Yes, but what exactly is Feast Sunday?

'Well, of course, that is Feast Sunday.' Any long term Willingham resident will tell you that that description applies to the Sunday before 11 October. The reaction, from more recent Willingham residents, is quite likely to be: 'And what exactly is Feast Sunday?'

First of all, we can look at what happens on that day. There are two big events. During the Sunday afternoon a visiting Salvation Army band plays on the Green, and leads an informal open-air service. Then in the evening there is an ecumenical service in the parish church, led by the same visiting band.

On the Monday, Thurston's fun fair opens, for two days, on the Green.

Go back 30 years or so, and the fun fair arrived on the Sunday, their vehicles lining up in the neighbouring roads until the band had left, and then moving on to the Green to get set up for the Monday. Children who went to the Green with their families to hear the band then had fun watching the fun fair vehicles move into place.

Until the early 1960s the children at the Primary School had a half day holiday on the Tuesday so that they could go to the Fair. Janet Hart, then teaching at the school, recalls that that stopped when more and more parents were at work, and the children could not be left to wander about alone.

There have been other changes. For many years, the Band would play at Willingham House (now a conference centre, then an old people's home) before going to the Green. In the evening they would play at the cross roads by the Black Bull before moving to Stocks Corner. That changed when the evening service moved to the Baptist Church - the old Tabernacle. The move to the parish church is more recent.

Feast Sunday has traditionally been very much a family occasion; for example, daughters who were working out of the village in domestic service came back for the weekend. Michaelmas Day was the day on which 'domestic servants change places or are re-engaged, but in all cases they have a few days holiday, when the mistresses are placed in the awkward position of having to do without them for a short time.' (*Cambridge Independent Press*, 15 October 1881)


For some it is still a time for family gatherings. Paul Ingle recalls that it was also the occasion for women to get their new winter clothes, which could be shown off for the first time at the gathering on the Green.


Family reunions may continue, but what is undoubtedly less common is the cooking of special cheese tarts. Janet Hart notes that they were made with local cheese, sugar, lemon, egg and mixed dried fruit. On Feast Tuesday, people visited neighbours to taste their cheese tarts. Other villages had other delicacies; in Cottenham, for example, where the Feast is later than Willingham's, it was pear pie. Janet also recalls that during the war many Americans, based near the Milton railway crossing, used to come to the Feast.


For many years, Feast weekend was the occasion for collecting money for Addenbrooke's Hospital. These were the days before the National Health Service.

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

Seasonal Prohibition of Driving Order

On 2 August the County Council made a Prohibition of Driving Order on a number of byways in the area. This prohibits vehicles with more than two wheels, apart from permit-holders, from using these byways between 1 October and 30 April each year, and is for the protection of the byways from the heavy rutting which has badly damaged them during the wet winter months. Affected byways in Willingham are part of Byway no. 9 (Aldreth Causeway), and part of Byway no 8 (Haven Drove). A copy of the Order, and full details and a map of all the byways included, are displayed on the Library Noticeboard; it can also be inspected in the Parish Council Office during opening hours.

Communities had to pay to ensure that hospital beds were available. In 1921 the amount collected totalled £108 178 6d. The hospital collections continued until the NHS was established after the Second World War.

Traditionally, Feast Sunday was a Parish Church occasion, linked to Harvest Festival. In 1891, for example, the Rector John Watkins noted in his Parish Magazine: ' "Feast Sunday", which fell on the 4th, was observed as the Thanksgiving for Harvest, and the offerings of money, to the amount of six guineas, and of "fruits of the earth" were sent to Addenbrooke's Hospital.'

It widened its scope in the 1920s. In 1921 a meeting took place at the Public Hall when it was decided 'by the few enthusiasts present' (*The Chronicle*, 1 September 1921) that the usual festivities should take place. Another meeting was called at which 'it is especially hoped that officials of all clubs and societies will make an effort to be present'.

Significantly, the Salvation Army promised to be responsible for the band. That responsibility has continued, and Gordon Spackman, who has been Sergeant Major for nearly 60 years, has made the arrangements for more than half a century.

'Feast weekend is not what it was', all who have lived many years in Willingham will confirm. It probably never was what it had been – at least if you read the comment of Enid Porter, in *Cambridgeshire Customs and Folklore*, where she wrote: 'Willingham Feast was already declining in the last years of the nineteenth century'.

