Profile: Enthusiast at the helm

Mrs Jo Brearley has been Head Teacher of Willingham Primary School since January 2001, and she has not regretted a moment of her time here. As she puts it: 'To touch the lives of so many children is a great privilege. I feel honoured.'

You cannot be with her for more than a few minutes before becoming conscious of her enthusiasm – for teaching, and for the school.

Willingham is a large school, with some 320 pupils. When she came here, some Willingham parents were sending their children to other schools, but now it is a different matter; children are looking to come to



Willingham School from neighbouring villages. It is a compliment to the school, but a problem also, at a time when the number of Willingham children has been growing. Jo Brearley expects the school to have nearly 350 pupils soon, and to meet that demand she and the governors have been working hard to get more classrooms. By 2010, she hopes that will have been achieved.

Jo spent her early years in the North East, but was able to visit Zambia, where her father was working. She was always interested in the idea of teaching, but was also a keen musician. Having passed Grade 8 in piano and in singing while at school, she realised that a musical career could have been a possibility.

Teaching won, however, and after training in Gloucestershire she began her teaching career in Coventry. There followed a period in Northamptonshire, first in a secondary school and then a middle school. This was followed by time out while she brought up her daughter Ruth.

Meeting about by-pass

At its February meeting the Parish Council learnt that the County Council had completed a Willingham by-pass survey without referring it first, as had been agreed, to the Parish Council. Councillors heard, from County Councillor Shona Johnstone, that after so many months and so much expenditure the report's only conclusion was that further work was needed. They strongly endorse her view that the only work now necessary is to decide how to fund the by-pass, not whether one is needed.

The Parish Council has been pressing strongly for a by-pass for several years. The need for it was one of the issues most commonly raised by people who completed the Parish Plan questionnaire.

The increase in the number of heavy lorries entering Willingham along Earith Road has made the need for a bypass urgent. Parts of Earith Road have subsided yet again.

On 13 February Councillors Philip King and John Anderson, and District Councillors Ray Manning and Brian Burling, attended a meeting with the County Council. The meeting was positive. It was agreed that more work was needed but that the case for a by-pass was looking much stronger.. Achieving it, however, is still many years away. Funding will be a major issue and after that planning and building will take some time.

It was primary school teaching that really appealed to her, and she returned, first to a part-time post, and then to Spaldwick as deputy head. Then came a move to Folksworth Primary School, near Norman Cross, as Head Teacher, with the task of turning the school round after a prolonged bad period. She was there for six years, and was then offered the post at Willingham, a much bigger school.

Jo Brearley's approach to education is based on a clear philosophy. It can be summed up as 'instilling a love for learning and providing a beacon for *all* children'. The 'all' is important: she is conscious that some children have difficult lives.

Asked how children can be motivated, Jo has an equally clear answer: 'Children should be confident learners – through praise, making lessons fun, bringing some magic into the classroom, getting them switched on to learning, and trying to 'tap' into what they're interested in'. In this, she admits, 'boys can be more challenging than girls'.

Jo makes an important point about learning when she declares: 'We are all learners and I'm constantly learning with the children'. This is no mere form of words; she points out that children can often know more about computer technology than the adults who are teaching them.

Her long-established enthusiasm for music plays an important part in her approach. She believes it is important for children to have the chance to 'taste' the arts. She has, for instance, introduced free recorder lessons in every class except reception.

Jo believes strongly that schools should be very much a part of the community. When she was doing a master's degree at Loughborough University, her thesis was on community education in primary schools with Cambridgeshire, (which enjoys the legacy of Henry Morris), Leicestershire and Coventry as case studies. She rejoices in the fact that the school building is widely used as a centre for learning in the evenings as well as during the day, and she is trying to get more activities based there. She herself makes a point of getting involved in the wider community. 'You've got to be living it', she declares!

She enjoys a strong partnership with the governors and with parents and makes a point of getting to know parents well – and dealing with little problems quickly.

As always, the enthusiasm constantly comes through. Talking of the partnership with governors and parents, she comments that it shows in the school. 'I would call it a buzzing school.' She devotes much energy to getting done the things that need doing – getting money for the necessary new buildings, for example. 'I'm a fighter', she declares. When she adds: 'My time in teaching has been very rewarding' it is absolutely clear that she means it, and that it remains so.

Help on offer

Since that initiative was successful we would like to suggest another. Do you or someone you know, such as a neighbour or friend, either through advanced years or infirmity need some help with clearing up in the garden, decorating or getting to the shops? We have a small group of volunteers who would happily assist with home or garden maintenance on a one-off basis for those who can't manage it themselves. Website plans

The Social Action Group are planning to produce a list of details of existing events and activities in Willingham and helping to start even more. Soon they will be contacting the various people and organisations who deliver the current activities to see if the Action Group can help in any way and to listen to new ideas. This raises the issue of how best to improve communication and to that end we shall convert the website (www.newwillingham.org), which was set up to hold the Parish Plan and the results of the questionnaire, into one where events can be advertised. Our aim is that the site will also hold a youth section, one dedicated to business with a Willingham business directory, and much more. Do you have any other suggestions? Setting up the site will take a few months as we rely on volunteer help but we will advertise the launch as soon as it is ready.

