

# Could you let someone dig a hole in your garden?

The Fen Edge Archaeology Group (FEAG) are looking for about a dozen locations in Willingham in which secondary school students could, under supervision, dig one metre square archaeological test pits, on Wednesday 16 and Thursday 17 May. The purpose is to give the students a 'higher education experience' and to encourage them to consider continuing studying to degree level.

The HEFA is organised by Carenza Lewis and her team from Access Cambridge Archaeology within the University of Cambridge Archaeology Department.

The students will come from a number of different schools across the region and will be working in small groups to carry out the excavation of the pits in a structured way, following instructions as to method and, importantly, the recording of their processes and what they find.

They will excavate, record and backfill the pits within the two days. Your garden will, of course, show signs for a while of where the pit has been; but the aim is that it should be left so that it returns to normal as the soil settles and the replaced turf (or whatever was there) grows again. During the dig the students will be accompanied by an adult who may be from one of their schools or from the University. There will also be several visits during the two days by professional archaeologists to address any queries and advise the students (and you) about what they have found in the pits.

On the following day the students will be in the University to learn more about archaeology and about higher education studies. In due course they will also write a report on their involvement in the project. You can find out much more about the HEFA at this website: http://www.arch.cam.ac.uk/aca/fieldacademies.html

You can also follow links there to see what has been found during previous such exercises in Cottenham and elsewhere.

FEAG is assisting with the process by locating sites for the test-pits. Please get in touch if you could help or if you have any questions. We need to have available about a dozen locations but they may not all be used.

### Outings

Anyone can come whether a Club member or not.

Our first outing of the year will be on Saturday 19 May leaving the Green, Willingham at 9 am.

We shall be visiting Coton Manor Gardens, Guilsborough, Northamptonshire. These gardens are included in Rae Spencer-Jones' publication 1001 Gardens You Must See Before You Die which includes gardens worldwide. The garden is described as an 'exquisitely planted garden' and has been in the Pasley-Tyler family since the 1920s. There are terraces with seasonal planting, a water garden with flamingoes, Mediterranean climbing and scented plants, a conservatory, a mixed rose garden and a wild garden. There is ample seating in this 10 acre temperate garden and woodland built in the Arts and Crafts style. Visitor facilities include a cafe, a garden shop and a plant nursery. *Gardeners World* TV programme paid the gardens a visit in 2010. We shall make a coffee stop en route at Buckden – Frosts Garden Centre.

The cost of coach travel and entry is  $\pounds 20$  per person payable on the day by cash or cheque.

### **Future attractions**

1. We shall be holding our annual **Plant Stall** next to the Post Office on High Streeet, Willingham on **Saturday 26 May from 9 am**. We usually have a wide variety of plants for sale at competitive prices. These varieties include perennial and annual varieties of flowers including bedding plants, vegetable plants and small shrubs. Members – if you are sowing your seeds or planting out your seedlings now please plant a few extra for sale at the stall.

2. On Wednesday 20 June we have arranged an outing to Peckover House and Gardens at Wisbech. This is a National Trust property with a Georgian House (open to the public and included in the cost of our visit) with a Victorian garden. The cost per person is  $\pounds13$  for NT members and  $\pounds19$  for non-members. **Remember to take your membership card with you** 

3. On Saturday 14 July we shall be visiting Beth Chatto's Garden and plant nursery in Essex. This is a superb garden built from scrubland by Beth Chatto and her husband over many years. The cost is  $\pounds 20.50$  per person, 9 am start from the Green. More details next edition.

4. On Saturday 22 September we shall be visiting RHS Gardens at Hyde Hall near Chelmsford. Cost is £15 per person for Club members. A small additional charge will be levied from non-members on this visit.

# Pastoral Letter

Noah and his family had no doubt spent years building the ark. Now Noah and his family were inside the ark and the Lord Himself had closed the door. The waiting now began. For seven days Noah and his family waited. And waited. I wonder what went through the mind of Noah during these seven days of waiting? Did Noah wonder whether God would be faithful to His promise? Did Noah ever fear his work had been in vain? These seven days of waiting must have seemed like an eternity! But finally, any questions Noah might have had were answered as the sky began to grow dark and the rain began to fall. The waiting was over!

