Holiday in China



The Chinese New Year is calculated according to the Chinese lunar calendar. Hence the date varies every year but always falls between 21 January and 20 February.

The monkey ranks ninth (out of twelve) in the Chinese zodiac.

Lucky Colours: white, blue, gold.

Lucky Numbers: 4 and 9.

Lucky Flowers: chrysanthemum, crape-myrtle.

Personality: smart, quick-witted, frank, optimistic, ambitious, adventurous.

Best-suited careers: accounting, banking, science, engineering, film directing.

The Significance of Red Envelopes

Sending red packets is customary at Chinese New Year for good wishes and luck. The Chinese love the colour red (the symbol of energy, happiness and good luck) so by wrapping money in red packets it is hoped to bring more happiness and blessings to the receivers but it is impolite to open a red packet in front of the person who gives it to you.



Images of China that we carry with us? The young man standing in front of a tank in Tiananmen Square? The food – Peking Duck, dumplings? Books – *Wild Swans* – by Jung Chang?

However, a first impression of Beijing was smog – very busy traffic everywhere but worse were the bikes and scooters – a nightmare.

But the Great Wall is amazing! It is more than 2,300 years old and is the world's biggest ancient architecture. It stretches as far as the eye can see. The array of scenery is stunning from the beaches of Qinhuangdao to rugged mountains around Beijing to a desert corridor between tall mountain ranges at Jiayu Pass. It passes through an incredible nine provinces and municipalities.

Nearly one-third of the Great Wall has disappeared without trace and it is thought likely that the North-Western section (in Gansu and Ningxia) will disappear in the next 20 years because of 'desertification' and changes in human land use. Looking at the photograph on the front cover, anyone will understand why this is such a highlight for visitors.

The next scene is sailing down the Li River in daylight very scenic and incredibly peaceful, then at night it was possible to watch the fishermen with their cormorants catching fish.

Another day, another venue – this time to Chengdu to see the pandas. First the tiny babies, just over a week old, then moving along, they gradually get bigger. What takes some tourists aback is the $\pounds100$ it costs to cuddle a panda and they must do so in the back of the nursery where no-one else can accompany them or take photographs. Nevertheless, Chengdu is a very pretty and quite a lively town.

The barge on the front cover shows one of the small gorges off the Yangtse River before the dam was built. The water then was much lower and men used to pull the boats up the gorges with ropes. Thankfully the river is wider now and the ride much smoother. The dam is spectacular and boats pass through the five-stage ship lock.

China is a vast country and most trips touch only a tiny part though occasionally the coach drivers get lost so you end up seeing more of the countryside than you are supposed to. Also to add to the fun(?), to dry out rice, the locals spread it over the roads so coaches coming along slide all over.

The Terracotta Army is a must! It is so immense. Also the acrobatic show. The performers are mostly ex-Olympians so they are fantastic. The Peking Opera is another must-see. It is easy to forget that they are only marionettes.

Everyday life – people in the parks playing Mahjong, doing Tai Chi and letting on-lookers try to do it with them and the brides having photographs taken in Shanghai, all looking very beautiful.

Whetted your appetite? Hope so.

Tales from Vienna Woods

She carried a glass of chilled Prosecco out onto the terrace of her third-floor Swiss apartment and walked to the railings to gaze down the length of the lake to where the sun was setting between the mountains. Always dressed in navy her appearance belied her love and use of colour in her work as a costume designer for the theatre – opera, dance, plays – her creations encompassed them all.

Summer was still clinging on though it was late September. She had only returned from Vienna, where she had been contracted to dress the dancers for the prestigious New Year's Day Concert. The meticulous planning of this event was minutely choreographed like any of the balletic interludes to accompany the Strauss pieces. The budget, provided by the Opera House, negated that term – it was sheer indulgence, pure generosity – but of course, the clothes could be re-used in other ventures.

