Jottings from your County Councillor

For those of you unable to attend the Annual Parish meeting, what follows is my report:

First, I would like to thank members of the Parish Council for their forbearance and support during my illness in 2009.

Elections took place to the Cambridgeshire County Council in June 2009. The Conservative Party continues to have a majority of seats on the council and therefore form the administration. The new council has seen the emergence of minor parties for the first time, with the election of a Green Party councillor and also, by way of a countermanded poll in July, a UKIP councillor.

One of the first tasks of the new council, with which I was involved, was a review of the advisory groups, set up originally to provide an all-party mechanism to develop policy. There was a suggestion that they could be subsumed into Overview and Scrutiny Committees, but the views of the review group was that policy development and scrutiny were two very distinct areas, best served, at least in Cambridgeshire, by keeping them as separate groups. The Liberal Democrat group decided to boycott both the review and the advisory groups since there was agreement among the other parties that there was merit in allowing free discussion that might not take place in meetings held in public.

Within the new administration I have been asked to chair the Children and Young People's Scrutiny Committee. One of the tasks of the committee is to hold a member-led review into the role of children's services within new communities. This will be particularly relevant to Northstowe as it develops.

On the subject of Northstowe, councillors will recall that for many years I have campaigned for Northstowe to be included in the government's Eco-town programme. I am pleased to say that in December, CLG announced that Northstowe would, finally, be included within that list. The County Council, with other partners, successfully bid for £1.5m of funding to undertake further work on the Northstowe eco-town proposal.

The draft 'Minerals and Waste Local Plan' has caused considerable disquiet in the parish, not least unfounded rumours, as to what would happen afterwards. I should emphasize that this remains a draft plan. If the additional allocation is approved it will be a number of years before extraction takes place and Hanson has made it clear that they expect the gravel to be taken by conveyor to the existing plant at Needingworth for processing. The plan has, however, prompted a campaign for a by-pass – a campaign which I am more than happy to support. The issue is not whether the bypass is needed, but how it will be funded.

I am sure that councillors will be as frustrated as I am at the attitude of BAM Nuttall, the contractors building the guided busway. Nuttall told the County Council that the guideway would be completed by May and then again by August last year. As you will recall, in the autumn they actually gave the County Council a date on which they would be in a position to hand the guideway over and for services to start. I regret that the last 12 months have been a long story of one failure after another to deliver. The Council has been frustrated at every turn to try to get Nuttall to complete the outstanding defects. These include the maintenance track – which is continually flooded because it was built below the ditch into which water is supposed to drain and the bridge crossing the River Great Ouse, where water continues to pour off, causing long-term issues around maintenance. I would describe their performance as one of abject failure. They have let the Council down, and let residents down.

Finally, I have to confess to the following being a total misuse of my column. As many of you know I have been extremely fortunate in the last 18 months to have benefited from excellent treatment for breast cancer at Addenbrookes hospital. On 19 June, along with thousands of others, I will be taking part in the Moonwalk – walking a marathon starting at midnight to raise money for breast cancer research. I am equally lucky to be supported in this walk by a number of close friends and family who supported me during my illness. Out of hours Urgent Care Cambridgeshire (formerly CAMDOC) 0330 123 9131

Out of hours cover: Many of you will have heard that CAMDOC has changed its name to **Urgent Care Cambridgeshire**. The out-of-hours' service remains exactly the same but the new telephone number is **0330 123 9131**. Please ring this new number if you need urgent medical attention or advice when the surgery is closed. The old CAMDOC telephone number 01223 464242 will still be in use for the next few months to allow time for everyone to become familiar with the new number. We have a supply of stickers in reception to use as an aid memoire and new practice leaflets.

Holiday vaccinations: If you are planning a holiday abroad this year, remember that you will need to make an appointment with the nurse at least six weeks before you travel in order to make sure you get full protection.

Travel advice: We stock a full range of anti-malarial and sun-screen products in our pharmacy and can offer advice on travel issues. Don't forget to take the usual standard remedies, plasters and bite repellents with you on holiday. Better to be prepared before you travel.

