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

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
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
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Poem for March

At our January meeting we had an extremely informative talk about UN Hazardous Occupations – Crawling through the rubble... and having tea with the Taliban with Gary O'Shea.

Gary is a very eloquent speaker who took us into his world of Disaster Management. His regular job is as a corporate accounts manager but, for roughly 12 weeks of the year, he works with International Rescue, tackling disasters such as earthquakes in poor areas of the world. His specialism is at the first stage of rescue and assessment which usually lasts up to 14 days. Gary explained about the 'golden 72 hours'. It is during this time that live victims are usually found. Outside of this time frame the chance of finding people alive decreases dramatically.

His mix of personal anecdotes and explanations of how emergency response forces work together kept the audience transfixed. In response to questions, Gary shared with us his belief that, in the future, he thought it extremely likely that disasters would relate to the damming of water and its effect on populations lower down the water course – very thoughtprovoking.

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A Welsh Recipe to celebrate St David's Day on 1 March

Weish Cawi (Lamb and Root Vegetable Soup)

Cawl (pronounced cow-l, like towel, in one syllable) is a thrifty traditional Welsh soup dish, dating back to the 14th century. Recipes vary from kitchen to kitchen in Wales, and are often passed down through families. It is really very simple – a soup made from a cheap cut of red meat stewed slowly with winter root vegetables. But, oh, it is so much more than a simple soup – ask any Welsh person. Because Cawl is a simple, traditional food, recipes are usually more of a guide than a strict set of ingredients and instructions. Of course, you have to use leeks, it's not Cawl without leeks.

Traditionally the choice of meat depended on what was available, however it was always an economical cut which required long slow cooking. Cawl isn't really a meaty soup, the meat is there to flavour it. The cooking method is proof that old traditional diets were often very good for you. By slow cooking the lamb, the soup is enriched with the nutrients from the meat. It has a multitude of health benefits particularly supporting poor digestion. The neck is a tough cut of meat, and slow cooking breaks down the tough tissue, making the meat easier to digest.

This will satisfy and warm up 6 hungry people.

Ingredients

Butter or olive oil

- 600g bone-in lamb neck*
- Salt and pepper
- 2 large potatoes, peeled and cubed
- 2 carrots, peeled and cubed
- 2 parsnips, peeled and diced
- 2 small turnips, peeled and diced
- 1 small swede, peeled and diced
- 2 leeks, thinly sliced
- A few sprigs of thyme or parsley

* Lamb neck can be substituted for other cuts – such as shoulder or even chops, but a better taste is achieved when the bone goes in the stew too.

Instructions

1 Heat a large deep pan on the hob with a smidge of butter or oil. Sprinkle the lamb with a little salt and pepper, then sear in the pan until browned on all sides – this step is not essential but gives the soup a deeper flavour.

2 Add 2 litres of water to the pan, and bring to the boil. Lower to a simmer and add all root vegetables – except the leeks. Simmer uncovered for 2-3 hours, or until the meat is so tender it falls apart. The fat from the meat rises to the top of the pan so you can skim it if you prefer to.

3 Twenty minutes before you are ready to serve, add the leeks to the pan.

4 When the Cawl is ready, take out the meat and shred it, taking care to discard all the bones. Return the meat to the soup. 5 Finally, sprinkle with fresh thyme or parsley for a touch of colour and flavour, then serve in deep bowls with bread, butter and a hunk of strong cheese – Caerphilly or Cheddar.

March Stories from Mike Petty's Cambridgeshire Scrapbooks

Mike Petty is a local historian with a huge knowledge of Cambridgeshire and the Fens. He writes a daily column, 'Looking Back', in the *Cambridge News* and these excerpts are from these when Willingham has appeared:

Thursday 20 March 1928

A remarkable story of how a Willingham flower and fruit grower took a farm at Whittlesford, in order to get his two sons set up in farming, and lost £2,600 over it, was told at the Bankruptcy Court. In 1881, he'd set up as a nurseryman and flower and fruit grower and bought additional land, but lost a considerable sum in a malting business in Ware. In 1920 he set up his two sons as farmers at Whittlesford New Farm. The cause of his failure was four barren seasons through the weather.

Thursday 25 March 1954

Papworth Everard will not get a warden to guide children to the village school. Traffic was reasonably heavy and is faster than it need be, but there is a speed limit on the road which can be enforced. It is also intermittent; you can wait ten minutes without anything passing through at all. Every village wanted a warden and many, such as Willingham, had more need of one. They should be encouraged to provide their own voluntary wardens.

Tuesday 28 March 1956


The bell of Willingham county school, silent since 1939, will again summon pupils to their lessons. Its tolling will mark the centenary of the opening of the school built in 1856 by voluntary subscriptions and labour. An exhibition will be staged contrasting modern teaching methods with those of bygone days. The school is appealing for old exercise books or class photographs that shed light on its history. A new flag has been designed and will be flown on a new mast that is being erected in the grounds.

