After last month's photo by the High Street crossroads, our usual correspondent informed me that there used to be a pond near the junction. He said: 'I wonder how many residents realise that the open space between the Black Bull and the facing houses on Berrycroft (now occupied by trees and a lawn fronting a bungalow) was one of the four village Ponds that existed in my youth. It was known as Parson's Pond. There was also Green Pond and one near the then entrance to the recreation ground referred to as Lode Pond, being adjacent to but not connected to the Lode. The only remaining example now is Long Pond.' This month's photo is of Long Pond in the 1960s looking much less cluttered than now.

## The Future of the Library

At its Cabinet meeting on 27 September the County Council decided to go ahead with its cost-cutting reorganisation of the Library Service.

They agreed an 'emerging vision to design a 21st century library service to suit the varied needs of communities ... to make libraries community hubs'. The council will use the proposals put forward by the 13 libraries originally identified as under threat (including Willingham) as 'pilots to show what changes or support can be achieved with the County Council working with local communities'.

The County Council is continuing to look to save money by libraries sharing buildings with other council services and local business or community facilities, making them community hubs, and 'ideas such as use of volunteers, staff restructuring and self service will continue to go forward'. The Friends of Willingham Library and the Parish Council will continue to fight for the best possible provision but, in the meantime, it is important that we all continue to use the library, and encourage others to do so as well.

## Letters

#### Pride in your village

The Parish Clerk recently received a letter from the Royal Horticultural Society suggesting that Willingham should consider participating in the 'Britain in Bloom' campaign designed to help people improve their surroundings and strengthen the ties that bring neighbourhoods together.

After discussion the Parish Council decided not to participate, but they supported the aims of the scheme. It was felt that the first step forward was to draw the attention of villagers to some of the obstacles which might prevent achievement of the basic requirements of the scheme and which, if addressed, would improve the overall appearance of Willingham.

Whilst Willingham is not, and never can be, one of the small pretty villages of East Anglia, it is unique in its variety of houses and facilities which have developed over many years.

Currently the appearance of the village is spoilt by a variety of problems due to the thoughtlessness of individuals either resident or people passing through. At this stage if all residents took it upon themselves to maintain an increased standard of the area immediately surrounding their own property, the overall effect would be an enhanced appearance to Willingham village as a whole.

Some residents may need assistance in this matter and they are urged to discuss this with the Parish Council, who could possibly offer advice.

Problems which should be considered are – general litter, removal of time expired notices pinned to telegraph poles and disused buildings, untidiness of unoccupied buildings, weeds on property boundaries and frontages, overhanging bushes and trees, abandoned childrens' playthings, grafitti on walls and footpaths, derelict motor vehicles and overflowing commercial litter bins.

So - let's pull together with true community spirit.

Come on Willingham. Take pride in your village.

## JOTTINGS FROM YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

At the end of September the County Council's Cabinet discussed a paper entitled a new vision for a 21st century library service. It is clear that the world has moved on very rapidly since nearly 200 people packed into Willingham Primary School in April to consider the potential closure of Willingham Library. The County Council wants to retain all libraries with services shaped by local communities. Given the 24/7 nature of our society, use of modern technology will allow greater access to library services and libraries will become a gateway to new ways of learning, particularly for adult education. At the same time, the vision is clear that the service must be affordable, but I have yet to see detail on what the cost might look like. Colocation of the library with other public services is seen as a model for future working, with the services available dependent on the size of the local community that it serves. So what will this mean for Willingham Library? To be honest, at the moment I don't really know. I spoke in favour of the very comprehensive business case prepared by the Friends of Willingham Library along with Willingham and Over Parish Councils. I referred to the fact that my constituents did not recognise the description of Willingham as set out in the original consultation document and that we had never had a response to these concerns. I also pointed out that the proposed development of Northstowe, which would be the subject of a planning application in the near future, did not include a library and for a few years at least, residents of that community would be using Willingham as their nearest library. My comments were noted, so all I can say is that for the moment it is a case of 'watch this space'. I will keep you updated as I learn more.

