When ordering your repeat prescriptions you have the option to collect your medication from Willingham or Longstanton surgery. Please remember which surgery you have specified to avoid disappointment if you arrive to collect your medicines at the other surgery. Opening hours are:

It is important to let the surgery know if you change your name, address or contact telephone number.

Flu vaccines

We hope this year to beat the Christmas rush with our flu vaccines! They are due to arrive by 5 October so we hope to vaccinate all eligible people during October. We will be taking bookings from mid September so please contact us at that time. As before, flu vaccination is recommended to all people of 65 years and over, and to those of any age with a long term medical condition, for example diabetes, heart disease, kidney or liver disease, asthma or any breathing disorder. Carers (in receipt of Carers Allowance) are also eligible. Please enquire if unsure. Due to the large number of people needing this protection we plan to hold some flu vaccine only sessions and ask that people wear short-sleeved clothing for easy access to arms! Many thanks.

Want to stop smoking?

1 July saw the introduction of the smoking ban in public places and the work place. Smoking is estimated to cause the death of over 120,000 people every year in the UK. It is the cause of 1 in 5 of all male deaths and 1 in 10 of all female deaths. If you are motivated to give up smoking we can help with advice and information. There are many nicotine replacement products to help you in the initial stages of quitting and these can be purchased at the pharmacy. The VAT on these products was reduced to 5% on 1 July so you will save money compared to buying cigarettes. Ask the pharmacist or GP for details.

A celebration of Guiding in Willingham



Last term the 1st Willingham Guides celebrated the 10th anniversary of the reopening of the Guide unit after being closed for a number of years. To mark the occasion a barbeque was held attended by nearly 40 ex- and present Guides and Leaders. Present that evening were the two original Guide Leaders and three girls from the first meeting held 10 years ago. The evening was partially spent reminiscing whilst looking at the log books and photograph albums spanning the last 10 years. The party also raised money for Forgotten Children International the charity supported by the Guides this year. The evening finished with the candles on the birthday cake being blown out by the two eldest ex-Guides present and the two youngest current Guides.

In the past 10 years over 100 girls from Willingham and the surrounding area have been enrolled as Guides in the unit. Guides can chose (within reason) where they get enrolled and girls have made their Guide promise in such diverse places as the Pirate ship at Pleasurewood Hills, in the rapids at Bedford Oasis, in front of Buckingham Place and in a puddle in the dark down past Schole Road. Girls from Willingham Guides have represented the Guide Association on international trips to Netherlands, Switzerland and Mexico and as a unit we have visited Switzerland, attended 4 international camps, 11 county camps and numerous unit camps.

Today's Guides organise their own programme of activities which, over the past years, have included such wide ranging topics as reflexology, belly dancing, windsurfing, bouncy castles, make up and beauty sessions as well as the more traditional first aid, outdoors cooking and crafts.

Open Letter to Shona Johnstone concerning Speeding Traffic Earith Road Willingham

Over two years have passed since you called on me to seek support for your election to the County Council. You noted the problems of the Earith Road and promised you would try for traffic calming measures should you be elected. A promise also repeated, I think, in your election address. Since then alas no progress on the traffic calming. Traffic continues at dangerous speeds and volumes. It can only be a matter of time before a serious accident occurs. That is not to say that CCC has been idle. I note that most of the other villages in the area now have traffic calming. What surprises me is that given traffic flows and speeds, the risk in these villages is calculated to be greater than Willingham.

Residents of Earith Road have on a number of occasions approached officers in respect of the speed and volume of traffic. The response is often baffling and included statements such as the traffic is too fast for calming measures; volumes of traffic too great; calming would slow the traffic. Interesting responses given government's latest policy advice on the design of residential streets. This notes, inter alia, that for too long the focus of planning and design has been on the movement function of residential streets with the result that some areas are dominated by vehicles and fail to make a positive contribution to the quality of life. It stresses the need for a fundamental culture change in the way that streets are designed including a more collaborative approach. I understand that this is a policy supported by the Conservative opposition. It is also worth reflecting on officers' recent decision to resurface the Earith road with an inappropriate dressing which has increased traffic noise to new levels.

Given the likely increase of traffic flows with the advent of Northstowe it would be interesting for the residents of Earith Road to know your views on improving their quality of life. Do you believe traffic calming is still necessary, if not why not? Do you agree that it is inappropriate that every other local village has traffic calming but not Willingham? No doubt officers have undertaken risk assessments. Have you seen them and do you intend for them to be posted on the web?

We look forward to hearing your views. *Req Purnell*

I fully agree with everything in Mike Parson's letter.

I have been told by the County Council that we can't have the traffic calming measures that most villages have because Earith Road is too fast, but surely the whole point of them is to make sure the road isn't too fast.

Over has a wonderful traffic calming scheme, but hardly any traffic ever uses the village, so why have they got it?

Why was so much money spent on the bike path, which incidentally I have never seen a bike use?

There is going to be more and more traffic using Earith Road, especially when they start building Northstowe and

to get to the park and ride at Longstanton for the guided buses when that opens.

Perhaps it would be a good idea for all the residents of Earith Road to get together then we might get something done.

JOTTINGS FROM YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

Reg Purnell kindly sent me an advance copy of his letter to the Willingham News and so I am therefore able to respond. As I have made clear in the past, I am very much in favour of traffic calming measures on Earith Road and indeed Rampton Road, where there are similar problems and I have taken this issue up with officers on several occasions to seek ways in which this might be achieved.

It is true that many other villages in the area have traffic calming measures. The majority of these schemes were provided through the A14 villages programme, using funding from Government. Willingham was included in this programme and traffic calming measures were developed for the parish. Unfortunately, it did not prove possible to reach agreement with the Parish Council on the form of calming features to be installed. The scheme designed by officers proposed speed cushions with a gateway feature but the public consultation raised some concerns over this design approach. An alternative approach using traffic islands was investigated but insufficient room is available within the highway to construct this type of feature.

Prior to this a comprehensive scheme of traffic calming measures on B1050 through the village was proposed back in the 1980s but it also proved impossible to reach agreement with the Parish Council on the design of the scheme so it was also abandoned. My experience in other villages is that traffic calming is often seen as the solution to the problem of too much traffic but that once a traffic calming scheme is built, it proves very unpopular, either because it does not achieve the desired effect, or because some motorists feel it goes too far. We can never get it right.

I have discussed with officers the possibility of putting a bid forward for traffic calming from the annual medium sized traffic management and safety budget where scheme bids are assessed on an established methodology with the personal injury accident record being one of the key factors taken into account.

On Earith Road the injury accident record within the built up area is fortunately very good with only 1 slight injury accident being reported over the last 5 years, which compares very well with many other sites across the county where similar concerns over speeding and road safety are being raised. Of course, whilst the low accident rate is good news but it does little to increase the possibility of any bid being successful.

You say that it is only a matter of time before a serious accident occurs on Earith road; I only hope you are proved to be wrong. Ideally, I would want to be able to undertake works to avoid accidents occurring but the reality is that priorities have to be set on the basis of actual and not predicted accidents. I have to support this approach even if it does not suit my desire, as your local councillor, to get something done to address the concerns in Earith Road.

Earlier this year, the County Council undertook a review of speed limits and when adopting a new policy it was agreed to review all the speed limits on the A and B class road network in the county. Therefore, the situation in Earith Road will be reviewed as part of this programme. Given the length of road network involved this will take some time to complete and again priorities have to be set with the sites with the highest number of accidents and worse casualty severity being reviewed first. I have asked officers for details of how the review is being prioritised, as I would like the B1050 to be considered as soon as possible. I think this offers the best opportunity to address the concerns over speeding traffic on Earith Road.

With regard to your comments on the latest advice from Government on the design of residential streets, there is a culture change taking place and this is demonstrated by the new design guide for new developments that the County Council is developing which advocates a less vehicle dominated approach to road design. The draft document is available on the following link:

http://www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/transport/managing /networkmanagement/Cambridgeshire+Design+Guide.htm I also want this culture to spill across into schemes on established highways. However, there has to be a balance here and whilst I recognise that Earith Road is a residential street I also have to accept that as a B class road is does form part of the county's major road network, serving wider community needs, and which will continue to carry considerable volumes of traffic. In the meantime I will continue to press for measures to reduce speeding both along Earith Road and also in Rampton Road, but equally, I do not want to raise hopes of something being done quickly.

Pastoral Letter

Sometimes what we say is more profound than we intend 'You become what you do.' was a comment by my wife's Physiotherapist. Strictly speaking she was just talking about my wife's post-stroke recovery and how she should train her arm out of its tendency to curl across her chest. Yet I think that, at the time, we all felt that this was actually a profound statement about the human condition. We grossly underestimate the power of habit to shape the human soul.

To give one trivial example: I always have a cup of tea first thing in the morning, and my second drink with breakfast is coffee. There is nothing profound about this; it is just a routine I have dropped into ever since we resurrected out Teasmade a couple of years ago. Yet if for any reason the routine gets dislocated and the first taste on my lips is that of rich black caffeine, I have the feeling that the world has shifted on its axis and I am participating in the collapse of civilisation as we know it. It feels 'Wrong!' It does not actually feel immoral, but certainly incorrect. It is as though I had unknowingly violated one of the more obscure bits of Leviticus and incurred the wrath of God.

Our feelings, our reflexes, our relationships are all influenced, largely unconsciously, by norms and expectations to which we never give a moment's thought. We always do things that way. Also by extension we adjust to what is going on around us, the accepted habits of our society. To be honest most of our behaviour is shaped less by the profound conclusions of Moral Philosophy or the hallowed traditions of Religion, than by what we see on the TV or the gossip round the office water cooler.

This is inevitable and human society has always functioned in that way. But it does mean that we adjust to a lowest common denominator. We get by on what is acceptable; we seldom get exposed to or confronted by what is likely to challenge us, to inspire us, or to stretch our moral imagination.

Things have been worse. I am prepared to concede that the Roman games, with their gross displays of cruelty, were more sickening than even the goings on in The Big Brother House; but I still think the words St Paul spoke into that society have relevance to us today.

Whatever things are true, whatever things are noble, whatever things are just, whatever things are pure, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report, if there is any virtue and if there is anything praiseworthy—meditate on these things.' Philippians 4.8-9

Willingham Women's Institute

To place our local Women's Institute (WI) in perspective, we should first to take a brief look at the national body. The pioneer WI in Britain was formed in Anglesey in 1915, following the founding of the Canadian WI at Stoney Creek, Ontario in 1897. By 1917, 40 branches were in being and the National Federation was formed, chaired by Lady Denman. There were two clear aims: to revitalise rural communities and to encourage women to become more involved in

producing food during the First World War. There are now 211,000 members in 6800 WIs in England and Wales - nine new branches opened in recent months. Separate organisations exist in Scotland and Northern Ireland. WI plays a unique role in providing women with educational opportunities and the chance to build new skills. The WI has its own residential adult educational college at Denman near Oxford catering for over 6000 students annually. The WI helps its members take part in a wide variety of activities and to campaign on issues that matter to them and their communities. Past campaigns included the provision of village nurses, and telephone kiosks; current campaigns are concerned with excessive packaging, the closure of cottage hospitals, and climate change. The WI is an associate of the Associated Country Women of the World – a current project is to provide hens for women in Ghana that will produce chicks and thus provide more hens for more women in Ghana.....

The all-pervading conception of the WI is that it is based on 'Jam and Jerusalem'. The recent television series 'Jam and Jerusalem' was itself something of a parody and reflected neither the true aims of the organisation nor current reality. However, at the beginning of the Second World War, when food was short and severely rationed, there was a national glut of fruit all, especially in Cambridgeshire; but there was no sugar available as this too was strictly rationed. Preservation centres were therefore set up to can and bottle fruit and make jam up to professional standards. The jam had to contain 60% sugar, and this was supplied by the government. Thirty four preservation centres in Cambridgeshire were provided by local WIs. Willingham played its part; but special mention must be made of Arrington WI whose 28 members made 1500 pounds of jam, chutney and marmalade in one year. Today in Willingham, at least, individual members may well make jam – this is a fruit growing area, after all – but it most assuredly is not a group activity. 'Jerusalem' is sung on special occasions only. Hopefully, this article will provide a more complete picture of WI life in general and Willingham WI life in particular.

