POLICE REPORTS Village Parking Problems

I am aware from the many emails South Cambridgeshire officers receive from Neighbourhood Panel meetings, that parking is a constant concern for many residents in villages across South Cambridgeshire.

Many of you may know that I cannot prioritise parking patrols over investigating and preventing crime and responding to calls for service. In light of this, it means that my officers might not do as much parking enforcement as many of you would like.

I have been giving some thought as to how we can meet your expectations on parking enforcement and have decided to try something new. I have therefore set up an online web-page where you can report concerns about parking. The information that you give will go directly to me and will help us build a picture of the exact hotspots for parking issues. I will then use this information on targeted 'crackdown' days. There is some good evidence that crackdowns work in other areas of policing, so we are going to try it for parking. For obvious reasons I will not be publicising the dates of the crackdowns in advance, but updates will be sent to you, by e-cops, twitter and facebook, once we have completed a crackdown day.

I am not pretending that this will solve all parking problems, however, I do think that it strikes the right balance between dealing with parking concerns and the other important work that we do.

Recent Media Coverage about Policing in Villages

Some of you may have seen recent media reporting regarding our policing of villages. I would like to emphasise that we do prioritise policing of the villages but what I do ask is that my officers prioritise the 'hottest' areas within our villages. This does mean that certain areas in some villages get more attention than those villages with very low crime. I believe this is a sensible approach to policing which most of you would agree with. The main benefit of our local policing structure is that you have your own, dedicated local resources that are responsible for policing South Cambridgeshire rather than the City.

I have sought to put as much time and effort as possible over the last three years into crime prevention events in the villages (first Operation Oaklands and more recently Operation Hunter). Your local officers and I work hard to give you the best, most intelligent policing service we can; but if you do have any concerns please do get in touch – or come to our next round of neighbourhood panel meetings where you can join in the discussion.

The Community Governance Review: Willingham's Boundary with Over

The Parish Council is disappointed by the introduction of unattributed sources into discussions about the Community Governance Review – especially when the facts are straightforward! These are:

- The current historic boundary between Willingham and Over has not kept pace with the development of our village. Some houses in Haden Way are sited within Over parish but have telephone connections originating from the Willingham exchange. Residents of these houses will register for medical care from the village medical practice and their children may attend our Primary School.
- The boundary is having a negative impact on the more than 20 businesses, employing up to 100 local residents, currently sited around Highgate Country Stores. These businesses are also located within Over parish, although clearly part of Willingham, and they report problems with the efficient delivery of internet and postal services because of confusion as to location. Deliveries of stock can be delayed due to their misdirection to the Norman Way commercial area in Over.
- Both local residents and businesses would prefer to be formally recognised as part of Willingham. This is acknowledged by Over Parish Council¹.
- A valid petition requesting a review of the boundary between Willingham and Over was submitted to South Cambridgeshire District Council last year, signed by over 400 residents of both villages. This petition was accepted and every Willingham household has been asked recently to take part in the consultation for this review. The deadline for taking part in the consultation is **Tuesday 16 May**.

The Parish Council supports the Review. It believes that the Review offers a 'once in a lifetime' opportunity to adjust the boundary with Over and will enhance Willingham's strong sense of identity as a distinctive and recognisable community. Two boundaries are being considered – the Parish Council supports Option A ('the first proposed alternative'), an effective and convenient minor adjustment which will remove the current anomalous situation for residents and businesses but not impact unduly on the countryside between Willingham and Over.

Whether you agree or not with these arguments the Parish Council urges you to take part in the consultation no later than the deadline of **16 May**. You can do this by completing a short online questionnaire (at <u>bit.ly/2kFNx3w</u>). If you prefer to complete a hard copy of the questionnaire, please contact the Parish Office.

The results of the Review will become available during this Autumn. ¹Article in Over News (March 2017): 'Proposal to move the Parish Boundary between Willingham and Over'.

County, District and Parish Councils

The County Council has set its budget for 2017–2018. An increase of 2% has been agreed which will be ring-fenced to support adult and social care.

It has also been decided that District and Parish Council elections will be held in 2018, following the principle of 'all out'. This means that all District councillors will stand down and then stand for re-election. This will replace the current practice of holding District Council elections annually with only some councillors being required to stand for reelection each year. It is anticipated that this change will contribute to the savings required of the District Council following reductions in central government support. At these 2018 elections there will also be a reduction to two District councillors for our Ward instead of the current three.

Highways

The Parish Council continues to liaise with our County Councillor on issues of congestion in the village – especially Over Road – and the mud on the roads around Northstowe. Villagers accessing the A14 at Bar Hill will be aware also that narrow lanes and speed limits have now been introduced to enable work on the verges of the current carriageway – be patient, they are planned to be in place until December 2020!

Four roads in the village have been chosen for this summer's County Council 'top dressing' programme. These are Balland Field, Brickhills, Newington and Wilford Furlong. Top dressing is designed to protect the road surface from frost damage and to increase skid resistance.

