Pastoral Letter

November is a month full of rememberings. Obviously Remembrance Day will spring to mind but there's also Guy Fawkes and both All Souls' Day and All Saints' Day. We think, usually with sadness, of those who have left this earthly life. Terms like 'passed on' or 'over' come to mind. We might think about how we miss them and contemplate what they have missed and what they could have done, seen or been if they were still here with us. Of course all of this is natural and stems mostly from our having loved them and now we are missing them. So usually all of this remembering seems to be cloaked in sadness.

But there is another side to this. There is the great hope of the Christian that the next world will be altogether more beautiful and glorious than we can ever imagine here in this one. Dear Editors

Having read the October Willingham News I cannot believe the comments from John Raven of Earith Road regarding the 'surfacing of The Causeway from Aldreth to Fox & Hound Corner'. I accept that as Willingham has become very built-up since my family moved here in 1975 it obviously produces more vehicles, not only as a through way but also for locals. We surely do not want to use a historic Roman byway - which is used for recreation purposes and keeps walkers, riders and cyclists out of the village as much as possible and is a place of natural beauty which leads directly into the Fens. If surfaced it would only encourage even more traffic from the Ely and Chatteris direction to avoid the A10 and we would still have the problem of too much traffic from Earith and St Ives avoiding the A14. I assume he must own some land in this vicinity otherwise he would have more respect for what little countryside is left in the area.

The only comment I would agree with is that if a bypass is not forthcoming then Northstowe should not be started.

Dear Editor

Please can I add my thoughts regarding heavy goods vehicles travelling through Willingham damaging the highway? Can the Parish Council make the following suggestion to SCDC and the Highways agency?

Can a 7.5 tonne or 18 tonne GVW weight limit (except buses) be considered along the B1050 Willingham High Street starting at Over Road crossroads continuing westbound covering George Street and Earith Road Willingham and Shelford's Road Earith as far as Earith Bridge? Goods vehicles at higher weights would have to use the A14, A1096 St Ives by-pass and the A1123 Needingworth by-pass. I believe the Needingworth by-pass was built with a primary purpose of encouraging heavy goods vehicles collecting gravel from Needingworth to avoid travelling through Bluntisham, Earith and Willingham.

This weight limit should cause minimum disruption to heavy goods vehicle traffic. It would go a long way to protecting the subsiding section of the B1050 Shelford's Road close to Earith Bridge running alongside the river. It would also cut down heavy goods vehicle traffic through Willingham.

In addition, it would also prohibit the route from becoming a heavy goods vehicle 'rat run' should the suggested road toll be introduced on sections of the A14 as part of the 'A14 Upgrade' between the M11 and A1M.

Feast report 2012

The Willingham Feast took place in October and, if we judge by the happy faces of those who joined in, it was a success. The new events this time included an art display by local artists and a wine tasting quiz and the Willingham Youth Trust organised a curry and quiz night. If you were one of those who attended events we hope you had an enjoyable time.

The Feast, many years ago, was a combination of Harvest Festival and the time when young men and women ended their contracts of working elsewhere as farmhands, maids and other such jobs and came back to the village to celebrate before going away to work again. The whole village joined in; people wore their best clothes and went around their neighbours' houses eating and drinking – a little like New Year. The tradition died out but after the Parish Plan Questionnaire, where one significant response was that Willingham lacked social events, Willingham Action Group reinvented it.

Sadly, there are two problems. Firstly, the group of core organisers is too small for the workload that arises especially in the final two or three weeks and especially as some have full-time jobs and/or young families. Despite using these pages to call for volunteers to help, we have had no response. Secondly, although there was a great response asking for more social events from the questionnaire, many of the events are poorly attended, considering the size of the village. Flu vaccines are still available free for those aged over 65, pregnant women and anyone with a chronic disease. Just ring for an appointment. Private flu vaccines are available for those who do not qualify under the NHS criteria. Please ask in our pharmacy for details.

Repeat medication: Patients ordering repeat prescriptions late November/early December will be offered 2 months' supply to cover Christmas and the New Year.

To prevent wastage please check your stocks and only order those items you actually need from your repeat medication list. If you need the medicine in the future you can still request it then. Once medicines leave the pharmacy they cannot be recycled even if they have not been opened. Please take any unused medicines to your pharmacy for safe disposal and do not flush them down the toilet. Remember that stockpiled, unused medicines kept at home are a safety risk for children and others.

Did you know that unused medicines cost NHS East of England an estimated \pounds 34 million every year which is the equivalent of around 1,350 more nurses, 9,275 more hip replacements, 35,788 more cataract operations, 2,271 more drug treatment courses for breast cancer, or 34,393 more Alzheimers treatments? Help the NHS to help you and others by avoiding waste.

