SMAS Rector to retire



Geoff Turner is to retire this summer from his position of rector of St Mary and All Saints, Willingham. His last service will be on Sunday 29 June 2008. (*All welcome.*) Following his retirement, Geoff and his wife Sheilah are to move north to be nearer to their family.

Geoff came to be rector of SMAS, and neighbouring Rampton, nearly 7 years ago. He had a wide range experience in ministry in parishes in Merseyside, St Albans and Cambridge before his move to this parish, and had also worked for a time as communications officer for the diocese of Ely.

Geoff and Sheilah both threw themselves very enthusiastically into the life of the parish church and wider village of Willingham. Sheilah was very involved with Friends of Willingham Library and was the founder editor of the magazine which is now the Willingham News. Sadly, a serious accident in 2004 inevitably made it much more difficult for Sheilah to play an active part and also meant that Geoff had to give more time to supporting Sheilah. Not withstanding this setback, Geoff took on the chair of our Willingham Parish Plan Committee as well as being involved as a school governor.

Memories of a happy childhood in Willingham

Quite recently I was given several copies of Willingham News, which I have found most interesting to read, and I am amazed at the many improvements which have been made within the village, the number of new shops opened, and the variety of clubs and associations formed – surely something for everyone to enjoy.

Since then I have bought the book Willingham – Portrait of a Village, featuring profiles of some of my contemporaries still going strong! Other friends I remember from that time were Pamela Jeeps, Joan and Betty Gleaves, Neville Cole, Desmond Miles, Thelma King and Hope Jacquest. Good wishes to anyone of those who might be reading this. My life in Willingham was carefree and happy. I was born in 1921 and lived there until my marriage in 1944, when I moved away. We all knew each other and people had time to give a helping hand to others when needed, or to stop to have a chat.

In the 1920s and '30s family life was very important, meals were eaten

together, sitting at the table. Children were not allowed to roam the streets at night and elderly parents or relatives were cared for at home, supported by Dr Cane, the very busy District Nurse, and kind neighbours.

Guided Busway

The Trial for the Guided Busway took place and went very well. Bus services are still in discussion regarding different sorts of services and how they might work. Stage Coach has taken over Huntingdon Bus Service.

Northstowe Consultation

The Parish Council wrote to the District Council in response to an invitation to take part in the consultation over Northstowe. The full response may be seen at the Parish Office. The Parish Council made the point that it did not have the resources or expertise to reply in detail to the consultation documents (which ran into hundreds of files). Here is a summary of the main points made by the Parish Council:

We were incensed by the decision of the planning inspectors to override the views of all the elected councils and felt this was a travesty of democratic accountability. It has led to the fear in Willingham Parish Council that its views will again not be taken seriously.....

The documents with which we have been presented are opaque in their complexity and detail. It is unrealistic to expect any parish council to be able to examine the plans, and react to them in detail. The papers provided for us do not include any realistic executive summary, a failure which in our view indicates once again that what we are faced with is not a consultation in any meaningful sense of the word.....

Our concerns are the same as those laid down several times over the past few years, but have been given added weight by the views of the parishioners obtained towards the end of 2007 in a questionnaire which will form the basis of the Willingham Parish Plan.The responses regarding Northstowe were clear and back up the Parish Council's concerns, which we set out under four headings.

1. Traffic

The existing volume of traffic is already a major concern. Traffic surveys undertaken by the Parish Council show a clear north/south capacity of 12 vehicles per minute. This is regularly exceeded at peak times or when the A14 is closed and results in frequent tailbacks of two to three miles. Added to this is the problem of the growing number of Heavy Goods Vehicles that add to the congestion at peak times and speed dangerously through the village at other times, leading to high risk of accidents.....

Little account has been taken of northbound movements to and from Northstowe, yet these will comprise a significant proportion of all movements. The need for a bypass is already clear and will become overwhelming. Over and above this is the question of construction traffic. If aggregates are to be used from the Sutton or Earith area the most direct route and therefore the least environmentally damaging will be through Willingham. The Parish Council's very strong view is that a link road should be a prerequirement of the developers before any construction at Northstowe begins and that this road should be designed in such a way that it can become a bypass in due course....WPC would also like to encourage less local traffic through much improved public transport. ...

Hopefully the guided bus may provide some relief for individuals wishing to travel to Cambridge or Huntingdon but for this relief to become a reality it will be essential to provide a regular bus link from Willingham to the Longstanton Park and Ride station. In all of the planning documents we have examined there seems to be a distinct reluctance for District or County Councils to take on this issue....., Their mantra of lack of demand is merely a circular argument based on their poor service as clearly demonstrated by the successful 'Citi' services links to Bar Hill and Cottenham.

