# Important bin collection

# changes



#### Green bin collections

Green bin collections will be moving to a monthly collection during the winter months when

far less garden waste is put out by residents. The change is being made for December, January and February collections only, with fortnightly collections remaining in place for the rest of the year.

#### Christmas collections

We're asking residents to make an early note of Christmas bin collections as changes this year will affect all residents, with some collections moving forward as well as back. Collections will be made up until 27 December, break until 4 January and return to normal on 5 January.

- Please ensure bins are put out by 6am on the day of collection
- You can recycle all your Christmas cards and wrapping paper in the blue bin
- You can compost all leftover food (cooked and raw) and real Christmas trees (cut up) in the green bin
- Excess blue bin material will routinely be collected when placed alongside the blue bin in a returnable container or cardboard box
- Excess black bin waste will be collected if placed alongside the bin on the first scheduled black bin collection after the New Year only.

# **Gardening Tips for December**

- 1. Clear diseased fallen leaves from around roses and apply a compost mulch around the stem to prevent spores from black spot mixing with soil. Do not compost any leaves with black spot.
- 2. Insulate outside taps and turn off the water supply to them. Store irrigation system hoses in sheds or stores.
- 3. Raise patio pots onto bricks or pot feet to prevent pot soil from becoming saturated. Insulate pots containing tender plants with bubble wrap or hessian to prevent frost damage.
- 4. Watch out for slip hazards on paths and patios caused by mould or algae growth. Apply patio magic which will kill such growths without the need to hose down.
- 5. If you have heavy soil in your borders or vegetable plot it is worth digging it over to let the frosts in to break up the soil.
- 6. Keep your bird feeders topped up.
- 7. Apply grease bands to apple and pear tree trunks to prevent female winter moths from laying eggs. The bands are sticky but otherwise organic.

# **Old Willingham**

Here is a wintery scene. Apart from the church in the background you wouldn't recognize it as Willingham, as none of the buildings in the foreground remain today. This photo is taken from the corner of Church Street and High Street (Stock's Corner), probably in or around 1897. The building on the corner of Church Lane was a bakery then as now but, as so often happened in those days of thatch, it burned down in the early 1900s taking the house next door with it. Although quaint, many of these old cottages were very small and lacking in amenities. The Edwardian houses that replaced them would have been considered luxurious by comparison.

Each month this year we have published a piece to commemorate the centenary of the start of the Great War. Our final piece has a humorous tone, but as we approach a time of feasting, it should perhaps give us all pause for thought.

# **World War 1 Rationing**

Rationing during World War 1 was introduced relatively late into the conflict. Limited food restrictions and voluntary rationing had been attempted but were unsuccessful, as those with money could purchase supplies on the black market whilst the poor went without. Almost all of Britain's food imports came across the Atlantic from Canada and USA, and ships were at the mercy of the German U-boat campaign. By 1918, national food stocks were running dangerously low and rationing had to be introduced in February.

To assist housewives with avoiding waste and cooking with limited ingredients, the *Win-the-War* Cookbook was published with approval of the Ministry of Food. The foreword was a message to the women of Britain that efforts on the home-front were as important as in those in the trenches, and they were exhorted to 'beat the Germans in the larder and the kitchen.' The book provided useful tips such as how to build a hay-box cooker, encouraged people to 'masticate more', and promised 'complete victory if you eat less bread.'

One of the strangest sounding recipes in the book was for Fish Sausages, an unlikely sounding combination, but the finished dish was actually a kind of fish croquette made with cooked fish and rice rolled into a sausage shape. The quantities for 4 people would be more suited to today's fasting diet, containing just 2 cups of fish and 2 spoonfuls of rice; however the book got around the problem of tiny portions by recommending serving the dish after a first course of porridge! Who knows how many households actually sampled this delicious dinner menu, but the sacrifices made on the home-front were ultimately successful as food supplies did not run out and were distributed fairly. Rich households found out for the first time what it was like to be hungry and the poor were probably better fed than they had been before the war.

# Two generous grants from FECA for Willingham projects

At its first meeting under new Chair, Eileen Wilson, the Finance and General Purposes Committee (F&GP) of the Fen Edge Community Association (FECA) responded to requests for financial aid submitted by Caroline Hyde for Willingham Youth Trust and by Catharine Atkins for Willingham Action Group. These requests were for equipment for Willingham's new youth club and the new QEII playground facility respectively, and each received a generous grant of £500. The Committee regarded these as eminently deserving projects well within FECA's remit 'to promote the benefits of the catchment area of Cottenham Village and its neighbourhoods'. Willingham-based F&GP members Graham Mumby and Paul Knighton (who, after presenting the cases, absented themselves from the discussions and voting) gave their thanks on behalf of the village, especially the hard-working volunteers who have taken these two projects from ideas on paper to tangible reality within such a remarkably short period.

