Margaret and I have travelled to Sierra Leone near the equator on the west coast of Africa to see first hand the poorest country in the world. Despite his disability David has the biggest grin I have ever seen as he shakes my hand.

For ten days we lived in the shanty town east of the capital Freetown, surrounded by shacks and buildings gutted in the brutal civil war of 1995 – 2001. This place is utterly chaotic with one tarmac road and the rest just dust and rocks. People flood the streets along with chickens, goats, hungry dogs and hoards of chattering children. Unlike the UK where children are taught that all strangers are dangerous, the children here are trusting and curious and we soon have a crowd of smiling faces around us.

Everyone we meet is friendly and warm but, of course, there is another side. Most of the children are hungry and often conversations lead to a request 'will you be my friend' which is a plea for help. A 1000 Leone coin is

We travelled with a party of ten people organized by Mission Direct, a Christian charity that helps people regardless of religion. The charity supports a number of local aid projects including an old people's home, a hostel for the mentally ill, two polio foundations, and a

beautiful rural home for street children rescued as beggars or prostitutes from the gutters. They are given food accommodation and love for one year to get them onto their feet and then a permanent home is found.

The weather is hot and steamy. One night a violent thunderstorm brings hurricane force winds. Getting out of bed in the dark to look through the window I find our room 1cm deep in water! Outside the clangs of flying corrugated iron are heard as frail roofs rip off and huddled families are drenched. But the morning brings sun and the sound of hammering and repairs. People don't expect

From the Parish Council

Pyrethrum Way

The Parish Council has noted concerns expressed by some residents of Pyrethrum Way regarding disturbance to people living near the two small green areas. The disturbance is caused by footballs being kicked towards houses. The green areas are public open spaces, intended for leisure use by the residents, including use as a children's play area. Their size and location, however, mean that they are NOT suitable for use as football pitches. The Council urges parents to make sure that their children do NOT use them in this way and so avoid the necessity of a ban on all ball games on these areas.

Interactive Traffic Sign in Earith Road

Following the protest in May, the interactive signs on the Earith Road are now working. The Parish Council will be now be contacting the Police to do regular speed Police Checks.

Sports Pavilion

The new Sports Pavilion unfortunately has had more setbacks due to vandalism, which is occurring on a regular basis. The completion date has now been set for mid July providing no further set backs are experienced.

Ploughman Hall

Since the Parish Council took over the running of the Ploughman Hall on 1 April, there have been some minor problems due to lack of a Custodian to open and shut the hall at the appropriate times of hire and also a lack of a cleaner. Because of this, the Parish Council have been unable to take new bookings for the hall. However, these issues will be resolved by the end of June and the bookings

Parish Plan Update

The task of writing the Plan is now entering its final phase of editing before formatting for publication, and a draft list of actions arising from the Plan is being put onto the website at www.newwillingham.org. The actions range from weighty suggestions with a timescale of several years and a large cost to small ones that could be easily implemented within a matter of months. For example, those related to crime, disorder and disturbance include the obvious one of greater and more frequent police presence, plus better publicity for the regular liaison meeting that the police hold for local residents, encouraging the reporting of crimes, a youth venue, better street lighting in some areas and encouraging pub landlords to display signs requesting patrons to be considerate when leaving.

security here. There is no railway, no postal service and no electricity for much of the time. People lucky enough to get employment can expect a wage of just £15 per month.

For much of the week we have practical work to do, painting and repairing worn out facilities. We renovate a decrepit toilet block at the old people's home and there is plenty of time to talk to the old folk and hear their stories. Each day we visit a different location to learn about the aid work being done and understand their needs.

Too soon it's Monday and time to leave. In ten days we have met wonderful people who devote themselves to living here and helping these warm and friendly people. Ten days is not enough and arriving back in Willingham is a strange feeling. But we know that people here care too – we were given £680 by Willingham residents before the trip, 100% of which will go to aid the projects we saw. We may not smile so wide, but there are plenty of big hearts in Willingham.

The National Blood Service Mobile Donor Unit will be visiting Willingham Surgery on Monday 14 July. The day is organised by appointment and appointments can be made by calling 0845 7 711 711 quoting postcode 'CB24 5LB'

The Mobile Donor Unit has been collecting donations in the Cambridgeshire area since the beginning of the year. The National Blood Service needs to collect 7,000 donations daily to meet hospital demand. Only 4% of the eligible population donate. You need to be aged between 17-59 (70 for regular donors), be in good health and weigh over 7 stone 12 lbs (50kg). It is important to have plenty to eat and drink before donating. The Unit has 3 beds, a confidential booth and a refreshment area. Donors can donate up to 3 times a year and each donation can save up to 3 lives. Red cells have a shelf life of 35 days and platelets have a shelf life of only 5 days.

The CAMTAD Van will be visiting Willingham surgery on **Wed 16 July from 2 30-4 30 pm**. If you need to replace your NHS batteries or have any problems or queries regarding your hearing aid, just pop along. No appointment needed.

