From the Parish Council

News from South Cambridgeshire District Council Lobbying for a by-pass would continue; the need was now recognised. A lessening of the amount of HGV traffic passing through the village was also being sought; a report on HGV hierarchy and routing was imminent and a copy has been promised to the Parish Council. County Council financial constraints meant that they would concentrate on specialist parking needs with little cash left for other projects. The need to log all accidents in the village was stressed as this would provide concrete supporting evidence.

Youth

Reverend Rowe was in negotiations to hire the Salvation Army Citadel with a view to maintaining the existing activities there; and also to provide youth facilities. The aim was to cover running costs, including insurance. The Parish Council have agreed upon request to fund two evening sessions. Further news to follow.

More details will appear in the September *Willingham News* and then in full in the Feast Programme to be available later that month.

Below there are details of the weekend activities but here we would like to make a plea for assistance. If any groups such as the Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and Guides, or sports teams, or social groups such as the Gardening Club would like to help with or organise an event then please contact us. If any local businesses would like to sponsor part or all of an event then please get in touch. Your firm's name would be associated with the event. If you can't help but know of someone who might want to, please let them know of this request.

At the moment we have confirmed an evening of music at the Social Club on the Friday, a Farmers Market on the Green on Saturday morning, a dance competition in the Ploughman Hall on Saturday afternoon and a ceilidh in the same venue in the evening. On Sunday the Salvation Army band will play on the Green and there will be a service in St Mary and All Saints Church in the evening.

We also hope to have several events at Willingham School, a beer festival, an 'old-folks' tea party and an afternoon of 'silly sports' on the recreation ground. As mentioned above we would welcome ideas for other activities or offers of help.

The Feast weekend has traditionally been very much a family occasion; for example, daughters who were working out of the village in domestic service came back for the weekend as it was a few days holiday before they were re-employed. The Sunday was called 'Hospital Sunday'; it was a day, before the existence of the NHS, when the village collected money to go to Addenbrooke's to be used to treat Willingham parishioners who became ill. Throughout the Feast weekend we intend raising money for local groups such as MAGPAS and the Teenage Cancer Trust unit to be opened at Addenbrooke's.

Willingham Cricket Club Second Innings

After the war in 1946, Cambridgeshire Cricket association (CCA) restarted its activities. The initial response was limited due to some players still being in the armed forces along with the need to bring pitches back to playable standards. To save travelling, the CCA split the Junior League into five sections on an area basis; and this obviously gave rise to a large number of local derbies. Willingham played in Section D and the final league table for that year was as follows:

Willingham went on to win the Junior League Cup for the second time after an interval of 19 years. The players' names engraved on the trophy are: J Collett (Captain), P Collett, J Day, J Elsome, J Few, J Hayden, S Lucas, R Royston, R Smith, S Smith, A Thorpe and S Wolfe.

With more players becoming available, the second XI was again formed in 1947 when they managed to complete their fixtures but only winning twice. 1956 was a very good year for the club. The second XI reached the final of the Minor League Cup but lost to a strong Melbourne 2nd XI in the match played on Parkers Piece. The first XI, having been relegated from the Senior league at the end of 1955, promptly earned a quick return by winning the Junior League Cup again in 1956 by beating Coton. On a rain affected pitch, Coton were all out for 29 runs and Willingham lost six wickets in passing that meagre total! 1956 started a run of success for the first XI as they went on to win the Senior Division II Cup in 1957, 1963 and 1968.

Meanwhile, the second XI were having mixed fortunes and fluctuated between Divisions II and IV of the Junior League. Referring back to 1956, not only was it a good year for the club, but it was also notable for the controversy that split the village when it was proposed and subsequently agreed that the Recreation Ground be open on Sundays for organised sport. It took a long time for the club secretary to find a team willing to provide the opposition on a Sunday for a friendly match. The only memorable thing about the game was that Jack Elsome made a century. The second XI's finest hour eventually arrived in 1977 when, under the enthusiastic captaincy of Neville Denson, they gained revenge on Melbourne II after a lapse of 21 years by beating them in the final of the Minor League Cup played on Parkers Piece. The photograph on the front cover shows the winning team as follows: Back row: left to right Peter Kilworth, Ron Leach, Tony Aspinall, Adrian Peacock, Dave Shipp, Nigel Aspinall, Front row: left to right Colin Jeeps, Terry Skinner, Neville Denson, Terry Jakes and Norman Lewin.

