Yesteryear Road Run - more detail

We reported in the October *Willingham News* that the organisers of the Yesteryear Road Run want to close a road on the day of the Run, in order to ease congestion.

They will arrange all appropriate consents and proper marshalling of the closed sections.

The proposal is to close to through traffic Rampton Road, Green Street and Church Street between Newington and the High Street from 10 00 am to noon on Sunday 25 April 2010. Through traffic will be diverted along High Street and Newington.

This will allow the vintage vehicles to parade in a double moving line, improving the flow and the spectacle and reducing congestion. Marshals will assist with any emergency access that is needed.

The Parish Council has agreed to the request on a one- year trial basis.

Traveller sites consultation: the Parish Council's response

Parishioners who have attended the consultation meetings will know about central government requirements for South Cambridgeshire District Council to find more traveller sites. SCDC have produced a consultation document that proposes responding to this by increasing the number of sites in Willingham and other Fen Edge villages whilst creating almost no new sites in the south or east of the district.

Willingham has been very supportive of the traveller community and hosts a large number of sites. However, in the view of the Parish Council, this number is now becoming too large for the infrastructure to support.

The Parish Council has opposed further expansion for a number of years and will oppose this expansion.

The Council's response is based on evidence obtained under the Freedom of Information Act, and elsewhere, some of which the Council finds most disturbing.

The full response of the Parish Council is available for anyone to see at the Parish Office.

Your Parish Council works for you on many issues in a totally open way. Please visit the office to inspect any documents you wish to see, or attend any meetings. The agendas are on the notice boards and the meetings are open to any member of the public.

Stopping anti-social behaviour - your help needed

Damage has been done in St Mary & All Saints church. Some people who were there to welcome cyclists on the sponsored cycle ride in September were subjected to harassment.

More recently, some youths have set fire – for the second time – to a picnic bench in the playground behind the Ploughman Hall. The bench was given to the village by the Aspinall family in memory of Jamie.

Youths have been urinating behind the Salvation Army Hall, Silver Street. Apart from anything else, this is unhygienic, and particularly bad as children attend events at the Hall.

Anti-social behaviour has become a serious problem in Willingham. The police are, of course, aware of it, but you can help. If you see people behaving badly, please report the incident immediately to the police (08454 564564), and if you can identify the people carrying out the antisocial behaviour, please make that known to the police.

The Willingham Action Group, which works with the local councils and other bodies to implement the parish plan, is looking for a few more people to join the group on a voluntary basis.

Swine flu vaccines Please take note of the advice given by the government and in the media. Contact reception for details of our practice vaccination programme specifically for swine flu.

It did, and people came from far afield, even Longstanton and Over, to buy the goods on sale and the stallholders had brisk business all morning with some selling out completely.

At midday you might have been bemused by groups of people wandering around looking lost, no doubt they were taking part in the Treasure Hunt. Despite difficult and devious clues the standard of answers was high with the Venning family on the High Street just beating the Laycocks and Goodchilds to first place. You might also have wondered what was happening as the Cambridgeshire Caledonian Pipe Band decided on an impromptu wander through the village on their way to do an exhibition of Scottish dancing at the Ploughman Hall.

The dance competition organised by Ladybird Borland in the afternoon was well attended. All the dancers made up their own routines and the standard was excellent. The overall winners were 'Sugar and Spice' with Jamie Foster taking second place.

In the evening the band 'Pigeon English' played and led the dancing at the ceilidh. Tickets were sold out days beforehand so we think that means we must hold more dances in future. We have taken out public liability insurance and there were times in the evening when we thought we might have to claim! The fun of a ceilidh is trying to get it right and not stand on the toes of others but with the band determined to make each successive dance more complicated it was hard not to!

During Saturday and Sunday Carenza Lewis of Time Team and the Cambridge and Fen Edge Archaeology groups supervised digs at the school and in many gardens around the village. There were many interesting and significant finds spanning the period from Anglo-Saxon to Victorian times. Everyone found it most enjoyable and exciting to be in the hunt for buried treasure.

