# From the Parish Council

#### **New Parish Clerk**

We now have a new Parish Clerk, Mr Colin Brown. Mrs Dawn Spouge will continue as Deputy Parish Clerk.

#### **Guided Bus Way**

Our County Council have advised that works on the Guided Busway have reached Oakington. Four companies are soon to start trials of their buses. A concrete base is being laid on the B1059 at Longstanton and during this time there will be single line working, controlled by traffic lights that will operate 24 hours a day.

#### **Traffic Calming**

Traffic calming measures would be welcome in Willingham. There are no doubts about that on the Parish Council. Getting the County Council to provide traffic calming of a kind acceptable to the majority of people in the village has not proved easy. What people wanted - and did not want - became clear from a wideranging consultation carried out several years ago. Getting that translated into action by the County Council, by contrast, has not been straightforward. The Parish Council is continuing its efforts, and wishes to assess the effectiveness of the interactive traffic sign on Earith Road before deciding, in consultation with the public, what else would be effective. Unfortunately, the interactive sign, installed by the County Council several years ago, has never worked, and efforts to get the County Council to tackle this have not so far been successful. The Parish Council, however, has been assured - once again - that something will be done. Watch this space.

#### Willingham Public Art Bus Stop Steering Group

There was a meeting of the above on Thursday 6 March at the Ploughman Hall. The Bus Stop project is soaring ahead with contributions from our local teenagers on several designs for the floor lights.

around school, and we are always surprised and very pleased when they come up with simple solutions that we have never even considered!

We are a Health Promoting School encouraging pupils to lead healthy life styles. We have been running our own school meals service for three years and this has allowed us to control the food we buy and the food our pupils eat. Mrs Jipson and her team provide nutritious meals that are tasty and filling and you won't be surprised to hear that the uptake for our meals is high. As well as good food at lunchtime, cookery lessons have been on the curriculum for some time now, providing children with knowledge about food and where it's grown and so equipping them with essential life skills.

The 'Arts' are promoted at the school. Pupils' art work is displayed in our corridors for everyone to see and admire and more and more children are learning to play musical instruments and joining the band and choirs. We hold a regular Art Exhibition and concerts, and many of you will have attended our wonderful 'Last Night at the Proms'.

Languages are also offered, and we are twinned with a primary school on Avrillé, France, the Fen Edge twin town.

Schools are not about just schooling nowadays, they are about life -long learning. We are a real community school here in Willingham providing care for our children from 7 45 am until 6 00 pm each day and many clubs in the evenings for children and adults which extend their learning opportunities. We feel that we work hard at being a real community school, welcoming everyone and listening to all.

We have just had an OFSTED Inspection and we were very pleased by the outcome. It reflects all the hard work of our pupils, staff, parents and Governors.

**Patient Survey** Many of you will remember being asked to complete a survey in September last year organised by Cambridgeshire PCT about the services we provide. This is part of a government-led nationwide exercise which has been conducted every year for the past five years. We have been lucky enough to feature consistently in the top few practices in South Cambridgeshire for all aspects of care and have appreciated the many kind comments from you about our practice. The results of the survey are available in reception if you would like to view them.

We always conduct a full team meeting to assess the results and act on your comments. Last year we failed in our main target to introduce a new telephone system due to technical problems with the exchange. We have been told the new exchange will soon be completed so we will now press ahead with our plans. In the meantime we have tried our best to improve telephone access.

We need **feedback from you regarding the survey results** and your health needs so would be grateful for a few **volunteers to look at the report** and discuss your views with us. Please contact Cynthia if you would be interested.

**Antibiotics** The Department of Health is currently running a campaign to advise patients about overuse of antibiotics resulting in resistance to their effectiveness. All colds and most coughs and sore throats are caused by viruses which do not respond to antibiotics. Leaflets explaining the use of antibiotics are available in reception and in our pharmacy. Our doctors will only prescribe antibiotics if they feel they are appropriate. Neil, our pharmacist, can advise you on alternative treatments. Accident and Emergency and Out of Hours Cover We see from hospital discharge letters that some people are attending A & E with minor problems which could be dealt with by our **Out of Hours Service CAMDOC**. You may not be aware that each time you attend Casualty Department your local PCT is charged a **minimum of £54** (even if you decide not to wait to be treated). There are situations when it is appropriate to attend Casualty following serious accidents, in life threatening situations, and when it is likely that you will need an X-ray.

In the majority of cases the quickest way to be seen is to ring CAMDOC on 01223 242646. They will advise you if they feel a trip to A & E is needed or they can offer either telephone advice or an appointment at the CAMDOC centre at the Chesterton Hospital site where there are no parking charges. They can arrange a visit by a doctor if necessary.

