LOOKING BACK – The Great War

The editorial in January's *Willingham News* highlighted the special significance of this year in the history of our country and requested readers to submit stories relating to the Great War. Looking Back, the *Cambridge Chronicle* and *University Journal* of 22 December 1915 carried an article including photographs on the Red Cross Hospital at Willingham that had opened on 21 January of that year.

The hospital was managed by Cambridgeshire Voluntary Army Detachment 26 and the paper reported that up until that date, 158 patients had passed through the hospital. Each had expressed their gratitude for the benefits received during their stay at the hospital. All the work was entirely voluntary and Cambridgeshire. 15, under Mr E J Frohock, Commandant, were responsible for the night orderlies.

The officers of the hospital were: Mrs L M King, Commandant; Nurse Jacquest, Lady Superintendent; Mrs F Cole, Quarter-Master; and, Mrs F Frohock, Assistant Quarter-Master.

The article described the activities of the Willingham VAD since the outbreak of war. In August 1914 money from a door to door collection had been used to convert the Parish Room into a temporary hospital housing 20 beds and their requisite furniture. In addition, a certain amount of medical stores was obtained from the neighbourhood. A working party was formed and this made 401 garments and 340 bandages, some of which were despatched to the Central Office. In the last 3 months of 1914, First Aid classes had been held and at the examination, 23 out of the 25 candidates passed. The detachment had also taken part in attending to the needs of the wounded soldiers arriving at Cambridge Station.

The hospital was mobilised for 20 convalescents on 21 January 1915 by the detachment and the aid of Cambridgeshire 15 (men). After the hospital opened the entire staff had worked excellently and during the period, two of the nurses had left to become probationers in hospitals carrying out military work.

On 12 September, the hospital was closed for cleaning and re-opened on 14 October, after a major improvement programme which included painting and the provision of many improvements for the comfort of the patients.

Old Willingham

The old Church Hall on Church Street (now a private house) has been used for many things since it was constructed at the end of the 19th century including meetings, parties for young and old and, of course, shows by WAMADS. But during the First World War it was used as a hospital. In this month's photo we see the nurses, staff and some of the recovering patients outside the gate. The sign on the gate reads 'Willingham Hospital, VAD Cambridge. No admittance without permission of the Commandant'. Other places in the village provided beds for soldiers including the gallery at the rear of the Church (now removed) where some of the soldiers carved their names into the walls.

Two of our oldest village residents recognised the house which appeared in last month's issue and which used to sit on the corner of the Green by Priest Lane. We have combined the information as follows:

The left end of the building was a watch repairer and jeweller run by Walter Miles. His name was emblazoned across the board above the window so it is possible the picture was taken after he retired and the sign painted out. To the right was a bake-house run by Jonsey Gadsby and family, who made a very popular fruit cake always known as 'Jonsies cake'. As often with bakers the oven was available for a small fee and one of our contributors remembers 'taking a cake or something that my Aunt had made to be cooked there'.

Top Award for Willingham Guide

Our early January meeting had less business to conduct than usual. In its February meeting, however, the Parish Council was required to take some important decisions

The Ploughman Hall

In the Autumn of 2013 four local builders tendered for works to convert underused parts of the Ploughman Hall into a youth club facility managed by the Willingham Youth Trust. The process required several discussions with the Council's professional adviser and the seeking of more information from each builder about the content of their tender. Having received that information it has now been formally agreed that the tender supplied by Edgar Farrell Construction, a Willingham based builder, should be accepted. It is hoped that the conversion work will start after this Easter and be completed as promptly as conditions allow. Funding for the project will come from a variety of sources. These include a grant from the South Cambridgeshire District Council, Willingham Youth Trust resources and community infrastructure money paid by housing developers.

Liaison with Willingham Action Group

The Willingham Action Group (WAG) is justifiably proud of its achievement in planting the community orchard at the Old Recreation Ground on Earith Road. Nearly 700 trees have been planted, with more to follow! It is still possible to sponsor a tree. Members of the Parish Council were disappointed that this fantastic achievement was put at risk when a recently provided entrance gate to the Old Recreation Ground was stolen. It was swiftly replaced.

The Parish Council has also been part of a joint working party with WAG to enhance the play equipment at the QE II Field, adjacent to the Ploughman Hall. The working party has identified a preferred supplier, Proludic, a decision which has been endorsed by the Parish Council. A detailed design will be developed, approvals sought and funding applied for. The majority of the funding will come from external sources.