2. Drainage and Sewerage

....We have access to residents and land owners with considerable local knowledge.... There is grave concern that the scheme as put forward will simply not work because of the scale, a town the size of Ely, the location and the routes out for surface and foul water. The proposed reduction in the number of balancing ponds simply exacerbates the situation....

Even without Northstowe we have regular problems in our village with flooding. ... We are aware of existing problems today in our village with sewage. Given the huge increase in population, and from what we can see of the limited provision for pumping and treatment, we believe this is a second disaster waiting to happen.

3. Separation

We are pleased that the development is being contained for now to the South of the old rail line but would like to see much more robust instruments in place to prevent expansion northwards at a later date.... We believe very strongly that if the character and heritage of the Fen Edge villages is to be retained then permanent and significant green belt separation will be needed.....

4. Nature of the Development

It seems clear to us that this development is far too large. We argued from day one that a community of more than 5000 to 6000 homes was totally disproportionate and that if 10,000 to 12,000 homes were needed they should be built in two towns not one.

The view of Willingham Parish Council (and other elected bodies) about the maximum size of the development has been ignored. Not only that, but also the policy that Northstowe should be an eco-town has been abandoned. These two facts raise serious issues about the sustainability of Northstowe.

Further.....whatever the size, it is crucial that the essential infrastructure is in place *before* major house building begins. It is essential, for example that a secondary school, and at least one primary school, is built at a very early stage of the development,Willingham Parish Council has concerns about the density of the build and the lack of green space. Although sports fields have been included this is not good enough and does not address the issue of accessible green space for all.....

5. Conclusions

We fully accept that it is extremely unlikely that much notice will be taken of the views we have expressed here. It gives us little satisfaction that we will probably be proved right about most of them.....

We can only repeat our grave concerns and ask that planners and developers ensure that as far as possible steps are taken to mitigate the major impacts on Willingham of traffic, drainage and separation......

Jottings from your County Councillor

Summarised below are Cllr Shona Johnstone's comments submitted to the District Council regarding the planning applications for Northstowe.

'If we have to have such a major development on our doorstep, then it is essential that it is of high quality and fit for the twenty first century. The current application does not do that.

As a general comment, in advance of specific objections, I would make the point that Northstowe has been described by government as a proto-type eco-town and that it is therefore incumbent upon the local authorities and the developers to ensure that these principles are adhered to, with appropriate support from the relevant government departments to enable the highest standards to be achieved. In particular I would refer to the statements made only this week by Hazel Blears, that eco-towns should have a speed limit of 15mph and that half of households should not require private cars. The fact that an eco-town will be difficult to deliver should not be an excuse to ignore these requirements.

A second general comment relates to the overall lack of detail in the applications of the impact of Northstowe to the north of the development, in particular, the impact on the B1050 and Willingham. This is particularly disappointing, given the proximity of Willingham to the development and the fact that the B1050 is routed through the northern corner of Northstowe. I believe that this will need to be addressed through the planning process.

Thirdly, experience at Cambourne has demonstrated that a lack of community facilities at the outset of the development has a serious negative impact on the health and well being of the community. The mistakes of Cambourne must not be repeated at Northstowe and the developers must therefore be required to bring forward development of community facilities, including the town centre at the start of the development, not at some unspecified point in the future.

Finally, throughout these applications, the developers describe Northstowe as an 'exemplar of sustainability'. The applications do nothing to justify such a description and it is highly disappointing that after all this time there is nothing that merits the description of visionary or sustainable. '

Cllr Johnstone then makes a number of detailed comments relating to specific sections of the application, and concludes:

'On the basis of these comments and concerns raised by the parish councils of the parishes which I represent, I would urge South Cambridgeshire District Council to reject the current application.'

Traffic Calming

I am staggered that the Parish Council are setting out on an exercise in futility ie assessing the effectiveness of interactive traffic signs on Earith Road. Surely it is obvious that if motorists have already broken the law by disregarding the speed restriction signs at the beginning of the village, that they are highly unlikely to take any notice whatsoever of a flashing interactive sign? Even the most cursory observation of the sign on the very few occasions when it was last working and today of the (badly located) sign at the North end of the village, proves this. In addition to motorists there is the problem of the heavy lorries which thunder, and I do mean thunder, along Earith Road with, as often as not, the driver having one hand on the steering wheel while the other clamps a mobile phone to his ear. I am amazed that there has not been a serious accident as a result of this illegal practice.