It is worth noting that FECA's funds are largely generated from within Cottenham, home of the majority of the committee members and the most active fundraisers. This is especially true of Alan Leeks who recently resigned the F&GP chair to take up the chairmanship of Cottenham Parish Council. So, thank you Cottenham! This wider community support also helps to convince larger donors of the validity of these major local projects.

# Autumn News from the Hanson – RSPB Wetland Project

At Ouse Fen we're passionate about creating a home for nature and the partnership project with Hanson is doing just that by transforming Needingworth Quarry into a vast wetland nature reserve.

#### A bumper summer for wildlife

With the breeding season coming to an end it is time to review the birdlife successes and failures on the reserve this year. Well, bitterns, our top target species did very well with 6 booming males, double last year's figure, and in July it seemed that young were on the wing across the reserve. This is above all expectations and bodes well for the future years as gravel extraction continues and new habitats are created. All the work done by our sterling volunteers – from pre-dawn monitoring of boomers, to sowing and planting reed plugs, pays dividends when a young bittern flies from the reeds right over your head.

We've also had a large increase in bearded reedlings with at least 24 pairs, up from nine last year, their pinging calls echoing across the reeds accompanied by the chatter of reed and sedge warblers. Overhead, sky-dancing marsh harriers had a reasonable year – six pairs raised at least 14 young. Barn owls had a great year with all four boxes holding three well grown chicks in the first brood, with more to come. On a sunny day it was a great place to watch hobbies hunting dragonflies over the reedbeds too.

The black-headed gull colony did very well at Barleycroft Lake with 274 pairs and eight pairs of common terns. Breeding wader numbers were also plentiful with 23 lapwing pairs and 12 redshank. Duck numbers and variety were good, including a pair of garganey present through the period. At Hanson's Needingworth settlement lagoons up to 4 turtle dove could be heard 'on-territory', welcome news alongside shocking declines nationally.

It has been a good year for butterflies, the nettles and thistles have provided caterpillar food and nectar for hundreds of small tortoiseshells, peacocks and the more occasional painted ladies and clouded yellows. On the mammal front we have seen Chinese water deer, water shrew and lots of water voles, so the new wetlands are providing secure habitats on a large scale. There have been occasional otter sightings too.

#### Get set for winter

Autumn wildfowl numbers have been building through October and November when thousands of ducks and geese join us to spend the winter here. The bird flocks attract raptors, particularly peregrines. One of the best ways to spot one is to look for lapwing and plover flocks rising from the fields and margins. There are rarities too from time to time – great white egrets seem to be making a home here, with one or two around the reedbeds throughout the autumn.

#### FLOOD EMERGENCY CONTACTS

In the event of flooding, we recommend you contact the specified authorities involved in dealing with emergencies, which are generally as follows:

#### Police

Responsibility: Co-ordinate the emergency services in a major flood incident and help with evacuation of people from their homes where it is necessary.

Contact: Dial 999 only in an emergency, dial 101 for non-emergency.

#### Fire & Rescue Service

Responsibility: Respond to all emergency incidents as required. Assist public with personnel and equipment where a need is identified. They may also pump out floodwater (Contact your local service to ask about this. There may be a charge for this service).

Contact: Dial 999 only in an emergency, dial 101 for non-emergency.

#### The Environment Agency (EA)

Responsibilities: Issues flood warnings for flooding from rivers, the sea and ground water and deals with emergency repairs and blockages on main rivers. The Environment Agency is responsible for building, maintaining and operating flood defences and for issuing flood warnings to the public, other flood responding organisations and the media.

<u>Contact</u>: Flood line 0845 988 1188 service and Incident Hotline on 0800 80 70 60. (You can listen to recorded flood warning information for your area or speak to an operator for advice 24 hours a day).

#### Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC) Highways

Responsibilities: Places flood warning signs on roads, organises road closures and diversions and clears blockages on highway drainage systems. Work with the police, fire and rescue services and the Environment Agency to co-ordinate responses during severe flooding. Deal with road closures and disruption to social services. Investigate disruption caused by overflowing drains.

Contact: 0345 045 5200 (Option 3) or out of hours contact the police.

#### Anglian Water

Responsibilities: Deals with blocked main sewers, and investigates issues with overflowing sewers.

# Pastoral Letter

#### Advent

The 'average response time' is a term used by various services to show how much time they need to respond when needed. In case of the emergency services it can be a matter of minutes, in other situations the waiting time can be much longer. Those responding to the 999 calls must be alert at any time.

