

Swine flu in Beijing – a Willingham view

**Jamie Males**, who lives in Willingham, writes about his experience on a visit to China:

The first few days in Beijing went very well; despite the unpredictable weather. We took fantastic excursions to the Great Wall of China, the Summer Palace, the Forbidden City and Tiananmen Square. Then, on the evening of our third day, as we got ready for bed at the Foreign Language School on the outskirts of Beijing, we received news that all of the activities for the following day, including planned visits to the Temple of Heaven and the famous Pearl Markets, had been cancelled.

We all knew why - pretty much since we'd first arrived at our accommodation, the shadow of the swine flu virus had been present. In China the illness has not become as widespread as in the UK, and the government was understandably

keen to stop it from spreading. We had had our temperatures checked before we left the aeroplane at Beijing, and temperature checking was to become a regular thing. The authorities had decided that any visiting students who contracted the virus would have to be put into quarantine. It had become a daily occurrence for one or two students to disappear, to quarantine in a hotel in another part of the city.

September 2009

Using the computer rooms near our dormitories, we were able to check websites to read about what the experience of quarantine was like. Whilst it didn't seem as if they were having too bad a time, I certainly didn't think for a moment that we would end up there with them.

Things began to unfold when a girl who had been sharing a room

# Jottings from your County Councillor

Three phone calls in almost as many days about matters relating to the District Council have reminded me that the division of responsibilities between the various tiers of local authorities (and there are three) can be confusing and at times pretty arcane.

Essentially the County Council is responsible for transport matters – roads, streetlights (well most of them, if they aren't owned by the District or even parish councils), schools and education – up to the age of 16, libraries, recycling (of rubbish), the registry service (for births, marriages and deaths), economic development and trading standards, archaeology, the environment and older people's services.

The District Council is responsible for housing, planning applications, refuse and environmental health (among other things). However, it is not quite as straightforward as this; while the County Council is responsible for roads, the District Council is responsible for street names and street signs. The District Council collects our rubbish, but the County disposes of it – and runs the household waste recycling centres. The vast majority of streetlights are owned by the County Council (and can be identified by a CCC and number sign), some are the responsibility of the District Council (SCDC and number) while a few are owned by the Parish Council.

The County Council is responsible for bus services, Dial-a-Ride and taxi card services where public transport is not commercially provided, but the District Council licenses taxis and at present is responsible for the concessionary fares scheme (although this is likely to change within the next couple of years).

Equally confusing, the County Council is responsible for older people (paying for care etc.), but adaptations to older people's homes to enable them to continue living at home falls to the District Council. Post-16 education is currently the responsibility of the Learning and Skills Council (LSC), but a Bill currently before Parliament will abolish the LSCs and create two new bodies – the Skills Funding Agency and the Young People's Learning Agency, while planning for post-16 education will transfer back (again!!) to the County Council.

Confused......? So am I sometimes. It rather reminds me of that Flanders and Swann song – It All Makes Work For The Working Man To Do; or in this case, officers in the different tiers of councils. We are lucky that in South Cambridgeshire there is a good deal of joint working, but I suspect that for most people all that you want is one council that deals with all the local problems that you have. But that, as they say, is another story!

with two of my friends from Impington was diagnosed with the virus. This meant that anybody she had been in contact with would have to be put into quarantine.

#### **Birthday 'celebration'**

When we found this out, it was the middle of 20 July, my birthday, and my teacher's birthday too. It wasn't exactly the kind of birthday we'd been hoping to spend... We'd already missed our scheduled flights to Shaanxi, and now we discovered that we were to be put into isolation for a week. All of us were massively disappointed at missing out on so much, but understood that there was absolutely nothing anyone could do about it.

We were told to put on face masks and were swabbed to check if we were already carrying the swine flu virus. Fortunately, the results the next day confirmed that we were all healthy. We were taken in ambulances to the hotel where the other students were in quarantine. It had slowly begun to sink in that we were destined to spend seven days in that place, and I was envious of the group of Spanish students being released as we arrived. After numerous temperature checks, we were given our rooms, which were very comfortable, but the novelty soon wore off.

We were provided with everything we needed, and the staff were very considerate, helpful and apologetic. I had more than enough food, although by the end of our stay I was yearning for something other than rice and eggs, which is what my diet consisted of for most of the time as the vegetarian selection was limited.

#### **Origami boats**

The days were long and for the most part devoid of any kind of activity other than reading and using the laptops we had been given. We did our best to make the most of our time by meeting up in the evenings so that we didn't completely lose our social skills! We also tried to view the solar eclipse, but unfortunately we mistimed it and ended up waiting for an event that had happened hours earlier. Instead, we made origami boats and sailed them on the hotel's lily pond.

