# **Birds over Willingham**

Last summer we published a piece about peregrine falcons nesting in the centre of Cambridge. The piece concluded with the hope that the birds would return to nest again this year. Not only have peregrines been seen again around the city centre during this winter, but have been even closer to home, as our cover picture shows. This beautiful image was captured in the sky over Willingham on a bright sunny day at the end of January.

It is worth keeping an eye on the sky if you are in your garden or walking around the village as there are other interesting birds to be seen. Sparrowhawks have long been present and some village residents have even seen them actively hunting small birds in their gardens – perhaps not a sight for the faint-hearted but all part of the food chain.

Another bird of prey which is becoming easier to see is the common buzzard. Like the peregrine, buzzard numbers were significantly reduced in the past due to persecution and the use of pesticides. Numbers gradually recovered after the war but the east of the UK was one of the last areas to be colonised and birds have reached this area only relatively recently. Buzzards fly regularly over the village and can also be seen perching near the road-side on the Longstanton bypass. The sight of a family group last summer suggests that they have bred successfully in the area as well. Finally, if you are fortunate you may even catch sight of a red kite, a beautiful bird with its rusty coloured plumage and forked tail. Although a less frequent visitor than the buzzard, it is also gradually moving in from the west of the country and has recently been spotted over the village.

Everyone came away with something wearable (including the leaders!) and I think we found some hidden talent in some of the girls! Anneke also commented on how well behaved the girls were.

## Willingham in the 1920s

Last month we published the first in a series of letters from Marjorie Pennells (formerly Smith) looking back to her childhood in Willingham. The series continues with memories of the Feast – perhaps not so very different from today.

#### **Letter No 2**

#### From Marjorie Pennells

Your mention of Overcote brought back memories. On Sunday evenings in the summer our parents, my brother and I would cycle there. It was a very popular spot. While the parents were chatting we and the other children played in the water. Later John and I lived in London in a top-floor flat, and our children, Christine and Colin, thought going to Nan and Grandad's in Willingham was heaven. We all had bicycles there and we used to cycle miles.

I don't suppose the church bells toll when anyone in the village dies now. It used to toll three for a man, two for a woman and one for a child. We would count the tolls and then we knew who had died because we knew who was sick. Do you have Willingham Feast now? Feast Sunday was always the Sunday nearest to 11 October. There would be a visiting Salvation Army Band which joined the Willingham Band and then they paraded round the village. En route

several people with money boxes collected money which went to Addenbrookes Hospital (which in those days was paid for by voluntary subscription). The parade ended at the village green where there would be an open air service. I understand that this service was connected to the Church and Harvest Thanksgiving. Also on Feast Sunday the ladies (if they could afford it) turned out in their new winter coats. On the following three evenings there would be roundabouts, swings and stalls on the village green. All the fun of the fair.

There was a Mr Ambrose in the village who made boiled sweets. On a certain day of the year he would come to the school with bags of sweets which we would buy for 1d a bag. I cannot recall if there was a special reason for this. I think his daughter Grace married Ken Jeeps.

Are the two windmills still there in Willingham? One was up the Station Road on Tony Manning's land and the other in Mill Road. I am interested that Tony Manning has told you about the fire which destroyed several houses in Silver Street, including the one belonging to his parents. The houses were next to where the new Salvation Army is now. The doctor who lived opposite the Co-op was called Dr Higgins, and after he left, Mr Francis Jeeps and his family lived there. (Dickie Jeeps, his son, became a very wellknown England rugby player when he grew up.) I think Mr Francis Jeeps was mayor of Cambridge at some time. Mr Hounsell was the headmaster when I went to school. He was a very nice person, and he retired about a year after I left school. At the church the vicar was the Reverend Hair when I was baptised, and the Reverend Bywaters came later.

If you do miss the call you will need to phone reception and book another telephone appointment.

**New Telephone System** Apologies for any inconvenience caused to patients during the installation of our new telephone system. We are aware that there were some difficulties when we changed over but are confident that the problems have been resolved.

**Flu & Shingles Vaccinations** The flu vaccination programme for 2015/2016 has now finished. 1417 patients received flu vaccinations this season. We still have an ongoing programme to vaccinate certain patients against shingles. The vaccination helps to prevent the disease and also is very effective in reducing the pain experienced after the disease. Eligible patients will have a birth date of between 02/09/42 and 01/09/45 or between 02/09/35 and 01/09/37. This is a once only vaccination so if you have already had it, you do not need another one.

