This little building is a survivor! You may recognise it as the small house opposite the end of Church Street just down from the Co-op. It is very old – probably 200 years or maybe more and has had an interesting life. In this month's photo, probably from the 1920s, we see two shopkeepers standing outside their businesses. On the left a barber and on the right a cobbler. The sign says 'B.Conquest, Boot and Shoe Maker' and there seems to be sheets of leather on the floor in front. The right hand part was a barbers in the

1950s, by which time its thatch had been replaced by corrugated sheet and by the 1970s, it had almost disappeared, over-grown with ivy. More recently it has been nicely renovated. The thatch is back and, apart from losing the two doors, it is instantly recognisable. May it have many more years yet!

OWLS Community Car Scheme

Volunteer Drivers Needed

OWLS Community Car Scheme provides a valuable and much needed service to those people living in Over, Willingham, Longstanton and Swavesey who need to attend medical appointments or make some social journeys but are unable to access other means of transport.

Unfortunately we have recently lost the services of a few of our drivers for personal reasons. With at least 9 regular weekly journeys to fulfil and over 90 journeys being undertaken every month, we now need to recruit additional volunteer drivers.

Drivers use their own cars and receive 45p a mile (30p from the client and 15p from Cambridgeshire County Council) and the Council provides additional insurance cover. Volunteers also have to undergo a DBS (formerly CRB) check.

Drivers offer particular times and days when they are available – in practice about 4 journeys a month is very helpful. So can you help maintain this very important community service?

Mail Collections in Willingham

Despite strong objections from our Postmaster, changes to the Royal Mail collections in the village have been introduced. The post box at the Post Office is being emptied three times daily – around noon, 3 pm and 5 pm. This is an advance of thirty minutes on the previous last collection time. Other street boxes in the village are being emptied once daily, after 9 am..

Street Lighting

The County Council has been discussing switching off streetlights overnight on residential roads as part of its budget setting process. Following feedback from residents and Councils, the County Council now proposes to only switch them off from 2 to 6 am. The Parish Council has responded by asking for the switch off period to be 1 to 5 am. The reason for this is because the first guided bus from Longstanton Park and Ride leaves shortly after 6 am. Cyclists and pedestrians from Willingham wanting to catch this bus should have as much illumination as possible, especially during the winter months.

Northstowe

Regular drivers through the Northstowe road works will have noticed that these are now finished and the extra sets of traffic lights commissioned. The Parish Council has now been advised that, between March and September, the construction of the balancing ponds off Hattons Road, Longstanton will be carried out. This will involve lorries carrying earth on the bypass at a rate of one every minute of every working day between 8 am and 6 pm. Carriageway cleaning strategies will be implemented.

WISER Recycling

After a long delay, the Parish Council has finally received a payment from WISER Recycling for the village-wide collection of unwanted electrical items which was carried out in June 2015. The payment of £226.84 has, as in the past, been donated to Willingham Action Group to help its ongoing projects in the village. One of these projects is the organisation of this recycling activity.

RECAP is a Cambridgeshire and Peterborough partnership which encourages more recycling and less waste being produced. Their new and improved website, www.recap.co.uk, provides more useful information about recycling opportunities for local residents.

Community Project Funding and Small Business Support

The County Council's Community Reach Fund invites applications for funding to create positive activities for 0-19 year olds and their families. If your application involves young people with disabilities and/or special educational needs, the upper age limit is 25 years. Awards are made up to a maximum of £1,000. This 'Letter' was the last thing I expected to do. The Editors say mine is due – but what is a 'Pastoral Letter': A pious sermon disguised? Or a blessed thought with the substance of a marshmallow?

Is this a one off idea? I don't think so. Look at Christmas and those shepherds who were suddenly surrounded by a great party in heaven. What always amazes me, is that so many say they want to go to heaven but are quite unwilling to discover the One who opens it. Easter is the clue here, as it shows just how Jesus dealt with our problem of being separated from God – and Easter Day showed that it worked. Now it is ours to accept.