She sipped her sparkling wine as the view held her entranced. The unusually hot sun for that time of year was creating an explosion of colour as it laid itself to rest. How many hues of orange, yellow, vermillion could she count against the darkening blue lake and green pines? The sun dipped lower and the V-shaped spectacle before her grew ever smaller only to be rivalled by a myriad of silver, glittering stars which burst forth onto the cloudless sky that was now streaked with greys and blues and purples. She had used these same brighter colours for the dancers' dresses and the more sombre for the males' jackets and tights.

She glanced at her watch and drained her glass. The table was set – only the very last finishing touches were left to do. The burgundy roses he had sent were centre stage on the crisp white linen tablecloth. She selected a few pink rose petals from her own terrace garden and scattered them selectively over the table.

She waited for the doorbell to ring.

PASTORAL LETTER

This will be the first opportunity that I have had to greet the people of Willingham in this format even though I have met many of you in the last six months. I have to admit that this is also the very first time I have written such an article as I was newly ordained and appointed to Willingham at the same time in July 2015.

On the first Sunday in this New Year 2016 I addressed the Salvation Army congregation here in Willingham with a title 'In the Beginning' based on John 1:1-17.

'In the beginning' – before the world was created.

'In the beginning' – of the church year.

'In the beginning' – of this New Year 2016, and

'In the beginning' – of God's new beginning as the word made flesh.

I read in January's *Willingham News* (page 9) about the new fibre broadband cabinets that have been installed and wanted to bring to your attention the situation that some residents are now stuck in with regards to getting fibre broadband.

I live in Pyrethrum Way where half the estate (the even numbers) can get Virgin broadband and the other half cannot. This is apparently because when the estate was built, the cable company at the time (NTL?) only laid a cable down one footpath and did not return the loop for some reason. Unfortunately, I live on the wrong side of the road! My neighbour has contacted Virgin who has reviewed the situation but advised him they would not connect him as it is not viable (from a financial point of view I guess).

I followed with interest the Connecting Cambridgeshire scheme but was advised this week that I will not benefit from faster broadband access until sometime in 2017. Apparently because the 'majority of properties in my area' could get Virgin Media, the scheme could not fund upgrading the remaining properties. So we have been left out.

I would be interested in learning how many properties are now stuck in the situation of being unable to get fibre broadband. It would seem those that are, will be left behind for at least the next couple of years as the silent (or slow) minority in the village.

What, no Christmas tree again in 2015?

In June 2015, WISER Recycling collected unwanted waste electrical and electronic equipment and we were informed that our Parish would receive a rebate from the recycling company which could be reinvested back into Parish funds. Perhaps the Parish Council would reveal how much rebate they received for last year's collection, and how it was used, as their subsequent Meeting Minutes appear silent on this matter.

Notwithstanding the above and for the second year in succession, Willingham has had no Christmas tree on the Green but Cottenham, Rampton and other villages have managed to find funds for theirs. Is the absence of a tree on our village Green simply down to the cost? The Minutes for the November 2015 Parish Council Meeting report that to purchase a 15-20-foot tree would be around £500 with additional costs for delivery, installation and decoration. Yet a quick internet search suggests the cost (including specialist delivery) of a 15-20-foot Norwegian Spruce would have been £395. (www.realchristmastrees.co.uk)

Surely a village of our size can 'afford' to have a Christmas tree? We calculate that Willingham has approximately 1700 electoral register households and over 4000 residents reported (2011 census), so the cost equates to about £0.50 each household; less than the price of a first class stamp.

Do other residents have a view on this?

A resident contacted the council regarding the lack of Christmas tree on the Green and the Chairman read the email to Councillors.

7 Oct 2015 Minutes:

To consider siting of Christmas Tree on the Green

A request from a parishioner to site a tree on the Green had been received earlier in the year and at the time it was agreed to look at options nearer Christmas. Councillor Manning agreed to look into the costs of obtaining a suitably sized tree and the cost of transporting and siting it, he would report back at the November meeting.

