Possibly, but what triggers how we remember those who are no longer here? A particular smell, song, certain foods, a colour, a sound? Some scare, some comfort. I wonder if certain months are more melancholic than others? If so, why? Have we invested them with characteristics, personified them?

Is it true our preferred month, season is the one in which we were born? Or are our views coloured by background and experience? I must confess to being ready to embrace each new season as it approaches and the hope and promises it brings.

Old Willingham

If you went to Earith in the 1950s, you would have crossed over this suspension bridge. Nowadays you hardly notice the low concrete bridge that replaced it in 1963, but look to the right as you head into Earith and you will see



where the road went to this old bridge. In fact there has been a bridge of one sort or another here since the 1200s. The first iron bridge was opened in 1847 but was broken in 1863 when a traction engine was crossing. The bridge shown here was built in 1865. This picture was taken as work started on the new (current) bridge and you can see concrete piles ready to be installed. There is a very interesting history by Mike Petty available online by Googling 'mike petty earith bridge'.

LOOKING BACK – Water Shortages in Willingham

The *Cambridge Daily News* of 1 June 1962 described how in 1912, the initial water system was provided by the Willingham Water and General Supply Company. The instigator, Mr H G Frew, had arranged for the installation of the necessary pipes and pumps; a water tower was built by a local builder, Charles Unwin; pumps were provided by Charles Lack of Cottenham and one man was employed to maintain the system in proper working order. At that time, the village had an adequate supply for domestic purposes. However, the situation changed with the upsurge in glasshouses; the 3000 gallons of water an hour provided was inadequate.

On 13 May 1960, the *Cambridge Daily News* reported grave concern at the serious water shortage in Willingham. Houses in the parish had been without water for many hours and growers also lacked sufficient water for essential irrigation. The National Farmers' Union complained to the Rural District Council and requested immediate steps to improve the water supply.

However, a month later, the Chair of the Public Health Committee attributed the water shortage to people using it to irrigate their small-holdings but maintained the water supply was more than adequate though domestic users were bound to suffer unless the amount of water used for other purposes was reduced. He blamed irrigation lines operating night and day so in the morning when householders wanted to fill kettles, have a wash or do their washing, no water was available.

Two years later, the situation had improved slightly. The Chesterton Rural District Council had made adaptations to the water system and an agreement was pending with the Ramsey and St Ives Joint Water Board to use another supply in emergencies.

doddle. She sighed, considering what Maud's life must have been like. What did she know about her great-gran? One son, Ellen's granddad, had been born before the Second World War. They'd done that period at school but it was boring. Well that's what Kieran had said so she'd agreed. Now each class had to come up with a project about the First World War for its centenary – as if anybody cared, Kieran had said!

Ellen glanced sidewards. When had her greatgran been born? She asked her.

'9th of June 1909 - and you?'

'10th of July 1998.'

'I remember now. Your great-granddad died 18 years before in 1980. He never saw you.' Maud

chuckled. 'I was 89.'

Ellen looked askance. Had she worked that out in her head?

'Where're you working, love?'

'I'm still at school. I'm only 15, gran.'

The old lady shrugged. 'Times change. I wanted to be a nurse but we had no money so I started in a factory at 14.'

'Can you remember the First World War, gran?'

'A little bit. I was only little; it began as I started school – best time of your life!'

'Really, I thought the teachers caned you.'

Maud chuckled. 'Not in the primary school. They just used a ruler across your knuckles or the back of your legs – that was all.

'I was about seven because it was during the Somme - I'd had to stand in the corner. I forget why. When the playtime bell rang, I waited for Miss Mason to let me go with the others but she'd forgotten me. She went on sitting at her desk and took an envelope out of her bag. I can still see the black edging just as I can still hear her sobs. I was terrified in case she noticed me. She sat there till the bell rang at the end of break.'

Maud squeezed Ellen's hand. 'I didn't understand properly but mothers in our street were getting the same telegrams. It was probably either her fiancé or brother.'

'And she still went to work?' Ellen's voice went up an octave. She and her friends regularly bunked off school for no good reason.

'Why not? You did your bit in those days, though her heart must have been breaking. My dad survived – but he never referred to what he'd gone through and we didn't dare ask. So many died. What was it all for? Like many women, Miss Mason never married, yet she was bonny; it was probably her fiancé who'd copped it. No wonder the Twenties was a wild time with the Charleston and the Black Bottom and such dances. Be thankful, Ellen, you were born when you were but never forget what others endured – and some are still going through Hell.'

Pastoral Letter

Writing on a pet topic I feel I should apologise to church members who could well be fed up with it! The topic is clay pots, preferably of the cracked and broken variety. I'm neither a potter nor an art connoisseur but freely admit to being a 'cracked-pot'.

Everyone assumes that leaders, especially those of the stand-up and speak publicly variety are confident, selfassured individuals. I'm here to tell you that's not true, and further, its a good thing too!

We, who believe in God, like to think He's always right and, if this is the case then He never picked anyone who was either supremely confident (or even very good) to speak out on His behalf.