On the subject of Northstowe, I hope that you were able to visit one of the exhibitions held recently setting out the vision for a new master plan and details of the 1500 homes to be built as part of Phase 1. Unfortunately the promoters, Gallaghers, only allowed until 28 October for consultation responses, but you can view the plans at www.northstowe.uk.com. My own view is that there is so little detail in the vision that there is little to object to, but there is no mention of traffic impact on surrounding villages, or how community infrastructure will be provided.

It is also recommended for pregnant women and registered carers. Please enquire if unsure whether you are eligible.

**Drug Reviews** If you are issued with repeat prescriptions from our practice you will be asked to attend for an annual drug review appointment with a doctor. Your GP is legally responsible for prescribing and monitoring your continuing medication even if you also attend the hospital. You will be invited to make an appointment for your yearly drug review in your birthday month. Please remember that you must attend for a drug review in order for the doctor to continue to write repeat prescriptions for you.

**Repeat prescription orders** Patients ordering repeat medication in late November/early December will be offered 2 months' supply to cover Christmas and New Year. To prevent wastage please only order those items you need from your repeat medication list.

NHS Resources and Medicines Wastage Did you know that an estimated £3.2 million is wasted on medicines in Cambridgeshire? This could pay for:

862 hip replacements or 1,081 knee replacements

125 community nurses

211 drug treatment courses for breast cancer

3,200 more drug treatment courses for Alzheimer's NHS Cambridgeshire is asking for your help to make the best use of limited resources:-

- Please let your GP or Pharmacist know if you've stopped taking any of your medicines.
- Check what medicines you still have at home before reordering.
- Discuss your medication with your GP or Pharmacist on a regular basis.

- Think carefully before ticking all the boxes on your repeat prescription forms and only tick those you really need.
- If you don't need the medicine please don't order it! If you need the medicine in the future you can still request it.
- If you need to go into hospital, please remember to take all your medicines with you in a clearly marked bag.
- Please also remember that your medicines are prescribed only for you; it's not safe to share them with anyone else.

## MONEY, MONEY, MONEY

It is a constant source of concern and worry. The family always wanting the latest gadgets, the most recent computer games, fashionable clothes and then there are all the sports activities, music lessons, drama clubs and so on. Where does it all stop? And now Christmas is approaching. I am sorry to mention the 'C' word so soon, but we need to be prepared. It has become so commercialised in our time. The Bible has much to say on the matter of finance. Jesus, using parables, taught that we need to be wise in how we use our resources. In the parable of the talents Jesus describes a rich man who went away for a while and gave three of his servants a sum of money to put to work. ## **Transport:**

With the guided bus now entering its 4th month of service residents of SCDC will no doubt sit in three camps, they love it, hate it or haven't used it. The service seems to be well used at certain times of the day and the providers flexible regarding changes to the schedule, so hopefully its use will increase as time moves on. Recent accidents on the A14 and the B1050 have shown that an alternative means of access into and out of the city has been beneficial to commuters north of Cambridge. A recent accident on the B1050 left a person fighting for his life; at the time of writing this it is not known if the road surface was a contributing fact, however the County Council has real concerns about the state of the road surface and the cost implications in finding the correct solution to either repair or replace the road. Sadly no quick fix!

The County Council are currently reviewing subsidised bus services and there is an on-line questionnaire which can be completed. Just log on to their website, they would like to hear the public views on the cuts that have already taken place and their impact. The questionnaire is open until 9 December.

#### The Beast and The Feast:

The Beast of Willingham has been tamed. I refer to the Willingham Parish clock which over the past few months has thrown a wobbly, but concerted efforts from a specialist company has it back working correctly and a maintenance contract put in place to hopefully ensure 'The Beast' lives on.

