### **Jottings from your County Councillor**

The impact of the cuts to the public sector is now starting to hit us. Among the £6.2bn of reductions described as 'savings' announced by the Chancellor at the beginning of June was a reduction of over £5m to the County Council's budget. Given that this reduction will have to be implemented over six rather than twelve months, the effect on the total budget is double that sum. There is a further cut of £1.2m to the Constabulary's budget. This will no doubt cause some real difficulties and there is no way that cuts of this nature can be implemented without hitting front line services. It does, of course, lead to a debate as to what exactly constitutes a front line service. For example, police officers are an obvious example of a front line service, but what about the civilians who answer the emergency call centres? They may not be out on the streets every day, but would you be happy to wait twice as long for an emergency call to be answered in order to ensure that the number of police officers was not reduced? Council services are similar - we may not consider library services to be front line, but for the many people who use them, particularly the mobile libraries, they can often be a lifeline. Should every street light be kept on overnight, or are there some that could be turned off? Many years ago, not long after I first joined the council, there was a proposal to turn off one streetlight in every five, to save money. Perhaps we need to consider this again. So deciding on priorities is going to be very difficult and we will not see the final details for another few weeks.

In the meantime, hot on the heels of the announcement that the Public Inquiry into the A14 has been postponed, was the news that the upgrading of the A14 itself has been put into the pile marked 'too expensive and too difficult'. It was somewhat ironic that the following week saw three of the worst accidents on the road in a number of months. Whilst I do think that the proposed scheme was becoming too big and ambitious, there is absolutely no doubt that the current road is totally inadequate for the needs of today, let alone future needs.

Finally, I would like to thank everyone who was so generous in sponsoring me recently when I took part in the Edinburgh Moonwalk. Our team reached its target and our money will be put to good use supporting those living with and researching into breast cancer. I am very grateful.

**Holiday travel** Our nurses offer an extensive range of travel vaccinations and we are a registered Yellow Fever Centre. Do remember though that it is wise to book an appointment with the nurse 6 weeks before you travel in order to get maximum protection. If this is not possible and you are travelling at short notice book an appointment with a nurse immediately after booking your trip.

**Holiday medication** Our pharmacy can supply the required malarial tablets for your trip. It is wise to take a good supply of sunscreen and insect bite products with you as well as the usual medication remedies and plasters. Ask our pharmacist for advice. Don't forget to order your repeat medication in time for your holiday by leaving your repeat medication request form or by ringing 260073. You can also now order on line – just ring 260073 for details.

# Heatwave: Top Tips to take care of yourself during the hot weather:

Drink regularly even if you do not feel thirsty – cold water or fruit juice are best

Eat light meals and avoid excess alcohol, caffeine and hot drinks

Wear light loose-fitting clothes and a hat

Avoid going out in the hottest part of the day

Take plenty of water if you must go out

Stay in the shade as much as possible

Keep strenuous outdoor activity for the cooler parts of the day Reduce heat from sunlight indoors with shades at the windows if possible

Keep windows closed while the room is cooler than outside Open windows if the inside temperature rises and at night for ventilation

As I write this during the July heatwave, I am looking forward to enjoying more summer weather and summer holidays, with time to get away from the normal routine of life to recharge our batteries. Whether it be basking on a sun drenched beach, exploring somewhere new, or returning to a favourite haunt to re-live a special moment from the past, we all need a break.

Jesus also needed to take time away from it all. Before he started his ministry of teaching, he went away into the desert to prepare himself. He spent six weeks on his own, except for the interruptions of the devil trying to tempt him away.

Later on we have accounts of Jesus staying with friends in Bethany, sharing food and relaxing, as well as being in demand to heal the sick.

# Yes, the new church roof is in place

A restored sacristy and newly conserved wallpaintings people can see, and the restored organ they can hear. There is really nothing to see from ground level following the restoration of the north aisle roof of the parish church, though many people seem to have seen the report on BBC East, which did show the roof – from above. Anyway, you can take our word for it: a new roof is in place. Lead has been replaced by terne-coated stainless steel (because of lead thefts, in Willingham and many other places).

There should be no more water dripping through during heavy rain. Will very heavy rain be more audible on steel than on lead? Possibly, but between the wooden base of the roof and the steel there is an underlay, one effect of which will be to provide sound insulation.

The main contractor for the work has been Rattee & Kett, very well known locally. The architect is Jeremy Lander, of Freeland Rees Roberts, a Cambridge firm.