The government and the British Embassy sent supplies of chocolate, biscuits, art materials

to keep us occupied, teach-yourself Chinese books and CDs, and board games. It was very reassuring to know that if we ever needed anything, we could just ask for it, and I don't think any of us felt particularly worried about the whole situation. It was frustrating to be kept in quarantine knowing that we were all healthy, and the notion that if one of us did contract swine flu they would be taken to hospital alone was quite scary, but we felt safe and well-informed throughout.

Finally, we were told that we would be released a little earlier than we had been expecting, which meant we would have a spare day for exploring a little more of Beijing. I started counting down to the hour set for our departure from quarantine as soon as I knew when it was, and packed very early in anticipation. When the time came, there was such a feeling of general relief that we were now free again to enjoy the opportunities we had been given, even if we had missed out on so much.

#### Haggling at the markets

We had decided not to spend a further week in China and move on belatedly to Shaanxi Province, as this would risk us being put into quarantine again, and we all needed to get home. That last day of exploration (at the Temple of Heaven and the Pearl Markets) was for some a frenzied fit of money-spending. Haggling at the markets was an interesting experience. By the time I got to sleep in the 5\* hotel room I was sharing with another student from my college that night, I was really looking forward to catching the flight home.

But for all the mixed experiences, for all the frustration and thwarted projects, the most important thing that came out of our time in quarantine was a strong desire among us students to go back to China in 2010. We were determined to seize the chance to return to this exciting country on the next exchange organised by Hanban, the Chinese cultural committee, and experience the full range of the programme, which was to have included language learning, calligraphy, and Tai Chi. We're thinking up ways to fundraise for the new venture, as we don't think it would be fair to ask our parents to pay twice. I have my fingers crossed that next year things won't be quite so turbulent.

## Pastoral Letter

Summer holidays for many of us now seem to be just a distant memory, as we swing into autumn with days shortening, and the prospect of winter just round the corner.

With this comes the threat of more potential cases of swine flu, as these viruses apparently thrive in the colder weather. Already over the summer, we have been receiving a lot of advice about swine flu, including information from the Archbishops asking us to modify our practice during Holy Communion. We have stopped receiving the wine from a common cup, in favour of the presiding minister dipping the bread or wafer in the cup before placing it in our hand to consume as a combined sacrament.

Other recommendations from the government include becoming a flu buddy, or friend. This asks for volunteers to link up with other people (it could be a member of your family, or a friend or neighbour), who can be contacted to deliver medication and food to a swine flu victim, who can't get out, either because they are too ill, or just to contain the virus by not mixing with others at the local surgery or shops.

This highlights the fact that all too often in society today, we don't know our neighbours, partly because we move location more frequently than in the past, but also as more people go out to work and work longer hours, fewer people are around during the day for a chat on the doorstep or over the fence.

Jesus was asked the question 'who is my neighbour?' and He told a story to help us understand.

A man was walking along a dangerous road, when he was set upon, badly beaten up, robbed and left for dead at the roadside. Later, a priest came along, and seeing the blood, he thought the man was dead. As it was forbidden for a priest to touch a corpse, he kept on walking.

Someone else on their way home from the temple walked by, but fearing that those who had attacked the man could still be around and the same might happen to him, rushed quickly on.

At last, a Samaritan came by (at that time, Jews and Samaritans never spoke to each other). He stopped and went over to him, cleaned up his wounds, bandaged them, and carefully lifted him on to his donkey, then led him to the nearest inn. He gave the innkeeper money to pay for a bed until the man was well enough to go. 'Which of these was his neighbour?' Jesus asked. 'The one who helped him', His listeners replied. So, our neighbour is anyone for whom we are prepared to drop everything and help.

# Willingham Guides in national project

Willingham Guides have been taking part in a national Guide service project to 'Change the World'. The girls chose to work on the Camfed project. Camfed – which is based in Cambridge - is the Campaign for Female Education in Africa. The project was titled 'If you've got a voice – Use It!' and the aims of the project are to raise enough money to help ten girls go to school and to spread the word about how important girls' education is to 100 people.

Through a series of games and activities we learnt the importance of education to girls in Africa through the eyes of Cindy a 14 year old girl from Zambia. Cindy has been helped by Camfed to have an education after her parents died from AIDS when she was young. She has ambitions to become a lawyer. Without this education she would become a wife, mother and probably die at an early age. There are 22 girls aged 10-14 in our Guide unit with two young leaders under the age of 18 and two adult leaders. Some of the frightening statistics that we learnt were that if we were in Africa three of the Guides would be married within the next year, our two young leaders would have two children each, one leader would have had six or seven children of which only four or five would still be living and our other leader would have been dead for ten years!

We raised enough money for more school uniforms. At Easter we had a bingo evening, using our voices to raise money. Guides friends and family had a fun evening with lots of chocolate being won as bingo and raffle prizes and we raised £150. Further money was raised by collecting small change over the past year in money boxes we made.

With the help of *Willingham News* we will have also exceeded our second target of raising the awareness of the importance of female education to over 100 people.