The Feast weekend has been and gone and I am sure hundreds of villagers will have enjoyed the various activities put on by the hard-working Willingham Action Group (WAG). Further articles will no doubt appear about the Feast Weekend but the Parish Council are very appreciative of the efforts of WAG and the contribution it makes in trying to improve the lives of the people of Willingham. Well done to them.

## **Community Chest:**

No we are not talking about Monopoly. SCDC each year makes contributions approaching £800,000 to worthy causes. One scheme in place is the Community Chest Grants, details of which are available on the SCDC web site or by contacting the Council at Cambourne. Grants of up to £1000 are available for community based initiatives and one off projects. So if your group needs help and you meet the criteria laid down, fill out the form and send it in. Indications are that the decision making process is quick but it is not a bottomless money pit and the scheme finishes in March 2012. You have nothing to lose!

## The Old and the New:

As reported in the September *Willingham News*, the Parish Council were progressing a request from the Willingham Action Group to use the 'old' recreation ground as a community orchard and that the commercial value of the land needed to be explored. This has been done and it seems that the land concerned is outside the village framework therefore could not be used for housing. Based on this information WAG has been asked to provide further information on its proposal so that a reasoned decision can be made.

The 'new' recreation ground in West Fen Road is having some changes. Although the village has a new pavilion, the storage facilities for the equipment used by the sporting groups is virtually non existent. To improve this situation, thanks to promised donations from the Willingham Sports Council and contributions from the user groups, it is planned to provide a container to store the equipment. This will be sited adjacent to the existing metal shed by the bowls green. Further work on the ground will include claiming back recreational areas which over the years have been over run with brambles.

## Jubilee Field:

Work should have been carried out on the hedgerows and brambles in October and it is planned to plant a couple of oak trees either side of the entrance leading into the field from the Ploughman Hall. The Willingham Action Group will hopefully then develop a plan for improving the borders.

Unfortunately it is sad to report that dog owners have allowed their pets to foul the play park and have just left it for others to clear up. This goes for the recreation ground as well. So please clear up your dogs mess!!

## **Disability Forum:**

SCDC have set up a disability forum to focus on disability issues and how these are dealt with across the services they provide to their tenants and leaseholders. ## Willingham Library:

The County Council have now announced that no Libraries are going to close in this area, however, they are still reviewing how they can best serve the public in the 21st Century. Further details will be published once known. Watch this space!

It is also a chance to see where public money is being spent in your area. Please look out for more details on this community meeting and your chance to have your say with a captive audience!

## **Tree Maintenance**

## Message from Trading Standards Department Cambridge

The next digital re-tuning date since the digital switchover is 23 November.

Viewers will need to re-tune their Freeview set top boxes and TVs (and Top Up TV and BT Vision boxes) on 23 November to keep watching the full range of digital channels they currently receive, unless the set top box has auto re-tune. You will see captions on-screen reminding you of the need to re-tune on the run up to the date. Guidance on re-tuning is available from www.digitaluk.co.uk. If you are watching satellite or cable services, this does not affect you.

The set top boxes that the Helpscheme provided to eligible residents are auto re-tune so people shouldn't have any problems with them but, if they do require help and went through the Helpscheme they can call the Helpline on 0800 4085900 and someone will talk them through what they need to do over the phone or they will send someone out as part of the aftercare they get (there is no charge).

For those people who were not eligible or are already watching digital television and need help re-tuning the best advice is to call Digital UK on 08456 505050 who can talk people through how to re-tune their TV over the phone and their number is charged at local rate.



## From the Parish Council

Having seen a deterioration in the condition of some of the trees which the Parish Council are responsible for within the village, we requested an assessment be carried out by a tree surgeon to ensure that they are safe. The areas of concern were the Recreation Ground, the Jubilee Field, the Green and the Cemetery.

The resulting report highlighted that a substantial amount of work is required to maintain our current trees in a healthy and safe state. A few trees have been reported as being in a dangerous condition with the only option for these being complete removal. The main tree which needs removing is the large Ash tree located on the Recreation Ground beneath which a bench is currently placed. It is a shame that this needs to be removed but the safety of the public is our priority and so we have requested that this be carried out as soon as possible. A Cherry tree in the Cemetery currently hanging over a footpath is also in need of removal.

