Community Orchard and Woodland

Thought was first given to reclaiming and regenerating a long-abandoned orchard in the village some years ago but attention then switched to the Old Recreation Ground as a potential 'green field' site. After due process the Willingham Parish Council agreed, thus giving the scope to plant both woodland and orchard areas. The WAG Tree Project, funded through the Big Tree Plant, comprises planting within the village, the QEII and the wider Parish as well as the Old Recreation Ground, which represents the 'flagship' component.

The woodland features a mix of native species designed to benefit wild life and provide visual interest. It is planned to establish a patch of basket willow and hazel will also provide useful material. As the woodland becomes established, paths linking clearings will be created. A circular area has been left unplanted on the border with the orchard for gatherings and picnics.

The orchard has been planted on a traditional wide spacing with many trees on vigorous rootstock to preserve space under the canopy, as well as providing future veteran trees. Orchard trees have been selected to provide as wide a mix of fruits and nuts as possible, including local heritage varieties, benefiting both wild life and the community.

Advice will be taken on maintenance, developing biodiversity and habitat that will ensure that the village community has a legacy to be proud of and enjoy.

The pub on the end (Rose and Crown) is still there today, although substantially altered and no longer a pub. The large building further up is the Baptist Chapel which was opposite the Baptist Tabernacle – both by location and some religious views! But what is engaging about the photo are the two very separate groups of people. In the foreground, five young soldiers with a couple of old fellows from the village. At a safe distance a large group of women and children. We can only wonder now at what was going on in this picture.

World War I – Munitions Workers

Women were called upon to make armaments for the war. The photo shows some of the women (called canaries as the chemicals they worked with turned their skin yellow) along with the foremen, presumably turned down as too old to fight or on medical grounds. Also proving 'life goes on' the foremen had a bowling club – the area of Newcastle is Elswick/Scotswood.

WEEE Collection:

Last year the Parish Council and WAG organised a kerbside collection of electrical equipment by WISER Recycling. This proved highly successful; over ninety tonnes of goods were collected; the village gained around £360 which was given to WAG to help meet administrative costs and in recognition of the valuable work they do on a number of village projects. We intend to organise another, provisionally planned for 3 July – details to follow. The collection covers electrical and electronic goods from household appliances to phones, cameras, light bulbs and tubes. Assistance can be provided to move heavier items. Everything you recycle will contribute towards money raised for the village so don't throw it away!

County Council:

Ray Manning has decided to concentrate his energy on District Council and Parish Council issues and has resigned his position as a County Councillor. Ray does a huge amount of work for our village and as well as running a fruit farm business and does a second, almost full-time job, as leader of SCDC. Finding time to deal with the machinations of our County Council proved a step too far. Thanks to Ray for all he does and will continue to do. A byelection will follow in due course.

Summer Reading Challenge:

Many readers will remember the battle with the County Council over our library which was threatened with closure. Thanks to the support of residents, Friends of Willingham Library and the Parish Council this threat was seen off, at least for now. The library provides a host of useful services, not least the Summer Reading Challenge which the Parish Council is very pleased to support with an increased grant this year of £600. The money goes to funding events and prizes and the Parish Council is delighted to be able to help this excellent cause for the benefit of children in our community.

Old Willingham Map:

Those villagers who attended Willingham Primary School may remember a very large-scale map of the village hanging in the old hall, showing the village around a hundred years ago. It was an impressive and historically interesting document that sadly fell into a state of disrepair. In 2007 the archivist at Cambridge County Council was asked if it could be restored. Yes, but at a cost of £10,000. The Parish Council was disinclined to spend that amount. However, the price is now £1,000. Therefore, the restoration work will go ahead and the map will be returned to the school.

Elections:

By the time you read this it will be too late to put your name forward to be a Parish Councillor. There may not be a Parish Council election on 22 May; if there are fewer candidates than posts then those that applied will be elected automatically. The existing Parish Council is hopeful there will be a Parish Election and that you tell us by your votes how good or bad a job we are doing. In any event there will be other elections on that day. Please go and vote. You may not think so but your voice matters.