Hayfever: Most symptoms can be treated with over-thecounter medicines from our pharmacy. We have an excellent range of Numark medicines including allergy relief tablets, nasal sprays and eye drops. Ask our pharmacy staff for advice and don't forget to check if the tablets you have purchased or been prescribed, can cause drowsiness, particularly if you are driving.

Planning a pregnancy? Please check with your doctor or pharmacy if any medications you are currently taking are safe to continue in pregnancy.

Collecting repeat medication: If you are exempt from paying prescription charges please remember that you must **bring your exemption certificate with you each time you collect your medicines**. It is a statutory requirement that our pharmacy and dispensary staff must see proof of exemption before issuing you with your medication.

News from WAG (Willingham Action Group)

As reported in the last issue, Willingham Action Group (WAG) members have started planning to make this year's Feast bigger and better. The Feast will take place on the weekend of 8,9,10 October. We need volunteers to get involved at the planning stage as well as during the event so please contact us if you can help.

The WAG Youth Group met a few weeks ago to set up the Youth Trust. We have just enough people to form a board of trustees. Before we can complete the application to become a limited company, we must have a bank account and we are in the process of opening one at the moment. Then we will apply for charitable status. The trust will be aiming to attract funding to improve facilities for young people in the village.

WAG plans to join as a member group of the Fen Edge Association and play an active role, in a sense representing Willingham. The Association covers the villages of Waterbeach, Rampton, Willingham, Landbeach and Cottenham and seeks to benefit the communities by improving the social, leisure and recreational facilities for all. Seed grants are available for members/member groups to encourage development of their community-based activities. Willingham clubs and groups are encouraged to join. WAG members have met with Linda Browne, Community Liaison Support Assistant, for South Cambridgeshire District Council whose role is to interface between Parish Plan groups and Councils in the implementation of Parish Plan outcomes. We look forward to her help and support.

Recently, following an initiative by SCDC, WAG members delivered 30 mph stickers for wheelie bins to all residents along Earith Road, George Street and Rampton Road. We hope they may play a part in reducing speeding within the village.

WAG was set up after the completion and presentation of the Parish Plan in order to pursue the outcomes, as summarised in the Action Plan, both through direct and indirect action. WAG is representative of people who believe that it is possible to make a difference within the community and evidence of that was presented at the public meeting held earlier in the year to report back on what has been achieved so far. The WAG Report to Willingham Parish Council Annual Meeting is available on the Willinghamlife website (www.willinghamlife.org) and in the library.

There are costs attached to running any organisation ranging from paying for meeting rooms, stationery, communication to promotion and financing of events. This is before considering projects which would benefit the village or equipment for clubs and groups.

WAG has no guaranteed source of funds at the moment and indeed is currently in deficit. Last year WAG received some financial support from the Parish Council to cover meeting room charges of £50 and a one-off grant of £200 to cover necessary public liability insurance for our activities, including the Feast. In addition, £500 was granted towards the Feast Weekend, which benefited the community rather than WAG itself. The Feast generated funds but WAG decided to donate most of the proceeds to charity (The Teenage Cancer Trust and MAGPAS) rather than to support WAG.

WAG cannot continue to operate effectively or run events for the benefit of the community without access to funds. There are external sources of grant funds, which WAG can apply for in order to fund a specific project or equipment. However in general, operating funds have to come from within the community either through profit from events or as a grant from the Parish Council. Profiting from events reduces the money available to support good causes or requires higher ticket prices, which would unfairly exclude some families.

The Parish Council has not yet confirmed that we will receive funding this year so at the moment we are considering making proposals to the newly-elected Parish Council to the effect that an annual allowance be granted to WAG against an agreed programme, budget and accounting procedures. Should WPC not be able to make such a grant then we would have to ask for a loan since we must make advance payments for the Feast activities in the region of $\pounds 800 - \pounds 1000$. We would also have to consider using more of the Feast proceeds to support future activities rather than donate to charity.

