Agrand title, for what I expected to be a quiet night. I will come to that shortly.

First, I have to warn you that after the general election on 6 May you may be asked to vote again just three weeks later. I had hoped to be able to announce Parish Council Elections on 6 May, but we are not now allowed to use that date. The Prime Minister gets first call. So the Parish Council elections, if they are required, will be on Wednesday 26 May.



I say 'if required' because it all depends how many people stand. We are required because of the size of the village to have 15 councillors. These are unpaid posts without duck houses, second homes or any other expenses of any significance. The volunteers give their time freely to help the village and so the question is whether or not there will be more than 15 people willing to do so.

This year, many long serving councillors will be standing down, including Pat Daniels who was the chair for many years. The Parish Council therefore ran an open evening to encourage new people to learn about what the Council does – and possibly agree to be nominated. The response was very much better than expected as you can see from the photographs shown here. The 'quiet night' aroused a lot of interest.

If 15 or fewer candidates submit nomination forms they will be elected automatically. (Parish councils are often elected in this way and it is likely that this will happen in the vast majority of the 100 plus villages in South Cambridgeshire District, including Willingham.)

Thank you to all who attended the hustings, as existing councillors and new candidates. Whatever happens there will be a very different council in place from June with new faces, new talents and new ideas. Please give them your support.

The Meadow Road fly tipping meeting and resulting clean up has been well received. However it has been noted that there has been increased fly tipping on Milking Hill Corner, and South Cambridgeshire District Council have asked for additional surveillance to be placed there.

Additional housing allocation to this area is dependent on the outcome of the General Election. However, South Cambridgeshire District Council would not support crossing the Guided Busway for increased development of Northstowe.

Community clear-up events – help for Willingham

As a member of WAG I attended the DEFRA Workshop held in association with the District Council at Cambourne in March, with Phil King, Chairman of the Parish Council. The workshop, presented by Keep Britain Tidy, aimed to demonstrate how to organise and run a clear up event and explain the support the agencies involved may be able to provide, including possible grant aid.

The District Council spends £0.5M annually cleaning up so the message is 'we can't do everything'. On a village level the District Council has taken action to clear away rubbish accumulated along Meadow Road due to fly tipping and taken preventative measures (as reported in April *Willingham News*).

WAG, in association with the Parish Council, is planning to form an Environmental Group to take an interest in the wider environment of the village, which would include organising clear up events, so if you are interested in enhancing the village environment please volunteer to be involved both in planning and helping during organised events.

Jottings from your County Councillor

During the past week I have received many e-mails about a bypass for Willingham. There is no doubt that a bypass is urgently needed. In 2008 I persuaded officers at the County Council to undertake a feasibility study. That demonstrated that a bypass was needed, but of the four options suggested for a route, the cheapest was going to cost £30m. The stumbling block is therefore how to pay for the bypass. The County Council receives a small capital grant from government each year, but at around £15m to cover road maintenance and highway schemes, it would not even begin to reach the total required.

The other source of funding is what is known as the Regional Funding Allocation and as its name suggests, this means that Willingham would have to compete with regional transport schemes. These include the dualling of the A11 at Thetford and the upgrading of the A13 in Essex, as well as public transport and other rail schemes.

So the only real hope of getting a bypass is through developer funding. Hanson have been suggested, as 'compensation' for the proposed gravel extraction in west fen. However, Hanson have made clear that if they do work this site, the gravel would be taken back by conveyor to their processing plant at Needingworth and from there via the Needingworth bypass to St Ives and the A1096. They would not use Willingham as a route and therefore would argue that the traffic impact would be very limited.

This then leaves the Northstowe development. This will clearly have an impact on Willingham, even if the majority of traffic does go towards the A14. Additionally if agreement could be reached with Hanson to take the gravel via the more direct route to Northstowe, then there might be options to fund a bypass. It is something that I and my District Council colleagues have been exploring over recent months.

