OWLS (Over, Willingham, Longstanton, and Swavesey) Community Car Scheme recently completed its 1000th journey. It was fitting that the recipient was Rhoda Yates, a regular 'customer' who has used the Scheme since it started two years ago. She says 'OWLS has been really useful to me. I've been taken to appointments at the doctor, dentist and hospital, and done some social things too, at a very reasonable cost.'

OWLS is run by local volunteers who support the community by giving their time as co-ordinators or drivers. Are you elderly or disabled, unable to access public transport and have no-one who can take you to appointments or to places where you can meet others? Perhaps you have an elderly relative or neighbour in this situation. OWLS Community Car Scheme offers eligible residents a door-to-door return service for a minimal charge (£3 plus 30p a mile for each mile over 10 miles).

For more information please ring the Scheme's mobile 07505 254363 between 9 am and 4 pm, Monday to Friday. To book a journey, please give at least 48 hours' notice. If your call is not answered, simply leave a message and a volunteer co-ordinator will respond within 24 hours. ## Cycle Legacy – Small Grant Fund

One of the greatest sporting events on the planet will be racing along the roads of Cambridgeshire this summer.

On Monday 7 July, Cambridge will host the start of the third stage of 'Le Tour De France'. The riders will set off from Parkers Piece, cycling through the historic city streets and then into the beautiful south Cambridgeshire countryside before heading up to London for the conclusion of the stage on The Mall.

In celebration of this exciting event, Cambridgeshire County Council has announced the Cycle Legacy Small Grant Fund.

Small grants are now available and will be awarded to local groups and organisations to support activities or events linked to and inspired by cycling or the race. The Council is hoping that groups will design and deliver activities within their community that involve and motivate people to create a lasting and positive legacy to mark this historic occasion for Cambridgeshire.

Each grant will be up to a maximum of £500 and additional funding or support in kind will be expected.

The grants are being awarded in three rounds. The deadlines for applications for the remaining rounds are 7 March and 11 April.

## **LOOKING BACK**

November's *Willingham News* carried an advert inviting applications for the tenancy of one of the Josiah Smith home's in Over Road. Looking Back, the CIP newspaper of 28 July 1967 had a picture of the official opening of these new bungalows along with an article outlining the background history of the project.

Mr W H Law, chairman of the Parochial Trustees, reported that money and property, including Ivy House, had been left to the parish for them to administer. However it was considered unsuitable as a home for the blind or orphan babies, and the Trustees decided to sell it and build bungalows for the elderly.

The permission for this was not granted by the Charity Commissioners until 1960. In the meantime, the Trustees had had provisional plans drawn up, but planning permission to build in School House Yard, nearer the centre of Willingham could not be obtained.

Fortunately, Mrs James Smith came to the rescue and offered to sell the land on which the bungalows now stand. The first money from the bequest was not handed over by the Commissioners until the end of 1965 and the balance was paid early in 1966. Building began in April 1966.

The bungalows had been made possible by the generous bequests of Miss Hilda Smith and Mr Cyrus Smith in memory of their father, Mr Josiah Smith. They were opened by Miss Agnes Smith, aged 87, the oldest living descendant of Josiah Smith. She received a bouquet from the oldest of the six tenants, Mrs Mary Hopkins, aged 79.

## **Old Willingham**



This building stood on the corner of the green by Priest Lane. Today you would be standing outside the current library to take this shot, but the building itself is long gone. There are two cottages, one having a shop front, and a large shared inglenook fireplace in the middle. This picture was probably taken about 1930, but after World War II the owner, Mr Sutherland, plastered over the brickwork and painted it all white except for black fake timber beams, moulded into the plaster to look like a Tudor style building. He also covered the upper windows and painted three large scenes of sailing galleons at sea with sails billowing in the wind. ## **World War 1 Memories**

As mentioned in the last magazine, this year marks the centenary of the outbreak of World War 1. To reflect this, we are hoping that readers will send us accounts of their family experiences of this time so that we can include something in each edition.

This month Martin Hale of Rampton End shares memories of his grandfather.

During 1916 my grandfather William and his brother John were both sent from Nazeing in Essex to fight in the Somme. John was killed in action during November 1916. William was wounded when a German bullet removed some fingers from his right hand as he was firing his trusty Martini-Henry service rifle. He was repatriated as a war casualty.

During the crossing on the hospital ship from France to England, he was so traumatised by the injuries that he witnessed, the painful sounds he heard, the smells of early anaesthetics and consequent deaths, that he swore to himself that never again would he visit the sea, dentist, doctor or a hospital; when he had a toothache he simply removed the offending tooth himself.

He kept this oath for 53 years, until in 1969 his daughter Audrey, who had settled in Ohio, came to visit. Fearing that she might never see him again and wanting to make a special day out together, she convinced him to visit the sea once more, offering to drive him to Southend-on-Sea. He finally agreed and on arrival they parked along the esplanade

When Audrey opened the car door for him to alight onto the pavement, William's eyes fixed upon an elderly gentleman walking towards him. Their eyes met instinctively and knowingly; they had both recognised each other from when they shared that same hospital ship some 53 years earlier.

Until his death my grandfather always called me Martini Henry, after his service rifle.

**Chemist application in Longstanton** You may have heard that the appeal application by a pharmacy chain to open a chemist shop in Longstanton has been rejected by the independent NHS Litigation Authority. We would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who supported the practice. This comes as a great relief as it means that we will not have to close our dispensary at Longstanton Branch Surgery. The decision will ensure the continued viability of Longstanton Surgery into the future.

Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment Consultation This is your chance to have a say on local pharmacies and dispensaries in Cambridgeshire. The local Clinical Commissioning Group and Cambridgeshire County Council are running a consultation period until Friday 21 February. Pick up a questionnaire and prepaid envelope dispensary or pharmacy or go to our from www.cambridgeshireinsight.org.uk/JSNA/PNA. The key findings from the initial consultation with GPs, community pharmacies and patients were that services provided locally were excellent and adequate for the area and no need was identified for new service providers. We encourage you to read a copy of the consultation document and give your views.

The new 111 service is now up and running in Cambridgeshire. There may be a few 'teething troubles' until staff and patients are familiar with the new arrangements. Please do give us feedback on your experiences so we can help make sure that everything runs smoothly. If you ring the old Urgent Care Cambridge telephone number, your call will be diverted to 111 who will triage and then transfer you to the appropriate out of hours' service for you. This could well be Urgent Care Cambridge.

Last year poor use of A & E cost the local CCG  $\pounds$ 1.3 million. This could have treated 360 heart attacks or bought 230 hip replacements in the Cambridge and Peterborough area. Please use the correct out of hours' service this winter.

Unfortunately, the New Year Bank Holiday meant that the *Willingham News* deadline was before the January meeting of the Parish Council, so we are unable to include our usual report. Instead, and in keeping with the season, we have compiled an end of year report.

Willingham Parish Council have over the past year continued to maintain the Ploughman Hall, Public Hall, Pavilion, Recreation Ground and playing fields. This year has been a little quieter than the previous one in terms of projects, though we did spend a substantial sum of money repairing the drainage system to the Recreation Ground which appears to have solved the flooding problems.

The Parish Council invested considerable sums supporting the youth of the village, both by direct funding and providing facilities free of charge.

We have continued to press for improvements to the B1050. Although the need for a bypass is acknowledged by the County Council, there is still no sign of any source of funding. At least the latest works have improved rather than worsened the road surface, if only marginally.

We have done our best to liaise with Balfour Beatty regarding the new street lighting and we will carry on pressing them to complete the work to a satisfactory standard.

The Council has enjoyed a *fruitful* year working with Willingham Action Group – particularly in regard to tree planting which is on-going, and in developing plans for new play equipment.

We hope to proceed in the next few months with the conversion of part of the Ploughman Hall into a dedicated youth facility.

We have had a number of arrivals and departures on the Parish Council this year and have ended up with a single vacancy which will be filled at the elections in May. If you would like to know more about what is involved, please either contact the office or any of the councillors listed below for an informal chat. It should be remembered that all councillors give their time completely freely, with neither remuneration nor expenses.

A long overdue update of the office IT equipment has given us the opportunity to make some much-needed improvements to the Parish Council website – keep an eye out for these during the year.

Lastly, in October we said goodbye to our clerk, Dawn Spouge, who has moved to another part of the country. The new clerk is our former office administrator, Mandy Powell, and we wish her all the best in her new role.

## **Nature Notes**

2013 was a year of unexpected and noteworthy weather. Nature reports in the early editions of last year's Willingham News were a tale of problems for wildlife as a result of winter flooding followed by a prolonged cold spring. This was in addition to a miserable summer in 2012 which adversely affected all kinds of wildlife. What would the summer and autumn bring?

In the end wildlife could not have asked for better conditions as we experienced our best summer for many years, then a beautiful autumn. Many insect species, whose numbers were becoming dangerously low after several poor summers, had a chance to recover. Butterflies were especially visible in our gardens even into the autumn. The dry weather suppressed the number of slugs and snails, but this was no doubt good news for the gardeners amongst us.

Increased insect numbers was in turn good news for birds, contributing to the success of the breeding season. Ideal growing conditions resulted in a massive crop of wild nuts and berries which benefited both birds and small mammals.

Our activities include a programme of talks covering a wide range of archaeological topics, both local and far and wide, as well as visits to museums and excavations. Our major fieldwork venture is the Pence Project' 'Twenty \_ an exploration of part of a Romano-British settlement north of

Cottenham. For two weeks each July since 2011, we have dug test pits and trenches to study features revealed by geophysics. We have excavated several ditches and found that they contained a wide variety of pottery – over 40 different types from the Roman period or earlier – as well as cow, sheep/goat, horse and pig bones. (Archaeologists love ditches and the rubbish accumulated in them!)

The weather played its part in how much we achieved in 2013. The topsoil was removed by machine and the subsoil baked hard in the hot, dry conditions, providing a different challenge from last year's prolonged rain. A real surprise was the discovery of a straight-edged feature which might mark the site of a corn-drying oven or malting floor; further excavation will be needed to investigate this.

Participants included members of FEAG and members of other local archaeology groups – everyone was welcome whatever their level of experience.

If you are interested in history or archaeology, come and join us for talks, visits or fieldwork. Membership costs just  $\pounds 10$  per year. #### Nature Notes continued

This abundance of wild food appears to have resulted in few birds in our gardens in the autumn with numbers only seeming to increase now that we have had an influx of the usual Scandinavian thrushes and blackbirds. An interesting garden visitor to Short Lane was a lovely mistle thrush which decided that any trees or bushes with berries were its own territory. This it defended in a highly vocal and aggressive manner. All incomers were successfully repelled for several weeks until finally it was outnumbered by an

influx of blackbirds. The mistle thrush vanished and all berries were swiftly consumed.

Our Scandinavian visitors must be relishing the mild winter temperatures - at the time of writing we have had virtually no sharp frosts, let alone any really wintry weather. Spring bulbs are shooting up in the garden. It seems optimistic to hope that this might continue until the spring, but perhaps we are in for another year of unexpected weather.