Pastoral Letter

We have all been involved in making a choice recently - selecting a new government. For our part, all we had to do was to cast a vote for a political candidate that we believed could best represent us in parliament, while hoping that there were enough people nationally making the same political choice as us to ensure the new government was of the right colour. As it turned out, there was no outright winning political party, but we may conclude that the voters were still winners, even if the percentages did not quite translate. We all make choices everyday. What factors determine our choices? As the Israelites of the Old Testament were about to move into the land God had promised them, Joshua, their leader asked the people to make a choice. He said, 'Choose today who you will serve. As for me and my family, we will serve the living God.'

In the 1980s fans of boy band Wham wore tshirts with the slogan 'Choose Life.' Many centuries earlier, just before Joshua became leader of the Israelites, Moses had used the same words to his people after crossing the desert. The people were facing a new day. They could leave behind their old lives and move into the land promised them for generations and start afresh,

Church roof – work in progress

Work to repair the north aisle roof of the Parish Church is – at last – well underway. It is the happy result of many long months of planning and fund-raising. The work is being carried out by Rattee & Kett.

The need for the work became clear several years ago – and then the church was the victim of lead thieves, who stole sections of the roof.

Temporary repairs had to be carried out – and, because of the risk of further thefts, the decision was taken that it would be better to replace the lead with stainless steel. English Heritage had to agree, because the church is a grade 1 listed building. They did agree. So did the Ely Diocesan Advisory Committee.

With these crucial permissions in place we had to be sure that we could pay for the work. Over the years, fund-raising has steadily continued. The monthly cake stall and Rene Gould's bric-à-brac stall have been important sources of funds. So has the collecting box in the Co-op.

Major and vital help has come from charitable foundations. Chief among these is the National Churches Trust, which is the leading national independent body concerned with the protection and welfare of Christian places of worship throughout Britain. It feels OK even if it is not the most fulfilling, or we could take a few risks and go for a fresh start.

In Deuteronomy, chapter 30 sets before the people a stark choice: 'See, I set before you today life and prosperity, death and destruction...... Choose life.' That seems an easy choice. Sometimes, however, making the right choice may involve leaving something behind; letting go of something cherished. Jesus told his disciples, 'I have come to give you life in all its fullness.' They then chose to follow him even though it meant rejection and sacrifice.

As a church leader in Willingham I urge you to make a choice. It is, of course possible to live without including any thoughts of God, let alone following him. You will get by, but why make do with less than the best? I would never ask anyone to choose church over something else, but what I would say is this: choose to follow the blueprint plan that God has for your life. It is guaranteed to be the best route. Choose life; choose to follow God as did the thousands at that first Pentecost in response to the message delivered by the followers of Jesus.

It's never too late to live your dream

I moved to Willingham from France in 2004 – it was at the end of June. My daughter and her family had lived in Willingham since 1994 and were well into the community and Bovis, the builders were building a new estate - Covent Garden. About half the homes had not been built. My house was surrounded by a builder's yard and the sites of houses still to be built. I could look out at breakfast and they'd be starting on a roof and by evening, the roof would be on, capstones and all. It was interesting, the speed they finished each house. Six years since then and all the houses are occupied – some for the second time!

It is almost never too late to grab a dream and act on it! I was 71 years old but I still had energy and had decided to downsize anyway – lots of furniture etc going to the family. People were amazed at my plan but I had friends who had recently gone to Boulogne - who could speak French and had lived in France for some time. They knew 'the ropes' such as how to arrange with an agent and how to get electricity, gas and water turned on.

The second reason why I went to France was because I'd always wanted to live there but never thought I'd have the opportunity. I was quite happy about this – I'd done nothing to turn my dream into reality because I thought it would be a waste of time. However, these friends of mine went there to look after an Anglican congregation and after the Induction we (three of us) went to spend a few days in Boulogne before we all went back to England. They weren't happy about the accommodation they'd been given so I said, 'I know, I'll come and live in Boulogne and you can come and stay with me whenever you like!'

