Winter Warmer

In the middle of November, we flew a long way south, eventually reaching Windhoek, the capital of Namibia, to embark on a holiday tasting some of the varied wildlife and scenery of this large and sparsely populated country.

We met our excellent guide and driver, Lombard, at the airport and



then drove north for several hours along the B1 which turned out to be the only surfaced road used during the entire trip. We left behind the huge abattoirs around Windhoek – beef exports form a large part of the economy – passing mile upon mile of cattle farms comprising the huge areas needed to support the livestock. Some farmers had switched to producing game animals for hunting – these farms could be identified by their higher fencing.

Eventually we turned off the B1 onto one of the gravel roads that we were now to follow and came to Okonjima, home of the Africat Foundation, where they look after orphaned leopards and cheetahs with the hope of introducing them into the wild. The animals are free to roam within huge fenced areas; some have radio collars, but are still very hard to track down. This was a superb place, excellent accommodation and food, and with a wide variety of bird life outside the door and on the roof. Here, we were lucky to eventually get

very good sightings of a leopard; and, after a wet afternoon, close-ups of a somewhat drenched cheetah. We also saw some rescued African wild dogs.

After two nights, we travelled further north to Etosha National Park, supposedly larger than Wales. We covered some of the eastern section of the waterholes where

park, concentrating on various waterholes where animals congregated. At the first, we were lucky enough to watch two unconcerned male lions and the drama of the effect they had on zebras, jackals and a giraffe also wanting a drink. There were also a couple of elephants nearby, who ignored everything as befits their size and presence.

We later returned to the first waterhole, having seen on the way a Kori Bustard which is the heaviest bird in the world capable of flight, to spot a Secretary Bird and a

family of Ostriches including six chicks - some chicks!

We then travelled and south west towards the Brandberg Mountains stopping to look at petrified trees and a 200 year old Weltwischia plant mirabilis en route, reaching until Twyfelfontein where we saw impressive depictions of animals scratched into the soft stone; thought to be thousands of years old. Next, it was south to Swakopmund along the Skeleton Coast, socalled as many ships driven had been the aground onto shallow shore by Atlantic gales and high seas - we saw a fine example of a recently stranded ship. The road surface here was longer gravel no but smooth sand,

moistened and covered with salt fine until it rains; as it very rarely does. Swakopmund was extremely smart with a very Germanic feel to it. With very little rain, there was no road drainage sorely missed during a recent rainstorm when the town was flooded. Here, we spent two nights in the smart hotel that

used to be the somewhat grandiose railway station.

Next morning, we drove to Walvis Bay for a boat trip to see pelicans, porpoises, Cape fur seals, flamingos and other delights. The pelicans flew alongside looking for handouts; and a large and smelly bull seal clambered into the boat for a fish snack. This trip ended with an oysters and champagne picnic aboard.

In the afternoon, we took a drive in a dune buggy to learn about the desert animals and ecology that relies upon moisture from the persistent coastal fogs. We saw lizards, geckos, a sidewinder snake, a Namaqua chameleon demonstrating how to catch a beetle with your tongue; and an eight inch long black scorpion caught by the tail using kitchen tongs covered with sponge. We capped it off with a hair-raising drive down the steep side of one of the dunes.

Then a long ride south via Solitaire, aptly named, comprising a 1930's combination of hardware store, greasy spoon and souvenir shop, where it poured and Once the rain stopped, we inspected the poured. somewhat odd theme surrounding the complex artistically arranged scrap cars and farm machinery. We eventually came to our final accommodation at Sossuvlei Wherever we had which was super, as was the food. stayed, we had had the option of roast meat from various game animals, but could not face zebra. Here, we were The next also offered crocodile tail, but declined. morning, we left early to get out into the famous red sand dunes in time for sunrise and Kodak moments - pretty Later, we travelled further south and walked amazing. out into the desert, learning more about the fragile ecology. By then, it was very hot and we were glad to get back to our digs to think about packing for our flight home tomorrow.

Another long drive in the morning, via Solitaire for a packed sandwich, until we eventually came back to the B1 and Windhoek airport. All in all, it was more of an experience rather than a holiday, but one we enjoyed hugely.

When we arrived at Heathrow, it was 30°C colder than when we emplaned!

Still not had a flu vaccination? If you are aged over 65 or are in an at risk group due to a medical condition we urge you to **contact the surgery**. It is not too **late to protect yourself against a serious bout of flu.** If you are housebound and need a visit for your flu injection please ring reception to arrange this.

We are currently experiencing a huge demand for **emergency appointments** at the end of the morning surgery. We do try to see everybody who needs to be seen but with the flu epidemic we are struggling to cope. Many of these requests are for ailments such as colds and flu, vomiting and diarrhoea which are often self-limiting viral illnesses. Although these conditions can make you feel very rough they are usually best treated at home with remedies that can be bought in the pharmacy. Sitting in the waiting room spreads the germs through the community and puts our more vulnerable and elderly patients at risk. If in doubt please ask for a telephone appointment or ring our pharmacist on 01954 261787 for advice.

