## **LETTER No 3**

### From Marjorie Pennells

Thank you for the copies of the *Willingham News* and the calendar – what a lovely surprise. I remember several of the calendar pictures but not all. You do have a lot of things going on in the village now. What a difference from my days. How we



would have loved a Youth Club, but we enjoyed meeting up, playing games or chatting. That was all right in the summer but in the winter it was too cold and dark as we had no street lights. I was about 12 when gas and street lighting came, and electricity came soon after. I have sometimes talked to friends about village life years ago – no electricity, no gas, no flush toilets, having to get water from the tap in the road etc. They often say they wouldn't have been able to cope.

Looking back I think we had a happy childhood. One of the pictures in the calendar took me back to the past, and that was the village pump. When we were young we used to run up the steps and slide down the side of the steps which was smooth. Sometimes there would be a film show in the Public Hall and nine times out of ten it would break down and we would have to wait till it was sorted out so we could see the end of the film.

It has taken them a long time to do something with the railway line. Your bus sounds wonderful. What a lovely way to travel. When I was demobbed from the ATS after the War, I worked in the booking office at Longstanton station for a few months. By that time John was out of the Army and living with his parents, and working in London. That is when I left Willingham and moved to London. Consequently my ties to my 'home ground' have gradually disappeared. However, the magazines you so kindly sent have brought me up to date with what is a new Willingham There are so many activities nowadays and there is obviously so much more life in the community. I am happy that the magazines have shown me what Willingham is like these days.

# OPEN DAYS WILLINGHAM WINDMILL

## NATIONAL MILLS WEEKEND 2016 SATURDAY, 14 MAY and SUNDAY, 15 MAY 1 - 5 pm

This time last year the cap on the mill suddenly ceased turning. The wormwheel had become worn and some teeth were missing. This meant that the cap and sails would remain in the same position no matter which way the wind blew and was potentially dangerous.

Over the summer, work was carried out to remove the driveshaft (not without difficulty) and wormwheel. New blank teeth were attached, shaped and dressed to run true with the driveshaft; wormwheel and new bearings were refitted in October.

The cap now turns smoothly into the prevailing wind. However, whilst the sails have remained stationary there has been more weathering and water damage which will require considerable work.

If you are interested in supporting the restoration of Cattell's Mill, (one of the largest smock mills in East Anglia) visitors are welcome from 1 to 5 pm for this year's National Mills Weekend on Saturday 14 and Sunday 15 May when many of the country's other wind and watermills open their doors to the public.

Cream teas, cakes and refreshments will be served from our cafe, postcards and real stone ground flour (from Wicken Mill) will be on sale to raise funds. A 'mill to mill' radio link will be run once again courtesy of Cambridge Amateur Radio Society.

All proceeds go to the Cattell's Mill Restoration and Preservation Trust who are, as always, extremely grateful to our supporters and volunteers.

## **Travelling Through Brazil**

With the Olympics in Brazil this year, what better time to consider going there for a holiday? Back in 1998, I travelled through South America on an overland truck with a small group of people. We entered Brazil from Venezuela in the north and camped beside a river on our first night. After a couple of days on the road, it was a chance to wash ourselves and our clothes in the river.

The next day we crossed the equator. This required participating in a group initiation ceremony - dressing up in anything we could find, such as black plastic bags followed by a quiz about Brazil. Any incorrect answers involved swapping clothes and sipping beer through a drip feed. Yes, it was bizarre, but great fun.

After more long days in the truck, we arrived in Manaus where we prepared for a trip into the Amazon jungle. We set off in dug-out canoes and travelled down the river and witnessed the confluence of two rivers – an extraordinary sight where the black and white rivers run side by side for 18 kilometres but because of temperature and density differences, they don't actually mix.

During the three days in the jungle, we saw caiman, canaries, a white water eagle and the most magnificent sunrises and sunsets as well as catching piranha fish for supper (after swimming in the river! Apparently, they don't attack living, moving things, or so we were told...). We also learnt about some of the trees and their wonderful properties. For instance, the Julica tree is used in Aspirin. In addition, we watched pink and grey freshwater dolphins at play which was magical.