Buying a puppy from someone you don't know?

At Trading Standards we have seen an increase in puppies being imported for sale online or via newspaper advertisements but which have not been properly vaccinated against rabies. There is a potential risk of bringing rabies into the UK – plus rabies poses a serious health risk to families.

Our advice:

- Go with someone to meet the puppy, its mother and litter more than once.
- Ask where the puppy was born. If it was born in Europe it should have a pet passport and from elsewhere it should have a Veterinary Certificate. Ensure that the description in the passport or certificate matches the puppy, particularly its age. Check it has been vaccinated against rabies and treated for tapeworm. Usually a rabies vaccination will not work on a puppy younger than 3 months old so verify this. The scanned microchip should match the documentation. If you have any concerns, speak to a vet before buying it.
- Advertisers will not always make it clear a puppy has been imported unless they say it has a passport or Europass etc, but tell-tale signs are: a low price, the language used in the advert (which may suggest the advertiser is not English eg describing the puppy as 'potty trained') and the way the puppy is photographed (often importers accessorise puppies.)
- If they are advertised as pedigrees ask to see their pedigree papers and ensure the breeder's name is on them. Make sure you are handed the papers at the time of purchase.
- You could use an RSPCA and Animal Welfare Foundation's Puppy Contract (www.puppycontract.org.uk) which is a legally binding contract requiring certain information of the puppy's background and health.
- If you suspect the seller is operating an illegal puppy farm, contact the local district council. If you suspect animal cruelty, contact the RSPCA on 0300 1234 999. If you suspect a puppy has been imported without vaccination or a valid passport, report it to Trading Standards advice partner, Citizens Advice Consumer Helpline: 08454 040506.
- Finally, puppies should not leave their mothers until they are at least 8 weeks old.

Spotlight on scams and mis-selling

Recently the press has covered the story of Sylvia Kneller, a pensioner who lost over $\pounds 200,000$ to scam letters, ever hopeful that a big windfall would be hers.

At Trading Standards we sadly come across residents in Cambridgeshire who have lost significant sums of money to scams, typically operated by career criminals.

Scam letters

• Commonly these claim you have won a prize and ask for a small payment in advance ... and then another, each time requesting a larger sum with no prize. We also frequently uncover letters from supposed 'clairvoyants' who claim they can bring you luck or protect you from harm in exchange for payments.

Telephone scams

- Beware of callers who claim to be calling about nonpayment of telephone bills and threatening to disconnect you unless immediate payment is made. Check the facts and contact your provider on the number provided in your paperwork. Ensure there is a dialling tone before calling as the fraudsters could remain on the line ready to pose as your service provider. If there is no dialling tone, try again in 5 minutes.
- You may experience a series of silent calls, followed by a call from a company offering to help prevent silent calls, for a fee. This call is made by the same fraudsters who were making the silent calls.

Door-to-door callers

- With regards to house alarms, beware of telesales calls offering an alarm system at virtually no cost.
- Beware of any trader who knocks at the door offering to do home improvement or gardening work for you.
- Be cautious of door-to-door callers who claim to be exconvicts trying to turn their lives around by selling domestic products.

A REMINDER – Re-Paint

Supporting Businesses and Communities has been working with Cambridgeshire Community Reuse and Recycling Network (CCORRN)'s Community RePaint scheme which was launched in 2011. It involves the collection and sorting of paint from household recycling centres; any reuseable paint is offered for sale at low cost (significantly lower than buying from a DIY retail supplier) eg the RRP of 2.5 litres of Crown or Dulux coloured emulsion is currently £17.99 whereas the CCORRN price for the same product is £4.00.