Whatever the outcome of the meeting, it would be nice to think that something positive could come out of this incident. It has been suggested that it might help the Parish Council if a tree interest group or an environmental group could be formed in Willingham. It could advise and work with the Parish Council, involving the South Cambridgeshire authority where necessary. Among other things it could locate possible planting sites for trees and other plants, organise volunteer groups in working parties and attract funding or sponsorship for specific schemes. There are a lot of highly qualified and able Willingham people who are interested in trees, plants and the management of natural spaces. Some work professionally in these fields, others are keen to offer help in many other ways. Such a group would take some of the responsibility for these matters off the hard-worked council, while using local knowledge and expertise to good advantage.

# Pastoral Letter

## Missing the Obvious!

A recent drive through the country gave me the opportunity to enjoy the spring sunshine, the daffodils and the wildlife, along with the varied architecture of properties of very different eras. I appreciated once again the privilege of living in a beautiful country with so much that is wholesome and good.

Part of our drive out took us past recently ploughed fields surrounded by hedges and trees and, as a passenger rather than a driver, I could observe the wildlife and take in with pleasure what I could see. One particular bird attracted my attention; it was different from the robins, blackbirds, tits and finches I had seen earlier that day. High on a branch of one of the trees by the ploughed field I could see what appeared to me to be a 'falcon' type bird. But I'm no ornithologist, and was well aware that itdidn't display the colours I expected to see to aid identification!

Against the freshly turned soil the bird appeared lighter in colour with few distinguishing markings as I watched it swoop down to seize its prey. Then back to the tree it went to enjoy what it had captured. We stopped at the roadside to watch. Soon it took flight again and hovered, while keeping its eyes well focused for some other tasty treat. I thought it must be a kestrel, but I have never seen a light, warm-brown one! I took careful note of what I had seen, and wasted no time back home to try to identify the bird. After looking through two comprehensive bird books I concluded it must be a female kestrel - that was the nearest match. It hadn't occurred to me at the time that the male and female kestrels had different plumage.

I thought how slow I had been to cotton on to the obvious; I have no difficulty in identifying male and female pheasants, chaffinches, blackbirds and such like, but this time I had missed the obvious!

I seem to remember that the disciples of Jesus could be slow sometimes. After the resurrection of Jesus Christ as he walked along the Emmaus Road with a couple of disciples, they didn't recognise him, neither did they believe that he had risen from death. 'He said to them, 'How foolish you are, and how slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! Did not the Christ have to suffer these things and then enter his glory?' And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he explained to them what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself. (Luke 24: 25 - 27 NIV).

Only then did they realise the truth.

I hope we are quicker to see the obvious in things that really matter!

# Willingham Charity Lunch

This month's charity lunch will be held on Saturday 26 April at 1 00 pm at 36 St Margaret's Road, Girton, hosted by Chris and Daphne Randall. The lunch consists of a choice of soups, bread and cheeses, tea, coffee etc, and costs  $\pounds$ 3. This year's nominated charity is the local Over Day Care Centre, which collects and supports elderly residents in Over, Willingham, Longstanton, Bar Hill and other local areas, taking them to the Centre for activities including singing, crafts, quizzes, bingo etc. Also regular outings are organised. It is a self funded organisation and like many other charities it is always in need of funds to keep up the good work.

These lunches are social occasions, a good time to meet both old and new friends and at the same time raise money for needy causes, so why not come and join us.

# **PROFILE:** Grace and Ken Jeeps

You can often see Ken Jeeps cycling round the village. Sometimes, he will exchange the bicycle for a wheelchair, and push Grace, now unable to walk more than a few steps. Ken quite frequently attends meetings of the Parish Council, as a member of the public.

Ken and Grace were born in Willingham (Ken in February 1923, Grace a few months earlier, in December 1922). They have lived here pretty well all their lives, and for many years, and in many different ways, served the village faithfully. They reminisce interestingly about the changes they have witnessed, but they remain strongly committed to Willingham as it is today. A clearly devoted couple, they are cheerful, positive – and blessed with a great sense of humour.

This year they celebrate 27 years of marriage, but they have known each other all their lives, and are cousins; Grace's father and Ken's mother were brother and sister. They were at Willingham School – then in Fen End – together, but remark wryly that they really don't remember each other as fellow pupils.

Grace left school, at the age of 14, and went to work at Wellbrooks Laundry in Girton, cycling to work across the then quite new airfield at Oakington (for which a pass was necessary). She recalls people, seeing aeroplanes flying overhead, saying: 'There's going to be a war'.

She met and married Fred Evans, an airman who was stationed at Oakington. Their daughter, Pauline, was born in 1944. Fred died when he and Grace had been married for only ten years, suffering from kidney problems which they suspect had been caused by working on the maintenance of aircraft engines.

Ken, leaving school also at 14, spent a year doing casual work cutting flowers (flower growing being then a major industry in Willingham), and then in 1939 joined Thompson and Norris, a cardboard manufacturing company in Histon. The firm was eventually bought by Reeds Corrugated, but Ken spent the whole of his working life with them, retiring, in February 1989, only a few months short of a half century. He greatly enjoyed his work, moving over the years through every aspect of manufacture, and still recalls with pleasure the wonderful send-off with which he went into retirement.