Feeling a little daunted at first, they were heartened by the most wonderful weather for October and managed a very pleasant walk in four hours. Happy Birthday Little Notes

Twinkle Twinkle Little Star, Humpty Dumpty, tambourines shaking and bells ringing; just a few sounds you're likely to hear if you come along to the Octagon on a Thursday morning whilst Little Notes is in action. It has now been a year since the group was started up by local mum, Naomi Lockwood, and has become a firm fixture in the weekly calendar of Willingham's toddlers. It is a chance for the under 5s to sing, make music and express themselves through sound in a relaxed environment. It provides carers with a creative activity for their young children, without the expense that classes of this nature often bring.

Music is well known for improving children's language, movement and emotional skills, and it was Naomi's passion for music which led to her starting up the group. It began without any fanfare but as word spread there was soon an enthusiastic group of children attending every week. In May this year another branch of the group was set up by a team at the Baptist church under the name Baby Notes. Run by another local mum, Laura Thomas, this group provides a music and movement session for the younger age group, newborn to walking, in two separate age-appropriate sessions. Baby Notes is a multi-sensory mixture of music, song and movement and provides something for Willingham's tiniest residents. Working in partnership, the two groups have gone from strength to strength. Over 40 children have sung, skipped, laughed and made music since the groups began, not just children from Willingham but surrounding villages too.

When Naomi returned to work this summer, Emma Tregenna, a mum from Rampton, ably took over the reins of Little Notes. Little Notes asks for a donation of £1, which covers the cost of hiring the hall and refreshments. The resources we have as a group are limited to the instrument collections in St Mary's and the Baptist church. Any additional support to help provide instruments, puppets, mats, or help with running costs would be gratefully received.

It is so important to invest in the youngest members of our society. The group has had a tremendous year, made all the more special by the delightful children and their carers that join in every week. Everyone with a child under 5 is welcome to come along and join in the fun. Younger or older siblings are welcome at either group and mums/dads/grandparents/childminders are equally welcomed.

Pastoral Letter

For many of us, November can be a strange month; the transition from autumn to winter with the memory of sunny summer days fading fast. The cooler mornings, earlier evenings; nature's own life force begins to slow as the leaves drop from the trees and earth's very energy seems to sleep. The Anglo-Saxons called November 'Wind monath', because it was the time when the cold winds began to blow. They also called it 'Blod monath', because it was the time when cattle were slaughtered for winter food.

The poet T.S. Elliot called it 'Sombre November'. Sir Walter Scott, in his long poem Marmion, wrote in 1808:

November's sky is chill and drear, November's leaf is red and sear (withered)'

Yet we have the benefit of foresight in this often melancholy month; we know the truth of what is to come. We know that the dark and the drear will give way, eventually, to the bright and the warming; that the buds will begin to appear and the days will lengthen. Our enterprise is to hold on to that hope which draws us through these days, to the bright promise of better days ahead.

For many the month begins with the collective celebration of all those who have gone before us; both those extra-ordinaries we refer to as saints, and those whose lives were lived with more personal memories of sanctity. As we move through the month, those who gave - and those who continue to give - their lives in the service of freedom are recalled in a silence often stronger than words. November is the month of remembering and remembrance.

It is often painful to remember, yet to forget is often more painful still; it is as if - in this month especially - the whole of creation remembers with us, shares our pain, participates in our wordless hope. We may want to run away, to hide, to forget; but to do so would be to forget those we never truly want to forget. Our emotions play tricks on us as we recall those whose recollection is both beautiful and painful.

In her message to the American people after the disaster of 9/11, Her Majesty the Queen concluded with a line of immeasurable truth and power: 'Grief is the price we pay for love.' And it is a price worth paying, for without love – as St Paul tells us – we are nothing at all. That price, that pain never passes; but we come to terms with it through the transforming power of love: as one of the prayers in the funeral Mass puts it, 'The sadness of death gives way to the bright promise of eternity.'

Knowing the truth of what is to come, that bright promise of eternity, gives November the power to be one of the most healing and helpful of months. It is the month of hope.