The next two months hold the two events that have been much talked about seemingly for months: The Queens Jubilee and the Olympics in London 2012. Maybe you are planning to celebrate or even attend (if only by watching the TV!) these events? Maybe you've been waiting for them to arrive or even to finish for ages? At The Salvation Army we are celebrating the Jubilee by baving a Jubilee Lunch at our lunch club on Thursday 31 May, with flags, bunting and lots of food. We'd love to see you!

# South Cambridgeshire Youth Council

Nominations have opened for young people interested in becoming councillors and sitting on South Cambridgeshire's all new Youth Council.

There are 20 places available for young people aged 13 to 18 years old who want to have a say about the things that matter to them in their local area, and across the district as a whole.

The role of a youth councillor is to represent the views and opinions of all young people in South Cambridgeshire, and to become involved in, and contribute to, the wellbeing of local young people and the wider community. There are a lot of things that youth councillors may want to work with South Cambridgeshire District Council on, including new housing developments, sports and arts activities, jobs and businesses, climate change and energy, and communication with residents. Youth councillors will develop leadership skills, gain confidence, get involved in decision-making and help organise youth and community events.

Officers from South Cambridgeshire District Council have visited the district's nine village colleges, and the Connections Youth Bus that tours the area, throughout April to talk to young people about what is involved in becoming a youth councillor, answer any questions, and help them sign up and stand for election.

Tracy Mann, South Cambridgeshire District Council's Development Officer, said: 'Young people really care about all sorts of things that affect them, and the youth council will help them get involved in democracy at an early age. If you live in South Cambridgeshire and believe you should have a say in the decisions that are made on your behalf, then please volunteer to become a youth councillor and really help us to help you make a difference.'

Young people can nominate themselves until the closing date on 1 August. If there are enough candidates who want to stand on the new Youth Council an election will be held in September.

# From the Parish Council

### **Annual Parish meeting:**

Every month we extend a warm invitation to Willingham residents to our monthly meeting. In May there is a bonus of another meeting, namely the Annual Parish Meeting to be held on the 16 May at the Octagon. Again all residents are warmly invited to this, where the Council and groups from within the village provide updates on what they have done over the past year and their future plans.

### Pavilion kitchen upgrade:

At the time of putting these notes together a contract has been placed for improving the kitchen to bring it up to current legislation. This will see an additional sink being provided, an improved wall surface to allow easier cleaning and a commercial extractor fan. Some funding has been received from the SCDC Community Chest.

### The Ploughman Hall and Willingham Youth Trust:

Another step has been made in the provision of facilities at the Ploughman Hall for the youth of the village. A planning application has been submitted to the SCDC planning department which parishioners can either see at the PC office or by going online. The planning application also includes improvements to the car park, disabled access ramp and traffic calming. Funding is another building block in providing these facilities and the Willingham Youth Trust are actively seeking funding for the youth project.

Parents should be reminded that the car park area of the Ploughman Hall is not a playground. The Parish Council have provided alternative areas for sporting activities including a goal wall and a full sized football goal which are only a short distance away and they should encourage these to be used. Damage has been caused to the fabric of the building by balls being kicked against it costing Willingham residents unnecessary expense. CCTV footage has allowed identification and is with the police for action.

### Village Green:

The village map has been commissioned and it is hoped to be in place in a few weeks time. This has been funded by a contribution from the SCDC Community Chest. Residents are reminded that further grants are available for projects but grants are limited to five from within the Parish Council area in a financial year.

The village sign has been refurbished to a high standard and the Parish Council pass on their thanks to Sarah Taylor for restoring the damaged scenes. As you drive into the village from Rampton the change in the village sign is very noticeable - a great improvement!

### **Northstowe Planning Application:**

The first stage of the Northstowe development has hit the streets with opportunities for local residents to voice their opinions on the plans submitted. Likewise the Parish Council have had the same opportunity and a response has been formulated which raises concerns about the increase in the volume of traffic on the already busy B1050 and the roundabout at Bar Hill.

### B1050 Update:

Unfortunately there is no update on the progress regarding the poor state of the B1050 by the river. Despite meetings, no long term fix has been identified and no policy change regarding HGVs using the road. All motorists can do is drive carefully, keep to the speed limit or less and pray(!) that other drivers do the same. It seems that the B1050 can not be dealt with in isolation and the traffic profile of the whole area needs looking at before a decision is made. Other roads in Cambridgeshire are in a similar state and the County Council are having to go to government to seek extra funds for urgent repairs.