Support Your Surgery Campaign Thank you to all who signed the 'NHS Birthday Card' petition to support the preservation of your local GP practices. As you know many GP surgeries are under threat of closure to be replaced by private health funded polyclinics and walk-in centres. These may work for the socially mobile and fit population but will not meet the needs of the elderly and more vulnerable of our community, nor are we convinced that they will necessarily deliver a quality service to the population in general after a period of time. If you feel strongly about the future of the NHS we urge you to write to your local MP.

Drinking and You NHS advice on drinking recommends that men should not regularly drink more than 3-4 units of alcohol a day and women should not regularly drink more than 2-3 units a day. Pregnant women or women trying to conceive should avoid drinking alcohol. If they do choose to drink, to minimise the risk to the baby, they should not drink more than 1-2 units once or twice a week and should not get drunk.

Drink Units You may want to keep track of what you drink in a day or an evening, and count your units. Be aware of the health and personal safety risks you face if

you go over the NHS recommended limit. This will help you make an informed choice as to how and when you drink. If you need information on what a unit of alcohol is please ask at our Pharmacy where leaflets are available.

Extended Opening Hours We are considering introducing Saturday morning surgery sessions in line with government policy. You may remember that we ceased to provide these in 2004 in line with government policy for out of hours provision at that time! Government policy this time dictates that these sessions should be reserved for 'routine book in advance doctor appointments' and will not be walk-in emergency sessions. Our plan is to open from 8 30 am - 11 45 am each Saturday morning starting from 5 July for three months initially. We regret that it would not be viable at present for us to open the pharmacy and you will not be able to collect your repeat prescriptions on Saturdays. These surgeries are intended for people who work and cannot attend during the week. There are no laboratory facilities available to allow for blood tests on Saturdays. Emergencies will be covered by CAMDOC in the normal way over the weekend. We would welcome your views on whether you feel we should continue with this service after the trial period.

That's a bit of Luck!

Holidays on a scorching beach, lounging in the sun sounds idyllic, but in reality I would not enjoy it for more than a day at a time. I choose to have 'out-and-about' days with restful ones in between.

On a recent holiday break one of my 'out-and-about' days included a visit to a windmill way out in the country. It was a hive of activity, plenty of people coming and going, offering a visit to a small farm with interaction with the animals, a working windmill, busy bakery, restaurant, gift shop, cycle hire and children's play area.

The little children loved the 'hand's on' approach with the animals, and quite naturally, the activities in the play area, bigger children wanted to hire cycles and explore the countryside; men seemed fascinated by the mechanics of the mill, and the women (and secretly the men folk) shopped at the bakery having been lured by the aroma of freshly baked bread. All came together with a cuppa or a meal at the restaurant, making for a happy day out.

As I sat by the mill I saw a basket with a sign on which read 'Lucky horseshoes, £1 each'. I took a peek in the basket and saw about a dozen horseshoes there, very worn, shabby and a bit rusty looking. My mind went back to my childhood days, and I recalled the periodic visits of the gypsy women who knocked on the door trying to sell their wares of pegs, lucky charms and lucky heather. Even then in my young mind I couldn't see how charms or heather could be lucky, they couldn't do anything, so how could they bring luck? Horseshoes termed lucky come into the same category in my thinking, and I recall what the Prophet Isaiah said:

'The metal worker takes a piece of metal and works with it over a fire. His strong arm swings the hammer to pound the metal into shape. As he works, he gets hungry, thirsty, and tired. The carpenter measures the wood. He outlines a figure with chalk, carves it out with tools...He prays to it and says, "You are my god - save me!" The Lord says, "remember this...I created you to be my servant. Come back to me; I am the one who saves you.""

I am very thankful that the Lord God plans for me in love, and for my good. *I* don't need to trust to luck!

The Willingham Wing



Like worker bees sweeping up pollen from one flower to another, the 15A bus departs Willingham with commuters from just another Cambridgeshire bus stop...or is it?

On closer inspection, this bus stop is definitely no ordinary stop; in fact, it is the product of a creative partnership between regional artist Zoë Chamberlain and Willingham Parish Council. The artist was offered the opportunity of designing a bus stop feature with local relevance for the village. Enchanted by the historical association of Willingham's flower growing and bee

keeping traditions, Zoë focused on the relationship between routes the bees used when moving from village to village and the journeys made by local workers on their way to work.

The design incorporates a sweeping roof inspired by traditional canopy design, giving an element of shelter in the restricted bus stop location. Working in metal for the main structure and polycarbonate for the wing feature, Zoë enlisted the help of co-designer Louise Watson to carry out the detailed technical design. Complimenting the feature is some unusual floor lighting with embedded designs by local teenagers.

The project has relied on an active steering group representing a partnership between Willingham Parish Council, South Cambridgeshire District Council and Cambridgeshire County Council. It has also been made possible thanks to the input and involvement of local residents at every stage, from development of initial design ideas through to installation.

To celebrate the new bus stop Willingham Parish Council invite local residents to the launch on Saturday 19 July, 10 00 am. We will be giving away limited edition Willingham shopping bags filled with goodies. We are also looking for local people to get involved with the Bringing Back the Flowers community planting project which will rejuvenate the verge surrounding the bus stop later in the year. The project hopes to be a catalyst encouraging more residents to bring the flowers back to Willingham! To find out more contact John Burnett on 01954 270338.
