WILLINGHAM MEN'S BREAKFAST

Willingham Men's Breakfast has been running for almost five and half years now, having started at the Baptist Church. We now have an average of at least 18 'breakfasters' of a variety of ages and backgrounds, from an initial six. We meet on a monthly basis at 7 45 am.

We usually alternate between the Baptist Church and the Octagon and cook breakfast at a modest £2.50 each (free to first-timers . . . once only!). Breakfast is followed by a speaker on a topic of interest including 'Men at their Workplace' and 'Men as Dads'. We have also heard about travels and voluntary work at home and overseas, including Kenya and Tanzania, and the ascent of Mount Kilimanjaro by a group, including four intrepid Willingham climbers, in January 2012, which raised thousands of pounds for charity.

Last month we had a return visit from John Preece on 'Mayday. Mayday, Mayday', recalling life as a pilot flying small aircraft with MAF (Ministry Aviation Fellowship) in Kenya, Uganda and Tanzania.

We sometimes have locals talking about their experiences. In January we had a 'hear-a-pin-drop-talk' by our local professor on '*Cancer – The What*? *Why*? *How*?

Oakington Air Cadet flies solo - before he can drive!

Sergeant Tristan Johnstone, who is a member of 2524 (Oakington) Squadron, completed the flight as the final part of a Gliding Scholarship with the Air Training Corps. He completed hours of training under the careful supervision of the instructors of 616 Volunteer Gliding Squadron (VGS) at RAF Henlow before his instructor stepped out of the aircraft to send him solo.



His flight was witnessed by several other members of the Squadron and the Squadron's Commanding Officer who were present to take part in some experience flights.

Cadets are able to apply for a Gliding Scholarship when they reach their 16th birthday. This means that they often fly solo before they can drive a car.

Sergeant Johnstone, who is looking to have a career in aviation, said 'My Gliding Scholarship course has been the best thing I have done in cadets so far. Despite being delayed by bad weather, I managed to make some very good friends and learn a lot about gliding. After touch down of my solo flight it took a while for it to sink in exactly what I had completed and it was one of the best feelings I have ever had.'

Sergeant Johnstone has been asked to join 616 VGS as a Staff Cadet where he will be able to continue his training towards becoming an instructor.

Pastoral Letter

March 2012 was very dry. Some water suppliers imposed restrictions. A hosepipe ban had been introduced in some parts of England, and then it started to rain. A few days before Christmas flood warnings were issued after heavy rain in many places including Cambridgeshire. Since then water has occupied much space in national and local news and people's conversation.

One day I was sitting comfortably on the Guided Bus on my way to Cambridge. Soon after we left St Ives Park and Ride, the biblical image of the Israelites passing through the Red Sea came to my mind. This image was inspired by what I saw through the windows of the bus; waters on the left and waters on the right and only the narrow way between them. Cambridge is not the Promised Land and St Ives has not much in common with the ancient Egypt, but water has the same incredible power. It can save life but it can also destroy it. For the Israelites going through the Red Sea it meant passing from slavery to freedom whereas for the Egyptians who followed them it meant death. There was also a pillar of fire guiding the Israelites during night journeys – one of biblical equivalents of satellite navigation systems.

Light and Water are important elements of the liturgical celebrations of the Easter Vigil, one of the richest and longest celebrations in the Catholic Church. The Easter Vigil begins after sunset, in darkness. We gather outside the church where we light the new Paschal Candle - a big white candle that is used throughout the Easter season and then throughout the year on special occasions, such as baptisms and funerals. It reminds us that Christ is our light. The priest or deacon carries the Paschal

Candle into the dark church and is followed by the members of the congregation holding little processional candles. We listen to the Exsultet, the hymn to praise Christ for saving us. The Liturgy of the Word follows. There are nine readings and eight psalms. They recount the history of salvation. Some of them may be omitted but there is one that must be read; the story of the Israelites passing through the Red Sea. At the Easter Vigil catechumens (those who have been receiving instructions in the principles of the Christian religion) are baptised. 'In Baptism we become members of the Body of Christ, sisters and brothers of our Redeemer, and children of God. We are freed from sin, snatched from death, and destined from then on for life in the joy of the redeemed' (Youcat). In the spirit of gratitude we renew our baptismal promises and are sprinkled with the Holy Water. The amount of water we use during Easter Vigil and during baptism is very little but its spiritual meaning is of great importance. It can be partly illustrated by the image of the waters of the Red Sea and the Israelites passing between them from slavery to freedom. To see its complete meaning we need to enter the final part of the Holy Saturday Liturgy – the celebration of Jesus' Resurrection. Thanks to the mystery of Easter it means not only passing from slavery to freedom but it means passing from death to life.

The Lord is Risen. The tomb is empty. The jouful 'Alleluia' fills our heart and lives.

More Choice in Social Care

Social care is provided to people who have been assessed as having substantial or critical support needs with personal care, getting meals, managing medication and staying safe.

If you need social care the County Council will arrange your care for you, but they now have a duty to offer and provide Direct Payments. Direct Payments are an alternative way of getting the care and support you need. They are cash payments made directly into a Direct Payment bank account so that you can use the money to make your own social care arrangements.

