Meadow Road - action taken on fly tipping

At a meeting on 25 February, organised by the Parish Council, action to tackle the problem of fly tipping in Meadow Road was agreed. Soon afterwards, the action began. The 'before' pictures show the extent of the problem. The other pictures show some of the action that is being taken.

District Councillor Mrs Ellington chaired the meeting, which was attended by members of the Parish and District Council (including the Council leader, Cllr Ray Manning). Concerned land owners and local residents were there and the gipsy community was represented. Consensus was quickly reached about what should be done.

• The District Council enforcement team has arranged for surveillance cameras to be sited in Meadow Road to monitor the movement of suspect illegal waste carriers. Legal action will be taken against them if evidence supports the fact that waste has been dumped - or if the vehicles were not registered waste carriers.

together with signage for prosecuting anyone caught fly tipping in the area. The main part of the rubbish has already been buried in land site spots. However, your help is needed. When the major works are completed to clear the area, a BIG LITTER PICK will take place. All parishioners are invited to take part in this. Cambridge and Peterborough Minerals and Waste Plan

Willingham Parish Council persuaded Cambridgeshire County Council to hold an ehibition in Willingham, albeit very late in the day. Willingham Parish Council will be objecting because of the block to a Western Bypass, the obstruction of existing paths and bridleways and the lack of any common sense in taking millions of tons of gravel to St Ives to bring it back to Northstowe.

- Signage has been placed in Meadow Road stating that surveillance is being carried out and that severe fines could be imposed if persons are caught tipping (£50,000 and/or five years imprisonment).
- Some enforcement action is to be taken to compel absent land owners to remove waste and dispose of it correctly.
- Land owners have agreed to remove small plots of rough coppice and to cut back hedges, to stop the tippers having cover while tipping.
- The District Council agreed to move the large amount of fly tipped material already in place in field entrances to form a 'bund' (that is, a tank trap type of mound) along one side of Meadow Road, to protect the main area of fly tipping on private land. The entrances to unused plots of land are being blocked to prevent illegal access to land where tipping is taking place. Bam Nuttall, the contractors for the guided busway, have provided 20 large concrete blocks for this, and to reinforce the bund.
- Land owners in those areas that have been covered in fly tipped tree and garden waste will be allowed to burn this off.

All this work began in March. The Parish Council is hoping to organise a litter pick of the grass verges and ditches.

This is the first such initiative to be attempted to combat fly tipping.

Parishioners can play their part by reporting sighting in Meadow Road of any lorry carrying rubbish. If possible, note the registration number. The number for reporting incidents to the police is: **08454 564564**. Don't forget to ask for an incident number.

Jottings from your County Councillor

I have said very little about the progress of the guided busway over recent months, partly because it has been very difficult to know what to say. The work, while of generally good quality, has been painfully slow. I say good quality because I was lucky enough to be able to try out the busway last year. The ride quality was excellent – a bit like being on a tube train and it will certainly be a more pleasant and reliable alternative to travelling along the A14 to either St Ives or Cambridge. The last few months, however, have proved immensely frustrating. Nuttall should have completed the entire guideway well over 12 months ago; they promised completion on a number of occasions, prompting Stagecoach and Whippet to register services to run along the guideway from last November. It is deeply depressing that Nuttall have failed, yet again, to complete the guideway to a standard that will enable the County Council to accept it. Just as when buying a new house, you would not accept one that contained defects: or at least unless the builder had accepted the defects and agreed to fix them to a satisfactory standard. Anyone walking along the maintenance track between Swavesey and St Ives can see that it has not been built correctly. In many places the track is below the ditch that flood water is supposed to drain into. Now I am not a scientist, but even I know that water cannot run uphill! While this defect might seem minor, the County Council cannot accept the guideway in this condition. This is just one of a small number of defects that Nuttall need to correct before buses can start running. In the meantime, each time I get in my car and drive over the Windmill Bridge, or across one of the junctions, I rue the fact that I could have been using a more sustainable way of getting to work, if only Nuttall had delivered what they promised.

On a more positive note, last December the government did another U-turn and announced that Northstowe would, after all, be included in the eco-town proposals. This week I learnt that the project has been given \pounds 1.5m for some initial work to develop the eco-town plan. One of the most significant elements will be retro-fitting the existing houses in Northstowe to bring them up to higher standards. I hope that this will be welcome news to residents of these houses. There will also be an Information Centre giving advice on sustainable development.

