### Blue bins will be hitting the streets of South Cambridgeshire by 6 October

The new service will prove to be a more cost-effective way of collecting and recycling waste with an estimated saving of £400,000 by the third full year of operation. On delivery, residents are asked to be aware that the blue bin lids may not close properly owing to the way in which they were stacked for storage. The lid should settle after a week or so.

THE BLUE BIN will be for the dry recyclables that residents currently place in their green boxes, including plastic bottles, glass bottles and jars, and food and drinks cans, as well as new materials, including plastic pots, tubs, trays, film (eg carrier bags and clean food wrapping) and cartons (eg tetra packs). Residents will also now be asked to place cardboard in the blue bin for recycling, instead of in the green bin for composting. Items must be placed loose in the blue bin (not in plastic bin bags or other containers) and should be rinsed to remove any risk of food contamination. The blue bin will come with an inner caddy specially designed to keep paper - magazines, directories, envelopes and junk mail - separate from the rest of the recycling. This is because paper is more valuable when it is kept separate. Residents are asked to keep the caddy in the blue bin as it prevents people from heavy lifting and does not need to be removed.

The blue bin will be delivered with an information pack, which will be placed in the caddy, giving residents all the information they need about the new recycling service. In the pack, residents will find a battery bag for recycling domestic batteries. This will need to be put out for collection with the blue bin and will be replaced each time it is used. There will be clear instructions on the bag to demonstrate how to attach it to the bin. If residents fill their blue bin, excess dry recyclables will be collected when placed in a returnable container and left alongside the bin. Similarly, excess paper will be collected when kept separate and left in a returnable container alongside the blue bin.

**THE GREEN BIN** will continue to be used for garden and food waste. Residents are asked not to put cardboard and paper in the green bin any longer but to put both in the blue bin for recycling instead.

**THE BLACK BIN** will now only be for waste that cannot be recycled or composted. Excess black and green bin material cannot be collected. Residents are asked to take any such excess to the recycling centre at Milton.

Residents are reminded to ensure their bins are out by 7 00 am on their designated day of collection. Residents are welcome to keep their green boxes if they have a use for them. For those residents not wanting to keep them, there will be drop off points at Morrison at Cambourne, Tesco at Bar Hill, Fulbourn or Milton where they will be picked up and sent for recycling.

Flu vaccinations will be available from the beginning of October. Please ring reception to book your appointment and state that it is for a flu vaccination. We will be holding special clinics and ask that people wear short-sleeved clothing for easy access to arms! Flu vaccination is recommended and is free under the NHS to all people of 65 years and over, and to those of any age with a long-term medical condition, for example diabetes, heart disease, kidney or liver disease, asthma or any breathing disorder. Carers (in receipt of a Carer's Allowance) are also eligible. Please enquire if unsure.

**Mobile telephone numbers:** Please can we ask you to provide a mobile telephone number in case we need to contact you urgently or on occasions if we have to reschedule an appointment due to unforeseen circumstances. You can either fill out a form at reception or give us your up-to-date number by telephone. Many thanks.

**Text messaging:** We have introduced a system of reminding patients about their appointments by text message. This has proved successful for other NHS Organisations and Practices so we decided to run a trial to see if this would be of benefit to our patients. If you have provided us with your mobile number and have an appointment booked at the surgery, you will receive a text message marked NHS Mail the day before to remind you. If you no longer need the appointment, we ask you to let reception know. This will allow these unwanted bookings to be released for other patients to use. If you would prefer not to receive a reminder in this way, please let reception know. We would welcome your feedback on this new initiative so we can make a decision on whether to continue it long-term.

**Pharmacy Survey:** A big thank you to all patients who filled in our Pharmacy annual service questionnaire. We were delighted with all the positive feedback you gave us and we will endeavour to provide the same level of service this year. Your comments are always important to us and we are always available if you need to discuss any issues. If you would like to see a copy of our questionnaire results, please ask in the Pharmacy.

Dear Sir

I was appalled to learn that the Feast Weekend is proposing 'Chinese Lanterns'. These metal contraptions, when they fall



from the sky in grazing fields, can cause terrible suffering and even death to cattle, ponies, goats etc. The biodegradable lanterns are made of bamboo which splinters into sharp shards and can be nearly as harmful. Even when downed the lanterns can 'spook' ridden horses. Questions were again asked in September in the House of Commons regarding the banning of these lanterns.

There is also a number of heritage, thatched homes in Willingham and surrounding villages which would be at risk from aerial fire.

I hope the Feast Committee will re-consider and follow a responsible course of action.

# Pastoral Letter

'Thank God it's Sunday!' I say it often enough, but then, that's the bit of the job that I am expected to fulfil, and I get paid for it. How many of us have ever looked forward to Mondays? The Boomtown Rats had great success with a song declaring loudly that they didn't like Mondays. For many that's the day when we go back to work, college or school after a weekend break. We do like Fridays though! I will confess that in the days when I did a 'proper job' I did look forward to weekends. That's when I had the chance to spend time with my own kids instead of other people's. Do you get the feeling that, in general, people don't like work? I have always enjoyed my work, well, nearly always, but I have still enjoyed time off.

Did you realise that a day off was actually God's idea? You discover that in the Ten Commandments: 'Six days shall you work but on the Sabbath (the seventh day)..... "take a break". (Perhaps even enjoy the luxury of a well-known chocolate biscuit bar.) There is the reminder that even God took a break after six periods of creating. College lectures and others are often allowed a sabbatical break after seven years or terms. It is good to take time out. You have the opportunity to do something different, reflect, be refreshed. The consequence of not taking time out, (no further chocolate reference intended), could well be burn-out or shut-down.

Whatever you do with you weekend, the 'sabbath' break makes it count whether you spend time with family - home or away - with friends, or on your own. If you make best use of your time out, thanking God it's Sunday, you may find you can look forward to the rest of the week in a different frame of mind. God will help you to get through. (A bit of chocolate also helps but is not a substitute!)

# Keeping Fit in Willingham.

Did you know? Iron deficiency can lead to hair loss. For thick, lustrous locks make sure you eat iron-rich foods like red meat, bran flakes and dried apricots.

Food of the month. Fennel – an excellent source of vitamins A and C, potassium and fibre. It is also believed to help purify the body of free radicals.

Of course exercise is for both adults and children so take every opportunity to get out and have fun. Walking or cycling to school, work or nursery starts the day off well, and all before 9 am! A trip to the park can be a great workout, not just for the kids but adults can play catch too! Each time you go to get into the car - stop and think – 'Could I walk there?' Bringing exercise and super healthy eating into our lives can be so easy with just a few changes. My aim, as your local fitness instructor, is to get Willingham fit!
