LOOKING BACK No 2

Major football matches, particularly World and European cup-ties normally generate great passion. However even minor cup games can also sometimes generate highly charged atmospheres and this was the situation faced by the Willingham Football Eleven on 13 November 1937 when they visited Stretham for a 3rd Cambs Minor Cup match.

The newspaper headline was: 'Cambs FA Close A Ground, Disorderly Crowd at Stretham' and unfortunately it was the Willingham team that had been the victim of this outbreak of trouble.

The article reported that the referee had sent off C H Sadler of Stretham for dangerous play and abusive language. The official had also highlighted the spectators' disorderly conduct.

The Council agreed that both cases had been proved. Sadler was suspended for one month and the ground closed for two weeks, both dating from 14 December. The Stretham club was also severely disciplined for playing an ineligible man.

In 1950 there was brighter news for Willingham footballers. *Cambridge News* reported that a system of floodlighting to facilitate football training on dark evenings had been inaugurated on the Recreation Ground at Willingham. Floodlights for this purpose were an entirely new departure in this district and the system had been provided by the village football and supporters' club at a cost of over $\pounds120$. The Secretary of the County Football Association suggested the next thing to better the ground would be the erection of a stand. 'This club has risen from humble beginnings to be one of the soundest in this county', he said.

Pastoral Letter

After a very cold March and April which delayed spring and set back the growing season by about 6 weeks we are at last seeing spring. It is always a source of 'feel good factor' when we see the dull colours of winter being replaced with the fresh new growth of spring. For Christians this is a great reminder of the Creator God at work. Recent television programmes have shown some remarkable coverage of the details of nature at work. I was intrigued to watch one programme showing how the temperate forests of Canada are so dependent on the sea for their life. Great tall trees are fed nutrients from fish remains, left by grizzly bears, via a maze of tiny fungal webs. A tree core from a tree over 300 years old was DNA tested and found to be 85% fish!

Easter was celebrated very early this year and is another reminder of God as the source of new life. The resurrection of Jesus from the dead shows us that life is renewable. This month we celebrate Pentecost which marks the birth of the church when God sent his Spirit into the world to transform the lives of men and women; God putting his life into us and giving new gifts and abilities to believers. So the church was born and now is found in every part of the world albeit sometimes in the face of severe opposition. The church is a great family interconnected by means



of a common faith in Jesus Christ as the Son of God. It is through the church that God's presence in the world today is recognised. It is unfortunate that, at times, there are difficulties. This is because it is made up of people, all imperfect human beings who, though forgiven, are still on a journey in pursuit of perfection.

The Christian community, like the great forests of Canada, are intricately connected, supporting and feeding each other. In times past there was often a great amount of ill-feeling between different groups of churches but today there is much more of a sense of being part of one great family seeking to help each other and reaching out beyond 'the family' to help others in Jesus' name. Why not become part of this great family of God and see what a difference it can make in your sense of well-being, belonging, identity and purpose.

MAY BULLETIN FROM CAMBRIDGESHIRE FIRE AND RESCUE SERVICE

BONFIRE SAFETY: In the lead up to summer, if you are going to have a bonfire, ensure you take care when doing so:

- Before lighting, check children and animals are not hiding inside and are a safe distance away
- Never leave your bonfire unattended and dampen down with water if you have to leave it
- Do not light in unsuitable weather especially on windy days and take care that the smoke is not a nuisance to others, or obstructing traffic
- Never burn flammable liquids, aerosols, paint, foam furniture or tyres
- Build clear of buildings, including garden sheds, and hedges.

A huge thank you to residents who attended car washes held at many of our community fire stations in March. Firefighters spent many cold hours soaping up cars and raised more than $\pounds1,500$ for The Fire Fighters Charity.

Community groups can now bid to secure a slice of $\pounds 36,000$ from the Service's new Community Fund to help tackle arson in the county. See www.cambsfire.gov.uk/ 10604 for more information. Closing date 1 June.

The last of the Service's six new rescue pumps will be rolled out across Cambridgeshire this month, providing more life-saving equipment for fire crews who are first to arrive at the scene of incidents.