Announcing the service, the Council states: 'Each day, an officer from our friendly and experienced planning service will provide:

- general planning advice;
- general advice on householder development proposals for applicants or neighbours;
- answers to technical planning questions;
- help to complete application forms;
- information on fees and other charges;
- guidance on interpreting plans and drawings, and confirmation of the validity of applications delivered to the Council's office.'

Calls should be kept to general planning queries and take up no more than 15 minutes. Specific enquiries about registered applications will continue to be dealt with by the relevant planning officer. Pastoral Letter

As I write this letter, with snow all around, and temperatures down to -6 degrees Centigrade, and schools having to close, I can hardly believe that spring is just around the corner.

With spring comes Lent, but what does Lent mean to us? The word Lent comes from Anglo-Saxon, and actually means spring, and is the period of 40 days (not including Sundays) between Ash Wednesday (25 February this year) and Easter.

When we think of Lent the two things we think of are Shrove Tuesday (Pancake Day) the day before the start of Lent, and giving something up which we enjoy, for six weeks, like chocolates or alcohol.

Early Christians felt that Easter was so important that they needed to spend time preparing for it, often spending time fasting. By observing the 40 days of Lent, the individual Christian imitated Jesus' withdrawal into the wilderness for 40 days, where he was tempted by the devil before the start of his ministry.

Later, Christians used the time to rededicate themselves and new converts were instructed in the faith and prepared for baptism on Easter Eve.

Lent is a season of soul-searching and repentance. It is a season for reflection and taking stock, At this time of year many companies take stock, and analyse their strengths and weaknesses of the past year, to plan their strategy for the new financial year to come.

It is an opportunity for us to take stock of our spiritual lives, spending time studying the bible together and in prayer. and then seeking God's plan for us, and how we should serve our church and our community.

Are we following God's will and commands day by day, or maybe we are just marking time waiting for a day when we are not so busy.

If you haven't yet joined one of the Lent courses in the village, why not join one this week. The leaders at each of the churches will have details of the available venues. Do contact them if you are interested.

Thanks to Gordon for 70 years of service

A special presentation was made to Mr Gordon Spackman during the Salvation Army's Songs of Praise Service at Willingham on 8 February 2009.

After selling *War Cry* and *Kids Alive* papers in the public houses for 70 years, Corps Sergeant Major Gordon has found it necessary to retire from this ministry which he loved and delighted in. He started this ministry in his teens in Cambridge with a friend, following the Saturday evening meeting at the Citadel, a little after he continued in Willingham and the local villages. He continued (in Doncaster) while serving as a Bevin Boy in the mines from 1943 to 1945. Then he had a short break during his time in the RAF from January 1946 to July 1947.

On returning to Willingham he continued to sell these publications each week and by 1960 covered St Ives and surrounding villages as well, for almost 50 years.

The picture on the front page shows him with Mrs Jean Pepper of the Free Church in St Ives who first met Gordon as he sold the papers in the public house which she ran with her husband for many years. Jean proudly wore her Salvation Army Volunteer Badge as she went along with Gordon on his weekly round, during a four-year period.

They are pictured with Major Marian Lewis, Cambridgeshire Development Project, as she presents them with their Certificates of Appreciation for their valued service. This ministry will be missed by many throughout the area.

Jottings from your County Councillor

^{*}February is the month when the County Council sets its budget for the forthcoming year. Since the announcement of the government grant for the authority in December officers have been working hard to try to get the figures to balance. It is always a difficult job. Yet again, and for the 15th year in a row, Cambridgeshire has received a grant which is well below the national average. I wish somebody in Whitehall would explain to me why Lincolnshire merits an increase of 8%, while Cambridgeshire gets just 2%. Last vear I recall that we got a 2.2% increase, while Dorset got nearly 11%. This means that trying to provide a decent level of service becomes more and more difficult.

The County Council has the same inflation costs when it comes to energy as the tax payer and other specialist services have inflation costs well above the basket of goods that the government uses to determine the Retail Price Index. On top of that, as the fastest growing county in the country more and more people are using our services. So year on year it has been the case that the only way to balance the budget has been to cut services and at the same time increase the council tax by above the rate of inflation. This is not a decision that we take lightly - we are tax payers too. This year has been as difficult as ever, but the cabinet will be recommending an increase of 3.9% for the next tax year. This is still high, but less than the 5% initially proposed. As a gesture of solidarity councillors will also be foregoing the proposed 2.7% increase in allowances for next year.

Whilst I hope that by the time this is published the winter weather is over, this year has been particularly hard for the gritting teams. The gritter for this area goes by the name of the BFG (Big Friendly Gritter) and I would like to thank him – and his driver – for the many long hours they have put in to keep our roads clear. People often complain that they never see the gritter - but that's often because they are out in the early hours before anyone is up. Our particular driver has been doing this route for many years and knows just where the most treacherous bits are and where to drop extra salt. This year he has done double the number of runs that might be expected in a normal year, but then this winter has been far from normal.

In May last year (2008), French families arrived in England and spent a fabulous weekend with their English host families, celebrating the tenth anniversary of the twinning between our two communities.

The next visit to France is this May over the weekend of 23 and 24 May. The weekend will start when we arrive in Avrillé on the evening of Friday 22 May. There will be a number of activities arranged during the weekend and we will all return on Monday 25 May which is the bank holiday. If any families with children at the primary schools wish to join us we will make sure that we arrange to visit the schools in Avrillé and meet with some of the children.