Wednesday 4 March 1984

George Webb Haulage, which started over 40 years ago, are willing to move anything. Now they have moved themselves from Willingham to new offices in Longstanton. Two years ago Marshall's of Cambridge rang to ask why they did not use British trucks. When they heard the Webbs' specialist needs were not catered for they arranged a meeting with the manager of Leyland trucks. The resulting vehicle is now in production at the Scammell factory.

QEII Park – Your Space for Rest and Play

Following the publication of the *Parish Plan* in 2009, six years of tireless planning, two 'It's a Knockout' events, and a stream of fundraising, we finally see completion of the park that Willingham deserves – the QEII Park.

For those who haven't visited the QEII field of late, it is now a vibrant, active park with a range of equipment to suit all ages. The process of this £150k park re-development began after feedback from the Parish Plan highlighted the need for improved play facilities. This was followed in 2010 by the creation of a project group within WAG (Willingham Action Group) to focus on development of play facilities within the village. Later that year, following a village-wide petition, we succeeded in securing 'Fields in Trust' status for the playground, thereby guaranteeing preservation of the field as a village amenity for recreation and opening discussions for development of the existing park.

The exciting process of selecting play equipment then commenced, with extensive consultations held with user groups of all ages throughout the village, before a tender went out for plans from play companies. A final plan was selected that we felt encompassed many of the key wishes of the villagers, although sadly it fell short of some of the more aspirational requests made, a swimming pool and a skate park!

Installation of the under 12s equipment took place after an enormously successful 'It's a Knockout' event in 2014 and was followed by a further community event in 2016 to raise the final contribution for the over 12s equipment which has now all been installed.

We feel we finally have a park we can be proud of, a park that will engage and challenge our young people, as well as being a fantastic space for families to enjoy a picnic on a sunny day.

None of this would have been possible without the generous support of a number of bodies including: Imagen, Amey Cespa, WREN, Domino Printing, Amazon, Brewers Decorator Centres and the Parish Council. We would like to take this chance to extend our thanks to them and all involved in creating this wonderful space.

With completion, we now hand over the facilities to residents to enjoy, develop and protect. Have fun! Those who have spent a lot of time developing these facilities wish to see the facilities enjoyed by all. Willingham is a great place to live.

A14 Upgrade

It has started, but when it will finish is less certain. However, over the next few years you can expect even more delays along the A14. At our February meeting, a councillor commented that his occasional commute from Willingham into Cambridge for a 9 am arrival is now often taking over an hour, at an average speed of less than 10 mph. He asked County Councillor, Peter Hudson, what plans the County Council had to deal with the added delays that are now likely. Councillor Hudson was not aware of any plans.

As a humble Parish Council, we may often be critical of the higher government authorities at national, county and district level but one thing you have to say about South Cambridgeshire District Council is that they are really good at rubbish.

They were leaders in recycling and way ahead of most other District Councils in the use of wheelie bins and kerb-side collections. Let's hope that the cost-saving changes coming this month do not diminish their excellent record. Willingham's new collection day will be Friday, with a similar pattern of blue/green and black bins being emptied on alternate weeks, but watch out for the Bank Holidays! Black bin collection in the week of the first May Bank Holiday is on Saturday 6 May. Details of collections can be found on the Parish Council website.

Boundary Review

A state of mutual disagreement has been announced with Over Parish Council. They claim that Willingham Parish Council is trying to land-grab Highgate Farm in the hope of securing future business rates. It is not true. The residents living locally have petitioned for an area of land that is clearly part of Willingham to be formally recognised as part of Willingham. Willingham Parish Council agrees. The boundary goes back 400 years, to a time when both villages looked very different. Kirstin Donaldson, Development Officer at South Cambridgeshire District Council, made an excellent presentation at the February Parish Council meeting, regarding the process that will be involved in the formal review. 

PASTORAL LETTER

Writing this at the start of February, I'm aware that you will be reading it at the start of March which, this year, is also the beginning of Lent in the Christian calendar.

During the six-week period leading up to Easter, Lent is one of the most important times of the year for many Christians around the world. It is regarded with a similar level of importance to Advent, the build up to Christmas, but whilst Advent is a celebration and a time of excitement as Christmas approaches, particularly for children opening doors on their Advent calendars to find the chocolate hidden within, Lent is quite different. From its start on Ash Wednesday (1 March this year) to its conclusion on Easter Sunday, Lent has been a traditional time for giving something up, typically chocolate in the Western world! But do we know why we give chocolate up?

People tend to choose chocolate as it's a luxury item. Others will give up meat or alcohol for the same reason. It is also becoming increasingly common to give up other things such as watching television, going to the gym or contributing to social media. Last year, I gave up Facebook, realising that I was spending far too long each day catching up with posts! It was becoming a bit of an obsession. The purpose of giving something up is to refocus our faith during this time. If you do give something up, maybe the challenge to ask yourself is: How is this refocusing my faith? Is what I'm giving up creating space for me to spend more time thinking about Jesus?