The service has also welcomed 13 new on-call firefighters into its ranks at various stations across the county during March. If you are interested in becoming an on-call firefighter, get in touch by calling 01480 444500.

Willingham Action Group – Crime Prevention

Speeding continues to be a problem in the village putting us all at risk but especially the younger and older members. In response the Police have suggested that, for our part, we start a Speedwatch initiative. In response WAG has agreed to act as the Speedwatch coordinators.

Last month, on 10 April, members of Willingham Neighbourhood Watch, NHW, were invited to a meeting addressed by Sir Graham Bright, the newly-appointed Cambridgeshire Police Commissioner.

Commissioners set police and crime objectives, the police budget and issue crime and disorder reduction grants; they also hold the police to account, making them answerable to the public.

A Commissioner's role is to support and, when necessary, challenge the Chief Constable. They must also work with local agencies such as local authorities, health, the Probation Trust, fire and rescue service and the criminal justice system, to ensure there is a joined-up approach to preventing and reducing crime. The Commissioner is ultimately held to account for performance by you, the public, every four years through the ballot box.

Sir Graham started the meeting by shaking everyone's hand and went on to outline his ideas on tackling crime. He recognises that burglary can devastate people's lives, especially the older generation's, and that it is not good enough for the police to arrive three days later with a crime number. He wants the police to arrive soon after the event when evidence can be collected. He also wants to train a few volunteers in counselling, as the police victim support unit may only get in touch five days after a trauma and he recognises some people may need support in the immediate aftermath of a crime.

He is also setting up the 'Alert' system. This system is new; the police complete details of crimes on the system on a daily basis and this can then be accessed by NHW members so that should people have witness information it will be submitted quickly. At the moment the ecops system only gives such details on a weekly basis. He has also had an immediate effect on response times for the 101 police number, dealing with less serious incidents. The time for someone at the police call centre to answer this number was often up to 10 minutes and it is now 30 seconds.

He has already set aside a sum of money to provide resources for NHW so that posters, pamphlets, signs and stickers will more 'freely' available. He mentioned other initiatives in the pipeline. He wants police to use electronic reporting of crimes on the beat. At the moment a police officer has to go back to the station to fill out paperwork before resuming duties. Using equipment such as a tablet computer means the officer remains active on the street and gets immediate feedback such as whether a car is taxed and insured or if the person whose name is entered in connection with an incident has 'previous.'

He certainly seems to want to bring quick and significant improvements to policing even though he was quick to remind us that South Cambridgeshire is one of the safest places to live.

Willingham Youth Centre on track for late 2013!

Following funding applications and local fundraising from individuals and businesses in the village (you know who you are and we thank you), plans to start work on the proposed Youth Centre, as part of a conversion of the Ploughman Hall, look set to start in the next couple of months.

Willingham Youth Trust, working with Willingham Parish Council, has jointly raised most of the funding required for the proposed two storey youth building which will house the youth club as well as seek to provide a number of other activities and support services for the young people of the village.

Although there is still a shortfall of around $\pounds 10,000$ the Council are now keen to see the project move forward and have generously agreed to cover the shortfall. It is hoped that a contractor might be appointed as early as May with work starting immediately.

Willingham Youth Trust is still looking to raise sufficient funds to equip the new facility for a proposed opening in September 2013.

You can help us by getting involved in our Spring for a Year campaign. A pot of $\pounds 15,000$ has been ring-fenced by Cambridgeshire Community Foundation for local groups, to encourage local, on-going support. Annual Parish Meeting

Although all Parish Council Meetings are open to the public, and the Council is always happy to see and hear from parishioners at their meetings, the Annual Parish Meeting is especially for the Parish community and is only hosted by the Parish Council. It provides an ideal opportunity to catch up with what has been happening over the previous year. There will be presentations from the Parish Council, County, District Councillors and the Police. Other village groups and voluntary village organisations will also be reporting on their activities. This year's meeting will be held in the Octagon at St. Mary and All Saints Church, at 7 30 on 15 May. The Parish Council hope you will be able to join them, voice your opinion or ask any questions.