Wings for Life

This year's Wings for Life run will take place on 7 May. There will be local road closures during some parts of the day – please make sure that you are aware of these so that no one's safety is compromised.

Setting up a Timebank

Timebanking is designed to create opportunities for people to help each other by sharing knowledge, help and skills. Cambridge ACRE is organising a workshop to explain how Timebanking works, its possible benefits and how a Timebank can be set up. The workshop will be on **3 April**, 1 - 4 pm in Histon. If you wish to attend please contact the Parish Clerk.

Meeting dates are published on the website, the notice board outside the Public Hall in the High Street, at the Library and are listed below. Members of the public are welcome to attend and speak briefly or ask questions. Names will be taken down at the beginning of each meeting, together with the electoral register number to ensure everyone has a fair chance to speak within the allowed time (15 minutes in total for all speakers -3 minutes maximum per person).

Meeting Dates: 5 April, 3 May. The meetings are held in the Octagon and start at 7 30 pm.

The Parish Council office is open Monday to Thursday from 10 am to 1 pm, except Bank Holidays and there is an answer-phone service outside office hours.

PASTORAL LETTER

JUST FORTY DAYS

The crowds got even bigger and He addressed them: "This is an evil generation; it is asking for a sign. The only sign it will be given is the sign of Jonab. For just as Jonab became a sign to the people of Nineveb, so will the Son of man be a sign to this generation (...)"

Luke 11, 27-30.

The sign of Jonah

Jonah had a simple task to fulfill. For three days he had to preach the countdown on the destruction of Nineveh. On the first day he cried: 'yet forty days, and Nineveh shall be overthrown !' The second day he would probably call out: 'thirty-nine days, and Nineveh shall be overthrown !' Because Nineveh was a vast city that required as many as three days into its transition, probably on the third day the Prophet would have to call out: 'thirty-eight days, and Nineveh shall be overthrown!' The Book of Jonah passes however the message, that the warning was distributed faster than the prophet moved, because the first day the entire Nineveh province launched a penance. It looks like Jonah in the second day went silent and neglected to countdown the remaining days of the announced forty. The inhabitants of Nineveh, with its King at the helm, began their fast, and they kept deducting the days remaining to the announced destruction of Nineveh. Fasting and penance, however, continued - no interruptions. You can expect that they devoted themselves humbly in this attitude, and Jonah did not leave the city until the annunciation or confirmation of divine amnesty for the city. Final judgment of God nobody knew, neither prophet nor people. They all knew that before the forty days expired Jonah could speak up again. They were afraid of only one thing, that the prophet could have called out: 'Eight days (for example), and Nineveh shall be overthrown!' That kind of a sign for the inhabitants of Nineveh was Jonah: he was measuring the expiring time for them not even saying a single word.

The sign of Jesus

We are living at the end of times. We have been preparing for Passover for forty days. Already we are running the countdown days to the experience of the night of the Resurrection. During forty days of Lent we need to ask ourselves a similar question to that of the inhabitants of Nineveh: Does this Passover bring liberation from slavery? Would it release us of sin? Would it allow us to pass from death to life? If we did not resist the dispersal caused by our own affairs we could have overlooked an important element necessary to meet truly with Risen Jesus (Son of men) when He passes by during this Easter. These are important questions to ask because if we are not prepared for this meeting it would be such a big scandal - which is associated with the Passion of Christ, His Cross and death - that could have conceived in us the ruin that leads to despair, rebellion or even suicide! Lent is not a time for collecting souvenirs of a good and merciful God-Man who for me, once upon a time, died and rose again. Jesus is alive and is present among us up to the end of time. So Lent, then, is a time to deal with the demons of modern times, with the sins of the present, and strengthening in the hope of tomorrow's eternity that can come any time, relying on Jesus all the time!

Passover this year may be the last chance to leave my Egypt and enter the promised land of the Kingdom of God. You never know when and how your life might end.

The sign of Jonah during Lent, cited by Jesus, is the elapsing time before Easter Saturday which falls this year on 15 April.

The sign which lasts just ONLY for forty days...

I wish to comment on the letter in the March edition of *Willingham News* concerning the proposed boundary change.

I am firstly surprised that you published this letter as you claim to take care to ensure the accuracy of all submissions. However, this letter contains inaccuracies and makes claims against the landowner, without naming him, for which the writer has no proof.

The writer, based on hearsay, states that the ditch on the edge of Bourneys Manor Close is the parish boundary with Over. If this person was familiar with the village or had bothered to check what they were saying, they would know that the parish boundary is several hundred metres to the west of the ditch they refer to. The boundary runs along Over Mereway which is on the edge of Highgate Farm. This means that the field to which they refer has been in Willingham for hundreds of years.

I have spoken with the landowner regarding the claim made by the writer about wanting to build on the field and he informed me that he has had offers in the past regarding selling for building but has at the moment no intention of selling.