Is your medicine safe? You may have seen spam emails advertising cheap medicines on the internet or you may have seen medication for sale on market stalls. By purchasing from these sources you could be receiving fake products that may seriously harm you or your family. Always obtain medicines from a registered Pharmacy or Dispensing Doctor where goods are obtained from reputable suppliers.

RSPB News

Our news is that marsh harriers have nested at Fen Drayton for the first time, and two chicks have started taking flying lessons. RSPB volunteers and staff will be in the Holywell Lake car park at weekends to help visitors see these large, slow-flying birds. The signs are that it will be the most successful year ever at the lakes for nesting common terns and black-headed gulls, and the best year for many years for nesting lapwings, ringed and little ringed plovers.

'My Grandad, Jack Elsome, was born in Willingham where he lived all his life. He lived with his parents and brother, Don. My Nan, Elizabeth, met Grandad when she worked in the Land Army during the Second World War. She fell in love with Jack and left her home in Lancashire to settle into married life at 25 Millfield, Willingham. They went on to have a daughter, Linda, and a son, Kenneth, (my Dad). My Grandad worked for the Waterboard and my Nan at Tesco's, Bar Hill. They also kept and raced greyhounds, and my Nan was a sucker for taking in stray cats.

My Dad met my Mum and they adopted my oldest brother, Darren, and had me, Lisa. Although my Mum and Dad split up, I still had fortnightly visits and stayed at Nan and Grandad's regularly. My Dad re-married and had another son, Thomas.

Sadly, my Grandad was the first to pass away, suddenly, and my Nan was never the same after this. Then my dad was diagnosed with cancer. Before his death, I made him happy by becoming a mum, and he met his granddaughter, Megan. Six weeks later, he lost his battle. This again had a dramatic effect on Nan, and a few years later, she too passed away.

So, there you have it. When you sit on the seat, spare a thought for them. I do every day, and donating this seat is my way of saying "Thank you, Grandad, Nan and Dad".

COTTENHAM: Midsummer monster festival



The 2009 Fen Edge Family Festival held in Cottenham during midsummer weekend was a monster hit this year! At the largest family festival in East Anglia, there were dozens of market stalls, a buskers' tent, monster climbing wall, junior quad bikes, art exhibition, and

musical entertainment from Children of the Kingdom Gospel Choir, The Galaxy Big Band, B1049s, Mind the Gap, and many local singing groups and bands. There was even legalised under-age driving on the playing fields at Cottenham Village College. With fine weather throughout most of the four-day weekend, record attendances estimated in excess of 10,000 people enjoyed around 150 different events and activities.

The Festival's 'monster sculpture competition' had record numbers of entries from families making fiendish friends from household rubbish, broom handles, and pot plants. But, even the Red Arrows' fly-past on Saturday afternoon at '14h45:24 BST' couldn't cap a Time-Team style archaeological mini dig on the Village Green where a century-old bottle was unearthed embossed with the word MONSTERS – a genuine coincidence.

Sunday evening's closing ceremony was topped off with the Gospel Choir singers. Mike Smith, a resident of Cottenham since 1986, thanked fellow organisers and everyone in the Fen Edge Patch who helped make midsummer a monster of an event.

After God created the world, the universe and everything in it he decided to take a rest. We are sustained in our daily lives by the food we eat, (sometimes to excess!) but we still need to stop after a while and recover. It is also built into the Ten Commandments. The fourth commandment given to Moses, (Exodus chapter 20, verse 8), says 'remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy.' This was not simply a case of God asking his people to stop work just to worship him but a recognition of the need to stop work and rest. Those who regularly work long hours or overtime will eventually suffer from exhaustion or worse. The heart can only take so much. Holidays, or 'holy days' as they started out, give us the opportunity to take time out and recover before we burn out.

Chill out or burn out!