Ploughman Hall Youth Conversion

A refreshed team at the Willingham Youth Trust is working with the Council to add a Youth Centre to the Ploughman Hall. There is more need than ever for this provision, as the Connections Bus is no longer visiting the village, and the Council hope to start building as soon as possible in order to open this year.

B1050

No-one who travels north from Willingham will be unaware of the dreadful state of the B1050. The Council has long campaigned for a replacement road and this month officers from Cambridgeshire County Council attended the Parish Council meeting to outline their plans. They have looked at the costs of a new road – both East and West of the current route – but say the costs are prohibitive. Instead, they plan to try 4 different methods of propping up the road to see which will be most effective – not just for the B1050, but for many similar roads in the county. The Council will keep you informed of more detailed plans as they become available, but be prepared for 24 hour closure for several weeks later this year when these works take place.

Street Lighting

The Council is aware of some problems with the new lighting columns. The Council is in contact with Balfour Beatty who have advised them that there are cabling problems outside of their control, but they will correct them as soon as possible.

Willingham Bird Report 2

Writing this piece one week into April, there is some hope that the daytime temperature might finally reach double figures! If you have found this endless cold spell hard to take, spare a thought for our birds. By this time of the year we would normally expect to see steady numbers of spring migrants reported on our shores. However, the continental high has continued to peg back migration to the UK and actually discouraged European winter migrants from returning home. Having discussed the waxwing in the last report, it is surprising to see that numbers of these are still reported around Cambridge. There are also still flocks of fieldfares and redwings, winter visitors from Scandinavia, to be seen in the fields around Willingham.

The cold spring weather has underlined the increasing importance of domestic gardens for our birds. We are used to filling up our bird feeders during the winter months, but a delayed spring makes these a vital resource even now as food supplies in the wild become exhausted. Birds are gearing up for the breeding season and need to be as strong as possible to succeed.

By the time the magazine is delivered, the days will be longer and (hopefully) warmer, and migration should be in full swing. At present only the hardiest sand martins and chiffchaffs have braved the trip from Africa, and many other early migrants have perished on arrival due to the freezing temperatures and lack of available food. By the beginning of May we should be able to see and hear the willow warbler, garden warbler, and whitethroat in hedges around

This is one of the older photos in the collection and it looks like a scene from a Thomas Hardy novel! The woman wears a traditional rural apron and the man leaning on the fence seems to be wearing a smock. This picture is probably taken around 1890. Although you would find no trace of this today, we know that this was the village 'pound' where stray animals would be placed; the owner would then have to pay a fine to retrieve them. The location of the pound was just on the corner of the road leading to the Recreation Ground by the lode. It is of course unsurprising that the short road alongside the lode is still called 'Pound Lane'.

We are very fortunate to have two excellent locations on our doorstep where spring bird-watching can be enjoyed. The RSPB have done a huge amount of work to improve the habitat at Fen Drayton lakes, not only for the kind of birds mentioned above, but also for wading birds that depend on inland sites for nesting. Last year's wet spring was a disaster for these birds. Early nesters were washed away and available nest sites were covered with water for the duration of the breeding season. Hopefully this spring will be drier and give these populations a chance to recover. Over Fen, meanwhile, is a great place to see one of our more dramatic summer visitors, the hobby. This is a small acrobatic falcon (about kestrel size) with characteristic 'moustache' markings, which hunts over water for its favourite prey of dragonflies. If we are really lucky, we may even get a visit from its European cousin, the red-footed falcon, which has been sighted at Fen Drayton in previous years.

A little further afield are the gravel pits at Little Paxton, one of best places in this area for nightingales. Admittedly, you would be more likely to hear than see these plain and secretive birds, but their song is so beautiful it would be worth the trip. In fact, spring is the optimum time for hearing all our birds as they sing to mark out territories and to attract a mate. So even if you can't tell a sparrow from a swallow, get out there and have a listen!
