The Community Orchard project is going well. My Ethiopian Christmas

The Coptic 13 month calendar - 12 months of 30 days and the 13th with all the left over days is standard in Ethiopia. Christmas, or Genna, is celebrated in early January. (I never did figure it out!) The festivities follow yet another massive fast of 40 days which ends with animals being herded, carried on any transport, or simply dragged to back yards. Prayer is important and everyone chooses either to stand through a 3 hour Christmas Eve or Christmas Day service from 4 am to 10 am! Which would you choose?



Ethiopians returning from the shops

Ethiopians don't have cards or wrapping paper; what a pointless exercise when you are busy trying to stay alive! Food gifts are more likely at a family gathering but this can extend to giving clothing to the local poor or disabled. The occasional westernised trees are on sale but they look so crazy; small fake green tinsel conifer trees they simply don't recognise, with strings of heavy plastic baubles of oranges, strawberries, Santas, all wired up on dodgy cables to plug in – electricity permitting.

My landlord, Hailom, had invited me to his house and as the taxi driver was on holiday I set off on the hour long hot dusty walk. I couldn't quite remember the final track so I rang him and was told 'Oh we have left to go to my brother's house. Meet us there.' Marvellous. Luckily I knew where that was, phew, but it meant a further 45 minute walk past a nasty ravine. Looking down I did see a couple of huge hyenas sniffing about. I arrived before he did, so I politely sat, smiled a lot, ate a meal of sour dough injera bread mopping up the spicy chewy meat stews, washed down by the traditional three coffees before he eventually turned up. 'Hurry up we have to get back to mine'. Great. Avoiding the heavy weight pudding, we all piled into the open van and bumped to his house. Thank goodness his brother vouched for me so I didn't have to eat quite a whole meal over again - Vicar of Dibley style - but I did have to swallow a lot more coffee. Being stuffed as well as wired, I needed the walk home before the buzzards and darkness came down. I was glad too I had taken with me a few little gifts of pens and balloons; small but meaningful to people who have nothing much.

The Duke of Wellington

The Duke of Wellington held its annual Halloween party on Saturday, 2 November. As usual it was a fun filled night with dressing up and silly Halloween games but doubling as a charity fund raiser; the Trick or Treat Lucky Dip raised £204.45 for the Milton Children's Hospice.

A few similar events have been organised over the past seven years with the generous support of their customers. Barry and many pub regulars grow the 'Mo's' for 'Movember' supporting Prostate Cancer, Fran ran the Great North Run for the Arthur Rank Hospice plus made a sponsored parachute jump for Cancer Research and Nigel Leaney's Race Night supported Help 4 Heroes. Some more daring regulars will remember Bungee Jumping in the pub car park to raise money for the Stevenage Garden House Hospice.

Mr Summer's article in the last edition of the *Willingham News* reminded us of the evolution of the Duke of Wellington over the years and its growth as the village has expanded.

Trying to research the pub's history is surprisingly difficult and considering it's the oldest trading public house left in the village, there isn't a lot of information readily available. We know that it used to be known as the 'Warriors' in 1765. Sadly however, in 2004 it was branded by the Cambridge Magistrate's court as a 'Den of Iniquity' and its licence was revoked after it became the centre of too much public disorder.

So, in 2006, Barry and Fran Todd took on the Duke of Wellington, a huge change from their telecoms and management backgrounds, to work to turn it around by refurbishing plus taking a hard line on unsociable behaviour.

With the traditional village pub under increasing threat, and although there is doubt over the future of the Black Bull, we hope the villagers of Willingham celebrate the fact that they still have the Duke of Wellington and the Bank which offer such a lot to their village and provide good, vital social focal points. The saying 'use them or lose them' couldn't be more appropriate during these times and we're sure Willingham publicans will be hoping to see you soon.

New Clerk

Dawn Spouge, who supported the Parish Council's work for the last seven years, has moved to East Sussex. We wish her every happiness there! Parish Councillors are delighted that Mrs Mandy Powell has agreed to become our new Parish Clerk. Mandy will be known to many of you in her previous role as Administrative Assistant to the Parish Council. We all wish her every success in this new role. The process of appointing a new Administrative Assistant will now start.

Youth Club

Progress with alterations to the Ploughman Hall to include youth club facilities has been slow. The Council has now successfully met all the necessary regulations with respect to changing the Hall structure. Builders will now be invited to re-tender for the alteration work which we hope will start early in 2014.

Ploughman Hall Car Park

The Parish Council have now installed a 2.2 metre height barrier at the entrance to the car park. This will mean the gate can be left open more often enabling easier access to the car park.

QEII Field

The Parish Council have agreed to replace the old worn fence which runs along the Lode in the QEII field. Work should commence on this in the next few weeks.

Street Lighting

Upgrading the village's street lighting has now been in process for nine months! Whilst many parts of the village have benefited from this upgrade there still remain ongoing issues with the installation of lights on some village streets. The Council is liaising with Balfour Beatty to ensure that any outstanding works are completed as soon as possible. The benefit of some new lights is being obscured by overgrown trees which create large areas of shadow. The Council will also work to get this issue resolved.

Cemetery

The old cherry tree has now been cut down and various trees trimmed where necessary. Work on the entrance beneath the gates will start shortly, if the weather permits!

Highways - Regional and Local

Parish Councillors maintain a vigilant overview of local highway developments, contributing to discussions and

decisions where possible. The public consultation on the A14 has now been completed and the responses received have to be analysed by the County Council. Local traffic flows are also being monitored closely by the County Council which help assess the current impact on the village of A14 congestion and the future impact of developing Northstowe. Finally, the Parish Council has expressed an interest in County Council funding to improve the village's bus shelter provision. The Council will also be considering bidding for monies awarded under the County Council's Local Highway Improvement Initiative, 2014-2015.

LOOKING BACK WILLINGHAM FEAST

The annual Willingham Feast is always highlighted in *Willingham News* but this is how the feast of 1910 was chronicled in the press.

The newspaper of Tuesday 11 October 1910 reported that this annual and much-looked-forward to event had come and gone. Relations and friends were arriving in the Village on Saturday and there have been many family reunions and meeting of old friends long parted. The Church bells early on Sunday morning heralded the festival – how the sixth bell was missed. During the afternoon the yearly parade of the Friendly Societies was held. Assembling on the Green in goodly numbers, the procession was marshalled and headed by the Salvation Army Band, and marched round the village. The band of the People's Mission brought up the rear. The day was fine and the streets were crowded.

On returning to the Green a meeting was held, at which the needs and claims of Addenbrooke's Hospital were set forth. Mr E Ingle presided, and speeches were made by the Rev A C Ashpool (of the Tabernacle), Mr Hills (Old Baptist Chapel), the Rev Quicke (Wesleyan), Mr W Thoday (Over), the Captain of the Salvation Army, and Mr T Langan (People's Mission). Young men with collecting boxes and wearing badges collected on behalf of the Hospital. They visited every house, and appealed to every onlooker and they succeeded in raising between £14 and £15.

During the week the village has been given over to gaiety. Messrs Thurston's motor roundabouts and shows, swings, stalls, were greatly in evidence. The weather on Tuesday and Wednesday was, unfortunately, unfavourable and doubtless many visitors from surrounding villages were kept away.

Messrs Thurston have received permission from the Parish Council to remain on the Green until Saturday evening, and the famous public entertainers devoted their Thursday 'takings' to Addenbrooke's Hospital.
