From the Parish Council

News from Cambridgeshire County Council

Council Tax capping has meant that the Council has had to do more with less income.

Applications for traffic calming measures for Earith and Rampton Roads have been unsuccessful. The system of 'points assessments' for such schemes is to be reviewed.

The County Council grits 40% of roads, with priority for bus routes. Local salt bins might help and Willingham Parish Council is looking into this.

Willingham Parish Council will be contacting the local MP to point out that snow is an act of God and that private individuals should be able to clear snow locally without fear of being sued if an accident subsequently occurs on the cleared area.

Community Clean-Up Programme

Willingham has been included in the Community Clean-Up Programme that will result in a one-off, much deeper cleansing of selected villages in the coming year.

Possible Repair of the Flat Bridge

Willingham Parish Council is looking into the possibility of grant funding to enable the County Council to repair the Flat Bridge by removing the old broken deck and replacing it, thus enabling the bridge to be used as a footbridge only, offering footpath rights and enhancing public access to the pathways on both sides of the river.

Public Meeting

The Parish Plan - What Happens Next?

The Willingham Parish Plan Action Group will hold a public meeting on Thursday, 18 February at 7 30 pm at Willingham Primary School.

The Parish Plan was launched over a year ago and we want to fulfil our commitment made at that time to report back on an annual basis and briefly say what has been achieved. More importantly, we are now planning what to do in the coming year and we would like your ideas to guide us.

We are also aware that the village lacks facilities for young people and we intend making this a major part of the discussion at the meeting.

We want to hear views on anything relating to the village; perhaps how to deal with traffic, how to fight petty crime, how to improve facilities and what social events might be held on a more regular basis in light of the Feast. We would like your thoughts on what the priorities should be in 2010 so **please come along and have your say.**

Willingham Traffic Calming

As I reported in January's *Willingham News*, Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC) put forward two traffic calming schemes for assessment under this year's Capital Safety Schemes Programme. The proposal for Rampton Road was ranked 19th out of 45 bids and the Earith Road Scheme 40th. Funding will allow the top two schemes to go forward.

The Rampton Road Scheme will be retained on the list for next year's assessment but the Earith Road Scheme will be dropped as it scored so low. The low score for Earith Road is attributed to a lack of serious injuries in the last two years.

We will continue to try and persuade CCC that safety on our village roads should be improved preferably before any serious accidents occur.

Thank you to all our patients for the many cards and presents we received and for your kind thoughts. Our thanks to Andrew and Mary Coe for donating the splendid Christmas tree which brightened up our waiting room at Willingham.

Lucky Squares raised a grand total of **£330 for MAGPAS**. Thank you to all who donated prizes or bought squares. There is a list of prizewinners in reception.

Still not had a flu vaccination? If you are aged over 65 or are in an at-risk group due to a medical condition we urge you to **contact the surgery**. It is not too **late to protect yourself against a serious bout of flu**. If you are housebound and need a visit for your flu injection, please ring reception to arrange this.

We are currently experiencing a huge demand for **emergency appointments** at the end of the morning surgery. We do try to see everybody who needs to be seen but with the flu epidemic we are struggling to cope. Many of these requests are for ailments such as colds and flu, vomiting and diarrhoea which are often self-limiting viral illnesses. Although these conditions can make you feel very rough, they are usually best treated at home with remedies that can be bought in the pharmacy. Sitting in the waiting room spreads the germs through the community and puts our more vulnerable and elderly patients at risk. If in doubt, please ask for a telephone appointment or ring our pharmacist on 01954 261787 for advice.

Medicines Waste Campaign The NHS and Cambridgeshire PCT are currently running a campaign to inform patients how much money is wasted by unused medicines. For instance, did you know that **the annual cost of unused medicines returned in Cambridgeshire alone is at least £4 million** which would pay for 766 more hip replacements, 523 heart bypass ops, 706 knee replacements or 5333 cataract operations. **Returned medicines cannot be reused and have to be destroyed even if the packet is unopened.**

Repeat prescriptions: Please **order only what you actually need from your repeat list.** If you are ordering your medicines by phone (01954 260073), make sure you have your **repeat medication request** **form** ready by the phone. This form is always enclosed in the bag with your medicines. If you prefer to bring in your request form, please tick only the items required from your list. If you forget to bring your list, you will be asked to fill out a form at the surgery. We have introduced a new collection box at each surgery where you can leave your request form if you are in a hurry and do not wish to speak to a member of staff.

Remember to order at least 2-3 working days before you run out to allow time for important safety checks to be made. We thank you for your cooperation in helping to ensure that limited NHS resources are used to their best advantage for everyone.

. Pastoral Letter

As I write, there is snow on the ground and the daytime temperature is hovering around o degrees Celsius. This winter has so far proved to be very different from other recent winters. Many animals hibernate during the colder months of the year, and I have often reflected on the wisdom of this seasonal habit. They are not troubled by the cold, nor do they have to battle with adverse climatic conditions, and only reawaken when spring beckons them out with her milder temperatures and lighter days.