I am concerned that the letter will be read by other people who are not sure about the current parish boundary and misunderstand the real reason for the request for moving the boundary. The real reason is to help the people who have businesses at Highgate Farm who sometimes have difficulties with deliveries and telephone connections because they are in Over. Most of the land which will change from Over to Willingham is in fact owned by Willingham residents. The boundary change would bring their property into their own parish.

Although I am a newcomer to the village (only 40 years), I know the village well enough to comment accurately on where the boundaries are.

Old Willingham

This large barn is situated on the corner of Church Street and Long Lane. It was built in the 1600s but it looks pretty shabby here in the 1970s. However, while cladding has been replaced many times over the years, the original internal structure and beams are still large and strong. Barns were an essential part of village agriculture both for grain storage and for threshing, separating the edible grains from the stalks and chaff.

Before threshing machines this was done by beating on a hard floor in a large barn like this. There used to be several barns in Willingham but this is the only one to survive, being converted to a Grade 11 listed house in 1989. As a condition of conversion, the original threshing floor was left in place and remains under a new raised floor.

LOOKING BACK – APRIL

Tuesday 11 April 1900

Amongst the Baptists at Willingham a serious split has arisen. The members of the church are arrayed against the ordinary members of the congregation as to whether only members of the church could act in the appointment of a pastor, or whether the congregation had a voice in the matter. The dispute was submitted to the president of the Baptist Union.

Tuesday 9 April 1902

Willingham Parish Council have written to Addenbrooke's Hospital concerning a case of measles which it says was sent into the village from the hospital some six weeks since, by which means an epidemic of measles has resulted and at least two deaths caused. They accuse the Hospital authorities of a grave error of judgement and request steps be taken to prevent such an occurrence in future.

12 April 1910

Two young men returning to Willingham from Haddenham on Saturday evening by the nearest route across the fens had an anxious and exciting walk. The night was intensely dark and they had difficulty keeping the proper path. With the aid of matches they managed for some time but soon the last match was struck. Then they reached a bridge over a drain. First one and then the other stepped over the side and dropped into the water. At length they struck the right track and reached home weary and wet.

29 April 1910

A decently-dressed woman called at a Willingham baker's shop and inquired about some respectable lodgings. She was recommended to apply at Mrs W Ellwood's in Newtown. Thither she went and was provided with supper of bread and cheese before retiring to bed. Next morning Mrs Ellwood set out breakfast and then left to draw her old-age pension. On return she found the woman had had breakfast, washed up and put away the cups and saucers and then disappeared. Nothing was disturbed in the house. The police have been informed but can find no trace of the guest.

29 April 1910

A Willingham labourer was charged with stealing £40 in gold from his mother. His parents had gone to work leaving him alone in the house and the money under the mattress of the bed. The neighbour saw the lad with a handful of gold and a search revealed it had gone. Police discovered he had been showing a lot of gold in a public house at Longstanton before leaving for Cambridge by train. When arrested at the Compasses lodging house in East Road he said 'They should not leave the money lying about in the house. I told her I should do her one. She always scrapped the last penny out of me and is always cadging money of me'

Thursday 17 April 1928

At Cambridgeshire Magistrates' Court two Willingham

men were convicted of stealing potatoes from their employer, farmer Thomas Langan, and each fined 10 shillings. A London motorist was convicted of not having a road fund licence at Hauxton; the last licence had expired in June 1927; fined £10. A Dry Drayton man pleaded guilty to using a wireless set without a licence; he was unaware he needed one for a crystal set; fined 10 shillings. Two Cottenham men were convicted of riding bicycles without lights and fined 7s. 6d.

Tuesday 6 April 1929

Four cottages, barn and outhouses gutted at Willingham; big blaze at Teversham; week-end blazes at Little Shelford and Kneesworth.

Tuesday 18 April 1931

Alderman Harry Gleaves Few was born at Willingham in 1848 and spent long years in the service of his village: he was a founder of the Star Benefit Society, Building Society, Water Company and Village Hall and one of the builders of the Willingham Baptist Tabernacle. He was in business as a corn merchant and became an expert in fen drainage. During the Great War he served on the Military Tribunal with his eyes open for the country's need of both soldiers and farm workers.

Wednesday 4 April 1932

Astonishing examples of hardship to farmers were cited at a tithe payers meeting at Willingham. There was an agricultural depression with Norfolk farmers going bankrupt at the rate of one a day. Land worth £25 an acre in 1925 was not worth £5 today, yet the same tithe had to be paid on it. At recent sales of farmers' goods a dozen sheep had been bought for 2s 6d (12p) and a tractor for 2s (10p). It is impossible to get blood out of a stone, but it is possible to smash it – and that was the attitude of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners.

Monday 22 April 1952

The County Council and landowners in Landbeach, Cottenham and Willingham have objected to their land being included in an internal drainage district of the Great Ouse River Board. Cottenham was well served by ditches, drains and gravity drainage, but they were not kept in a proper state. The only way was to put them under a drainage district. But the County claimed that the additional cost of the drainage rate on their smallholdings would increase the rate throughout the whole county.