Medicines Waste Campaign The NHS and Cambridgeshire PCT are currently running a campaign to inform patients how much money is wasted by unused medicines. For instance did you know that the cost of unused medicines returned in Cambridgeshire alone is at least £4 million every year which would pay for 766 more hip replacements, 523 heart by-pass ops, 706 knee replacements or 5333 cataract operations. Returned medicines cannot be reused and have to be destroyed even if the packet is unopened.

Repeat prescriptions Please order only what you actually need from your repeat list. If you are ordering your medicines by phone (01954 260073) make sure you have your repeat medication request form ready by the phone. This form is always enclosed in the bag with your medicines. If you prefer to bring in your request form please tick only the items required from your list. If you forget to bring your list you will be asked to fill out a form at the surgery. We have introduced a new collection box at each surgery where you can leave your request form if you are in a hurry and do not wish to speak to a member of staff.

Remember to order at least 2-3 working days before you run out to allow time for important safety checks to be made. We thank you for your cooperation in helping to ensure that limited NHS resources are used to best advantage for everyone.

Progress with the Parish Plan

A new committee has been formed to press for the implementation of the action plan arising from the questionnaire. It is made up of five members of the original committee that produced the Plan and thirteen new volunteers.

At its first meeting on 8 January the committee divided into three groups, each dealing with different aspects of the Plan. Each group will meet regularly over the coming years.

One group will liaise with the various Councils and other relevant bodies regarding action on issues raised in the Plan such as traffic volume and speeding, anti-social behaviour, the development at Northstowe and environmental issues such as litter, dog mess, poor pavements and lack of play areas and green spaces.

Another group will concentrate the actions involving social issues, aiming to improve communication about all the clubs, sporting groups and activities that take place in Willingham, as well as offering help with new ventures. One first idea along these lines is to start a running club since many residents go running but often alone – watch this space! It might also be possible to get a group of volunteers to offer assistance with gardening and/or redecorating for those who need help or to offer help in cleaning up the local environment and planting and maintaining trees.

A third group will focus on improving facilities for young people. The Plan showed that Willingham offers little for the young and transport is poor so it is difficult to use amenities such as the sports centre in Cottenham. We also need a youth centre.

A fourth group could be formed in the future to press for improvements to help the business community of Willingham.

This all sounds wonderful but we recognise that achieving all the action points in the Plan will be a long and sometimes daunting process. It is clear that Willingham is a good place to live, it has not become a characterless suburb and still retains its own unique identity, but it can be improved.

Pastoral Letter

What does 2009 hold in store for us in Willingham? Well, we expect the commencement of the guided bus route, (which probably won't make much difference to the way we all travel!) and we may begin campaigning for a weight restriction on traffic using the B1040, but that probably won't make a great deal of difference either. Perhaps we could turn our minds to creating a stronger sense of community in the village.

Those who have lived here for more than 20 years have seen a vast change as the village has expanded and the population has virtually doubled. Gone is the backbone economy of village life which was based on horticulture. Most of those who have moved into the village have not come from a rural background but are mostly young professionals, many of whom commute to work. The Parish Plan responses suggest that 75% work more than 5 miles away. Many will leave the village early in the morning and not return until early evening. This does not help to build community spirit. In the gospels Jesus encourages us to 'love our neighbour.' This is not so easy if we rarely see our neighbours! Of course, in line with the parable of the Good Samaritan, neighbours are not just those who live next door but the wider community and, in particular, anyone in need.

Perhaps in the light of all this we could make 2009 a year in which we seek to be better neighbours. We are always quick to complain if next door have their music system too loud or have a party that runs late or park across our drive, but are we good neighbours to others? A friendly 'good morning' or a small act of kindness may be enough to get us started. I must say that I know more people who are my immediate neighbours in the five months I have lived in Willingham than I did after 7 years at my previous address 'up north.' Even in a friendly village like Willingham there are those who are lonely. Some elderly people living alone rarely go out and have little human companionship. Others with health issues may similarly feel out on a limb. Then there is the constant flow of people moving into the village who will probably know noone at all to begin with and, if they also commute, will have little opportunity to become part of village life.

Seek out events in the village to join in with and invite your neighbours. WAMADS, the primary school, the sports clubs, the churches and the pubs are just some of the organisations that arrange community events. We are hoping to make the Feast Day a bigger and better event this year. For those who like Bible study there is an opportunity to be part of a Lent course running from week beginning 23 February in various locations throughout the village. Your nearest church will have details or phone me (261193). There is a start in getting to know new people.

Let us, then, take up the challenge of Jesus to love our neighbours and create a better sense of community in Willingham.