In the meantime a number of people have suggested that lorries should be banned from using the B1050. This is certainly something that I support, but last time I suggested this I had a number of e-mails and calls from people saying that it would damage their business. I guess the compromise might be a night time ban and I would welcome residents' views on what they would like to see.

I would, however, like to assure you that neither I nor any of the District Councillors have changed our views on the urgent need for a bypass.

A Village Story

Once upon a time, 1856 to be exact, a new school was built in Willingham. The children could walk there from all corners of the village as there were many little bridges and paths for the village folk to walk around their village. Some children, who had to cross through the allotments on the western edge of the village, were a bit naughty and helped themselves to fruit as they passed through, so they were asked to use the nearby Rook Grove instead. But it didn't matter because the bridge over the lode was there and they could walk to their school safely.

Eventually a new school was built in Thodays Close. Villagers, however, continued to enjoy using the welltrodden, signed routes around their village: they crossed the lode on the sturdy wooden sleeper to get to the Lord's Pastures, to go to the shops or to watch a cricket match on their recreation field.



About 12 years ago something sad happened: the 'footpath' sign disappeared and the old sleeper was pulled up. At about this time too there was talk of creating a special new pathway bounded by a fence to make sure the walkers were safely kept to one route preserving the circular path around their village but ensuring the farmers had their fields secure. However that was just talk.

This winter, just before Christmas, men arrived in Rook Grove. They were carrying out orders from the



Willingham Combined Charity committee to fence off old Victorian Rook Grove with a six foot

high fence. Luckily they did not put this too near the bungalows used by the older ladies of the parish. Sadly, however, the people of Rook Grove have a severely coppiced or in parts removed hedge which serves little to mask their new, ghastly, Stalag-style fence erected by the Charity.

Some stories have a happy ending: watch this space.

Pastoral Letter

In the gospels there are two occasions where mention is made of a bowl of water and towel. They are both in the minds of Christians after celebrating the great feast of Easter since they figure in the re-telling of the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus.

On the morning of his execution, Jesus stands before Pontius Pilate, the Roman governor of Palestine, accused on the most dubious of charges. His detractors agitate the crowd to call for his death. The final word rests with Pilate who condemns Jesus to death and, as a symbolic act, calls for water and washes his hands with the words: 'I am innocent of this man's death'. Here the act is one of abdication of responsibility and denial of truth. Pilate acts out of fear or desire to impress the crowd or in the hope of increasing his standing in the eyes of the people; in essence an act reflecting the 'me' rather than the other.

The night before this rather sorry scene of Pilate's capitulation, Jesus had celebrated the Passover with his disciples. In that upper room he removed his outer garment, took a bowl of water and a towel and washed the feet of his disciples; those who would run away from him at his arrest or even deny their association with him when the going got tough. As Peter protested Jesus asked the question: 'Do you understand what I have done to you?......I have given you an example so that you may copy what I have done to you'. Here the act is one of inspiration and service, of ministry and self-giving. In contrast to the words and actions of Pilate, Christ directs all away from himself to the 'you' of his disciples.

Our democratic society is under threat from an all too real apathy fuelled by the focus on 'me' rather that 'you'. In looking to the future, to the beyond, we find ourselves obsessed with the now of scandal, misappropriation, bonuses and recession. It is all too easy to slip into being swayed by the crowd who try to convince that 'they're all crooks!' 'There's no point in voting, they are all the same!' It becomes almost rational to 'wash our hands' of the involvement, commitment and cost of building a society of tolerance, justice and respect.

Yet, taking inspiration from Christ – and all people who see the value of 'the other', are not we responsible for the society we build? Is it not our responsibility to search for those who possess the inspiration, service, ministry and self-giving we demand of our elected representatives? Am I inspired to be one who adds my voice, a voice that calls for change and for future? Or am I one who will simply wash my hands of the whole sorry affair?