AAA Screening: NHS Clinics for patients living in this area will be held at Willingham Surgery over the coming months. This is a new national programme which will invite men to be screened when they reach the age of 65 to detect if they have an Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm. We encourage you to take up this free offer which could potentially save your life. The wall of the main blood vessel called the aorta which supplies blood to the body can become weakened and enlarged with age forming an aneurysm and if this becomes large enough to rupture it could be life threatening. An appointment will last less than 10 minutes when a simple ultrasound scan will be taken of the abdomen. There is no need to undress and you will be given the result straight away. If you are over 65 and do not receive an invitation, you can contact 01223 256909 or visit the national screening website at aaa.screening.nhs.uk

Appointment reminders: Since the beginning of the year we have been able to send a text message reminder to your mobile phone on the day before you have an appointment at the surgery. We now have the facility to leave a reminder message on your home phone if you do not have a mobile

JOTTINGS FROM YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

One of the roles of a local County Councillor is often to be a statutory member of a local body or charity and it is in that context that I have been one of the Trustees of the Over Day Centre for the past 15 years. The Day Centre was first established in 1989 before moving to its present premises in 2001. Its purpose is very simple - to care for the frail and elderly of Over and surrounding villages who are referred to the Centre. The Centre is open six days a week and clients can be transported to and from it in the Centre's own bus that can often be seen in Over and neighbouring villages. The Centre offers companionship and entertainment, but also a number of other services for example clients can use a specially designed bath (a normal bath being a luxury that they may no longer be able to use at home); there is a hairdressing salon and a foot-care specialist comes regularly. There is a programme of entertainment and often groups from outside provide musical offerings. The Centre also has a good relationship with the Over Primary School.

There is a small band of paid staff, but we rely heavily on volunteers to help with preparing hot lunches and refreshments. We also depend on the staff and volunteers to help with fundraising. Although the Centre has a contract with Cambridgeshire County Council to provide 42 places per week for social service clients, this does not cover all expenses and £2,000 still has to be raised every month to keep the Centre running.

So who comes to the Centre? Clients come if they are referred by their doctor, or district nurse, or by a family member who thinks they may benefit. An assessment is always carried out although it is very rare that someone is deemed too frail to be safe at the Centre. The Centre can take up to around 28 clients per day who may attend on more than one day, depending on their needs and the vacancies at the time. On most weekdays the Centre is nearly full, but we currently have a number of vacancies on Saturdays when perhaps clients are with their families, but it may be that weekends are when carers and families would like a break from caring responsibilities. If this is the case and you know of somebody who may benefit from coming to the Day Centre on a Saturday, please do get in touch.

Old Willingham

Milford Jeeps, who appears in the picture outside Berry Cottage, sent the following letter:

'In 1921 my family and I moved to Berry Cottage, exchanging homes with Gordon Spackman's family. My father was a painter and decorator, and a water engineer, running the water pumping in Station Road and the Fen drainage in Earith Road and we needed larger premises.

'The lean-to on the side of the house was a dairy used by Mr William Norman who moved to the Acacias in Long Lane. The building on the right was built about 1924 as a shop. The front railings were requisitioned in 1940 for the war effort. Many villages lost their railings but many were never used as they were made of the wrong metal.



'The car, previously owned by Sir Frederick Hyam, was a 12HP Humber. One luxury it had was a screen for the rear seat. One of the downsides was that it had no driver's door, the reason being that the petrol can and spare wheel were attached to the running board. The vehicle had no selfstarter (it had to be hand cranked) and the screen wiper was hand operated. It was the first car in the village to tow a trailer. In 1932 the car was sold to Alan Bloom of Oakington, later of Bressingham Steam Museum. Note that, at that time, there were no kerbs or footpaths.'

Resignations:

Sadly several very talented Councillors have resigned lately – not all for the same reason but a group of them because of some ludicrous legislation. After the scandal of MPs' expenses it was decided by Central Government that no politician could be trusted and that systems must be put in place to guarantee openness and honesty. The principle was fine and there seems no reason why it should not apply to MPs who receive decent salaries, large expenses and goldplated pensions from the public purse. Whether or not it should apply to unpaid Parish Councillors who claim no expenses and receive no pension is another matter.

None of the Parish Councillors involved in the dispute had the slightest problem with declaring their interests. They have always done so even when asked to complete a 14-page form that listed a considerable amount of personal and financial information about both them and their partners. However, the sticking point was that the legislation insisted it be posted on the worldwide web. You will have read the letter on this subject in last month's *Willingham News*.

Those of you who have received e-mails from a Nigerian bank telling you that there is $\pounds 1,000,000$ just waiting to be collected if you will provide a few personal details will know about identity theft. Some Councillors felt that this was an intrusion too far into their private lives and the Parish Council agreed. A strongly-worded letter is going to our local MP and the Secretary of State.

We wish those Councillors, who have resigned, all success and our thanks for their considerable contributions. Should the legislation change and they feel able to return at some time in the future they will be most welcome. Meanwhile we are delighted to welcome new councillors, Sue Ayling and Neil Harris. Neil has previously served on the Council and his experience will be very useful. Sue will help augment the number of female Councillors – of which we are very short. Ideally the Council should represent a cross section of the community it serves.