Back in Manaus, we prepared for the 4-day ferry trip along the Amazon to Belem - 1175 miles long. If you board the ferry early, you get to choose the best hooks to hang your hammock on! By the time we set off, there was a sea of hammocks drifting in the breeze and what seemed like the whole population of South America onboard, along with chickens, TV sets and everything else deemed necessary in this world.

Meals were served on a long table on a rota basis and the washing facilities for the hundreds onboard consisted of 4 toilets, 4 showers and 4 basins al fresco. See the picture!



It was a once-in-a-lifetime experience but heaven to reach Belem, check into a hotel with a bed, bathroom and air conditioning.

There followed more long days seeing Brazilian rural life through the truck windows. There is no welfare system and a great deal of poverty. The villages have wattle and daub huts with thatched roofs made from palm leaves – and no running water or lighting.

We stopped off at Sete Cidades National Park with its strange sandstone formations, estimated to be over 190 million years old. Some of the towns we visited were full of Spanish colonial style architecture and despite being in poor repair, very beautiful.

Salvador is a vibrant city with a history of drumming and has a very African flavour where many of the liberated slaves settled. The women often wear traditional white dresses and look amazing.

Finally, we arrived in Rio de Janeiro for New Year and welcomed the New Year sitting on Copacabana beach watching the most incredible firework display with Sugarloaf Mountain in the background. Brazilians love a party and there were supposedly over 2.5 million people there.

The next day, the city was very quiet (rum and coke had been flowing all night) so it was a good opportunity to go up Corcovado to see Christ the Redeemer, standing 30 metres high and weighing over 1000 tons then getting a cable car up Sugarloaf Mountain to view the slumbering city below.

Leaving Rio and the old year behind, we set off in the truck once again, reaching Foz do Iguacu a couple of days later. This is where the Iguacu Falls are situated and can be viewed from both Brazil and Argentina. Nothing prepares you for the sight of these roaring and spectacular falls. They are incredible.

So ends some of my experiences of Brazil. It is a truly fascinating country and I hope I have persuaded some of you to visit it, Olympics or not.

We have decided that no one needs to fast for these annual blood tests. There will still be other occasions, however, when the doctor will ask for a fasting blood test.

**Travel Vaccinations** Going abroad this summer? Please remember to check if you need any travel vaccinations. Book an appointment with a nurse who will be happy to check for you.

**Out of hours Cover** Please remember to phone Urgent Care Cambridge on 111 if you require medical attention when the surgery is closed. Accident & Emergency is intended for life threatening conditions or if you are likely to need an X-ray.

## PASTORAL LETTER

During the lent period we, at the Baptist Church, embarked on an amazing adventure – an adventure that taught us a lot about ourselves and about God. This didn't involve packing bags and travelling to some far flung corner of the world, but it was an adventure within our daily lives – at home, at work, at play. We tried out many different spiritual disciplines to help us be more aware of God in the ordinary.

As Jesus walked this earth he preached 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near.' (Matthew 4:17) In other words, we are called to reconsider our approach to life because Jesus has given us the opportunity of living in line with God's eternal purposes, of moving our life into his life. How remarkable is that? Heaven is not just something for the future, a wonderful thing to look forward to. Heaven is near to us each and every day. In fact, when Jesus was teaching the disciples to pray he taught them the Lord's Prayer which says 'your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.' As we pray we call on God's kingdom to come to where we are.

So, if God's kingdom is near, shouldn't we be aware of it? That was what we tried to be as we sought God. We tried different ways of praying, meditating on the words of the bible, fasting (doing without food for 24 hours), showing compassion to others, walking in the countryside, gazing at the stars and many other varied things. As we did this, we tried to sense God in what we were doing. Interestingly we all had different experiences, as different people sensed God in different activities. Sometimes I would find it really hard but somebody else would say they had an amazing experience. At other times I would feel so close to God but somebody else would struggle, though as we tried more things, we became better at sensing God in them. How awesome to find yourself to be in God's presence!

As we became more aware of God's presence in these moments, we found that we were aware of him at other times. For as you grow accustomed to somebody's voice you can hear it better, or pick it out in a crowd. So, for me, the adventure was a successful one. God is really here; his kingdom is close at hand. He isn't a remote God but one who wants to be intimately involved in our lives whether we are at home, at school, at work, out and about or even at church!