What did I like most? I liked most of all the people of Boulogne as well as Boulogne itself. It's a nice small town with pre-war, post-war and old historic parts – an Old

Town and the 'New Town' - it's a port with sea walls. Boulogne has been there for centuries. Little old streets and high walls, the 'ramparts' enclosed the Old Town. Windows with shutters - why can't we have shutters? They keep the cold out in winter and the heat in summer. Going down the

street - there are a lot of hills - the houses have pretty lace curtains and the shutters are pinned back against the wall but there is a lot of unemployment because the main fishing industry has moved south to Etaples.

I had a nice, small, first-floor flat on a busy shopping street which was the scene of processions and protest marches and there were religious festivals, saints' days too. I enjoyed the weekly market on Saturdays; the walk and stroll through the quiet streets on my way to church on Sundays, seeing French friends; the little bistro in my street. Was it only because it was new and strange to me quite different from my life in England and the town I'd always lived in? Maybe, but they were five happy years and I still have French friends who keep in touch.

I signed up to take a French language course at the local 'Tech'. I had a good teacher and met more people – all ages and ethnic groups - North Africans, Tunisians, Ethiopians, Icelandic girls and more English people – twice a week for the whole day in term-time.

Writing this has brought it all back - a very happy time in my life.

Press release – Swavesey Festival Local History Project

SEVEN MYTHS IMPACTING ON ATTRACTING POTENTIAL CAMBRIDGE FOSTER CARERS



Seven myths surrounding fostering are helping to create a shortfall in carers in the Cambridgshire area

according to a local leading independent foster care agency.

'There are so many myths surrounding fostering that it is clearly putting off people who would be ideally suited to undertake such work,' says Karen Parsons, Carer Recruitment Officer with Pathway Care.

'In the UK there is an estimated shortage of 10,000 foster carers and it is very important to address this and get these children into a safe and supportive environment. In our experience some of the most successful applicants have been thinking about fostering for years, but have held back from applying for one or a number of reasons. For some, there is a belief that they simply could not afford to foster – but the days of meeting expenses from out of your own pocket have long gone.

'Foster carers come from all walks of life and have a range of life experiences to draw on. Some may have a natural vocation towards becoming a carer, others may possess transferable skills gained from a variety of work ranging from caring for the elderly, or people with disabilities, teaching assistants, retired police officers or a background in the armed services.

'Being a foster carer can be challenging work, but with it can come great satisfaction. Some of our carers have enjoyed a very good life and feel they want to give something back to society; others come from difficult backgrounds and have overcome adversity and now want to help others in a similar situation.

'However, before you rule yourself out please see below some of the most common myths about fostering:'

- **1. I can't afford to foster.** Carers through Pathway Care receive good remuneration for their services and all expenses are met.
- 2. I am too old to foster. People often rule themselves

out because of their age. Pathway care doesn't have an upper-age limit, but applicants are required to undergo a full medical and need to be fit and active.

- 3. We've never had children of our own so we won't be considered. This is a total misconception. We are looking for people who have experience of children – so if you have been very involved with children from your wider family – or friends – this may count. Perhaps you work with children through your job, or have been actively involved with youth groups etc.
- **4. I'm a single carer, I can't possibly be considered.** Yes you can, but it is recognised that being a single parent is tough and you would need to be able to demonstrate a good support network is in place through family and friends.
- **5. I've only heard negative feedback about foster children and this has put me off finding out more.** The public perception of foster children is that they can be very difficult and likely to be troublesome. Whilst recognising that these children do come with issues and can be challenging, they respond to support and care and the level of satisfaction you can gain from helping them can be immense.
- **6. I can't foster because I've been in trouble with the police.** In many instances this just isn't true. It does, however, depend on the type of conviction and when it was received. People who have turned their lives around can prove to be excellent foster carers.
- **7. I live in a socially-deprived area, I can't possibly foster.** If you have the necessary skills to foster and your accommodation is suitable a child must have his or her own bedroom then don't rule yourself out.

Pathway Care has experienced staff that can help and support you all the way and provide ongoing training. You will also be paid a generous fostering allowance.