The need for the work to be done has been known for several years, but it could not be commissioned until funding was in place. The church has been fortunate to receive grants from several foundations: The Cambridgeshire Historic Churches Trust (which administers funding from the Waste Recycling Group plc, under the Landfill Tax Credit scheme); the National Churches Trust, (the leading national independent body concerned with the protection and welfare of Christian places of worship); the Garfield Weston Foundation, and the Wolfson Foundation (through the Archbishops' Council).

There has also been much local fund-raising, notably from the monthly cake stall, on the first Saturday of the month, organised by Joyce Bowen and Jean Cook, and Rene Gould's bric-à-brac stall.

Church members are grateful for all the support, and interest, which has come from people in the village.

# **Billavincea Lodge**

Have you ever wondered about the reference to 'Billavincea Lodge 8719' in the Village Directory? If so read on...as it refers to the Willingham Lodge of the Royal Antediluvian Order of Buffaloes (R.A.O.B.), Buffs for short. It is recorded that the Buffaloes came into being in 1822 as a fraternal club, becoming essentially a charitable organisation without political or religious affiliation, when there was no welfare provided by the state. The Buffaloes have since developed into a national and international fraternal, benevolent and charitable body undertaking activities they consider most appropriate for the needs of the community in which they live and work, as well as assisting members and their families in times of need. There are parallels with the Masonic Orders in that there is a three-tiered system of Minor (local) Lodges, Provincial Grand Lodges and a Grand Lodge, and four degrees of membership. Membership is open to males over 18 years of age who are 'true and loyal supporters of the British Crown and Constitution'.

An internet search will reveal the full history but in brief the origins of the Buffaloes is to be found in the theatre and acting profession derived from the formation of a fraternal club at a tavern opposite Drury Lane Theatre with a ballad of the day giving the name. It appears that the charitable nature of the organisation derived from helping fellow actors in hard times between jobs. A constitution followed in 1866 and a national convention in 1888 as the organisation spread around the nation. Royal derives from the early use of Loyal, since it was necessary to demonstrate loyalty to the crown thus avoiding suggestions of subversive intentions. Antediluvian (before the time of the biblical flood) is suggested to have originated from the extravagant use of theatrical language.

The Willingham Billavincea Lodge was established in 1954. Approximately £3000 was dispersed in 2009 mainly benefiting the Wilford Furlong Community Centre, Willingham Salvation Army and local Alzheimer's Society institutions. The Lodge currently meets weekly on a Thursday evening at the Social Club at 8pm with members coming from as far away as Ely and Godmanchester. The teddy comprises 3 pieces: one body complete with legs, and two arms. You knit the legs and body all as one long piece, as you can see from the

To make a teddy:

• Cast on 10 stitches (leg 1)

picture, then fold it over. Then you knit 2 arms

- Knit 4 ½ inches (put aside i.e. put on separate needle)
- Cast on another 10 stitches (leg 2), knit 4 ½ inches
- Put all stitches back on one needle making 20 stitches across - knit 14"

I don't know how best to explain this .... If you're a knitter, you'd know how to do it: I did it through trial and error .... But in the end, I got 2 legs .... You have to work on one leg, then go back and do the other ...

- Knit 4 ½ inches of 10 stitches (to make one leg), cast off
- · Go back to the 'other leg' and knit 4 ½ inches, cast off
- To make the arms simply cast on 16 stitches, knit 3", cast off; x2
- To put teddy together ..

Stuff and sew up the hole.

- Fold the 'body and legs' over to meet .... and stitch together, leaving a gap to stuff. Create the 'head' by sewing around where the neck would be and pulling the thread tight to
- gather it up ..... about 2 ½" from the top? Create the 'ears' by sewing across each corner of the head, pulling the thread tight. They come out all shapes and sizes and give them personality.
- Sew each arm piece together length-wise, turn inside out, stuff and sew and attach either side at the neck

DECORATE as you wish .... Eyes, nose, mouth, pockets, mock buttons, belts ... (please don't attach buttons or anything that a child may swallow). All this brings them to life and gives them personality. They do not have to be perfect .... They are for small children who LOVE them. Any colour (the brighter the better) and any size but the more the merrier so use up all your scraps of wool

If you only want to knit the pieces - that's fine. I have people who don't like knitting, but do like putting the teddies together, stuffing and decorating them ... so that's fine too
