From the Parish Council

District Council matters

It has been approximately a month since the new blue bins have been issued. The objective of diminishing general rubbish seems to be going well. South Cambridgeshire is more than meeting central government targets on recycling.

Cambridge and Peterborough have formed a local enterprise partnership, more details to follow in next month's edition.

County Council matters

Snow Clearance – it seems that the general consensus from central government is to encourage all local residents to help their community keep the paths and tracks clear of snow without fear of liability, however, general guidance on the sensible way to proceed is awaited.

Although CCC have no money in the budget for additional signs for restriction of HGVs at the southern end of Long Lane, the Parish Council have agreed to fund the signs and the County Council will now look to put up the signs at the earliest opportunity.

Police matters

Although police presence in Willingham has reduced speeding on the highways, and also resulted in many receiving warnings or tickets, this will be stepped up with the presence of a Camera Van. The message is REDUCE YOUR SPEED.

There has also been an increased presence of Police in the Pyrethrum Way area due to reports of antisocial behaviour, especially with regards to footballs causing damage to private property. Please bear in mind whilst playing in the area that other people are entitled to assume that their property is safe from damage.

After a spate of vandalism and other unpleasant behaviour, the area surrounding the recreation ground has also been patrolled regularly to ensure that the litter culprits pick up after themselves, after all, who would want to step on broken glass!? The Pavilion is also controlled by both CCTV and by the local Police PCSO and other security to ensure that it stays a safe place for the community to use for local sport. Take pride in this local amenity that many other communities are not so fortunate to have!

Recreation Ground

In response to requested feedback on the Football Wall recently erected, it was suggested that it was good for the younger children, but not big enough for the older ones, it was suggested that nets be added to the goal posts. These have now been added.

Willingham Feast Weekend

Once again the committee who organised the above event excelled themselves, the events were well attended and enjoyed by all. A big thank you goes from the Parish Council to the organisers who plan this throughout the year and it will be awaited with much enthusiasm next year.

Aiming High

As soon as I reached thirteen I couldn't wait to join Air Cadets. I didn't know much about it, but I found some leaflets at college about a recruitment evening. It happened to be just after my birthday in October last year, so I was only just old enough to join. The nearest squadron was 2524 Oakington Squadron based in Longstanton.

I've been to Air Cadets for a whole year now and I've made lots of new friends and learned new skills through the activities we do. During that year I have flown a Grob Tutor training plane from RAF Wyton twice, and on the second flight I did aerobatics over Willingham on a Saturday morning.

I have been involved in lots of activities, including shooting, swimming, ice-skating, first aid, sports, car park



marshalling for Duxford Air Show, and a flight simulator. We meet up with other squadrons from the Beds & Cambs Wing annually for an I n t e r - W i n g weekend Camp at Wyton. We

compete against them throughout the year in sports, drill and aircraft recognition competitions

I have trained to handle and fire a No. 8 bolt action rifle. Although I have learned to handle and maintain a L98A2 assault rifle, I can't take a weapons handling test to fire it until I am $14\frac{14}{2}$ years old.

In July I was lucky enough to be one of five squadron members chosen for a 7 day camp at RAF Linton-On-Ouse in Yorkshire. We travelled by coach with other cadets from the Beds & Cambs Wing. We stayed in barracks and every day was a very early start and a late finish. During the week we visited Air Traffic Control, which was very interesting. We got to sit in a Tucano, but as the weather was very wet and windy, we were unable to have a flight in them. Later in the week we got an air experience flight in a glider, which was just as fun. A visit to the Krypton Factor assault course was challenging, and really muddy. A lot of our spare time was spent preparing our uniforms to look their best as we had inspection every morning.

I am now looking forward to my second year and hope that it will be just as good as the first

It is a great hobby for girls and boys, and you don't have to join the armed forces when you are older. You can join Cadets between the ages of 13 - 17. 2524 Squadron meet Tuesdays and Thursday between 7 oo and 9 30 pm all year round. If you are an adult and would like to join us as a volunteer, there are also opportunities.

Seasonal Flu Clinics are running this month. Please ring reception to book your appointment and state that it is for a flu vaccination. We are asking that people wear shortsleeved clothing for easy access to arms! Flu vaccination is recommended and is free under the NHS to all people of 65 years and over, and to those of any age with a long term medical condition, for example diabetes, heart disease, kidney or liver disease, asthma or any breathing disorder. Carers (in receipt of Carers Allowance) are also eligible. Please enquire if unsure.