### Non emergency Police contact number:

Please be advised that 101 should be used to call the police for **non emergency** events. The 0345 number has been switched off although there will be a message to use 101 instead.

People should continue to call 999 when an immediate response is needed, for example if a crime is happening, someone suspected of a crime is nearby, or someone is in danger.

### Dog fouling on the Recreation Ground:

Dog fouling still seems to be a problem on the Recreation Ground (plus other areas of the village) and notices are in place requesting 'No Dogs' on the field. It is obvious the dogs can't read them but hopefully their owners can so please use the alternative walks that exist a short walk away from the Recreation Ground. The Recreation Ground is used by the sporting groups of the village and the dog fouling, as well as being an anti social habit, can cause health problems. Again it is the minority of dog walkers that cause the problem.

# **ETHIOPIA BULLETIN number 3**

Religion does play an important part in Ethiopian life. The majority of people here are Orthodox Christians while others may be Catholics or Muslims.

Not long after I arrived in Mekelle to carry out my VSO work I had to adjust to the fasting period before Easter. Their Easter is a week after ours and is an enormous celebration from Friday to Sunday then back to work on Monday. The fasting however lasts for fifty five days. I haven't quite got my head around why that long; I can appreciate the forty days and nights in the wilderness and maybe add onto that the Holy Week seven, but fifty five? Anyway, that means strictly no animal products are eaten. I took a potato salad to a 'do' the other week and had to sort out a different dressing as salad cream has eggs and milk in it. The eggs are still on sale in most places – how can you tell a chicken to stop laying, or cows to stop producing milk?

During this time meat is difficult to come by and I have become accustomed to being a vegetarian. Just before the 'fast' began everyone had a huge meat eating feast and this was repeated at the end. During the following month it seems a case of frugal fare while saving up for the next celebratory feast. Saint George is important here: even the big beer company is 'St George'! In fact they celebrate him on the 23rd of every month but the one in April is seriously big. Uniformed brass bands sometimes practise for feasting at weekends which are quite a spectacle even while practising. I noticed that not many weddings happened during the fasting season so I expect there will be many afterwards when no doubt there will be plenty more meat available. Weddings are big white religious affairs and after the ceremony the convoys of cars spread out right across roads as they cruise from the church all through the streets. Guests hang far out of the windows shouting while blasting their horns - don't mention health and safety here.

The weather is warmer now although the wind gets up at odd times, which keeps it at a good temperature – but it does blow the dust about. We have also had a few thunderstorms in the evenings which are quite dramatic in terms of watching the sparks fly from the wiring between the street lights ... and don't worry, I have a good supply of candles at the ready for when the electricity finally gives out! On my tiny protected balcony my little plants in their make-shift grow bags are doing well and I hope to have my own salads soon. I think sometimes about your greener

gardens in Willingham, warming up now for summer planting too!

And so, if I am in the office this is my walk to work...

With a shawl round my shoulders, I grab the small rucksack which I carry in front of me, 'Shalom' to the cleaner on the stairs and avoid skidding in the latest mopped floor, then smile at the guard - he grins back showing the teeth he has left. Waving to the shop keeper outside on his stone stool, I cross the road avoiding a few three-wheeler taxis, horse-drawn carts or donkey trains which don't necessarily keep to the right side of the road. Then it's past the dusty waste ground littered with charred ox bones (from the last feast) and into the main street towards town. I always nod to the uniformed guards outside the hotel as they sit in the shade clutching their little bomb detectors and I check out progress of the weaver birds nesting above in the beautiful trees there. From here the route is full of little shops and bars or fruit juice cafés busy with men sitting outside on their low stools chatting. Women may be washing their front pavements and the

shoe-shine boys have a brisk trade along this stretch. Negotiating parts of the path is tricky and I know where to avoid tripping on the wobbly slabs, the open holes to the storm drains, the huge drop down from the kerbs, plus the sleeping beggars and the pavement sellers. Some of these sell a variety of eucalyptus sticks which are used generally to chew as teeth cleaners; it seems to work. If you can also imagine a school nearby with 1,350 children, all walking there in ragged uniforms and flip flops, coming from every direction for the start of their day, some lads kicking anything round or girls arm in arm stretched across the street, then that is where I leave them to turn into the rough track to the City Education Office. I may have had a call along the route of 'forenji' (which means foreign), which I don't mind really since as a white person I am an oddity, but some school children know me now and call out 'teacher, teacher!' which is really lovely. Progress!