Pastoral Letter

In the same way that Christmas merchandise was in the shops as early as September, since the New Year our shops and supermarkets have been trying to tempt us with chocolate eggs. They come in all sizes: small sugar coated, filled egg-sized, through to large boxed ones. The largest Easter egg recorded, according to the Guinness book of world records, was produced in Belgium by Guylian in 2005, and weighed 1200 kilograms.

But why do we have eggs at Easter? Early Christians considered eggs to be 'the seed of life', symbolic of the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Spring time is the season when we are aware of new life with the spring bulbs pushing up through the soil, producing flowers every Easter, and new lambs being born. We too can have new life, by accepting Jesus as saviour, like being born again. As Jesus told Nicodemus 'No-one can see the kingdom of God unless he is born again'. Nicodemus questioned 'How can a man be born again when he is old? Surely he cannot go back to his mother's womb and be born again'. But we can be born again by accepting Jesus as lord of our lives. As Jesus said, 'Unless we are born of water and the Spirit we cannot be a part of God's kingdom'.

Easter is a key point in the recorded events in the life of Jesus Christ, showing to the world by his resurrection that death is not the end for those who trust in Him.

As Jesus continues his conversation with Nicodemus he speaks the well known promise in John chapter 3 verse 16, 'For God so loved the world that he gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have eternal life'. He opened the door for us, showing us the way to a new life with him.

What's happening at the Hanson - RSPB Wetland Project Spring News - 2010



The Hanson-RSPB wetland project is an ambitious partnership between Hanson and the RSPB to restore the working quarry, to a nationally important wetland nature reserve of reedbeds, open water and grasslands.

The project area lies between Needingworth, Over and Willingham with the centre of restoration activity currently passing Earith. Following sand and gravel extraction, Hanson progressively restore the workings to create a series of shallow freshwater lakes or meres. These are handed to the RSPB who will manage them as a nature reserve.

Early news for 2010 is Hanson's plan to create the first new path through the RSPB managed part of the site ready for the Summer. While a new bridleway has already been created by Hanson to the north of the working quarry and an extensive network of public rights of way created around Needingworth Settlement Lagoons, this is the first new route through the restored reedbeds. The path will make possible a circular walk incorporating Cuckoo Drove, Long Drove and Long Holme Droves north of Over village.

Path creation will continue in the autumn with extra routes and viewpoints, and go toward meeting the first phase of our long term plan to create an extensive network of paths and bridleways running through the wild and open landscape of the fen. Visitor entry off the Bluntisham Road, Needingworth with limited vehicular access and parking will be included.

Meanwhile Hanson's restoration work over the autumn was focussed on the fourth mere where they planted 13,000 reed seedlings to kick start reedbed development. In the nearby second and third meres RSPB staff and volunteers planted another 5,000 reeds and cleared self-sown willows to ensure that the developing reedbeds do not become overgrown. The latest winter addition is the planting of 500 young hawthorn and scrub trees in the grassland. More will follow later this year. Volunteers have been essential to the RSPB work, and with staff have carried out over 80 days of restoration management on site.

Once fully established it is hoped the reserve will provide home to host of threatened wetland wildlife and play a nationally important role in protecting the bittern, one of Britain's rarest breeding birds. With a current UK population measured at only about 75 males the bittern is restricted to reedbed as its breeding habitat. The new reserve created here could in time provide home for up to 20 males, bringing their distinctive booming 'song' back to a small part of the Fens. The undoubted wildlife highlight of 2009 was the first attempt by marsh harriers, albeit unproductive, to nest on the site. Only around 360 pairs of these rare wetland birds of prey breed in the UK but this is the first time in recent history they will have tried to breed here. Twice as many splashing, dabbling and diving grebes, ducks, geese and swans bred compared to 2008 with more chattering, piping and trilling reed warblers, sedge warblers, reed buntings, yellow wagtails and skylarks than before. With otters, water voles, badgers and roe deer all recorded nearby there are more signs that a wild marshy wildlife haven is developing well. We're already looking forward to what wildlife spectacles 2010 will bring.

If you're inspired to get involved in practical habitat management you could join one of the work parties held on the second Saturday and third Wednesday of the month.

Currently we have up to 20 registered volunteers assisting us with tasks like reed planting, fencing and scrub bashing. Come along and help us make a nature reserve! For a tour of the developing reserve, our 2010 programme is out now with walks throughout the year alongside the wide line-up of events at nearby Fen Drayton Lakes. See below for more details or ring to request an events leaflet.