4 Nov 2015 Minutes:

To consider siting of Christmas Tree on the Green

As requested Councillor Manning had looked into the costings of siting a 15–20 ft tree on the Green. The tree itself would cost around £500 with the additional costs of delivery, installation and decoration. Councillor Slater proposed that the Council continue with the lights only this year and that Green and Coundaries Lead/Deputy look at possible alternative options for next year. Seconded by Councillor Croucher and agreed unanimously. This would be added to the March 2016 agenda.

Sue and Nick West

In response to the letter from Mr and Mrs West regarding a Christmas tree on the Green.

As the letter indicates the Council is looking into the issue of lighting/trees within the village. This has been itemised for the March meeting to enable Councillors to take a full review of the current situation and future provisions in Willingham before Christmas 2016 is upon us.

The Electrical collection raised £226.84. This has not been received from WISER yet owing to an administrative problem at their end and so does not show on the accounts in the Minutes. In the past the Council has passed on the funds to WAG (Willingham Action Group) to enable them to continue their excellent work in supporting village projects etc. Once the payment has been received by the Council a decision will be made as to where to allocate the funds.

Antibiotic resistance Both the NHS and health organisations across the world are trying to reduce the use of antibiotics, especially for conditions that are not serious. This is to combat the problem of antibiotic resistance, which is when a strain of bacteria no longer responds to treatment with one or more types of antibiotics. The overuse of antibiotics in recent years has played a major part in antibiotic resistance; this includes using antibiotics to treat minor conditions that would have got better anyway. It has led to the emergence of 'superbugs'. These are strains of bacteria that have developed resistance to many different types of antibiotics. Tree Warden Scheme

This is a national initiative founded by the Tree Council (the UK's lead charity for trees), and co-ordinated locally by South Cambridgeshire District Council. It was founded to enable people to play an active role in conserving and enhancing their local trees and woods. Tree Wardens are volunteers who get involved and gather information about local tree matters and encourage practical projects. Willingham has offered this post to a highly qualified local applicant and further details will be published here, and on the Council website, once the position is confirmed.

Berrycroft Traffic Lights

Late in December, the timing sequence of the traffic lights at the junction by **The Porterhouse** was adjusted by Cambridgeshire County Council. The large queues at peak times were acknowledged during traffic surveys for the planning for Northstowe, and it was suggested that these could be alleviated by giving greater priority to through traffic. The reduced road usage during the Christmas break, along with the temporary lights in place for the works on Station Road, mean it is too early to say whether the change has improved matters. We await the free-flowing morning and evening journeys with eager anticipation.

Co-operative Community Involvement

The new manager of the Co-op, Richard Fullicks, attended the recent full Parish Council meeting to introduce himself and explain that the Society would like to become more closely involved in the community and wishes to support local projects and welcomes suggestions.

Northstowe

The development of Northstowe continues at its glacial pace, with the latest application being for the town square – still no houses have been planned. The square will be adjacent to the B1050, between the last two sets of newly-installed traffic lights. Full details can be found on South Cambridgeshire's website in the planning section under application S/3164/15/RM.

South Cambridgeshire District Councillors

The District Council has proposed reducing the number of Councillors from 57 to a minimum of 45, and the Local Government Boundary Commission is 'minded to agree'. There will be no change to the ward boundary for Willingham and Over, but South Cambridgeshire is recommending that we be represented by 2 Councillors instead of the current three.

Horses

As the problem of loose and dangerously tethered horses continues, we have been informed by our County Councillor that the police have been instructed by senior officers to do whatever is needed to resolve the problem. Please assist them by reporting any horses loose on the roads.

Over Boundary

The Parish Council has long felt that the boundary with Over is illogically placed at Haden Way as it does not include the Highgate Farm businesses, which are far removed from the rest of Over. A local parishioner is campaigning to change this and is in contact with the District Council Civic Affairs Committee. The Parish Council is supporting this endeavour.

War Memorial

A parishioner informed the Parish Council that he had been approached by visitors to the village enquiring about the location of the Willingham War Memorial. He wondered if the Council would consider erecting a sign. The Council felt that the probable demand would not justify the cost but that any villager should be able to offer directions. The War Memorial is in the cemetery behind Saint Mary and All Saints Church on Church Street.