With a Direct Payment you have more choice, control and independence about how your care is organised. JOTTINGS FROM YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR

As you may know, I have decided not to stand for re-election to the County Council in May; by the time that Willingham News is published, nominations will have opened for the elections and I am now starting to go to meetings and other events for the last time, although I will continue working for you right up to election day. I have been very fortunate in having the support of Willingham Parish Council over the past sixteen years, which has made my work much easier. I would like to take this opportunity to thank all Parish Councillors, the Chairmen (four if I get my maths right!) and the clerks who have all gone above and beyond the call of duty during that time. I was also very fortunate, when Willingham Library was under threat of closure a couple of years ago to be able to work closely with the Friends group. Without them, I am not convinced that we would have managed to put forward such a good case to keep the library open. The Library - and village - is fortunate to have such a committed group of volunteers ready to give time and raise funds to maintain the future of the library.

Inevitably, it has not always been good; I remain extremely frustrated that I have not been able to get a solution to the problems of the B1050 and the bypass that Willingham desperately needs. I am sure my successor will take up that baton with vigour! The impact of Northstowe on Willingham is also something that we still cannot really predict, although I have worked with my district colleagues to try to ensure that impact on local communities is kept to a minimum; for example, routeing restrictions will ensure that aggregates used in the construction of the Northstowe will not go through Willingham. And do I dare mention the Guided Busway?! I am proud of my achievement, although I do accept that the feeder services have not materialised in the way I had hoped.

I have greatly enjoyed my time as a County Councillor, but it is now the right time to hand over to someone else. But I will continue working for you for the next few weeks. However, for the last time, I will say that until 3 May....

From the Police

Welcome to the Swavesey area update. Following some faceto-face consultation with local residents we have changed our parish updates to fall in line with your local neighbourhood. These updates will focus on your entire neighbourhood, and will give you a bigger picture of crime and disorder in and around your village and more information as to how to protect yourself from being a victim of crime. I hope these updates will also open out some of the work being carried out on your doorstep.

Over the last few months we've seen a shift from metal theft that is now subject to tighter regulation, as metal dealers must make electronic payments to customers. Unfortunately criminals will always find a way to make money, and have moved their attentions to fuel theft. In the last month there have been some significant thefts of motor fuel from commercial operations. I am sad to say that even multinational businesses do not protect themselves as they should, and over 30,000 litres of fuel was taken in one night from a petrol station locally. Residents with heating oil stored on their land need to think carefully about investing for the future in more secure tanks, automatic lighting and alarms. We are fortunate in many ways to live in a low crime area compared to rest of the UK. What that means however is that only limited officers are allocated by the Home Office to cover a vast area. Fuel theft can occur in any of our villages and towns pretty much any time, and the reality is that no number of patrolling PCSOs and Constables can totally prevent this kind of rural crime. If you'd like more advice about protecting your fuel tank you can get more info online by contacting our crime prevention officer.

We were pleased to report nearly a 50% reduction in

crime in Willingham in the last quarter. On 30 January, 10 of us took to the streets of Willingham to consult with residents about local issues. Lots of concerns were raised about the Recreation Ground and public safety. I found it really useful to discuss some of the incidents in person and also to put into context some of the issues being discussed between local parents. We have been in contact with the Willingham Action Group and the Parish Council, and there is some encouraging work being undertaken to improve the area. The facts: there have been two assaults reported in the last six months on the Recreation Ground, one leading to the imprisonment of a local male. This incident was intercepted by a PCSO who helped with the suspect's arrest on the same evening. The second was a fight between two 10 year olds. Neither incident has lead to any longer term issues that we know of. Our work with nearly 180 local residents indicated that the perception is much worse than reality. So what am I saying? In an ideal world I would have a police officer or PCSO to talk this kind of worry through with every resident, stand outside the school gate every day and always be on patrol as you leave your front door. We can't deliver this service to everyone, but do not hesitate to get in contact with us if you have any concerns.

Good news:

Three persons were arrested in Papworth in December for stealing fuel from a building site. All three were convicted at court and received a fine. Over the winter we have continued to tackle drug use and supply around the neighbourhood, the impact team executed drugs warrants on

addresses in Over and Willingham as well as having a number of successful arrests following stop searches. It's clear that cannabis use continues to be a problem and we should all discuss the dangers surrounding its use with our children. It is clear that our communities do not accept drug use or supply as support in the form of community intelligence remains impressive, thank you.

LOOKING BACK

(Acknowledgements to Mike Petty MBE)

At the end of last year, there was some controversy about the traffic in the vicinity of Willingham School. This was certainly not the first occasion. In October 1975 *Cambridge News* reported a Parish Councillor's claims that Willingham mothers had caused traffic jams by gossiping outside the School. The Councillor said that the mothers turned up at the School half an hour before the children were let out to have a 'chinwag'. One mother said traffic did get very bad at Thodays Close, but 'it is because there are a lot of cars'. However Headteacher Mr Roy Goodwin said, 'there is a lot of traffic for ten minutes, but within ten minutes the whole area is clear'.

The new School was opened in September and at that time Cambridge News reported that Willingham was a happy village. Mr Frank Rule, the owner of Berrycroft Stores, attributed this to there being a good mix of long established residents and go ahead newcomers who are genuinely interested in what goes on. However the opening of the new School and the fate of the former one built by the Parish about 1856 did cause some debate within the Village. Some residents thought that the former School should become a village hall as none existed. In November 1975 a Cambridge News article reported that a 1,000 signature protest petition was being sent to the Charity Commissioners by residents who were campaigning against the sale of the old primary school at Willingham - disused since pupils had moved into the new School in September. Willingham Social Club wanted to turn the School into a social centre because its present base - a small wooden hut on the opposite side of the road - was in poor condition, but the trustees claimed that under existing trust rules they had no option but to sell.
