WI News

In February we welcomed Alison Dickens who spoke about '*The Robert Sayle's Dig'* – the archaeological survey done prior to the building of the Grand Arcade in Cambridge. The archaeologists were very excited about this excavation as it is unlikely that the opportunity to investigate such a large area in Cambridge city centre will come again.

The team began by looking at old maps of the area which varied in accuracy but together gave good indications of old layouts and the progress of change.

The work on site began with an investigation above ground and interesting history about Robert Sayle's was gathered just by looking at the building. For example, there were extensive rooms in the attic where staff lived on site -95 people at its height with the last person leaving in 1968 – and the rooms of their servants. Fireplaces were also in evidence which heated the shop into the 20th century.

Once the buildings were demolished, the archaeological dig could begin. The main investigations concentrated on 'The King's Ditch' and a large number of wells on site which proved very fruitful, yielding many artefacts and bones dating from 11th century onwards.

A good speaker and a fascinating talk.

Defibrillator in Willingham.

Willingham Bowls Club

A new community public access defibrillator has been installed in Willingham after being purchased by the Parish Council.

The defibrillator, to be used on a person who has gone into cardiac arrest, is in position on the front wall of the Sports Pavilion in West Fen Road.

Someone in cardiac arrest is usually unconscious and not breathing, so early intervention and using this kind of device can make a vital difference in the critical first minutes before a community first responder or ambulance crew arrives.

Access to the defibrillator is via a key code held by the East of England Ambulance Service NHS Trust (EEAST) and is given out when someone calls 999 about a cardiac arrest.

The idea for the defibrillator came about when Dean Greygoose, chairman of Willingham Wolves Football Club, approached Councillor Jamie Smith, Lead for Leisure and Amenities at the Parish Council, three months ago.

'When it was brought before the Parish Council, it was decided to go for a community access defibrillator; this had majority backing from the minute it was raised. We felt it was the right thing to do in case of the worst case scenario and it would benefit the whole community, not just the sporting community' said Councillor Smith.

Jon Needle, EEAST Community Partnership Manager for Suffolk and South Cambridgeshire, said: 'I'd like to congratulate Willingham Parish Council on making this investment. The first few minutes of a cardiac arrest are vital and early defibrillation is key. More defibrillators in our communities will potentially save more lives.'

The Parish Council is holding an awareness session in conjunction with EEAST on Saturday 9 May from 10 30 am at the Sports Pavilion. The awareness session is open to all residents of the village and will cover basic life support lessons including AED (automated external defibrillator).



You may be aware that last season the Bowls Club announced that it was no longer able to continue as there were not enough volunteers to form a committee. Since this announcement, a group of ex-members have rallied round in an attempt to keep one of the county's oldest bowls clubs going.

Their intention is to have a team in the Ely and District afternoon league, whilst attempting to increase the number of members so that additional teams can be formed to play in the evening leagues too.

Work has started to prepare the bowls green in readiness for the new season which starts on 1 May. The bowls club will be open from Saturday 25 April.

Following the recent work by the Environment Agency, the water levels in the Lode have reduced considerably so, fingers crossed, the flooding issues of last season will not return.

In the meantime, the club will hold its AGM on **Thursday 2 April** at 7 30 pm at the Sports Pavilion when new and old members are welcome to attend. If you have never played lawn bowls before and would like to give it a go, please come along to the meeting.

So it's appropriate to congratulate Willingham Action Group on the completion of their Community Orchard Project. It is, as reported in the March issue of *Willingham News*, a great achievement and a great contribution to the awareness of our local heritage; and it should, as it blooms in the spring, attract an ever-increasing flow of visitors.