I suggested in your September 2007 issue that the answer to the ineffectiveness of the interactive signs, might be Gatso cameras. These would have to be properly located and calibrated to avoid appeals from those caught on camera and maintained to be fully operative over the whole year. Action should then be taken to hit those speeding in their pockets and to put points on their licences. Keep on doing this and sooner or later the message will get through. Councillor Johnstone, in her July 2007 Jottings, indicated that a new speed limit policy was to be considered later in 2007. Perhaps we could be told the outcome of the discussion(s) if they took place, or if they did not take place why not?

The fact that this problem has gone on for several years indicates that certain echelons of Local Government reflect the performance of our National Government. All are long on rhetoric and short on achievement. In her April Jottings the County Councillor says that low level of Government grant means that there is less money to spend on, say, community projects. And yet funding well in excess of £100million was found for the guided bus scheme under the employ of the County Council. I hope that the low level of grant is not a precursor for saving there is no money for our traffic calming, or that there are projects with a higher priority for funding. Surrounding villages, where the volume of traffic is not nearly so great as here, already have measures in place. Why did they have priority and where did the funding come from?

The assurance that "something will be done" has an extremely hollow ring about it. The invitation from the Parish Council to "watch this space" instills no confidence that effective traffic calming measures will be installed in the short or, judging by past experience, in the medium term.

The problem is not intractable. It is high time that this long outstanding and parlous traffic situation was gripped.

Christian Aid Week 11-17 May

'If we come together, we can achieve amazing things.'

Through the new village pani parishad (water council), Minu Basar has learned how to harvest rainwater safely so that she doesn't have to travel for a whole day and cross a dangerous river to fetch drinking water.

Rekha Biswas from Bangladesh provides the most humbling and inspirational example for Christian Aid Week. This courageous lady goes from house to house, talking to families about the problems they face getting water. And vitally, she challenges gender roles. She encourages women to come to meetings of the local pani parishad, the village water council.

Getting clean water is a problem throughout Bangladesh. People often have to walk for up to 24 hours to collect water to drink.

Some of my favourite memories were ice-skating on the flooded fens, being given a bicycle, the Feast and annual fête held in the lovely Rectory garden. There was also swimming at Overcote where there was a ferry, which took vehicles and passengers over the river on their way to Needingworth. I recall going to Lords Grounds and the Pastures with no fear of violence or meeting someone unpleasant, to pick blackberries, which were plentiful, and selling them at sixpence for four pounds to Mr Granger; this money was saved to spend at the Feast in October. Then there was the big decision about which sweets to buy with the Saturday penny at Mrs Few's shop.

There were certain rules to be observed, like not eating pork unless there was an 'R' in the month, which was just as well as it was a job to keep food fresh in the hot weather. Milk had to be boiled and food put outside in a meat safe which was hung on a north-facing wall.

The scent of carnations always reminds me to The Vineries. In the early 1890s my great grandfather and his son, both named Ingle Few Thoday, founded The Vineries in Long Lane, which consisted of six spanroofed glasshouses, 250 feet long, growing cucumbers, perpetual flowering carnations of every colour and a variety of plants new to the area. My grandfather, who lived at The Vineyards, also pioneered the growing of asparagus. Thank you for the opportunity to take this nostalgic trip into the past. I hope that one day soon I might ask one of my family to drive me to the village where I can see for myself the changes, and admire the lovely sign designed by Sarah Taylor.

Anti Social Behaviour (ASB): You can help

The ASB Caseworker, Julia Howlett, recently met with Parish Council members to discuss ASB and the processes in place in South Cambridgeshire to tackle it.

The legal definition of ASB is: 'acting in an anti-social manner that caused or was likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to one or more persons not of the same household as the complainant'.

Generally it refers to actions that have a detrimental effect on someone's quality of life. Listed below are some of the things that could be classed as ASB:

> Abandoned vehicles Drunken behaviour Verbal abuse Vandalism Setting fires

Criminal damage Intimidation/harassment Dropping litter Throwing missiles

Police	All serious incidents of ASB should be reported to the police on 0845 456 456 4. If incidents are not reported local neighbourhood policing teams may not be aware of the problems being experienced.		
Registered Social Landlord (RSL) (Including SCDC housing)	If you experience issues of ASB and are aware that either the perpetrator or victim is a tenant of a housing association a report should be made to the relevant organisation.		
Environmental Health	Issues such as noise nuisance, littering, flytipping, dog fouling and abandoned vehicles should be reported to Environmental Health on 08450 450 500.		
ASB Caseworker	If you require advice or have an issue that does not fall into any of the above categories the ASB caseworker is happy to give advice and can be contacted on 08450 450 500 - ask for Julia Howlett		

There are many more types of behaviour that could be classed as anti social.

It is vital that agencies responsible for tackling ASB are as fully informed about the issues as possible. The table above shows which incidents should be reported to what agency:
