The charity also runs the Community First Responder Scheme that trains nonmedical people to save lives within their local town or village. Each group carries a medical kit bag that includes oxygen and an automatic defibrillator for use in cardiac arrest cases. Willingham is fortunate to have such a group. New members are always welcome. Safety in the Sun We are now finally enjoying some sunny weather and unfortunately we have already had patients who have suffered sunburn. Please remember to apply sunscreen if you are outside in the sun and use a **minimum sun protection factor of 15**. Sunburn can cause long term damage to your skin and we recommend that you check regularly for any moles or blemishes that have changed shape or colour. If you are concerned make an appointment with the doctor. Some medicines may make your skin more sensitive to the sun. Please check on the label supplied with your tablets or ask the pharmacy staff.

Please make sure that children are always protected from the sun. A high protection factor of at least 25 is advised and during the hottest part of the day skin should be covered. It is advisable for children to wear a sunhat. Remember to reapply sun lotion throughout the day.

Skin care products We have a full range of suncare and after-sun products in our Willingham Pharmacy and our staff will be happy to advise on these and on our insect repellent preparations. **Insect bites** can be very irritating and distressing although most can be treated with creams or antihistamine tablets available over the counter. Occasionally the bites can become infected and will need treating with antibiotics. Please ask our pharmacist for advice.

Allergies Most hay fever products are available without a prescription and are cheaper to buy over the counter than on prescription. Ask at the pharmacy for advice on tablets, nasal sprays and eye drops. **Travel Vaccinations** If you are travelling abroad this year don't forget to make an appointment with one of our nurses at least six weeks before you travel to ensure you receive the full cover needed to protect you. We are a registered Yellow Fever Centre.

The CAMTAD Van will next be at Willingham surgery on Wednesday 16 July between 2 30 and 4 30 pm. **This is a free service for those with hearing problems**. Just come along and sit in the waiting room to wait for your individual consultation when you can discuss any problems and obtain advice. No appointment needed. NHS batteries can be exchanged and hearing aids checked. CAMTAD stands for Campaign for Tackling Acquired Deafness and the service is provided by trained volunteers who all suffer from hearing problems themselves.

Threats to your local GP practices

.

Government plans to reform the way primary care services are delivered in the future pose a threat to the current model of patient-centred general practice. The BMA have launched a campaign to raise awareness of the issues and how this will affect your local surgery. Look out for details in your own surgery and watch the media. It will give you a chance to make your personal feelings known to the government by signing a petition which will be presented to the Prime Minister on 12 June, and explain how you can write to your MP and the PCT. We may still have a chance to influence government policy. **Please support your local surgery or you may lose it.**

Jottings from your County Councillor

In wading through the thousands of pages that comprised the Northstowe planning application (which I have on CD ROM to save the planet!), one theme constantly emerged – the desperate need for Willingham to have a bypass. So last month, I was extremely pleased that finally the County Council have agreed to fund a study to ascertain whether one is needed.

Yes, I could give them the answer now, as I suspect could many residents of Willingham, but at least we have moved one small step forward. I am confident that the volume of traffic will confirm the need for a bypass, but the key issue then will be how it is funded. It is likely to cost many millions of pounds and there is not enough money in the council's budget for capital schemes, so we will need to think of some creative alternatives – although with the presence of Northstowe so close by, I think part of the money at least should come from developer funds. In the meantime, the Parish Council and I will continue to keep up the pressure to ensure that the study comes up with the right result.

Just this evening, along with representatives from the Parish Council we had a briefing about the Longstanton bypass. Work on this is starting on 19 May and will take some 40 weeks to complete. We all expressed concern about the fact that the bypass was starting just as the B1050 will be partially closed (single line working) for the guided busway scheme. That is extremely unfortunate, especially since the bypass should have been completed had it not been for arguments about land ownership, which has held the scheme up for many months. The County Council officers assured us that they will try to keep delays to an absolute minimum.

Finally, it occurred to me that while parish magazines are the best way of keeping in touch with everyone, my

reports can sometimes be a bit out of date. So I have taken advice from my children (and husband!) and set up a blog, where I can report on current issues and hopefully keep you all better informed. The address is listed below along with my other contact details.

Pastoral Letter

The Myanmar Tragedy

On 2 May, Cyclone Nargis swept up the Irrawady Delta. The wall of seawater was ten feet high and the wind that drove it roared ashore at 130 miles per hour. In farmland that once grew more rice for export than anywhere else in the world, whole villages were annihilated. As that first week slipped by, the highly professional staff of International Aid organisations were refused entry visas. Myanmar's military government seemed less concerned with the rescue of its own people than it was with a referendum to strengthen its own political position. Meanwhile thousands of dead floated in floodwater and the scene was set for catastrophic outbreaks of disease in communities already weakened by dehydration and famine. A great bereavement fell upon a nation with nearly the population of England. From our distance, we try to give, and pray and hope.

But how did it happen?

The Cyclone was the end, but not the beginning. The generals had long ago set their political agenda. It involved ruthless clamp-down on dissent but did not include plans to make the Irrawady Delta's fertile floodplain a safer place to live. And where did these men themselves emerge from? What lies behind the turbulent, violent history of Burma's internal politics of the past 60 years: independence in 1948, the assassination of most of the government-elect before it had taken up office, and then weak leadership that opened the door to periods of xenophobic military rule, now continuous for the past two decades? Cyclones can damage economies and cause loss of many precious lives, but they need not ruin countries if there is far-sighted, wise and resourceful governance. The tragedy of Myanmar is that it has had none of these for many years, and Nargis demonstrated its resulting woeful infrastructural weaknesses.

Around AD30, in Jerusalem, a man from Galilee was arrested. He was innocent of any crime, and the Roman procurator knew it. But Pilate was an amoral governor, his actions for long determined by political expediency, spiced with violence. When the test came, he condemned Jesus to be crucified. Likewise the soldiers revealed a longstanding familiarity with brutal behaviour when they tortured their Galilean prisoner, and the Pharisees ran true to deep-rooted, wrong-headed, religious prejudices when they mocked Him. The decisions they made about Jesus revealed the chronic state of their hearts. When their 'cyclone moment' came, they were found out. But Jesus repeatedly taught that we all have a cyclone moment - a time when we need to decide whether we neglect Him or explore the claims and promises He makes - to cleanse from guilt and sin, to purge and redirect priorities and to open up a loving relationship with God. Are we ready for the 'cyclone test'?

Willingham Walk4Water Sunday 8 June 2 30 pm

Turn on the Tap 4 Safe Accessible Water in the Developing World.

Samaritan's Purse aim to raise £1 million by the end of 2008 to provide more hand dug wells, repair and drill more boreholes, provide more water filters and ensure that thousands more people receive the health and hygiene education that is so important for sustaining long-term development.

Here in Willingham, we are planning a four (roughly) mile walk from the Parish church to Queenholme Farm (down Spong Drove and with the kind permission of Robert and Christine Gilbert) and back to 28 Church Street for a simple BBQ. There will be a pause at the farm for refreshment before the return journey.

For those unable to walk, the BBQ will be available from 4 30 pm and there will be a bowl for donations which will go to the campaign. Walkers also very welcome to the BBQ. Numbers needed for catering, please.

For those hoping to walk, there is a sponsorship form. Alternatively, there is registration fee of £2 for entering the walk if one doesn't want to go down the sponsorship route. Either way, we hope to raise a good amount to send to Samaritan's Purse who, incidentally, run the annual Operation Christmas Child (Shoeboxes).

The plan will be to set off from 2 30 onwards. Children will need to be accompanied by adults who will be totally responsible for them. There is no footpath but very little traffic on the route.
