# Tim Curtis – Willingham's very own TV personality

If you watch Anglia Tonight, the flagship news programme transmitted five days a week at 6 00 pm, you will be familiar with the friendly, calm and authoritative main male presenter, Tim Curtis. He has had that role for the past five years. For the ten years before that, he was the stand-in presenter - and before that, he was a reporter with Anglia.

What you may not realise is that Tim is a Willingham man, who spent the first 20 years of his life in the village. He lives now near Norwich with his wife and children, but his parents, Roy and Lyn, still live in Willingham, and Tim still relishes his links with the village.

He attended Willingham Primary School when it was still based in the old school building in Fen End, and was still a pupil at the school when the move to the present site took place in 1975. He had one year at the new school.

He then went to Cottenham Village College, and then to Hills Road Sixth Form College. It was at that point that the standard pattern of his life changed. He had long

Yet another set of volunteers has been drafted in, this time split into groups to sift through all the data analysis of the questionnaires and write particular sections of the Plan. In total, thousands of hours of work have been donated by a wide cross section of the village population. Our thanks go to all of them.

As already reported, the response to the general questionnaire was outstanding and the response to the youth questionnaire very good.

The response to the business questionnaire has been disappointing, with a 25% return rate, but it is still big enough to be representative.

hankered after the idea of becoming a journalist, and when Christopher South, then news editor of the *Cambridge Evening News*, offered him a job in 1982 – as an experiment, because by this time most entrants to journalism were graduates – he took it without hesitation, giving up the idea of A levels.

For the next six years Tim worked at the *CEN*, and then had the chance of a move to the *Wellingborough Evening Telegraph*, as deputy news editor. Just after making that move, he was head-hunted by *CNFM* (now Q 103), who were looking for a news editor for the launch of Cambridge's first commercial radio station. It was a challenge which Tim enjoyed, but after 18 months he decided to try another move, and joined Anglia in 1990.

Nowadays, there are not many journalists who have worked in all three media – television, radio and print.

Why did he go to television? One reason, he says quite frankly, was it paid better than newspapers and local radio, though as he wryly remarks: 'As I joined, the days of the gravy train were over, and bidding for licences, introduced by the Thatcher government, made TV much less of a goldmine. Just my luck!' The really important reason, however, was the high profile of television. 'Every time I went to a press conference, the TV people would waltz in, and they would get what they wanted. The rest of us picked up the crumbs. I decided I wanted a slice of that action.'

In fact, in TV Tim has been doing what he had always wanted to do as a child, when he used to watch Ian Masters, then main news presenter on BBC East.

It is as a news presenter that Tim is widely known, but in his time he has had other assignments, including a visit to Malawi to do a feature on a couple who had moved there to set up an orphanage, and a visit to Bosnia shortly after the Bosnia war, to do a feature on East Anglian soldiers serving there

When he was living in Willingham, Tim was an active and enthusiastic member of the Scout movement. He became a Cub Scout at the age of eight (but actually started attending when he was six, because his mother Lyn was the Cub leader, and took him with her). Then from 11 to 16 he was a Scout, and after that he and some others helped to form a Venture Scout unit in Over.

Scouting meant a great deal to Tim. 'The First Willingham Air Scouts were the bedrock of my life', he recalls, inculcating a work ethic, and offering a great variety of activities and opportunities. He has the fondest memories, and huge respect, for Tony Fowler, who played such a key role in establishing Scouting in Willingham.

How has Willingham changed since he was a child here? Tim's reply shows the kind of shrewd observation that explains his success as a journalist. 'When I was a kid', he says, 'the village still had some of its roots in the Victorian era'. He recalls, as an example, 'old men in black coats cycling unsteadily from pub to pub on a Sunday morning'. In a sense, he believes, Willingham at that stage still partly reflected life in the 1860s and 1870s.

How does he see it now? He describes the village as having 'pulled itself up by its bootstraps': bigger, much more modern but, he observes with real pleasure, still with a great sense of community. Willingham has clearly changed a great deal, but Tim is delighted to be able to see many of the buildings which he knew as a child still in place: the old school, the old church hall, Foreman's Garage. And, above all 'I am very pleased that the Public Hall is still the headquarters for the Scouts'.

Winter vomiting virus (Norovirus) This illness is highly contagious but usually brief (1-2 days). The main symptom is forceful (projectile) vomiting associated with diarrhoea, stomach cramps, general malaise, muscle aches and tiredness. There is no specific treatment and it cannot be treated with antibiotics. The best course of action is to prevent dehydration by drinking plenty of fluids and wash your hands as frequently as possible. Do not visit your doctors' surgery as you will only spread the virus to other members of the public including the more vulnerable. If you feel you need extra medical advice please ring the surgery for a telephone consultation.

**Child Health Immunisation** We wish to inform parents of young children that due to the changes in the vaccination programme over the past two years the Child Health Recall System is struggling under the workload. If you receive an invitation to attend for vaccinations your child has already received please ring the surgery and let us know. We can then ensure the records are updated. If you wish to check your child has been fully immunised please make an appointment with the nurse, and bring your child's handheld records with you if possible.

**Telephone numbers** Please can you remember to let the surgery know when you change your telephone number - including your mobile. There are occasions when we will need to contact you, for instance if a doctor is taken ill and we need to reschedule a surgery session. Yes, even doctors get sick from time to time! **Loan items** Do you still have any items loaned to you by the surgery in the past. For instance we are now completely out of our *Treat Your Own Neck/Back* books which we lend out to patients. If you have a copy lurking on your shelf please can you return it to the surgery. There are no fines!