Changes there have certainly been. The fun fair, for example, is neither as big nor as popular as it was even 30 years ago. Nevertheless, Feast Sunday, and Feast weekend, still continue as a feature of village life.

One question remains: why is it on the Sunday before 11 October? The answer is: because it is linked with Michaelmas Day – the quarter day on which rents fall due (and servants change or confirm their employment). If you know your calendar, you will reasonably object that Michaelmas Day falls on 29 September.

Yes – but the calendar changed in the 18th century. New style quarter days were: Lady Day (25 March), Midsummer Day (24 June), Michaelmas Day (29 September), and Christmas Day (25 December).

Old style quarter days are Old Lady Day (6 April), Old Midsummer Day (6 July), **Old Michaelmas Day (11 October**), and Old Christmas Day (6 January).

John Watkins wrote, somewhat disparagingly: 'People in our country villages forget that the calendar was altered in 1752, and are so "behind the times" as to persist in observing the "old style".

That may not be so backward-looking as it seems. Janet Hart points out that even today some rents are paid on old Michaelmas Day.


Willingham Charity lunch

Pastoral Letter

New Beginnings

Every few years as an Officer in the Salvation Army means moving house and starting a new avenue of ministry in a different place. So at the end of July I moved from Maldon in Essex with my husband David to live in Godmanchester to serve people in that area and in Willingham and Huntingdon; our appointment is known as the Cambridgeshire Development Project. That is a challenging task as it covers a fairly wide area, with each centre having its own unique identity, and the opportunity for research and development in areas where the Salvation Army has not been working.

But it makes little difference where we are appointed, so long as we have a place to live, and that is taken care of by the Salvation Army. Yet there is usually a deep wondering what the house is like, and the kind of neighbourhood it is in. Will we like the décor, and will the accommodation suit our needs.? What is the garden like, and is it well maintained? We wouldn't be human if these thoughts never occurred to us. But I'm pleased to say that all the necessary work has been done to make the house our home, decorating has been done and repair work carried out so that quite soon we will feel that it is our home, quite quickly we will know its nooks and crannies, and know the squeaks and groans that are common to the place, and feel safe and secure.

This process of preparation and settling in reminded me of the parable in the Bible where Jesus speaks of the house built on the rock; he said that anyone who obeys his teaching will be on sure foundation just as a house built on the rock. Certainly all the preparation work has been done, and that's like the foundation of the house, and now we will live in it and enjoy it.

But even more important is the life I live; that too needs a good foundation of faith in God and following his purposes for my life.

Open letter to the County Councillor Dear Councillor Johnstone

In your July Jottings you express your hope that one day the interactive signs along the Earith Road might work as intended. I regret that this is a forlorn hope. Even when working, the signs are totally ineffective because they are ignored by the majority of drivers. It also appeared to me that the signs were 'timed out' during commuting periods at the beginning and end of the day, allowing drivers (a number of whom were of course using hand held mobile phones) to speed nose to tail through the village. This state of affairs continues.

I submit that it is a waste of time and money trying to get the signs working and that properly functioning Gatso cameras be installed in their place. These cameras are alleged to be the bane of motorists' lives and would seem therefore to be just what we need. Incidentally, I would be interested to know how many, if any, drivers have been fined/prosecuted as a result of the Gatso camera already placed in the village. I have never seen it flash and suspect it is redundant, in which case this camera could be moved. The alternative to cameras is a zero-tolerance implementation of road traffic law by the Police, but I have no doubt that in these days of form filling, they do not have the resources to allocate to what used to be one of their prime functions. A few days ago I was encouraged by the sight of a PCSO with a speed gun on the Earith Road. However, he was only 'monitoring the situation' and as this was mid-morning the traffic was extremely light.

Unless more random monitoring takes place (try midmorning on a Saturday and 'early bunking off' time on a Friday afternoon), the result will not present the Police with the true picture, prompting their superiors perhaps to think that there is not too much of a problem. If this is the case, perhaps you could disabuse them?

I note that a new speed limit policy will be considered later this year, which may etc etc.....I sincerely hope that the result of the discussion will not be a strategy, a word widely used by this appalling Government and others to grab a headline - and then do nothing, but will result in positive action being taken to reduce the speed of traffic along the roads in Willingham. I fear though, that in company with a number of residents of Earith Road, I will not be holding my breath.




