



COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

After showers, the sunshine - which makes these lines from *The Tempest* feel more familiar:

You sunburnt sicklemen of August weary, Come hither from the furrow and be merry. Make holiday. Your rye-straw hats put on, And these fresh nymphs encounter every one In country footing.

Studies are progressing into the A10 (necessitated by a new town at Waterbeach) and linking the M11 to the A47. All broadly parallel corridors play a part in northsouth movement, including the B1049 through Cottenham and the B1050 through Willingham. The other side of the A14, doubling the density of Cambridge Science Park and potential housing development around Cambridge North station complicate the situation. It's the Milton interchange throttle that's the problem, not the A10 as such.

The 184 sets of traffic lights in Cambridge, half the total in Cambridgeshire, are going to be overhauled. 52 sets are more than 10 years old. Traffic lights get installed for particular junctions, and their green/red cycles may not be best linked to neighbouring junctions. Recent ANPR traffic flow data, together with better sensors, will enable us to optimise their sequencing.

The Department for Education has published eligibility criteria for parents of three and four year olds for 30 hours childcare from 1 September. The government has information at:

Parish Council Vacancies

There are currently three vacancies on the Parish Council. If you are interested in serving your local community by joining the council and would like to know more about what is involved, please contact either the parish office or any of the councillors for a chat: contact details are below.

A14 Upgrade and Mobile Visitor Centre

The A14 upgrade is the biggest road project currently in construction in the UK. Patrick Howard, the ecology lead, says protecting the environment is one of the 'golden threads that runs through the scheme'. Among the initiatives are the creation of 271 hectares of connected habitats for wildlife, replanting trees at a ratio of two for every one felled, gathering wildflower seeds and specimens for replanting after construction – 866,00 plants from 50 different species (including oak, field maple, elm, hawthorn, blackthorn, elder, bee orchids, common spotted orchids and the slender tare), and using all vegetation cleared either within the local community or as biomass for local energy production. They also must protect wildlife such as great crested newts, water voles, bats, badgers and breeding birds on the sites.

The re-organised date for the Mobile Visitor Centre in Willingham is **Wednesday 11 October** from 4 to 7 pm. The Centre will be at the Ploughman Hall.

Vandalism, Anti-Social Behaviour and Reporting 101

There has been a disappointing amount of anti-social behaviour and vandalism in the village over the summer months. At a recent Police Panel, the clerk asked for additional patrols from our PCSO, particularly around the QEII field, but was dismayed to hear that the PCSO no longer makes any routine visits and only has a presence 'where possible'. It is therefore exceptionally important that any incidents are reported to the police. The 101 non-emergency contact number can be very tedious, but online crime reporting at <u>www.contactcambspolice.uk/Report/Crime/</u> is quick and easy, and we encourage all residents to use this if necessary. Always ring 999 if any crime is serious or there is immediate danger.

Potholes

Talking of online reporting, highways faults and potholes can also be easily reported at <u>highwaysreporting</u>. <u>cambridgeshire.gov.uk</u>.

HOOP

Cambridgeshire County Council and South Cambridgeshire District Council are running a six month pilot project on Housing Options for Older People (HOOP). The aim is to offer people over 65 specialist housing advice and support. After completing a questionnaire (online or via a leaflet), participants will be put in touch with local housing options (sheltered or extra care), support services and community groups which can provide practical support and advice. The aim is for all people to live independently in their own homes for as long as possible and the pilot is committed to doing that before expanding to the whole of Cambridgeshire. For further details, see the website at hoop.eac.org.uk.

Collective Switching

The Cambridgeshire Energy Switch scheme brings together District and County Councils and residents to get cheaper energy tariffs. Taking part is free and without obligation. The more people participate, the more likely cheaper prices can be achieved.

The next energy auction is on **10 October**. To sign up, go to <u>www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk./switch</u>, fill in your energy details from your annual energy statement or recent bills, and click the 'Sign Up Now' button. You can decide whether to accept the offer when the price is determined. You can also call on 01223 715349.

Advice from Police Community Support Shed Security

Many people underestimate the value of the items they store in their sheds. Unfortunately criminals are fully aware of the value of the goods that some people do store in vulnerable places. The following advice can help to keep your property secure and reduce the chance of you becoming a victim of crime.

Whilst a shed is not designed to withstand any form of determined attack, there are some simple measures you can take to make them more secure. Position your garden shed as near to your house as possible so that it is clearly visible from your home.

Consider painting your house number and postcode onto your valuable gardening equipment (eg lawnmower, strimmer and tools). This makes them much less attractive to potential thieves as it makes them more difficult to sell on, and also increases the chances of the property being recovered and returned to its rightful owner if it is stolen.

Avoid storing valuable items such as power tools, fishing tackle or golf clubs in a shed. These items should be stored inside your home or a secure garage.

If you have been working in your garden ensure that you lock away tools such as spades or forks when you're finished. Tools left out overnight could be used by an intruder to gain access to your property.

If you don't intend to use the windows in your shed you can make them secure by screwing them shut or fitting window locks. Hanging old curtain or netting up against the window will prevent any prying eyes from seeing what is stored in your shed.

