Gardening Tips for June

- Spray roses with insecticide to kill aphids.
- Hardy annuals grown indoors or in a cold frame can now be planted out in borders, tubs or baskets if they have been hardened off.
- Newly sown or repaired lawns should be kept watered. Recently fertilised lawns may need additional mowing.
- There is still time to sow runner beans, peas or other garden vegetables. Use peat pots for this for the ease of transplantation later.
- Plant lettuce in containers for convenience, keeping back some seed for repeat sowing through the summer.

From the Parish Council

Our meeting in May was the last formal meeting of the current Council before the local and EU elections were held on 22 May. Nonetheless, areas of activity were discussed and action agreed.

Elections

Last month it was reported that if there were insufficient numbers of candidates nominated for the Parish Council then there would not be a Parish Council election on 22 May. This has proved to be the case – thirteen people have been nominated and two casual vacancies now exist. If you have any interest in joining the Council please have an initial discussion with either the Chair of the Council or the Parish Clerk.

One member of the current Council has decided not to stand for the new Council. Geoff Pake has provided invaluable help to many of the Council's activities despite also running a busy electrical business. His technical expertise will be missed! The Council thanks Geoff for all his contributions to Willingham life.

The Parish Council Annual Meeting and the Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Meeting of the Parish Council will be held on 4 June. The business of this meeting includes the appointment of Council officers and the presentation of Annual Reports by the lead Councillors responsible for specific areas of Council activity. This is followed by the Annual Parish Meeting on 18 June at 7 30 pm. This meeting is facilitated by the Parish Council and is the opportunity for community groups that have received Parish Council support to report back on their activities and present their accounts. Parish Councillors attend this meeting as members of the public. Do come along and hear what the various groups have been doing in the village.

The Ploughman Hall

The Parish Council has engaged Edgar Farrell Construction, a Willingham based builder, to undertake the conversion work in the Ploughman Hall to create a much needed youth facility. The building work started on 27 May and the Council expects it will be completed as promptly as conditions allow. This will enable a smooth handover of the finished facility to the Willingham Youth Trust. During this work there may be a possible reduction in available spaces in the car park to allow for storage of building materials and plant. Every effort will be made to minimise any disturbance to the ongoing activities taking place in the Hall.

Public Hall Works

In the coming months there will also be some maintenance and improvement work taking place at the Public Hall. Firstly, the windows to the front and rear of the building will be repaired and renovated prior to them being painted. Secondly, the Council has agreed to a request to remove an internal wall on the ground floor of the Hall. This will help ensure the continuing successful activities of the Willingham Scout Group.

The Great War Project Event

The Great War, Between the Lines Project is being managed by the County Council. The Project will be organising a commemorative event on 3 August at Hinchingbrooke House, Huntingdon. A varied range of informative and educative family- friendly activities are being planned, to raise awareness of this milestone in world history.

Northstowe and the A14

You have the opportunity of commenting on the proposed Cambridge to Huntingdon A14 improvement scheme. The deadline for submitting comment is 15 June. This can be done by completing an online questionnaire, which can be found at: www.highways.gov.uk/roads/road-projects/a14cambridge-to-huntingdon-improvement-scheme. Parish Councillors who have attended meetings on the scheme report that there seems to have been little recognition given to the impact of the Northstowe development on A14 traffic flows. It is currently proposed that the section of the B1050 between Bar Hill and Longstanton will be made into a dual carriageway as part of the Northstowe Phase II development.

Yesteryear Road Run



This month's cover shows a reminder of the Road Run held in April in aid of Cancer Research. After a couple of years' break, we were treated to one the biggest parades ever, with vehicles large and small gleaming in the spring sunshine. A brass band provided musical entertainment and Garner's Farm once again kept everyone going with hot drinks, bacon butties, and home-made cakes.

Kerry and Janet would like to thank everyone that came and supported them at Garners, and their thanks also go to Boswell's Bakery for their kind donation of rolls for the butties. With everyone's support they were able to raise the fantastic sum of $\pounds557$ which will be donated to Cancer Research.