October 1928 by around 50 members. If any of our readers have details of the founding members, please contact Willingham News. It straightaway threw itself into a hectic round of charity fund raising, talks and meetings. It also took an active part in wider village life. For example, in 1934 after the then Parish Council had turned down electric lighting for the parish, it complained to the Council and asked that streets be lit by gas or

electricity. During the Second World War in 1941, it purchased a stirrup pump for village use in case of fire. The talks covered a wide variety of topics; one in 1943 was on the drying of rabbit skins – presumably for gloves and coats. Willingham WI has enjoyed strong support from its members over the years. One was the late Joan Smail who belonged throughout her time in the village, became a member of the County Federation, and organised the planting of a wood between Histon and Girton. She is commemorated through a tree planted by her fellow members at the Ploughman Hall. Another member, Pauline Verrinder evinced an interest in craft activities at the WI, and then began leading classes. She eventually took City and Guilds examinations and now lectures on the subject.

The modern-day Willingham WI is carrying on in a similar vein. It provided the village sign in 1988. The range of talks and activities includes the Annual Quiz Night with fish and chip supper, and open evenings covering such topics as a visit from the Raptor Centre when Barn Owls flew around the meeting room (neither member nor visitor was taken as prey), talks on the Enigma machine and on an escape from Burma. There is a very successful Darts Team that recently won the 2007 County Championship. In 2003 Willingham WI produced a local WI Cook Book. It provides bursaries for members attending Denman College. Twice a year, it

holds group meetings with Over, Swavesey, Longstanton and Elsworth WIs with speakers and entertainment, and an opportunity to get to know members from other villages. The County WI organises a range of outings, one of which was glider-flying, and, this year, clay pigeon shooting. The emphasis is on social enjoyment and helping each other; but, alongside this, taking part in the national WI campaigns. Members also like their parties and have one at Christmas and a Summer Garden Party they do love their food.

Perhaps the best way to end is to show how one of its members perceives the modern day Willingham WI:

WILLINGHAM

W stands for Wivelingham meaning the home of the people of Wifel. This dates back to Anglo Saxon times, so the village has been in existence for more than a thousand years.

In fact people from all walks of life, to compete for the cash prize. It is said that fish is brain food, so everyone was spurred on during the second half of the quiz after their fish and chip supper. Oh dear that's indulgence again.

WATER COLOURING

Wintry skies and Mediterranean heat have been pictured at the watercolour art group. Gill Barnes, our enthusiastic tutor, has helped us to capture the scene. INFORMING

A newsletter is distributed at our monthly meeting with all the important information and dates of activities within the Institute, and also of the County. These are also delivered to absent members, to keep them in touch. Cat-WALK

Last autumn some of our members became models for the evening. They looked fetching in the separates made from natural fibres, from Jan and Steve's shop in St Ives. 'The Earth Collection', "Fashion that doesn't cost the earth ". Something you will agree the W.I. stands for. WALKING

The walking group is to re-start during the summer months. We hope that members and partners will join our Thursday evening walks. We found that our members were too involved with family life for the group to meet on Sundays.

IN conclusion

Willingham Women's Institute is Welcoming, Indulging, Water colouring, Cat walking, Intelligent and Informing. There is another adjective that could be used: Wonderful, but we can't blow our own trumpet, we are British after all.

Longstanton, made up of local people who volunteer to be trained, equipped and organised by Magpas so they can attend medical emergencies in the villages. Since becoming available in January the volunteers have provided over 3500 hours of cover and helped several patients within the community. The volunteers receive basic training and have a defibrillator so they can resuscitate patients in very serious cases. The scheme's volunteers make a real difference, so much so that Magpas has received the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service in recognition of their work.

A local volunteer says, "Magpas does all the training, so you don't need to have a medical background. Even the defibrillator is automatic. You just attach it and it does the rest by itself!"

The scheme can be the difference between life and death. Other groups in the county have literally saved lives in their local communities. Magpas currently has 32 groups across the county and are willing to work with any community that wishes to develop a lifesaving group in their community.