**Travel Vaccinations** If you are travelling abroad this summer please remember to check if you need any travel vaccinations. You can book an appointment with one of our nurses who will be happy to check for you.

**Patient Parking** Please could we ask that all parking at the Surgery is used strictly for attending the surgery. It has come to our attention that parents are using our car park in order to drop of their children at the Primary School and this has had an impact on patient parking.

**Out of hours cover** Please remember to phone Urgent Care Cambridge on 111 if you require medical attention when the surgery is closed. Please remember that Accident & Emergency is intended for life threatening conditions or if you are likely to need an X-ray.

## PASTORAL LETTER

JUDGING WORD Jesus declared publicly: ' (...) If anyone hears my words and does not keep them faithfully, it is not I who shall condemn him, since I have come not to condemn the world, but to save the world: he who rejects me and refuses my words has his judge already: the WORD itself that I have spoken will be his judge on the last day' (conf. John 12, 44-50).

#### The Mission of the Church

The Apostolic Church defeated ethnic, economic and cultural boundaries. Among the members of the municipality of Christians there was not a problem in the appointment of a black man as the priest, a slave as the bishop and the local banker as responsible for the ministry to the sick and prisoners. Foreigners were appointed deacons and missionaries were not the youngest and strongest, but even elderly people. They were bonded together because of their faith in Jesus Christ, who revealed to them a Word of life that gives the promise of the Kingdom of Heaven. That Word was associated with the hearts of the people, not with their knowledge or possession. The Church was summoning missionaries to the ends of the known world to proclaim to all people without borders that salvation is available now to anyone who believes in Jesus Christ, son of God: the Victor of the death and the Giver of life immortal. The Holy Spirit had easy access to the believers because He was recognized in a variety of sources; there was the solid knowledge about the response to the specific challenges of missionary work and there was no doubt as to the supernatural nature of the services in the Church including obedience to the Church hierarchy. As then, so now, the Church is alive, although it loses its members by persecution and trouble.

#### The word which divides

The Message Mary entrusted to the world at La Salette (conf. apparition of Our Lady of La Salette, France – 19 September 1846) is a Word from the sky, which puts Jesus Christ, Son of God at the centre of this message. The Word spoken with pain and care by the Mother of God shall evaluate the behaviour of the human race: the first part of Her talk is the analysis of the bad spiritual situation of humanity; in the second, she reveals the promise of amendment provided by, what is always recalled in the Bible: the conversion. There is no other conversion but conversion to God, who has revealed himself in Jesus Christ. All other conversions are relapses, reimbursements, varieties, but not human decisions confirming the life everlasting. The Mother of the Saviour shares with us His opinion on the topic, leaving each one of us to decide on conversion. If we will listen to her, we will live. If we won't listen, it will be only our own range of alluring danger of perdition at our own request. Thanks to Mary for having wished to say those difficult and painful words to us. Thanks to her again for ending her Message with good news that blurs the sharp impression of her first words.

#### The word of judgement

Jesus does not wrap in cotton wool the words of truth: I am – He says – the light that illuminates the darkness. If this light does not reach us all yet, it will soon, through the Church. This Good News is addressed to everyone. Everyone must confront it! If someone despises Jesus and does not believe in His word, it will be that very Word which will accuse him or her of failure to cooperate. And it is always the same manner: God declares His love through the death and resurrection of His Son Jesus Christ that every man might live forever with the fruits of the Son of God's victory.

May the Church never forget that she has to be a missionary, she has to go to the people. If the Church would prefer to 'nurse' her own word within her own parish only – she will be lost at the Judgment of the Word of God.

#### Willingham Tree Warden Scheme

In January the Parish Council appointed Diana Oviatt-Ham as the village's Tree Warden. The Tree Warden scheme was launched by The Tree Council in 1990 to work with local authorities, parish councils, voluntary organisations and local partnerships. Tree Wardens are volunteers, appointed by parish councils or other community organisations, who gather information about their local trees, get involved in local tree matters and encourage local practical projects related to the trees and woods.

#### Wings for Life World Run

This major charity event will take place on 8 May. Over 3,000 athletes will take part in a marathon starting in Cambridge and passing through various villages to the north west of Cambridge including Earith, Willingham and Over.