Old Willingham

Much has been written recently about the politics leading up to the World War. First The picture this month shows а house on Church Lane (still there which today) appears to be the local party headquarters for the Liberal Party. Signs outside declare 'Vote for Montagu', and



there are posters all over the front. This is likely to place the photo at 1910 when Edwin Montagu was re-elected as Member of Parliament for the Chesterton Division which covered Cambridge and the surrounding villages. During WWI Montagu became Minister for Munitions and was then appointed Secretary of State for India.

LOOKING BACK Willingham Auctions

Willingham Auctions have over the years been an important part of the village and their regular sales attract large numbers of clients. Looking back, the *Cambridge Evening News* of 28 March 1994 carried an article on the revival of Willingham Auctions by new owners.

The article reported that Colin and Gail Peeke-Vout had renovated a series of barns at their house in the High Street in order to hold fortnightly auctions there. Mrs Peeke-Vout said that they had spotted the enormous potential for the barns and had decided to turn them into auction rooms.

Auctions used to be held there when the house was owned by Raymond and Jean Munns. However they had retired and the auctions ceased in 1984, having been part of the local scene since 1959. The sales were very popular then and the new owners had received an encouraging response to the events being revived. Mrs Peeke-Vout said that the auctions used to be regarded as a kind of social gathering and that people were looking forward to them starting up again.

The auctions would be held every two weeks starting on 2 April. Viewing would take place the day before and more than 500 lots would be up for grabs in the first sale. The article reported that general household items ranging from wheelbarrows and chain saws to a grand piano and wardrobe pine would be on sale.

The *Cambridge Evening News* of 22 November 1995 carried another article on Willingham Auctions saying that in the 18 months since the re-opening about 120,000 lots had come under the hammer, and at each sale there were now between 300 and 500 potential buyers. Already there had been many bargains – and surprisingly high prices from the auctions.

A mahogany dining table, which could be extended, except that there was no spare leaf, was put up for sale at an estimated price of $\pounds 300$. Two dealers, one Australian and the other from London were both determined to have it, but it eventually stayed in this country – for $\pounds 1,020$.

The article mentioned three Willingham people associated with the business; Stuart Allen who had undertaken IT work, his wife Becky who helped in administration and John Wright, the auctioneer.

Spring News from the Hanson – RSPB Wetland Project

The partnership project continued over winter in our relentless mission to transform Needingworth Quarry into a vast wetland nature reserve - Ouse Fen. Providing a home for some of the UK's most endangered wetland wildlife, we've spent the past few months working with willows and reeds to extend the newly created reedbeds ever further.

Now emerging wide-eyed and blinking into the spring sunshine we welcomed the first migrants including swallows, sand martins, chiffchaffs, wheatears, willow and sedge warblers. Meanwhile the reedbeds have come alive with more booming bitterns, sky dancing marsh harriers and 'pinging' bearded tits than ever before.

Recent Wildlife highlights

In early March two cranes were seen flying over the reserve and in more recent weeks there have been an increasing number of red kite sightings in the wider area – look out for their distinctive forked tails. We were also treated to a rare visit from a great white egret in early April, cousin of our more familiar little egret.

As well as screeching water rails, little and great crested grebes, our early mornings have been rewarded by hunting barn owls. Greeting one of our bird surveyors out on the reserve one dawn, was the increasingly rare sight of a snipe in it's 'drumming' display high above the reedbeds.

The numbers of black-headed gulls on the islands at Barleycroft have started to build in large numbers as they pair up and begin their nest building – joined unusually this year by two Mediterranean gulls. Looking forward to more warm spring days, keep an eye out for butterflies such as brimstones, peacocks and small tortoiseshells basking in the sun. Whirring damselflies and dragonflies are just emerging.

Spring into Action

Out on the reserve we've installed new signs to help you find your way and added a few benches for you to 'rest-awhile' around the trails. Helping us along the way, we've been joined by new Warden Barry O'Dowd, who with existing staff and volunteers will care for the growing nature reserve.