WILLINGHAM TREE PROJECT

The Porterhouse

After three years the grant-funded period of tree planting under the Big Tree Plant has come to an end, the fund officially closed at the end of March. However our work continues as we will inspect and look after the trees and water the orchard, and the more recently planted QEII and village trees, as required during their establishment. Planting was completed in February with the total standing at 1290 trees; with a further donation of 10, the total will reach 1300, exceeding the project target by some 185. Full details of the trees planted, with locations, will be posted on the Willingham Life website, but a summary of the planting is as follows – 115 within the core village area, 871 on the Old Recreation Ground and 314 outside the village.

The millionth BTP funded tree was ceremoniously planted in Bristol on 4 February, but Willingham may have taken the honours as we were planting at the same time that morning!

Thoughts about regenerating a long abandoned orchard go back to 2010, which then evolved into a more ambitious project taken up by WAG with the Parish Council kindly agreeing to our plans for the Old Recreation Ground.

The planting on the Old Recreation Ground, now known as The Community Orchard, is regarded as the flagship component of the project with a native species woodland area of some 750 trees and mixed orchard of 120 trees, 114 of which are planted on an 8m x 8m grid to create the feel of a traditional orchard. All the trees on the grid as well as those on the QEII, have been labelled with the name or dedication of the donors. An area has been reserved in order to establish a willow patch, which will be cut annually to provide material for any aspiring weavers in the village. Willingham now joins with 15 or more other villages around the Cambridge area where orchards have been established.

Many thanks are due to all those in the project group who have given their knowledge, time and energy, and to tree sponsors and volunteers involved in planting and watering. We look forward to your continued input and support. WAG also acknowledges the support and cooperation received from the Parish Council, South Cambs District Council and the County Council and Edward Gilbert for farming assistance.

A circular area on the edge of the woodland in the Community Orchard has been left clear for picnics, so enjoy the blossom in the spring and the fruit in the years to come.

An end of project celebration and orchard opening is planned for May – details to follow.

PASTORAL LETTER

Like the Sheep without their Pastor

What does a man?

Fussing around, looking for happiness, and at the end of the day he is coming to the conclusion that the most he was doing served only to sin. Of course, that conclusion can only be made by someone who listens to the Word of God and exposes his soul to the Mercy of the Lord; that mercy does not judge, but forgives the humble one. Prophet Hosea does not leave any doubts: we always do what is pleasing to us, what has a taste. The prophet says: They like the meat, which they are eating. Of course he meant the meat of the sacrifices the people offer to God. We make an impression on those, who know perfectly that taste which is pleasing God. But the Lord has no pleasure in it.

What does God want?

God is looking with favour towards the request of man. Hosea explains that attitude of God by saying that God has wrought numerous rights for them. God is sharing with us His opinions on any subject. Even though all the opinions and indication that God wants can be found in the Ten Commandments, in the dialogue with God we can always get to know what God thinks about my decision or my choice. What is our thinking about it? Do we accept this always as something good? Very often we say: My God, You again want the same! But what, on earth, can God say, that everything is OK because you have a better plan for your life and you asked God only to bless that plan and allow it to be introduced as something better than what God proposes? How many times should we accept the resolution, that only the plan of God accepted by man is the plan realizing the will of God. And this is it! What is wrong with that? There is another question: how far we can play with God in our lack of care and sinning and idolatry? Prophet Hosea again suggests that God reminds our guilt, He punishes our sins and ... sends us back to Egypt (!!!) Is it the sign that God is impatient? Not at all. It is a sure sign of His love, which is inviting a man to rethink his ways and to start his life again, but with a heart that is changed.

What kind of a pastor?