Pastoral Letter

We moved into a lovely cottage in autumn 1998. At the time we had no idea we would be sharing occupancy with another couple, but when the spring of 1999 came, two unexpected visitors arrived. We learned they had a second home in South Africa and spent many hours every year travelling back and forth to Willingham. They were wonderful, skilful, resourceful individuals. Year after year they would slip away in the autumn, to re-appear on cue at the beginning of May. They were, of course, a pair of spotted flycatchers, tiny birds no bigger than sparrows, but with amazing navigational skills (sustaining them throughout their long migrations) and aerobatics (underpinning their daily hunt for food). They built a neat nest in the external pipework and raised families of hungry chicks. They were good parents too.

Somehow we felt honoured they should choose to stay with us. When 2005 came, we waited for our friends' Maytime arrival with sinking hearts. They never came, neither that year nor any other since, and we felt bereaved. Had our birds died of old age, or been trapped by hunters, or perished off-course and exhausted somewhere in the Sahara desert, or simply chosen another home in the UK? Who knows?

But these tiny birds left us with much to ponder over. Today's scientists are still piecing together the multiple factors that guide the flycatchers' navigation – a combination of solar and stellar navigation, geomagnetism and a 'mind map' – a set of mental images that allows the bird to fly from landmark to landmark.

Jesus used little birds with short lives to show the rich, deep love of God for even the lowliest creatures. 'Aren't five sparrows sold for two pennies?' He asked the disciples, 'yet not one of them is forgotten by God.' The warmth of His words makes it clear that He loves His little sparrows.

The Bible narrative (recorded in the gospels of Mark and Luke) shows that Jesus was expressing his love for humankind – a love that extends to us today. 'Don't be afraid,' He said, 'You are worth more than many sparrows. Come to me all you who are weary and burdened. Take my yoke upon you and learn from Me.' We have no hard-wired mind maps and no magnetic field sensors to guide us through life, but we have a Redeemer, who has given his all to bring us to God.

GARDENING TIPS FOR MAY

If you have not carried out these tasks already it is not a problem but the later you wait, the longer before your garden benefits from a spot of TLC.

- Keep weeds under control garden plants should benefit from nutrients not the weeds.
- Prune your roses and tie in climbing and rambling roses. Shoots/branches tied in the horizontal will encourage flowering shoots.
- Sow hardy annuals and indoor salad crops. Wait for frost-free weather before doing so outdoors.
- Increase water to houseplants.
- Feed hungry shrubs and roses.
- Start to sow or repair lawns.
- Divide snowdrops while still 'in the green' and give them liquid feed. If they have already disappeared underground, water the soil where they were.

LOOKING BACK The Jeeps Family

Elections for the Parish Council are due to take place this month and in past years the name of Jeeps featured greatly in the Parish annals. Looking Back, the *Cambridge News* of 19 May 1965 reported on a recent Parish Council election and highlighted the prominent position of the Jeeps' clan.

The article informed readers that a number of the Jeeps family had been returned to the Parish Council with the firm backing of the electorate. It said that twenty branches of the family lived in the village and that the name Jeeps had appeared more than 50 times on the voting register. Five of the 15 seats on the Parish Council were now held by people named Jeeps. Three members were closely related, while the other two had more distant ties.



Mr Francis Jeeps, who was also chairman of the Cambridgeshire and Isle of Ely County Council, was the longest serving member of the Council. His associations went back before the last World War when he was the Clerk. After the war he became a member and had been Chairman for the past 10 years.

His brother Sydney had nearly 20 years' service but the other Jeeps are relative newcomers, having been on the Council for about 6 years.

The most well-known Jeeps was, of course, Richard, son of the chairman and a former skipper of the England rugby team. His popularity on the rugby field may have accounted for his very high share of the votes.

Dennis and Kenneth Jeeps who were the other successful candidates were not directly related to the others.

The newspaper reported that Francis Jeeps did toy with the idea of not standing at the election because he felt people might get fed up with too many members of the family on the Council. However he had been persuaded to change his mind and was complimented on having a legal mind, capable of grasping any subject.

The tailpiece of the article reported that the Clerk to the Parish Council was ... Mr Grenville Jeeps.
