been an agricultural area and hundreds of heavy horses were used for farm and other work. During the First World War, many farmers served in France where they first came across Percheron horses. Unlike the heavy horses used at home, Percherons are *'clean legged'* in that they have no feathers or long hair on their legs, and so do not accumulate mud in the same way. This was seen as a great advantage, and thus the breed was introduced into England.

Four generations of Garners have and still are contributing to the success of the team. It all really began back in the 1940s when Owen's grandfather acquired his first pedigree Percheron mare. Owen's father, Cyril, and uncle, Stanley, were the initial team members. In those days when transport was very different from today, stallions of different breeds were walked from village to village to cover the mares owned

Looking for a new Parish Councillor

The Parish Council was very sorry to accept the resignation of Cllr Rebecca Mead. They are now seeking a new Councillor to replace her.

CCTV at the Ploughman Hall

The recently-installed CCTV at the Ploughman Hall has already proved its worth, in helping in the identification of people causing criminal damage. The matter is currently with the police.

Police

At the first meeting of the new Swavesey Neighbourhood Police Liaison Panel, which includes Willingham, it was agreed that antisocial behaviour in Willingham would be a particular target for policing in the village for the next few months. These Panel meetings, which are open to the public, are aimed at enabling local people to highlight to the police those matters which are high on residents' agendas, so that the police can target their resources on issues which matter most on the ground. The next Panel is on 21st August, 7 30pm. Venue to be confirmed; see www.cambs-police.co.uk for further details in due course. And don't forget that there is a police attendance on the first Wednesday of every month at the housing "surgery", 10 00am - 12 noon at Willingham Baptist Church in George Street.

Public Art Project

The Parish Council would like to clarify the situation regarding the Public Art Project. The money for this project is not coming from the Precept/Council Tax! Likewise, this is not money which we could have had to use for anything else. This is money which had to be set aside from the Bourneys Manor Close development public contribution, solely and specifically for the purpose of a piece of public art. The Parish Council initially opposed the idea of a piece of public art, and tried to negotiate for the money to be used for what might be considered more 'practical' and pressing needs. However, it was made clear to them that if the money were not used for artwork, it would not be available at all. On that basis the Parish Council has been working with the District Council for the provision of something which combines the aesthetics of a piece of art with the provision of a practical need in the village. The artist's brief is to design something which will enhance the appearance, and add to the amenities, of the High Street. A programme of public consultation is an integral part of this brief.

Cambridge Water Village Life Fund grants 2007 ten awards of £250 are available from Cambridge Water in association with *The Cambridge News*, to help towards fund-raising for village groups or projects – to support activities which will benefit village communities and make a positive difference. Last year's awards were given to projects including improving a village hall garden for community events, T-shirts for young people across eight villages engaged in community activities, funds for a new church carpet, and repairs to a village pump. **The closing date for applications is Friday 13 July**. The Parish Clerk has an application form, or they can be obtained by phoning Louise or Margaret on 01223-846955, where any queries should also be addressed.

The search for a new cemetery site

The Parish Council is still searching for a suitable site for a new cemetery within the parish boundaries. New regulations mean that the new site will have to be well above the water table, and not within 250 metres of a watercourse. This means that a number of otherwise suitable sites in the village can not be considered.

If you own 3 - 4 acres of land which you think might be suitable and which you would be willing to consider selling to the Parish Council, please would you get in touch with the Parish Clerk at the Parish Council Office?

by local farmers. Chivers imported Percheron stallions which were used to help start the Garner bloodline. The stables at the rear of the White Hart (the large white building next to the Co-op) were used for this purpose. The Garners have always bred their own mares using a number of specially chosen stallions, including some with Canadian blood. A couple of years ago, Owen decided that he would like to have his own stallion with a view to improving the bloodline still further. He looked at French horses and found that, since they were no longer used either as working or show horses, they had been bred solely for human consumption. Accordingly, they were no longer up to the required standard. The French have now imported stallions from America to try to improve matters. He was already very impressed by Canadian Percherons and eventually went to Canada and brought over Ryans Day Stewart, a stallion who has been in much demand ever since. Hales Percherons are named after Greek gods and goddesses and a powerful name is chosen. Each year, the names all begin with same letter, gradually working through the alphabet until the time comes to start from the beginning again. It takes about three years to build up and train a foal to begin driving in a championship. A horse usually reaches its peak when it reaches 7 or 8 years old and may usually carry on driving until it is around 12 years old. Thereafter, mares may be used for breeding purposes, and the geldings are retired. The team has 14 horses at present with more planned.

The team has competed successfully at the Royal Highland, East of England, Suffolk, Norfolk, Royal, Newark and Royal County of Berkshire shows. The



picture is of the turnout at the East of England show in 2005 with Owen driving Hales Xanthus (Rosie) nearest the camera and Hales Lorimer alongside. Rosie is Owen's favourite turnout mare. past four years at the Royal show (the Royal show is more of a national show that the other regional shows). She also helped to win the turnout championship twice. Hales Uni became the first heavy horse to lift the Supreme in hand Champion Horse or Pony at the 2004 Royal Show.

Owen's philosophy is that you get back exactly what you put in and that there is no fast route to success in the heavy horse show world. His ambitions are to breed a team of four matching mares capable of winning, to maintain the team's standards, and to carry on learning.

When asked why Willingham has been able to produce so many champion Percherons, he thought it was down to local friendly competition and co-operation, and to two outstanding and occasionally linked bloodlines. This is perhaps best summed up by a quotation from the Autumn 2003 edition of *Heavy Horse World: 'Baileys are still close neighbours, friends and rivals, and Baileys' Willingham prefix and Garners' Hales line have helped shape Percheron history for half a century'.*

- 6 We maintain certain watercourses within the Parish.

Jottings from your County Councillor

I was very pleased when the footpath along Over Road was finally resurfaced earlier this year, but there is continuing concern that the good work will be undone by the cars which continue to use it as a third lane when the road is congested. Of course, traffic shouldn't use the footpath - it wasn't designed to take the weight of vehicles - and I heard of a car almost hitting some school children a few weeks ago because it was using the footpath instead of giving way to oncoming traffic. This is very worrying. The Parish Council have asked whether we could consider double yellow lines, which I have been pursuing for some time. The main problem with this is the cost of the legal processes which have to be gone through in order for two lines of yellow paint to be painted on the road – and of course, the assumption that people who think it is OK to drive on the pavement will also think it is OK to ignore vellow lines. So I have suggested to the Parish Council that an alternative might be some wooden bollards along the road at the critical points. I will be discussing this with

them during the month and hope that we might be able to find an acceptable solution.

The failure of the interactive signs along Earith Road continues to be a huge irritation. I understand that one of them has been shot – presumably in frustration! I can understand that. Despite all the hassle, I still remain hopeful that one day all of the interactive signs along the road might work as intended. In the meantime a new speed limit policy will be considered by the council later this year which may enable some action to reduce speed of traffic along the roads in Willingham.
