Willingham Jam Club – 18 months on

As reported in the *Willingham News* in December 2008, the Willingham Music Jam Club continues to flourish and the sessions have been growing fast since they began 18 months ago. The simple aim – to facilitate and promote music among local amateur and professional musicians, whilst providing a great night's entertainment for the general public.



The club is held on the last Monday in the month, 8 oo pm to 10 30 pm at the Social Club in Fen End and regularly attracts 50 to 60 people from Willingham and the surrounding areas. Many people come to play music and others come to listen. There's a mixture of styles from blues, rock, jazz and country to folk and sometimes more classical music. 'The more musical styles and instruments the better' says Steve Lockwood.

So what's happened in 18 months?

A major success has simply been bringing people together. There are first-timers, old-timers and people from all backgrounds – it really is an inclusive atmosphere.

'It has provided a nurturing environment for aspiring musicians of all ages, from 8 to 80, to get together and try new things. In my case we have a whole new



band emerging from it, which has been great fun! It just gets bigger and better' says Pete Laing.

Many people have plucked up the courage to play and have developed skills and confidence in performing. All abilities, including those with disabilities, are encouraged to perform. Rachel Dinnebier says:

'I have only been playing drums for just

over a year and a half and the Jam Club has given me the chance to play live in front of an audience and that's really boosted my confidence'.

The Club has been mentioned on radio, had local press coverage and attracts people from a wide area. Scott Harrow from the Admiral Vernon Pub in Over says: 'Seeing the success at Willingham gave me the confidence to set up my own open mic session'.

Heatwave Most of us enjoy sunny weather, but extreme heat can seriously damage your health. During a heatwave drink regularly even if you do not feel thirsty – water or fruit juice are best. When temperatures stay really high day after day avoid going out in the hottest part of the day (11 00 am - 3 00 pm). If you do go out make sure you use a high protection sun cream on exposed skin. Children are particularly vulnerable so apply the correct factor sunscreen regularly. Ask at our pharmacy for information. It is also wise to ensure that young children wear a sunhat and a T-shirt in hot sun.

Holiday travel If you are travelling abroad remember to make an appointment with a nurse at least 6 weeks before you travel in order to allow time for the full course of vaccinations. If you are travelling at short notice ask for an urgent appointment. We are an authorised Yellow Fever Centre so can provide a full travel service, including malarial cover when appropriate.

Parish Plan Progress report

The Action Group and Churches Together will be organising the Willingham Feast which will take place from Friday 2 to Sunday 4 October. On the Friday and Saturday we hope to have a wide variety of social activities for all age groups in various venues. There will be a more religious focus on the 'Hospital Sunday.' Willingham Parish Council has granted much support in terms of use of venues and financial assistance. If you want to know more about the origins of the Feast please use the contact details at the end of this report and we can provide a short written history for you. Details of the events will follow in a few months but in the meantime make sure you keep that weekend free.

The WILLINGHAM ORIGINALZ youth club now meets regularly each Wednesday during term time from 6 30 pm to 8 30 pm. We thank the Baptist Church on George Street for making their hall available. All Willingham youngsters of secondary school age are welcome to attend. Come along, join in the fun and give us your ideas for improvements and further activities.

In response to the request made by some of the young budding football stars of Willingham for permanent goal posts on the Recreation Ground for practice, the Leisure and Amenities Committee of the Parish Council are now looking into how they can be provided. We will keep you advised of progress.

The County Council Children and Young People's Service would welcome adult volunteers who would like to assist the youth workers in working with young people. You would become an accredited volunteer and receive training and support and this could be a stepping stone to a longer term involvement in youth work. We recently held a meeting with the organisers of Learning for Life courses at Cottenham Village College. They also run courses here in Willingham if there is demand, and we used the results of the Parish Plan questionnaire to provide evidence of such demand. It is possible they could run short or long courses in Willingham from next September in a variety of subjects such as basic computer use, Spanish, Art and photography. You should receive details of all the courses on offer, in Willingham and elsewhere, early in August. Such classes will be both educational and enjoyable, and if enough residents respond we would have the added benefit of local provision.