Other works will be carried out to a number of trees in terms of reducing their size and weight and dealing with the effects of Ivy growth and dead wood.

Please be assured that where possible any removed trees will be replaced by new trees or hedgerow. Although this will take time we have already begun plans to improve the appearance of the main green spaces within the village. We hope you will begin to see these improvements over coming months.

If you have any concerns regarding these potential works please contact the Clerk's office.

## **Textile and shoe recycling**

Over 2 million tonnes of textiles and shoes in the UK in 2009 were 'blackbinned' despite being either reusable or recyclable. In South Cambridgeshire we hope to reduce the number of unwanted textiles and shoes sent to landfill sites and provide more local recycling facilities for these items. Residents living in Willingham can use the local recycling bank at the Co-op car park and the Salvation Army, Silve Street to recycle items such as:

- Clean and dry clothing and shoes
- Bags
- Belts
- Towels
- Blankets
- Duvet covers
- Pillows
- Sheets
- Curtains
- Fabric

Such goods can be re-sold or if worn-out can be turned into a variety of goods e.g. rags for wiping and polishing, car insulation, stuffing, building materials, reprocessed upholstery fibres, and home insulation. ## **NHS Cambridgeshire helps you to Choose Well this Winter**

NHS Cambridgeshire is asking people to 'Choose Well' if they need medical attention this winter.

Choose Well is a national campaign which helps people find the most appropriate care for their needs. It's aim is to remind people that there are a range of NHS services available on the doorstep.

**Self-care** is the best choice to treat very minor illnesses and injuries which can be treated at home simply by combining a well-stocked medicine cabinet with plenty of rest. Ensure your medicine cabinet includes:

- Paracetamol or aspirin
- Anti-diarrhoeal medicine
- Rehydration mixture
- Indigestion remedies
- A thermometer

For expert help and advice on a range of illnesses and complaints you can visit NHS Choices – www.nhs.uk or NHS Direct on 0845 46 47.

Accident and Emergency Departments should only be used in a critical or life-threatening situation. A&E Departments provide immediate emergency care for people who show the symptoms of serious illness or are badly injured. Dialling 999 and stating a medical emergency will result in a response vehicle being sent to you.

If your local GP surgery is closed and you have a medical need that can't wait, whether your child has a very high temperature or you need medical attention you should **telephone your normal GP surgery number**.

You will be diverted automatically to the **out of hours** service and be put through to an emergency call handler who will take your details and pass them to a nurse/clinician. They will call you back and be able to assess your needs and advise you of what action is needed.

If your call has been assessed as a medical emergency you will be dealt with straight away and an ambulance called on

your behalf. If your call has been assessed as urgent you will be seen either at one of the primary care centres in Cambridgeshire or receive a home visit within two hours depending on your needs. For less urgent cases you will be directed to the right service within six hours. You may also be given advice or reassurance over the phone for less urgent or serious conditions.

#### When can you get out of hours services?

Depending on when your surgery closes, the out of hours services operate during the following times:

- Monday to Friday 6 30 pm to 8 00 am
- 24 hours a day on Saturdays and Sundays
- 24 hours a day during Bank Holiday periods

**NHS Dental Treatment** is available to everyone to maintain their dental health. There are three standard charges for a course of NHS dental treatment, depending on the treatment that is needed. These charges should be displayed in your dentist's waiting room

If you need out of hours dentistry care, the emergency number is **01223 471798**. You can only access this service if you have telephoned the out of hours telephone line and have been triaged as being appropriate for a pre-booked appointment. There are 3 dental access centres across Cambridgeshire based in Cambridge, Huntingdon and Wisbech. Each Access Centre is open for 3 hours, mornings only. This service is not available for lost fillings, crowns etc.