Sometimes I think we look for a grand revelation of God and miss meeting him in the mundane. Give him a chance; seek him in the ordinary moments of your lives, and each encounter, no matter how small, will build up to a greater understanding of God which will transform your approach to life.

May you know the presence of our loving God in all areas of your lives.

# SALTWATER FLY FISHING IN LOS ROQUES

Fly fishing is my love and I have caught many species on a fly rod (always returning them to the water) but saltwater fly fishing is becoming more popular and it was something I had an urge to try. There are opportunities to pursue this sport in the UK, mainly sea bass, but it was tropical saltwater fishing that caught my imagination. The main quarry is the bonefish, widespread in the Caribbean and Indian Ocean. After searching the web and making a few phone calls, I decided on Venezuela - on the island of Los Roques about eighty miles from Caracas. Los Roques Archipelago National Park was created in 1972 to protect a marine system of exceptional beauty and ecological value dominated by coral reefs, mangroves, and seagrass beds. It occupies an area of 1000 square kilometres, made up of 50 keys and 250 sand banks forming a ring with a central lagoon.

On a very cold and wet night in February, sitting on the coach heading for Heathrow, I experienced some trepidation about what lay ahead. Was I foolish to undertake this notion at seventy? What if I wasn't fit enough or fell ill? Would that dodgy hip hold up? Too late, the die was cast!

On arriving at Caracas I was taken to a hotel which had security barriers outside and my details were checked before I was let through. I was told not to leave the hotel grounds as Caracas is the world's most violent city. The courier changed fifty of my US dollars into the local currency of Bolivars. I received 33,000 - about the size of a brick. Inflation peaked at 270% in 2015; the economy is a mess but I had a steak and a beer before bed for 17000 Bolivars.

The next morning I flew to the island of Los Roques,

booked into the hotel, got changed and started doing what I'd come all this way for.....bonefishing! A fishing guide took me to the boat and we motored out to the small islands or sandbanks and waded knee deep looking for bonefish or other species that would take a fly. The guides are essential as they can spot fish 50 feet away that you can't see until they are on your line in front of you. The first day I lost more fish than I caught through inexperience but I returned to the hotel happy that I had caught my first 'grey ghost' which refers to their elusiveness.

There were only two other fishermen in the hotel and were buddies from England. Normally the hotel had lots of Americans but a current spat between the US and Venezuela means US citizens require a visa so they have decamped to Cuba where restrictions have been lifted.

I joined the English guys for the evening meal of mainly fish and pasta and lots of piscatorial conversation. They had fished all over the world and weren't short of fishing stories.

The next day was more fruitful; as well as catching bonefish, I caught a small shark, a barracuda and a snapper. On the penultimate day some big tarpon were seen in the harbour and after the day's fishing I discovered one of the English guys had caught two. The last day was very successful and I caught about ten bonefish. I asked the guide to head back to the harbour early so I could have a go at the tarpon and whilst we saw them occasionally sliding past the boat, I didn't hook one. Next time perhaps?

I landed on a grey, cold day finding it remarkable I had been wading in the warm waters of the Caribbean the day before.

# WEEE (Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment) Collection

For the last two years, WISER Recycling has organised a collection of waste equipment in the village, and has donated the proceeds to the Council – who has, in turn, passed this on to WAG. Unfortunately, WISER has informed us that the market for scrap is very depressed and there will be no financial return this year. However, the Council has given permission for another collection in the summer as we consider this to be a useful service. Watch out for details nearer the time.

### Extra Support during Power Cuts

UK Power Networks can offer free extra support if you need it during a power cut. This is for their customers who are dependent on medical equipment, are chronically ill or disabled, visually or hearing impaired, elderly, in nursing or residential homes, or those with young babies. The support provides a priority 24-hour phone number, text messages and updates and extra support from their partners – for example, the British Red Cross can visit in an emergency (They will check with you first). Historic England has added the War Memorial in the cemetery to its lists as a Grade II monument on the grounds that historically 'it is an eloquent witness to the tragic impacts of world events on this community and the sacrifices it made in the conflicts of the 20th Century'; and in design 'it is an accomplished and wellrealised war memorial which takes the form of a Celtic wheelhead cross'.