In more recent years, it has become popular to take something up during Lent, rather than to give something up. This can be committing to do a Lent course (there's one running at St Mary and All Saints if this interests you), reading through one of the Gospels in the Bible or taking up a challenge to be more generous. Why not have a look at the 40Acts for Lent, an online resource that, every day throughout Lent (not including Sundays), sends a generosity challenge and short Bible-based blog straight to your Inbox. Each act is designed to sharpen your awareness and give you practical ways to stretch your faith as well as your generosity, with three challenge levels. Why not do something different this year and engage with Lent in a new way?

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
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
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Willingham Wheels – could it be the club for you?

You may have read recently (or indeed not so recently as it is - apparently - not such a new quote) that if exercise didn't involve a whole lot of self-motivation and actual physical activity, but instead came in a pill, it would be hailed immediately as 'a wonder drug'. Well, we mid-forties to mid-sixties cyclists of Willingham Wheels have been taking one between meals for a few years now, with no great motivation required. Well, ok, in the winter months it is less attractive, admittedly, but once you have said you will meet someone at The Porterhouse (7.30 pm Tuesdays and Thursdays, 9 am Sundays), you generally do, kitted out to enjoy the ride (almost) whatever the weather. Members come, some go again, but we are gradually increasing in numbers. All around the same age group, and it'll probably stay that way, unless we get a whole group of young'uns suddenly joining all at the same time. Those new to regular cycling tend to not believe us when we say they will be up to speed within a couple of weeks, but they always are. Then they start complaining that there are no hills around here! We have strategies for not making newcomers feel they are holding us up. One of them is to make the Thursday ride a pub outing. Usually to an establishment within 10 - 12 miles. At the moment we are knocking off an alphabetical list. It is a pity the Zebra in Cambridge closed, but if anyone knows of another Z, we would be most interested. At the last count, we had visited about 60 in all. We go on our old bikes as leaving bikes outside pubs can prove costly, and the ride is at the pace of whoever is with us. We drink in pairs and therefore usually have just a couple before the turnaround. It's all very scientific - we make sure the wind is behind us coming home. Now, two pints is about 400 calories. Twenty miles cycling uses 800-900 calories, so you actually get slimmer by doing this, as well as improving the old cardiovascular system with each rotation of the pedals.

We have a membership fee of $\pounds 10$ which pays for club insurance. The Flood of 16 March 1947 – A Personal Reminiscence

At the time of the 1947 flood, my father farmed at Bridge Farm, Willingham with his brother. The flooding at Haddenham Fen was widely known about but West Fen at Willingham was flooded first and the waters moved from there into Haddenham Fen.

There had been prolonged freezing conditions over the winter and the rapid thaw and gales sent the waters down the Ouse from Bedfordshire. The Internal Drainage Board had believed that all the dykes were dry and the Great Ouse River Board knew nothing of the breach at Over until my uncle rang them. The water advanced between Bridge Farm and Willingham Engine, behind the houses on West Fen Road and Earith Road, but none of the houses was flooded.

My uncle had moved out of Bridge Farm and divided the livestock between Cold Harbour Farm on Over Road and Raven's Farm on Station Road. He was grateful for their good nature and also the help of the late John Gawtry of Cottenham. However, only the cellar was flooded in the end.

At Shelford Farm, Earith Bridge, a bull had to be left behind in the flood waters as no-one dared take him. He was later rescued when a rope was tied around his horns so that he could be dragged to safety behind a boat.

In the end, no houses in Willingham were flooded and no livestock lost but, later that year in May, when a tornado hit the village, it caused as much, if not more, damage than the flood.

Willingham Lode (next to the Recreation Ground) is currently in a poor state, as is Long Pond – the danger of flooding is always with us.

Paul launched his little kite again, having shortened its tail. This time, it stayed up for 10 minutes before it dropped

gracefully on to Paul's head.

The blue man spent even longer than he did last time getting his giant kite and himself ready for a second launching. Once again, he stepped off the edge of his cliff. Once again, he dropped like a stone.

Paul launched his little kite for a third time, and this time, it soared up up up into the sky, and stayed there, with Paul hanging onto the other end for grim death. That little kite was so high that we could hardly see it. It danced. It dipped. It did figures-of-eight.

The blue man trudged back up to his launching pad, sorted out his bits and bobs and jumped and dropped down onto the beach. He did this over and over again, and every time he landed, he got crosser and crosser and crosser.

Eventually, having landed on the beach for the umpteenth time, he stomped away, dragging his giant kite behind him, looking neither to the left nor the right.


When he was a dot in the distance, Paul's little kite was still soaring and dipping and dancing and doing figures-ofeight in the clouds.