So forget the idea of gloom. If you want that, start a faddy diet. They give you days of misery – and you pay for it. All that effort and pain and then you stay the same! At least all Jesus says is 'follow me and I will change you for the better'. To me that's the greatest offer ever made yet. It also appeals to my sense of adventure.

Consultation on the Future of the Libraries

The plan for 2016-17 is to save money by a combination of reducing opening hours at larger libraries, reducing management and professional staff and spending less on new stock (reducing the budget for new stock from $\pounds 80,000$ to $\pounds 60,000$ next year). Willingham Guides – Malawi

The Guides in Willingham are members of a local unit of a worldwide organisation. There are over 10 million members of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts in 146 countries on every continent. One of our Guide Laws in the UK is 'A Guide is a good friend and a sister to all Guides'. That means being a sister to all Guides worldwide, not just in our Willingham Unit and, as part of that, we have just started to forge links with a Brownie and Guide group in Namisu, near Blantyre in Malawi. Namisu is a Children's Village in Malawi for orphaned children which is run by the Aquaid charity based in Girton, Cambridge.

Josie Charter from the charity came to speak to the Guides, to give them an understanding of what life is like for a girl in rural Malawi.

It is so different to life in Willingham. The Guides learnt that if they lived there, they would have to get up at 3 30 am each day and walk the equivalent distance of there and back to Over or even Swavesey, to collect water for the family. On their return home they would go to school if they were lucky, or else they would have to work all day on the family farm. Primary school is free but fees have to be paid to go to secondary school, so many girls are not able to continue with their education. The Guides were quite shocked to find out that, under tribal law, a girl can be married at the age of 12 but legally they have to be 16 years old. Guide groups are important to the girls in Malawi who gain from being able to talk freely with sympathetic leaders and feel a sense of belonging in a place where they can relax and have fun.

Josie is going to Malawi soon and she will take with her photographs and letters that the Guides have written and some Guide and Brownie Handbooks to give to the Guides in Namisu. She will come back to see us when she returns to tell us more.

We asked Josie what we can do to help the people in Malawi and she said that one thing they are very short of is spectacles. When she goes out this time she is taking 200 pairs of glasses with her. So for our next service project we are going to be collecting unwanted glasses. If you have any that you no longer use, please give them to one of the Guides or Guide Leaders and we can send them to Malawi where they will be put to good use.

Willingham in the 1920s

I have recently been corresponding with an elderly lady, Mrs Marjorie Pennells, formerly Marjorie Smith, who was born and brought up in Willingham in the 1920s but who has not been back to the village for many years.

It has been very interesting to hear her memories of Willingham, as it was over 90 years ago. We have had lots of fun comparing her childhood here with that of my children, who were also brought up in the

Many of the descriptions of her childhood will be familiar to other elderly Willingham residents, some of whom will remember her. She now lives with her husband in Skegness.

I have copied most of her letters exactly as she has written them, but I have omitted most of her references to people who still live in the village. I hope her contemporaries will enjoy reading about a life that they too must have been part of. The rest of us can enjoy a glimpse of life in our village as it was many years ago.

Letter No 1

From Marjorie Pennells

When I last visited Willingham, a long time ago, the centre of the village looked the same as it was when I was a girl. I went to the village school, but they have a bigger one now. The church was where John and I were married. Paul Ingle played the organ at our wedding. Christine, our daughter, was baptised there and I sang in the church choir. On Sundays I attended Sunday school in the Parish Rooms which was near the Old Rectory in Church Street. I was born and brought up in a thatched cottage in Silver Street.

It was lovely living in a village – everyone knew everyone else and were always ready to help if anyone was in trouble. As children we had the fields to play in, trees to climb and our bicycles to ride on. In the summer we would go swimming in the river. We would ride one mile along the Earith Road where there was a farm and we were allowed to cross the farmer's fields to get to the river. I think it was Blakes Farm. In the village there were two bakery shops very close to each other. Olivers was on the corner by the church and Days was three or four houses away in Church Street. When I was 13 I had a Saturday job at Days shop, 8 am – 6 pm, and I was paid two shillings (old money), and with that you could buy a lot of sweets in those days.