Traveller Sites:

In some ways it has been a difficult month with neither Central Government nor the District Council helping us very much. Some of you will have seen the reports of a planning meeting at SCDC on 3 October in the *Cambridge News* There were no less than seven applications relating to traveller sites. Willingham Parish Council went along to present as balanced a case as possible that sites must be spread geographically across the district. The Parish Council has argued for many years that whilst the village can and will accept a fair proportion of sites, it cannot support an indefinite number. This is not discrimination. The traveller community has been consulted on the policy and agrees.

It was very clear that at this stage in the interests of justice all seven applications needed to be treated in the same way and SCDC did this on the first six with eighteenmonth extensions of their existing temporary consents. Unfortunately, the meeting got a little out of hand with a series of counter proposals that eventually resulted in the seventh application being approved for permanent consent. This could make it very difficult to object to any of the other six proposals and possibly more.

We also have to report that we failed to get our way on the erection of a wind turbine. The Parish Council was not at all happy about it but SCDC approved. It is only one for the moment in Meadow Road.

It is also only fair to say that none of these decisions were down to our local District Councillors, Ray Manning and Pippa Corney, who were both present at the SCDC meeting and spoke strongly in support of Willingham Parish Council.

Ploughman Hall

Work commenced on the car park at the end of October. It will be closed for a few weeks.

Tribute to Rene Gould, a remarkable lady

I would like to pay a special tribute to Rene, whom I knew for forty years. During that time the steadfast trait that shone through was her generosity - not just with her money, but with her time, her consideration of others and her genuine concern for those who did not wish to or were unable ask for help or assistance. She always had an eye for the underdog, the ones that needed help and encouragement. She was an active member of the Red Cross for many years and also for several years went with disabled members of the Winged Fellowship Trust on holiday to push the wheelchairs.

When we came to live in the village in the 1970s, Rene was one of the volunteers who ran the 'Nearly New Shop' in the Public Hall. It was started to raise funds to support the playgroup but progressed to supporting the cubs, brownies, scouts, guides and other village causes, as well as the Red Cross. She was a longstanding member of the Mothers' Union and Ladies' section of the British Legion and raised funds regularly at fêtes and Christmas Bazaars. I've been told how she even kept the telephone box and the

bus shelter on the High Street clean – couldn't stand the mess and dirt!

Soon she had set up her own stall in Fen End – a small table and her window sill in the street. She accepted almost anything from people moving house, or spring cleaning, and extended, on occasions, to unwanted Christmas presents. To the despair of her long-suffering daughter, a good third of Rene's sitting room was a regular sorting and pricing office, with



piles against the wall of every conceivable thing imaginable. The contents of the daily stall were but a fraction of her

'stock'. Wooden sheds appeared in her back garden to house the overflow, carefully packed in black bags. A few years ago we broke a teapot at home and I asked her if she might have a similar one. 'Go to the second shed' she said, 'and look in the third sack from the left'. I had a choice of three.

The casual passer-by may have thought a bric-a-brac stall like this would bring in the odd pound or two but week in, week out, she banked between £30 and £50 in the charity account. Multiply this by 52 weeks and you have at least £1,500 over a year. I well recall one day when someone tried to pass a fake £5 note through her stall takings. It was identified at the Post Office when it was paid in. She was livid. 'I know who will have paid me that' she said. 'I'll get him.' And she did – that afternoon. Rene became interested in the medieval wallpaintings' conservation programme in the Church, which was a particular interest of mine, and we discovered that several charities were much more willing to give grants if we could demonstrate our own commitment with some substantial initial 'seedcorn'. First the Pilgrim Trust, then the Archbishop's Council for the Care of Churches, English Heritage and others responded with grants of up to 3 or 4 times Rene's stall earnings. Very different needs and projects now emerged. Almost every year throughout the 1980s, 1990s and into the early 2000s that 'seedcorn' from Rene's stall played a major part in obtaining substantial grants for a wide range of projects in the Church from these sources.

Look around the Church and see the results for yourself: The infra-red heating system

The entire internal lighting system

The injection treatment against deathwatch beetle in the roofs

The restoration programme on the tower and spire

The conservation of all the medieval wallpaintings

The external floodlighting of the Church, Rene gave in memory of her husband, George.

It is no exaggeration to say that over the past 30 years her little everyday stall has raised around £50,000, and this has led to well over £250,000 of grant aid.

She never asked for recognition, but it was good to see Rene's work recognised

nevertheless. The Lord Lieutenant of Cambridgeshire presented her with a Certificate for her charity work. Later she received an invitation to one of the Queen's Garden Parties at Buckingham Palace – she did enjoy that day. In 2004 an article was published in *The Times* about her and then in 2010 the Parish Council nominated her for a Village Hero award from South Cambridgeshire District Council.

Despite problems with her fingers and mobility as she grew older, the routine of putting out the daily stall became one of the things that kept her going, albeit with increasing help from Gill. It was still out every day until Easter of this year. When at last it did not appear, you knew there really was something wrong.

A light has gone out in Fen End, and in the community at large. But what a legacy she has left behind.