The long term effects of not taking a break will be physical, emotional or mental break down. It can affect our family life and relationships. We need to acknowledge that God had it right. Take time out to let your body recover and spend time with those you love. For Christians that, of course, includes God. That is why Sunday has come to be special. It is the opportunity to spend time in the company of others considered to be part of the family and acknowledge our Creator. People of every background need such opportunities to come together to meet with God and listen to him. God has a best plan for our lives. We can choose to do something different rather than what he has made us for, but we will only get the most from life if we follow Plan A, God's plan. During the time of holidays, and holy days, we have the chance to stop what we normally do and check things out, recover from the normal routine and take stock of our lives. Perhaps if we do we may be able to realign our priorities and get back in step before it's too late.

Photo Mystery from OldWillingham.com



Last month we showed an old and rather grainy photo of a street in Willingham more than 100 years ago (see left.) The only b u i l d i n g remaining today

is the house on the front right. We had a couple of different answers but, in fact, the picture is of Berrycroft taken at the Mill Road end looking towards the High Street. Regular contributor Milford Jeeps said: "The house on the right at the front was the King William pub selling beer that was brewed at the Manor in High Street". Milford's grandfather Arthur Jeeps lived there in the mid 1890s. The smaller building next to the pub was changed to a fish and chip shop by Mr and Mrs Ernest Bonus in the 1920s. The site is still occupied by a fish and chip shop with Chinese food.

Top Hat, White Tie & Clodhoppers



Residents of Willingham will enjoy this book by Oliver Austin, recently published by Pen Press. It's not often that a book is published with a plot set right in the village where you live. But here is the reputedly true story of what happened to Amos Jeeps around 1905 – and quite a story it is. The author (writing under the pen-name Oliver Austin) was born in Willingham in 1922 and would have heard first-hand the events surrounding Amos and

his family in the early 1900s. In those days the village was small and close knit and everybody was expected to keep to their place. But this branch of the Jeeps' family had other ideas and set out to better themselves. How they did this, and where it all ended up is light-heartedly described by Austin over the course of about 150 pages.

At the start of the book we read about young Amos attending the Willingham Feast, "dressed to impress." Soon he is travelling to Cambridge several times a week, mixing with a more racy set at the Red Lion in Petty Cury. Rumours start to fly about Amos and his relationship with a wealthy heiress. Where will it all lead?

The descriptions of Willingham life and society are amusing but feel authentic, as might be expected given the background of the author. Although based on a true story, this book has the style of a novel with finegrained detail of household events and conversations which have been added to make the story. However, enough of the reality of Willingham life has been woven in to give interest and atmosphere to the local reader. The only regret is that, apart from Amos and his family, the names of the people mentioned have been changed, generally to very non-Willingham sounding names, and this detracts a little from the feeling of authenticity.

This book is very easy reading and draws the reader along at a steady pace, maintaining an element of suspense up to the end. I found it great fun and a very accessible way to get into old Willingham. The book is available from most online retailers such as Amazon.co.uk etc. at a list price of £8.99.

Willingham **Traffic Issues**

Speeding was one of the major issues identified as problems in the Parish Plan, and it is one of the issues which is being tackled by the Willingham Action Group (WAG), working in collaboration with the Parish Council.

A group of volunteers have been trained by the police to operate Speedwatch radar, and a report was given to the July meeting of the Parish Council on their work. The Speedwatch team have now carried out five sessions. As a result 278 speeding drivers have been identified and 132 will be receiving letters from the police. The top speed was 55mph in a 30 limit.....

The results of the Speedwatch activity clearly showed the need for police action, and we are informed that they plan to set up police radar traps. The Parish Council welcomed the help of the WAG, which included taking part, with the Chairman of the Council. in a meeting with the County Council to discuss a range of traffic issues, including the continuing need for a bypass – a need now recognised in principle by the County Council. Indeed. in a recent letter the County Council confirms that it is treating the matter of through traffic through Willingham seriously. The County Council fully agrees that Willingham would benefit from a bypass.

The Parish Council, and WAG are again pressing for traffic calming measures, something for which the Parish Council had made a strong case several years ago. At the time, the Parish