Moses told God he couldn't possibly speak publicly, the prophet Amos told God (as if He didn't know!) that he was just a young shepherd boy and wasn't eloquent enough to speak for God. Jeremiah, Elijah, even St Paul all recognised they were weak and flawed individuals. Having spent several years telling God He'd made a mistake in picking me for ordination, I know what they felt like.

Once the 'penny drops' we realise we can only do God's bidding once we recognise our weaknesses. St Paul often asked God to take away his feelings of weakness and inadequacy but God said His grace was sufficient and His power is made perfect in weakness (2 Corinthians 12:9). St Paul came to see that being weak in human terms enabled him to rely on God's power rather than his own. I echo this wholeheartedly.

St Paul also wrote (2 Corinthians 4) about us having treasure in clay pots: Meaning we are but fragile containers for the great wonders and treasures God bestows upon us. Pots get cracked and broken. The Japanese have a wonderful art-form (Kintsugi) for repairing breakages with a resin mixed with gold which thus renders all repairs to be visible. I firmly believe it is our very weaknesses and broken bits that shine out our 'treasure'.

Last birthday someone gave me a card with a badge declaring 'Blessed are the cracked for they let in the light'. How brilliant! My weaknesses mean I'm a broken vessel, the brokenness being what's needed to be strong in His service. His light allowed in through the cracks, His light shining out from the cracks.

We live in a society that prizes physical beauty and mental brilliance. May we cherish our status as clay pots, entrusted with great treasure by God's power, and freely share this with those around us?

GARDENING TIPS FOR OCTOBER

- 1. Remove all summer flowering annual flowers from borders and pots in order to plant bulbs and winter flowering plants.
- 2. Incorporate well-rotted homemade compost (or a commercial alternative such as bagged farmyard manure) into beds and borders to condition the soil for planting.
- 3. Rake lawns to remove any thatch which has built up over the summer. Next spike the surface to reduce compaction and let air into the roots.
- 4. Feed your lawns to improve colour and vigour. Continue to mow but gradually raise the cutting blade until you cease to cut the lawn.
- 5. Water lime-hating (ericaceous) plants such as azaleas, camellias and rhododendrons with rain water from your water butts. Tap water may cause such plants to drop next year's flower buds.
- 6. Plant bulbs in pots. To make a lasting show this can be done by planting bulbs in layers thus: Put some bulb compost in the base of pot and plant large daffodils, add more compost then plant tulips on top, finally add more compost and plant small daffodils such as Tête-a-Tête on top or early flowering crocus.

Flu vaccination is free to everyone aged 65 and over, pregnant women, and all with a long-term medical condition – diabetes, heart disease, kidney or liver disease, asthma or any breathing disorder. The **Shingles Vaccination** Rolling Programme is also continuing this autumn. There are strict eligibility criteria. The free vaccines are available now but only to the following groups:

- Patients born between 2/9/34 and 1/9/36;
- Patients born between 2/9/43 and 1/9/44.

Recycling: The second collection of electrical goods was again very successful with more than six tonnes of equipment raising a little over £200. WISER Recycling carry out similar collections in other villages and report a cumulative total to date of almost two thousand tonnes of small appliances which would have gone to landfill.

Willingham Post Office will close for nine days for refurbishment from the end of September and reopen on Wednesday, 8 October at 1 pm to provide all the existing services with longer opening hours; a new Postmaster will be taking over from Chris Warren. Chris and Linda have provided a Post Office service here for almost thirty years. We wish them success with their future plans.

Jack Few: We were sorry to learn last month of the death of Jack Few. Jack was a long-serving employee of the Parish Council, looking after the Recreation Ground and Pavilion for more than twenty years – sometimes less than happy with the state of the changing rooms on Monday mornings! He was a hard-working, loyal and conscientious member of the Parish Council team. Our sympathy goes to his widow, Marjorie, and family.

Northstowe: The phase two consultation process is under way and will continue until the end of October. The main concerns to Willingham residents are the impact of traffic and drainage. The Parish Council is making representations on both issues though with little progress. Highways seem to be in denial that there will be a significant increase in traffic through Willingham and any minor increase can be accommodated by adjusting the phasing on the traffic lights. The developers are adamant that the construction of three large balancing ponds will reduce the current flooding risk from a one in twenty-five-year event to a one in a hundredyear event. Given recent flooding experience, your Parish Council remains to be convinced. If you have similar concerns or other comments, please make your views known through the consultation process or at the public exhibition at the Ploughman Hall on Saturday, 18 October between 10 am and noon. There is also news from the archaeological dig of finding a Roman street and houses on the old golf course. What, if any, impact this will have is not yet known.

Sexual Assault: Although most of us would react to the sexual grooming allegations coming out of Rotherham that it could not happen here, the truth is that unfortunately it could. Cambridgeshire Constabulary has been running a special campaign to focus on encouraging victims of sexual assault or rape to report it. The initiative aims to raise awareness that women, men, teenagers and children all can be victims; that assaults can be committed by strangers, family members or friends. The Force's website has a dedicated section giving information on what happens when anyone reports a sexual assault; also help and support for victims – www.cambs-police.co.uk/GetCloser/SexualAssault/