We reported in an earlier edition of the *Willingham News* the decision of the Willingham Action Group to now tackle the problem of speed and volume of traffic which had been registered as a major concern of residents in the questionnaire survey. Eventually we received a copy of the Willingham bypass feasibility study from Cambridgeshire County Council. We are not sure whether it was worth the wait. Shona Johnstone, our County Councillor, reported in the last edition of the *Willingham News* that the report was 'disappointing'. I am not sure we would be quite so enthusiastic! At least it did record that a bypass is justified. When we will get one is the £20m question. In the meantime the county council has agreed to a meeting so that WAG can discuss actions that can be taken to reduce the impact of traffic on our quality of life whilst we wait for the bypass. A weight restriction and traffic calming measures would be steps in the right direction.

We also reported in previous editions that we had applied for Speedwatch training from the police. This has taken place and we now have 9 qualified Speedwatch operators with the possibility of more to come. We hope everyone will respond to the concerns expressed by residents and keep within the speed limits. Speedwatch will be operating throughout the village but with a focus on the through routes where speeding seems more likely. We would like to train further operators in order to spread the load and cover a wider area so if you are interested in helping or just want to know more about how Speedwatch works please email Reg Purnell (reg.purnell@ntlworld.com)

Finally, here is one more idea. We now have lively and active cycling and walking groups. Is anybody interested in starting a photography club? As far as we know there isn't one in Willingham. Pastoral Letter

Imagine: You are on your holiday, walking along the promenade, and there on the beach is the image of Christ crucified, created in sand sculpture. Amongst the deck chairs, the sunshades, the wind-breaks and children eating ice cream is the image of God's sacrifice for mankind.

What is the reaction of those who pass by?

"Well, there's a sand castle with a difference!' or,

'What a silly image to put on the beach - can't they leave religion out of it; after all, we are on holiday!'

Then the words of Psalm 139: 7 - 10 come to mind,

Where can I go from your Spirit?

Where can I flee from your presence? If I go up to the heavens, you are there; if I make my bed in the depths, you are there. If I rise on the wings of the dawn, if I settle on the far side of the sea, even there your hand will guide me,

your right hand will hold me fast.

Through the crucifixion of Jesus, and his subsequent resurrection, he is ever present. The sea, the rain and wind will wash away the image in the sand but you cannot escape the reality of God's presence - even if you are on holiday!

And that is the truth that Jesus came to earth to bring, that God is ever present with us, and constantly caring for us. And through his all-too-brief ministry on earth he affirmed that truth.

As the holiday season gets underway, my thoughts turn to the kinds of ministries he had by the seaside, that is, by the Sea of Galilee. And looking in St Mark's Gospel I notice that it was there that Jesus met four fishermen, and he called them to follow him.

Perhaps you can identify with me in that I can almost imagine that Jesus could be walking along the harbour in one of a number of seaside places around our coast, talking to the fishermen, and calling to them to follow him, even though we are two centuries on! We can sometimes see there the nets being washed and hung over the railings to dry and the little fishing boats beyond, not much unlike the boats that were used in his day.

These first four men whom our Lord chose to be his disciples were from the poorest and humblest rank in life. And Jesus intended that people from all walks of life should have the opportunity to hear and respond to the message he came to bring. Until now, it was the educated folk that had the prominent place in religion, but now, poverty and ignorance of books would not exclude anyone from the highest place in the service of Christ. Intellect and money are worth nothing without the grace of God.

In calling these ordinary, uneducated men, without rank, wealth or power, Jesus was showing that God's power was almighty, and that he could bring about his purpose through even the humblest people and things. These four men, along with the other disciples – all ordinary folk – turned the world upside down, through the grace, and by the power of God.

There are signs and reminders of God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit around us in every place if we eyes to see them. There are opportunities to respond to his claims on our lives. And just as Jesus told us, 'I'll always be there!'