**Struggling to give up smoking?** Come along and chat to a doctor or nurse or speak to Neil our pharmacist. Neil now has a private consultation booth in the pharmacy where he can explain to you all the different options available to help you, either on the NHS or to buy over the counter.

**Medicines wastage** Just a reminder to check your stocks and order only those repeat medications that you actually need. Please keep the order request form enclosed in your medicine bag and use this when you need to order again. If we all do our bit to reduce wasted medicines which cost the NHS millions of pounds each year we will be helping to ensure that limited NHS resources can be used for other vital patient care.

## Do try this at home

In the November *Willingham News* Chris Couchman suggested that readers might like to contribute traditional local – or unusual – recipes. Here is one from her:

### Kombucha

Kombucha is a living health drink made by fermenting tea and sugar with the kombucha culture. The result can taste like something between sparkling apple cider and champagne, depending on what kind of tea you use. Kombucha is thought to have originated in the Far East, probably China, where it is known as 'The Tea of Immortality'; and it has been consumed there for at least two thousand years.

The Kombucha culture looks like a beige or white rubbery pancake. The culture is placed in sweetened black or green tea and turns a bowl full of sweet tea into a bowl full of vitamins, minerals, enzymes and healthgiving organic acids. As the Kombucha culture digests the sugar it produces a range of organic acids, eg glucuronic acid, gluconic acid, lactic acid, acetic acid, butyric acid, malic acid and usnic acid; vitamins, particularly B vitamins and enzymes. And of course there are all the benefits of the probiotic microorganisms themselves.

Many health claims are made for kombucha, some more believable than others. These are listed on the website www.seedsofhealth.co.uk/fermenting/kombucha, from which the information given above is extracted. I am in no position to verify any of them, but I can testify that it is delicious, if you like a refreshing, slightly sparkling, slightly sharp drink.

The kombucha culture, like the ginger beer culture, grows with every brew, and I now have a limited amount of spare culture. If anyone would like to try making some for themselves, contact me on 01954-200824, or athenechris@aol.com, for a piece of culture and a recipe leaflet, or let me know if you would just like to try a bottle of the kombucha drink. In either case, I would appreciate a small donation for my Ugandan orphans education charity.

## Do you want the good news or the bad news first?

The good news is that Indian carmakers Tata have launched a people's car, the Nano, costing less than £1300. It will boost the economy, create a multitude of jobs and give millions of Indians that thrill I remember when my dad brought home a brand new Ford Popular in 1953.

The bad news is that Tata have launched a car that means that millions of people will start pumping Co2 into the atmosphere, and vast swathes of the country are being dug over to accommodate eight lane superhighways.

That's life! Everything that we do it seems has an up side and a down side. There is a fatal flaw that gets in and wrecks havoc in every human activity. Commonly it is called Murphy's Law, or some less polite derivative.

But it is also central to the Christian understanding of the human condition. We, and indeed the whole of our world, are flawed. Every silver lining comes wrapped in a cloud. How is it that the race that can produce Francis of Assisi, Albert Schweitzer and Mother Teresa, can also produce Concentration Camp Guards, serial killers and child molesters? Or less spectacularly why is it that the Christmas festival that brings jollity, togetherness and goodwill precipitates a surge in the divorce rate?

Everything human is flawed, and even Saints have their critics.

It is because of that fallibility that we should not give unquestioning loyalty and devotion to any earthy thing, be it person, party, or object. 'Thou shalt not make for thyself any graven image'. For all idols have feet of clay. There is a fault somewhere.

For the same reason we all stand in need of forgiveness, because somewhere along the line we shall have blown it; 'Through ignorance, through weakness, through our own deliberate fault' as the old Prayer Book has it.

The Gospel simply is that God has accounted for all this. He has provided for it through his Son Jesus Christ. God's grace, his forgiveness, is freely offered. The biggest mistake of all is to pretend that we do not need it.

Protect your Satellite Navigation System by registering it on www.immobilise.com.

This site is searched thousands of times every day by police officers resulting in thieves being removed from the streets and property returned to its rightful owner.

It is very simple to register items on www.immobilise.com. A user I.D. and password is generated allowing you to access your site and add or delete items at any time. There is no limit to the number of items you can register. Registered items are instantly identifiable making it far more likely that your property will be returned, the thief found and a successful prosecution achieved.

Any item with a serial number, like Sat Navs, laptops and ipods can be registered FREE of charge. For items like jewellery, antiques or horses there is the facility to upload photographs.

Imagine that your house has been burgled and your computer, which contains the inventory of your belongings, has been stolen. If you had registered with immobilise you could go to any computer, log on with your own I.D. and password and print out an inventory for the insurance company and the police.

If you have a mobile phone stolen it is possible to register in retrospect on Immobilise simply by contacting your airtime provider and asking for the IMEI number. The reason for doing this is as follows:

Having registered the IMEI number of the phone it is possible to go straight into the account and register the phone as lost/stolen. This means that, if the phone turns up in the hands of the police anywhere in the country, when they run a check on the IMEI number it will not only show that you are the registered owner but also the crime details. This will give police a fighting chance of finding out who committed the theft. It can give good evidence to support a successful prosecution and once blocked the handset will be immobilised and even replacing the sum card will not make the handset work again.