'Be ready, dressed for service, and keep your lamps lit, like people waiting for their master to return from the wedding. As soon as he comes and knocks they will open the door to him. Happy are those servants whom the master finds wide awake when he comes.' (Luke 12.35).

The early Christian communities had this sense of alertness with regard to the second coming of Jesus. They expected the Lord's return at any time. Now after two thousand years of waiting, we have lost this urgency and spiritual readiness. Advent (from the Latin word advenio, meaning 'to come') is the period of expectant waiting and preparation for the celebration of the Nativity of Christ. This solemn commemoration of the first coming of Jesus, that took place in Bethlehem two thousand years ago reminds us of His second coming that will take place at the end of the world. The second coming of Jesus is possible because the first one has already taken place. Advent reminds us that whether the Master's coming is near or not, we have to be ready. This readiness should not be the result of fear but of genuine love for the Master. Fear only makes us anxious and afraid, while love fills us with joy.

A tourist came across a very interesting place. At first sight, the property seemed to be abandoned, but the order he noticed all around indicated that there had to be someone who took care of it all. As he looked around, he noticed an old man. He was a gardener. A short conversation took place between them. 'How long have you been working here?' the tourist asked. '24 years' - the gardener answered. 'How often do the owners of this wonderful house come here?' the visitor continued. 'It has been 12 years since they were last here. Usually I am here alone. People don't come here very often' the gardener answered. 'But this garden and house are kept in exemplary order. The owner of this house could come and live here even if he were to arrive tomorrow' the surprised tourist said. 'Not tomorrow dear sir, not tomorrow, but he could come and live here today!' the gardener replied.

Advent is a time of waiting and preparation. It is a time of expectation, hope and joy. Advent is an opportunity to make a fresh start, to make a renewed effort in the way we live our lives. As we prepare to celebrate the birth of the Lord Jesus, our minds often turn to the many preparations we have to make; buying and wrapping gifts, decorating trees, planning parties and family gatherings, and so on. Time can pass so quickly that we can easily forget about the real meaning of Advent, and we arrive at Christmas Day without preparing ourselves for the celebration of Jesus' birthday. Advent is a time when we are called to take stock of our lives, to decide where we need to make changes and to resolve to do whatever is necessary in order to look forward to the Lord's coming with joy and peace.

# **From the Parish Council**

#### **Major Projects:**

As any of you that have employed builders will know, time estimates tend to be somewhat elastic. We had hoped to have the new youth building open this summer, but for very good reasons it was not possible. However, the good news is that it is now very close to completion and, fingers crossed, will be ready before the end of the year. There is also good progress on the purchase of the old traveller site on Meadow Road with contracts due to be exchanged within the same time scale. There is slightly less good news on the QE2 play equipment project which despite the best endeavours of the Parish Council and Willingham Action Group is still a long way short of the funding target.

#### **External Authorities:**

There are many services provided to the village over which the Parish Council has no control. But that need not stop us lobbying about them, which is precisely what we have been doing. There has been concern for some time about the security and robustness of the electricity supply. A very useful dialogue has ensued with UK Power Networks resulting in the upgrading of equipment and, very importantly, improved tree maintenance. Most of the short outages are caused by tree branches striking the overhead lines, particularly in wet and windy weather. Keeping the trees pruned is a major task which we are promised will be done.

So far, we have had less success with the Environment Agency. A meeting has taken place with them to explain the problems that are being caused and will be caused in the future by their refusal to clear the lode. The meeting resulted in a further refusal. We have, therefore, written to their chief executive, with copies to Downing Street, making absolutely clear the current and potential future problems resulting from their inaction. Of course, this is all about money. A stitch in time comes to mind as do photographs of Mr Cameron wading through the Somerset Lodes. We will continue lobbying on your behalf.

#### The Recreation Ground:

As the evenings get darker the use of the Recreation Ground for organised training events becomes more difficult. Responding to a request from users, the Parish Council has replaced the old floodlights with new LEDs. They are safer, brighter and a lot more energy efficient.

There are also plans to install a defibrillator which, if possible, will be made available for general use. Sadly, there are a few youths in the village that seem to get pleasure out of spoiling public equipment and buildings that you pay for. Please tell us if you know who they are and we will do our very best to make them see sense.

#### Crime:

Talking of crime, the village remains a relatively peaceful place to live. However, we are disturbed to hear of some scams which target the old and vulnerable including people posing as police officers to gain details of credit cards and pin numbers. A police officer will never ask for these details. Stay safe, just say no, and may you have a very happy and peaceful Christmas.