Repeat medication Patients ordering repeat prescriptions late November/early December will be offered 2 months' supply to cover Christmas and New Year. **To prevent wastage please only order those items you need from your repeat medication list.**

Consultation times NHS appointments are based on an average time of 10 minutes. We are trying to ensure that our surgery sessions run on time so that patients do not have to wait too long to see the doctor. Please remember that your appointment is for 10 minutes and that there will be other patients waiting to be seen after you. If you find you need longer than 10 minutes the doctor may ask you to come back again for a follow-up appointment. There will always be some occasions when a delay is unavoidable due to an emergency but we aim to ensure that our patients should wait no longer than 30 minutes for a booked appointment and generally we hope that you will be seen as near to your booked time as possible. Please help us to help you. Thank you for your co operation.

Verbal abuse to staff This practice in common with other NHS establishments has a Zero Tolerance Policy towards Abusive or Threatening Behaviour to its staff. Any person using abusive language or threatening behaviour towards our staff or causing a disturbance to other patients will be asked to leave the premises. We will also not tolerate the use of swearing or threatening language to our staff on the telephone. Any person who repeatedly behaves in this manner will be removed from the practice list in accordance with guidelines.

Anti-social behaviour The Police are putting on extra surveillance patrols around the surgery and surrounding area in Willingham as youngsters have been gathering in the evenings and at weekends and creating litter and noise disturbance to neighbours. JOTTINGS FROM YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

There has been considerable publicity this week about the fact that the last section of guideway south of Cambridge has been put in place by Nuttall, and I thought it might be timely to provide an update on Nuttall's 'progress' with the scheme. It has to be remembered that they should have completed the whole scheme nearly two years ago, so I'm not sure that the fact they have reached this milestone is really much of a cause for celebration. I am tempted to say that their whole stance for the past two years has been to wriggle and squirm like a snake, but then I think that description would be unfair to snakes. There remain many jobs to complete and their programme now shows they expect to complete the route in mid-January. This is incredibly frustrating as for the past six months the contractor has programmed all the work to be complete by mid-December and BAM Nuttall's most senior management had reassured the Council that they expected to have all the work done in advance of the mid-December deadline they earlier pledged

The numerous delays and broken promises by BAM Nuttall on this project have frustrated and angered councillors, council officers and residents. But in recent weeks they have also tried to drop plans specified in the contract for lighting to be installed at a junction in Trumpington Cutting where buses will change onto a stretch of single track guideway. In the Council's view the lighting is safety critical but it has taken some time for Nuttall to accept that the lighting is needed and are only now working up plans for it to be installed. The attempt by BAM Nuttall to remove the lighting was the final straw for Cambridgeshire County Council Cabinet Members and they have taken the decision to have an independent Public Review of the Busway contract. The independent Public Review will give the Council and residents a full investigation into the problems that have been faced without the multi million pound bill of a legally based Public Inquiry. The Review can only be carried out after the legal process has concluded to avoid prejudicing the legal outcome.

Nuttall has not made any progress over the past month rectifying the six outstanding defects between St Ives and Cambridge. They are carrying out some other minor work on the River Great Ouse viaduct over the next few weeks, but this is not to correct the expansion joint.

Much as I would personally like Nuttall to be removed not just from Cambridgeshire, but from the face of the earth, given the way they have let down the Council and so many residents in Cambridgeshire, the Council cannot accept handover of the northern section of the route without the defects being corrected as, until the whole guideway is completed, the additional costs of correcting the defective works might then fall to the Council. The Council is continuing to make plans to fix the defects once Nuttall has completed the southern section – claiming the costs back from the contractor as set out in the contract. Once the southern section of the route is completed BAM Nuttall will have a period of four weeks to correct any outstanding defects to the Council's satisfaction. If the contractor does not rectify the defects within the four week period the Council can then step in and finish the works, charging the cost to Nuttall. In the meantime, the Council is continuing to deduct damages of almost £14,000 a day from BAM Nuttall for late delivery. The total damages deducted so far are in excess of £8 million.