When I was a child, I learnt that snow protects the plants from the harsh winter winds, and therefore serves a purpose for natural life too. Years ago, before travel was so easy and so varied (dare I say that with the chaos the snow sometimes brings to our travel networks?) people worked hard during the spring, summer and autumn, but during the darker days of winter, they tended to stay indoors by the fire, rested more, and built themselves up ready for the year ahead.

We tend not to be quite so busy in the winter so there is time to relax more, to take a break, to reflect on our lives and the way we live. If you find yourself 'grounded' on winter days still to come because of the weather, take time to think back over the year we have left behind. In a moment of quiet, give thanks to God for all the good things that have happened. Ask for forgiveness for the things that went wrong, and leave them behind. Then look ahead to this year. Think about what you hope to do, and what you would like to achieve. Then think about what you can offer in service to God, maybe helping a neighbour or an elderly person, maybe there is something you could do for the community in which you live, or perhaps there is something that you could do in your own life or in your home that would bring you a greater sense of happiness and peace.

As a final prayer, offer your thoughts to God and ask him to protect you and those who are dear to you throughout the coming year. May the year that has newly begun, bring you health and happiness and God's blessings.

Resolutions

New Year's resolutions made? How many have been broken already? There is still LENT (starts 17 February) to give up the excesses! Or can the following help you find the new you?

Tips from the 1930s

Simple beauty hints: The best way to start the day is with a glass of hot water, in which there is a teaspoonful of lemon-juice.

After this, you can spend a profitable five minutes by taking 20 deep breaths in front of an open window, and doing the arm-drill of schooldays –

1. hands on the shoulder

- 2. hands outward stretch
- 3. hands on the shoulder
- 4. hands down

Don't do this exercise slackly. Put some vigour into it and you'll be surprised how energetic you feel after it.

Walking is a splendid way of keeping slim. You cannot do too much walking.

Skipping is also a splendid exercise. Sixty skips a day don't take long and they are splendid for increasing the output of energy and helping to burn up the waste fuel of the body.

Etiquette for women:

VISITING CARDS AND THEIR USES. The first rule about visiting cards is that you should have the right kind of cards to leave. No matter if you already know exactly when to leave two cards, or three, or one, as the case may be, your knowledge of the 'right thing to do' will be judged by the correctness, or otherwise, of your visiting cards. So let us consider this point thoroughly before going into the matter of when and how to leave them.

16 February – Shrove Tuesday Pancake Tuesday Recipe

(To serve six) 150 g (5 oz) plain flour Pinch salt 1 egg 250 ml (1/2 pint) milk and water mixed 1 teaspoon oil Hazelnut-sized knob of butter Sugar and/or lemon and /or jam for serving – whatever you want

Put the flour and salt in a large bowl and make a well in the centre. Break in the egg and start stirring it round with a wooden spoon, gradually incorporating the flour. Luckily, the rules about what is correct and what is not are quite definite. First and foremost, the card *must* be plain white and of good quality, with square corners. Do not let anyone persuade you that gilt edges, or deckle edges, or rounded corners or tinted cards are the newest and latest thing: all such variations are in distinctly bad taste. Equally to be avoided is any kind of elaborate lettering. If you are wise you will go to a really good stationer for them: 'cheap' cards nearly always look cheap. One thing you must be very clear about. The name and address are not to be printed, but *engraved*. This means that the lettering will be copperplate, looking as though written on the card.

Etiquette for men:

RAISING YOUR HAT. It is not necessary to raise your hat if you see a lady of your acquaintance in a public vehicle in which you are also a passenger. A little smile or nod is sufficient. Otherwise, you should always raise your hat when meeting a



lady whom you know. If the lady is a close friend, raise your hat immediately she gets near; but if you do not know her very well, you should wait until she acknowledges your presence before raising your hat.

You should also raise your hat when meeting a male friend accompanied by a lady, whether you know the lady or not; and when walking with a lady who meets someone she knows; and when walking with a man who has occasion to raise his hat.

A final word about hat-raising. While there is no need for a sweeping movement like that of the cavalier of other days, do not go to the other extreme and simply touch the brim with your forefinger, as many men have a habit of doing in these days. Raise the hat just clear of the head for a moment; that is the correct procedure.

- * As the mixture becomes thick add the milk and water gradually, beating all the time.
- * When you have a smooth batter, allow the batter to stand for 30 minutes then beat again.
- * To make the pancakes, heat a small frying pan one that you know will not stick. When it is hot put in a little oil and a hazelnut of butter, and swill it round to cover the bottom of the pan.
- * Now dip into the batter with a ladle and pour in just enough to cover the bottom of the pan. Tip the pan to spread the batter evenly. Let it cook until all the batter is just set – it should be brown underneath, if it isn't the heat is too low.
- Now slide a spatula under the middle and turn/flip it. Cook the underside briefly and transfer it to a hot plate.
- * Serve the pancakes as you cook them, with slices of lemon and caster sugar and roll them. Or make a mound of them and keep them hot to serve all at once.