Street Lighting

The February Parish Council meeting was attended by representatives of Balfour Beatty so that our views on the slow progress with upgrading the village's street lighting could be presented. Whilst the Balfour Beatty representatives tried to be generally positive about progress they seemed to have little awareness of the negative impact this long drawn out project has had on the village. A greater level of activity by Balfour Beatty employees has been observed recently in the village so it is hoped that the end is in sight!

Northstowe

The initial stage of building Northstowe will now be moving forward following agreement on the amount that the developers will contribute to infrastructure costs. A substantial amount of this payment relates to transport initiatives. The Parish Council is disappointed that there is no money specifically set aside for improving the B1050 although the monitoring of traffic flows will continue. The current official view is, apparently, that the B1050 can 'cope'.

The Community Chest

South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) continues to run a well resourced Community Chest grant scheme. The scheme offers grants of up to £1,500 to voluntary and community groups and Parish Councils for one-off costs relating to a specific project or activity. Applications can still be made for the 2013-2014 year – check out the SCDC website at www.scambs.gov.uk/content/community-chestgrants-201314 - for more information on how to apply. Parish Council members will be happy to advise if needed.

Over Day Centre

Over Day Centre provides social care for older residents of local villages, with a large number of these living in Willingham. In recognition of this work, the Parish Council was pleased to respond positively to a request for a donation to the ongoing costs of the care packages provided by the Day Centre.

Pastoral Letter

In 1763, travelling along the gorge of Burrington Combe in the Mendip Hills in Somerset, the Reverend Augustus Toplady was suddenly caught in a storm and found shelter in a cleft in the rocky gorge. As he sheltered it is said he drew inspiration for the well- known hymn 'Rock of Ages,' scribbling down the words on a playing card and later refining them into the words we have today. Debbie and I have often driven past the spot where the Reverend Toplady was believed to have sheltered and composed the framework of this hymn and on occasion we have stopped and looked at the opening where he was protected from the storm. Cheddar Gorge is not too far away and the area in general is very popular with rock climbers and walkers.

Inspiration can come in so many ways and on this occasion a storm and a cleft in a rock inspired the writing of a song which has brought comfort and strength to many people particularly during the storms of life. It is surprising what can be achieved in a few solitary moments when something as negative as a storm can be turned into something positive and full of hope. In scripture God is often referred to as a rock. In 2 Samuel we read, 'The Lord is my rock, my fortress and my deliverer; my God is my rock, in whom I take refuge, my shield and the horn of my salvation' (2 Samuel 22:2-3 NIV) and in the book of Isaiah, 'Trust in the Lord for ever, for the Lord, the Lord, is the Rock eternal' (Isaiah 26:4 NIV). In the New Testament Jesus invites us to consider on what or with whom we build our lives by comparing two builders; one who built his house upon solid rock and the other upon sinking sand (See Matthew 7:24-27 and Luke 6:46-49).

Our Rock is a Rock of Ages and that means every age including ours. 'The Lord is the Rock eternal' and in every age people can discover and take refuge in Him whatever their need. Our true security is found only in God who transcends any other foundation upon which we build our lives. He alone is our refuge and strength. He alone is our salvation.

'Not the labours of my hands Can fulfil thy law's demands; Could my zeal no respite know, Could my tears for ever flow, All for sin could not atone; Thou must save, and thou alone'.

Community Lifeline Service

Residents are being reminded of a valuable community lifeline service run by South Cambridgeshire District Council. The service provides alarm equipment to help anyone of any age to feel safer, more protected and independent in their own home.

The equipment gives people peace of mind by offering the reassurance of 24-hour emergency assistance at the touch of a button on a pendant or wristband.

When activated, the button raises an alarm and connects the user directly to trained staff who speak to them via a small unit installed close to their telephone. Those staff will instantly know the name, address and health details of the user, raise the relevant help and, where requested, notify friends, family or neighbours The pendant and wristbands work within a 50 metre radius of the unit so are very effective within properties as well as gardens.

This equipment supports a host of additional telecare technology, including smoke detectors, fall detectors and bed sensors, and costs as little as $\pounds 20$ to install and $\pounds 4.26$ a week.