Jesus cures all the diseases and weaknesses. He knows that they are the signs of a huge need of a man to find happiness and peace. Jesus' worry is whether the people would find the joy of doing God's will here, on earth, in the span of their earthly life. By curing people Jesus demonstrates His omnipotent power to help each man and woman in whatever difficulties they are in, especially the need for the Kingdom of Heaven. Our Saviour is questioning the matter of the lack of the labourers in proclaiming the Kingdom of God. It is the task of the Church to proclaim the presence of the Lord in this world and His invitation to join Him in His Kingdom. And it is ONLY Him who is the Shepherd of the sheep. People are tired and left behind because the Shepherd is not proclaimed to them, but they hear some occasional preaching. Jesus knew perfectly, that He should leave us, and went to Heaven. It is not His fault that people feel left behind, but it is the guilt of His disciples, that instead of announcing Him, the True Shepherd, they filled in and acted as the shepherds. This is a sad mistake, when the pastor bonds people with himself, not with Christ. The number of these individuals is growing. On the other hand people search for some skillful leaders who with great enthusiasm and zeal guide the flock, where? That is the question: if the flock has love for Christ, that is good: the pastor leads the flock to Him, Jesus, and at once leaves them with Him, going to search for others, who long as well to meet Jesus in person. But if he accepts praise, the flock is lost.

That is the reason, why Jesus is asking His disciples to plea for the workers, not the pastors, because the harvest is HIS, it does not belong to the workers.

Patient Survey Report 2014 We looked at the results of our recent Patient Survey at our monthly practice team meeting in February. Questionnaires were handed out to patients attending for a doctor consultation at Willingham and Longstanton surgeries during November 2014. The results were analysed and collated and comparisons made with the results from the NHS England postal survey. 28 individual comments from patients were listed. We were pleased to note that **the Practice scored above the national GP Patient Survey benchmarks** in all the core questions and by a considerable margin in most cases and the feedback from patients was very positive. A few patients asked for longer opening hours. A copy of the Report is available in reception at both surgeries.

Patient Participation Group Our Patient Group met on Thursday 26 February. We looked at the results of the recent 2014 Patient Survey and the group members were very satisfied with the findings. We also looked at the Friends and Family Test questionnaires for December, January and February to date. All responses said that they would recommend the practice to friends and family apart from one who was neither likely nor unlikely to and one 'don't know'. The free text box produced some very positive comments with some suggestions which we have discussed and actioned where possible. The FFT results are also available in reception for you to read.

Museum of Human Rights



I love museums. Seeing ancient artefacts so close, in front of you to stare at; being presented with actual things used in the past – machines, tools, photographs, objects from home life – all so intimate and personal. Yes, museums are such good places to visit and here in Cambridge we are lucky to have a great variety. In New Zealand, each village I visited had their museum to celebrate local family lives with their triumphs and hardships laid bare for visitors to ponder. It has been a long wait for me to see the finished Canadian Museum of Human Rights which was finally opened in Winnipeg. At Christmas I was able to visit the completed museum to enjoy not only the culture and history, but the art and technology through a variety of brilliant displays.

This museum is set in the heart of Canada and tries to break new ground in many ways. The idea was conceived quite a few years ago, followed by competitions for the design and the establishment of a good location, with the ultimate aim of furthering the cause of fairness and rights for all. Its aim is to 'explore the subject of human rights with a special but not exclusive reference to Canada, in order to enhance the public's understanding of human rights, to promote respect for others and to encourage reflection and dialogue'. In my trips back and forth to Winnipeg I have watched the project grow after the Queen unveiled the building's cornerstone on 3 July 2010. (That actual stone also has embedded in it a piece from the ruins of St Mary's Priory in Runnymede, England, where it is believed the Magna Carta was approved in 1215 by King John!)

The interior takes the visitor through vast and varied galleried areas. These deal in detail with different themes including the Canadian human rights journey, world human rights atrocities, Aboriginal concepts of human rights, the Holocaust, and current human rights issues. All of these are thought-provoking and sometimes quite unnerving. A strong granite and marble route leads upwards, tapering to the crowning glory, the glass 'Tower of Hope' at the pinnacle, where visitors can view the city past the confluence of the rivers out to the plains beyond. This finale is simply breathtaking but gives time to think and explore ones thoughts and concerns, and I am sure that after such a journey, the majority will resolve to try and make our world a better place.