It was during the war that the two cousins began a lifetime of voluntary work. Grace was the caller for bingo sessions – later replaced by whist drives organised by Ken – to raise money for Addenbrooke's Hospital. (These were the days before the National Health Service.) When Fred was ill, they set about raising money for a new dialysis machine.

For a few months after Fred's death, Grace moved to Birmingham, near his family, but, not a city girl at heart, soon returned to Willingham. She went to work at Willingham House, which had just stopped being the Rectory and had become a care home for the elderly. She ended her time there as cook, and, like Ken, greatly enjoyed her work. More recent Willingham residents will remember Grace in her next role, working at the baker's in Church Street.

For many years, before and after their marriage (in 1981, at the Methodist Church) Ken and Grace continued the hard-working participation in many aspects of village life that had begun during the war.

They were both heavily involved in organising the Field Days which were a major aspect of Willingham's life in the period soon after the war. They played a major part in the celebrations of the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth in 1953, and in the celebrations of her Silver Jubilee in 1977. Ken served on the Parish Council for many years.

As they look back, they reflect on the vast number of changes that they have witnessed. 'Our generation have seen more changes than anyone will ever see again', Ken believes. He recalls the coming of gas and electricity to Willingham in the 1930s (electricity slightly delayed because the Cambridge Town and University Gas Company 'pipped the electricity company to the post'). Then 30 years later, in 1967, he remembers the provision of sewerage. When he and Grace were young, he reflects, few of the roads had hard surfaces.

Grace remembers her father finding an old bike (with no tyres or tubes) and letting her ride it. She cycled along Rook Grove, and crashed into a wall. But, she notes 'We had no fear of motors – because there weren't any'.

They look back on some of the features of the village with happy nostalgia. Ken remembers that the old horse-drawn fire engine was kept on the Green, and manned by volunteers, until the second world war when a professional fire service became available. They both recall the bus company providing special buses to Willingham from Cambridge on Feast Sunday, and regret that the bus service now available to Willingham is much worse than in the days when buses ran via Cottenham as well as Longstanton.

They are conscious of the significance of the village's history. Ken, for example, spoke critically of moves some years ago to take the Public Hall down. 'That would have removed history', he remarks, noting also that the Public Hall is still fully used.

Remembering and relishing Willingham as it was, however, does not mean that they yearn for the past. Unobtrusively, and without fuss, both Ken and Grace continue to take a positive interest in the village, as they have always done.

# JOTTINGS FROM YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

In a few weeks the council tax bills for next year will be dropping through the letterbox and I guess that for many it will be another unwelcome increase. Cambridgeshire County Council (and also the Police Authority) have raised the council tax by 5% - yet again above the rate of inflation. Cambridgeshire will be one of the highest increases, but this masks the overall level of funding. Yet again we continue to be one of the lowest funded authorities in the country. The grant we receive from government accounts for about one third of what we spend and the rest comes from council tax. The average increase in grant from government for shire counties for next year is 5.7% - Cambridgeshire received just 2%. Already our grant from government is one of the lowest so 2% of not very much, remains a small sum, whereas a 9.4% increase on a large grant makes it even bigger.

So each year the gap between the best funded authorities (eg Nottinghamshire) and the lowest gets bigger and bigger. It isn't surprising that the counties with the lowest increase in council tax are the ones that got the best settlement from government and counties like Cambridgeshire are forced to go for a higher than average council tax rise in order the fund essential services. I know that I have said this before, but we can't buy our services in Tesco's or Sainsbury's and inflation costs for councils often rise above the standard measures. We have been hit, like everyone, by increases in fuel to pay, for example, for subsidised bus services or transporting children to school. Our elderly population is also increasing at a much faster rate than the national average and as a consequence the costs of caring from them are also increasing more. The one positive element of all of this is that the Audit Commission recently judged us to be one of the top authorities in the country for our use of resources – in other words, how we spend your money.

The ultimate irony – the Audit Commission, who visit us each year to check how we spend our money have announced that they plan to increase their fees by as much as 30% - haven't they heard of inflation?

# Parish Plan – Comments on Northstowe Planning Applications

When writing the questionnaire that was circulated to all households last autumn the Parish Plan Committee were aware that the development at Northstowe was likely to have a significant impact on the quality of life in Willingham, and so one question specifically addressed this point. With fortuitous timing, the letter from South Cambridgeshire District Council soliciting comments on the planning applications for Northstowe has coincided with the initial analysis of responses to that question, and the Chairman of the Plan committee has written to SCDC with a brief synopsis of those views, together with some of the background information that will form the basis of the Plan. The letter is lengthy, but it is based on the following four concerns:

- \* That the development could destroy Willingham as a distinct community.
- \* That during development it would create a strain on local infrastructure and services.
- \* That the traffic generated during construction would be disruptive and hazardous. In the long term, traffic on the B1050 would cause major deterioration to our quality of life.
- \* There is an increased risk of flooding.