Trip to Avrillé Friday 22 - Monday 25 May 2009 and Next Quiz Night - Friday 9 October 2009

The Twinning Association is always happy to welcome new members and following the latest visit to Avrillé the newest family to join has kindly written about their first trip...

We got up early to catch the coach from Cottenham Village College – as expected the children weren't happy about being woken at 6 oo am. After a quick breakfast and loading the coach we were off. As it was our first visit we used the time on the coach to get to know everyone. I could sense an excitement about the trip – some were renewing old friendships with French families from previous visits, but in our case we knew very little about the couple we would be staying with. Soon we were heading underneath the sea, finally arriving in Avrillé at 6 00 pm. The coach was met by the various French families, and we were introduced to our hosts, Jackie and Yvonne, who spoke very little English - my schoolboy French was very rusty but we could communicate the essentials. There would be plenty of time later to talk about more in-depth topics! We were given a welcome introduction in the town hall before everyone went back to their host families for the evening.

Saturday morning was free time but in the afternoon our hosts had laid on a tour for us - starting with a brief visit to Angers with lots of interesting facts about the area and its history going back to King René of Anjou, born in 1409 in the castle of Angers. The bus then took us along the Loire river and through some 'troglodyte' villages (with dwellings cut into the local limestone, now mainly used as garages and garden storage) before arriving at the Château de Pimpéan - the main attraction of the afternoon. This château was until recently in a state of ruin, but an enterprising couple had bought it and invested a lot of money (assisted by various local government grants) to restore it for producing wine. The most interesting part of it was the chapel, which had some beautiful wall paintings of particular historical interest. Towards the end we had the opportunity to taste the wine, and of course to make a purchase.

Afterwards we visited the beautiful town of Montreuil-Bellay, with its typical hilltop castle and beautiful architecture. The main reason for coming here was to visit a high-class restaurant in a medieval tithe barn where we ate a traditional meal based around fouée, a local bread. This was a great time for everyone, English and French, to enjoy each others' company over a few glasses of wine. It was a typical drawn-out affair lasting a few hours, with ample time to converse in a relaxed setting. Everyone had enjoyed the day, and unsurprisingly the coach journey back to Avrillé was used by many to catch up on a bit of sleep!

On the Sunday we attended the official naming of 'Square Fen Edge Villages', a park in honour of our

twinning. Avrillé has places named after its other twin towns in Spain and Germany, and this addition now completes the set. The new Miss Avrillé 2009 was present for her first public function in this role. In some ways this was the highlight of the trip, yet it was simultaneously a remarkably low-key affair. Speeches were made by both sides in honour of the twinning, and we all recognised the value of having such an association.

In the afternoon we had a joint picnic in a beautiful park on the edge of Avrillé – this wasn't the sort of picnic where you just sit down for half an hour to eat. The total duration was about 5 hours – starting with a glass of sparkling wine, followed by eating (and more wine), then generally relaxing, chatting, playing games on the grass and so forth. Part way through the afternoon a couple of Pétanque sets were produced - we were obliged to join in with this very French game. I was very pleased when in our game, which we decided should be English vs French, the English team won! We were later served with local cider and home-made cakes. A fantastic afternoon - I cannot remember the last time I spent so much time in one go with nothing particular to do, but thoroughly enjoying it. Our hosts had made us feel very welcome and relaxed while doing things 'their way' - an occasion to remember.

Monday morning was an early start for the journey home and I felt a bit of sadness saying goodbye to our hosts who had welcomed us into their lives over the weekend. We had made new friends on this trip (both English and French) and although we were only in Avrillé for a short time I am sure some of these friendships will continue for some time to come. I'm very much looking forward to the next visit! (Donald, Cecelia, Sophie and Nicolas Allwright and family)

Now that the schools of Cottenham and Willingham have links with schools in Avrillé we would like families with children at the schools to get involved and I hope that the above will encourage you to do so.

The next exchange will involve French families coming to England in May 2010 and if you would be interested in taking part and/or hosting a French family, couple or single person please contact us at the details below.