Locks and Bolts

The most effective way to secure shed doors is to fit a strong hasp and staple (also called a 'padbar'). Secure this with coach bolts (long bolts with a smooth head that cannot be undone with a screwdriver or spanner) and lock the hasp over the staple with a closed shackled padlock. You can further protect your shed with items such as 'shed bars' and larger items such as cycles can be secured to shed shackles.

Secure the shed door hinges with 'clutch head' or 'coffin' screws. These are a special type of screw that once fitted can only be unscrewed with a special tool. They can be purchased from DIY outlets and on the internet.

PASTORAL LETTER

I don't know what sort of summer you have had, there have been sunny days but I remember lots of wet days where it seemed we were more in winter than in summer. It would be lovely if I could use the oft quoted bible verse 'God causes his sun to shine on the righteous' at will. Surely that would mean I could leave my coat behind and never worry about an umbrella. But if you look more carefully at Matthew 5:45 you will find there are some extra words... 'God causes his sun to shine on the righteous and the unrighteous'. 'Not fair', the religious person cries, 'surely there is some reward for my going to church and singing hymns'. But apparently not so. For the expectation that what we do earns God's favour is completely misguided.

God doesn't want us to try and make ourselves right with Him by praying hard, by religiously going to church or by trying desperately not to do anything wrong. For there is nothing we can do as nobody is perfect enough, nobody is so righteous that they earn the right to come into God's presence. Nobody has the right but everybody has the opportunity, for God gives us the gift of salvation if we believe in him and follow him. In Ephesians 2:8-9 Paul says 'For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God— not by works, so that no one can boast.' This grace is what blows our minds, grace is God's blessing on the undeserving. Nobody deserves God's grace but everybody can receive it. That's why the old hymn 'Amazing Grace' resonates with so many people.

So, if we don't need to earn God's grace why on earth do we go to church? Why do we pray? Why do we try and do good things? What's the point? Well, an important thing to realise is that Christianity is about a relationship between us and God. My personal experience is that when I was saved I became aware of God's love for me, demonstrated by his son Jesus willingly dying for me on the cross. The reason I go to church, pray or try to do what is right is that I'm responding to God's love, thankfully trying to praise him and follow his will for my life. My response is a loving offering to a God who loved me first. And as I respond to God in these ways I find my relationship with him grows stronger, my trust grows and my love for him grows.

If you are trying to earn God's favour then stop, take stock and then tell him you want to accept his grace. Allow him to give you his gift of salvation, enter into that wonderful relationship with him and then respond in love.

I pray that you come to know how much God loves you.



Private flu vaccinations are available from the pharmacy at a cost of $\pounds 10$ for those who are not eligible for a free NHS flu vaccination. Please ask in pharmacy.

Flu vaccines for Healthy Children The campaign to reduce flu in the community continues this year by vaccinating healthy children. This winter, children born between 1 September 2013 and 31 August 2015 are eligible to receive the free nasal flu vaccination at the surgery. Please contact the surgery to make an appointment. NHS Electronic Prescription Service (EPS) from the end of September you can send your repeat prescription to any pharmacy electronically. You can order your medication from the surgery dispensary in the usual way allowing 2 working days notice as before. You need to nominate which Pharmacy you wish to collect from by completing a nomination form. These are available from reception or Willingham Pharmacy. For further information ask the Dispensary or Pharmacy team. Please note if you are ordering by phone you should ring the Dispensary on 207602 NOT Willingham Pharmacy.

HepB for babies HepB has now been added to the vaccination programme for babies at 8 weeks, 12 weeks and 16 weeks of age. Any child born on or after 1 August 2017 will be eligible. Please speak with your nurse or Health Visitor if you have any questions.

Jottings from our Allotment

With five grandchildren and a busy life, it has been with pride that we have both worked on our allotment since the end of 2016. My wife Corinne, has as they say, 'green fingers'. From the start Corinne wanted to make our allotment a working allotment. By that, I mean an allotment that produced a wide range of vegetables to be eaten by ourselves, family and friends. Corinne's father Gordon was a phenomenal amateur gardener and Corinne has inherited his love for gardening. I, on the other hand am a novice gardener. So, Corinne does the selection of crops and planting and I do the digging, hoeing, raking and some of the weeding. My weeding has been subject to some criticism as I've managed on several occasions to weed newly sown vegetables.



We have enriched the soil with manure and free soil improver from Amey Cespa at Waterbeach. We planted first and second early potatoes, peas, beetroot, parsnips, carrots, pak choi, radishes, runner beans, broad beans, french beans, sweet corn, courgettes (that aspired to be marrows), chard, strawberries, onions, tomatoes, leeks, parsnips, cabbages, patti pans, swedes, cauliflowers, radishes, rhubarb, kale and the very rare Uncle Tom Cobbleigh et al. We have battled with slugs, caterpillars and white fly with various methods of defence, mainly netting and attack with the 'stand to attention' application of a size nine wellington boot.

We've chatted with other allotment holders, sweated in the sunshine and dodged the odd rain shower; filled the wooden pallet composters with garden waste and food scraps from the kitchen; elongated our arms by carrying filled watering cans; added a small section for the grandchildren and smiled contentedly at the growth of vegetables.

All in all, it has been great fun. There have been a few disappointments caused by insect attack or blight but generally the hard work is very rewarding. In a rapidly changing world, simple things like providing your own food can bring a great deal of satisfaction.


