As another year nears its end, another Feast. Willingham history and the Social Club figured highly in this year's Feast programme.

A guided tour of the most historic wall paintings in St Mary and All Saints was well attended. Then, continuing with a bang – heavy metal emanated from the Social Club when the AC/DC tribute band, 'Let There B/DC' performed there.

Thurston's funfair on the Green, was followed by Custard Comedy at the Social Club to help raise money for the installation of a disabled toilet. The comedy nights are always sold out as they are so good. The compere, Jonathan Elston, was brilliant at interacting with the audience and we had two 'normal' very funny comedians followed by the headliners, Raymond and Mr Timpkins. You will never see another act like this, they resembled Laurel and Hardy but ten times faster. Their very clever act involved non-stop clips from songs accompanied by dozens of props.

I have lived here for just 14 years but this is the first place in which I have felt a real sense of belonging, partly due to a knowledge of its history. It was, and still is, a wonderful community.

On Saturday night, Willingham School Association ran a ceilidh. By the end, like most ceilidhs, everyone was hot, happy and slightly confused; at times it resembled the game 'British Bulldog' I used to play as a boy scout.

Feast Sunday started with the cycle ride to Ely, which looked wonderful in the sunshine. Later the Treasure Hunt around the village started with a search for older buildings and other points of interest. We must apologise that, for the very first time in many years, there was no concert on the Green by a Salvation Army Band. It was cancelled at the last minute for reasons beyond our control but the Band did perform in the church in the evening.

This account must be submitted to the Editor now as the deadline for November's *Willingham News* is looming. Many people have enjoyed the Feast so far and we have a 70s/80s disco, Willingham Youth Trust's Family Disco and the Wine Club's wine quiz still to come.

Changes to Bin Collections

South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) is changing the way used paper is collected from residents for recycling. From **11 December**, residents won't need to use their caddies to recycle paper and instead should place their used paper directly into their blue wheelie bins. This used paper will still be recycled after being sorted from other materials at our facility near Waterbeach.

Residents can keep their caddy to use for anything they like. Alternatively, they can be recycled by being dropped off at the nearest household waste recycling centre. They should not be placed into wheelie bins.

The decision to withdraw the paper caddy service was taken at SCDC's Cabinet meeting in September. It will save taxpayers' money and simplify the recycling process. Because of this upcoming change, SCDC will not be delivering any new paper caddies. If they are lost or stolen before **11 December**, residents can begin putting paper in their blue bin. More information can be found here: www.scambs.gov.uk/recycling.

County Councillor's Report

I am pushing for a root-and-branch review of bus services to, from, and around Cambridge. The Bus Services Act 2017 gave combined authorities, with directly elected mayors, the opportunity to explore bus franchising. When Whippet withdrew half its commercial services they stated, 'We strongly believe that a franchising model, like that of London, will create the conditions for high quality bus services to be operated with the single-minded purpose of serving the community here in Cambridgeshire'. I believe that buses deserve as much interest as railways seem to attract, especially because they carry more people in our district. At the Rural Travel Hubs event, many people said, 'It's all very well thinking about interchanges but they aren't much use if there is no bus, or the buses are full at peak times, or the bus takes forever going round the houses to get to the city centre'.

On 13 September, I represented Cambridgeshire at a meeting with representatives from Hertfordshire, Essex, Norfolk and Suffolk. A Department for Transport official spoke about setting up a sub-national transport body. A speaker from England's Economic Heartland, an umbrella group receiving government support to promote the Oxford to Cambridge expressway (called Camkox because it passes through Milton Keynes), gave a glowing account of its work to coordinate east-west transport.

The Greater Cambridge Partnership Joint Assembly has met and the High Quality Public Transport Proposal, parallel to the A428, passed its next stage more quietly than its previous hearings. The former leader of the City Council insisted that an off-road busway was the one to beat, despite the Local Liaison Forum preferring a 'Do Optimum' on-road option.

The Combined Authority has applied to the Housing Infrastructure Fund for the relocation of the Anglian Water Services Sewage Treatment Works, thereby unblocking development of 7,600 houses on Cambridge Northern Fringe East (around Cambridge North station).

At my first meeting as chairman of the Cambridgeshire Flood Risk Management Partnership in Wisbech on 6 September, the Environment Agency presented the Great Ouse Tidal River Baseline Report, setting out flood-risk issues on the tidal river (which reaches as far inland as Brownshill Staunch). One thing I learned was that overtopping does not necessarily represent 'failure' of a flood defence to perform its function.

Boundary Review

Whilst many of you might think that Highgate Farm Store and adjacent buildings are in Willingham, you would be wrong. They are in Over, and most of the residents and businesses that are based there also think that this is wrong. They have petitioned for this area to be formally recognised as part of Willingham. The matter was reviewed by the Civic Affairs Committee at South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) in September. The Committee recommended refusal for change on the grounds that a sufficiently strong case had not been made and that the proposed new boundary conceded too much land, despite the boundary having been recommended by SCDC officers.

Geographically, the Highgate area is joined to Willingham and separated from Over by about a mile of open space. As the petition from residents and the businesses operating there had requested local representation, Willingham Parish Council argued that it was their democratic right for this to happen. District Councillor Burling argued that the boundary had existed for 400 years and should not be changed.

The SCDC Committee recommended that Willingham and Over Parish Councils see if they could agree a smaller land change. Willingham Parish Council will certainly try, but efforts in the past have met a brick wall. We will also be raising concerns about the procedure at the SCDC meeting.

Traffic

Concern has been expressed by many in the village about the volume and type of traffic. The Parish Council is trying to obtain evidence about the extent of the problems, beginning with nitrous oxide testing at two locations. This will show whether the levels exceed national standards. Further testing may be done to measure particulates, noise levels and vibration. These are more expensive, but co-operation with neighbouring villages can reduce the costs, and could possibly lead to restrictions on heavy goods vehicles over a broader area. Meanwhile the Parish Council continues to liaise with local haulage firms to try and reduce the impact of heavy traffic through the village.

Bowls Club

An application for a grant to help the Bowls Club resolve problems with the grass on the Bowling Green was approved. The Council hopes the club will continue to grow its support.

Waste Collection

From 11 December, papers and magazines must be placed directly in your blue bin. The separate caddy can no longer be used. Please see the article on page 8 from South Cambridgeshire District Council for further details.

Keeping Well

However, there are many things you can do to stay well. Recommendations include getting expert advice from your pharmacist, making sure you get your flu jab, stocking up your medicine cabinet and keeping warm. Flu Vaccinations

We have now received our Flu Vaccinations. Please call and book your appointment. The vaccination is recommended (and free!) to all patients over the age of 65, pregnant women and those patients who have a long term medical condition regardless of age. If you are unsure please ask us.

Flu Vaccinations for Healthy Children

We now have nasal flu vaccinations, Fluenz, in stock. This winter, children born between 1 September 2013 and 31 August 2015 are eligible to receive a free nasal flu vaccination. Please contact the surgery to make an appointment.

Shingles Vaccination

Patients are eligible for this from their 70th birthday UNLESS born between 1 September 1938 and 2 September 1942 AND have not had their 78th birthday. The vaccine cannot be given at 80 years of age or older as it is much less effective. This is a one-off vaccination so if you have had it before, you do not need it again.

Kids back to school and the bugs that come with it?

There are so many basic medical problems that you can treat at home without a trip to your GP practice. Coughs, colds, upset stomachs, head lice, chickenpox and ear infections can all be treated with medicine from your pharmacy. Alternatively, practice nurses can help with lots of minor conditions which mean you don't need to see a GP. Remember that children can get between eight to ten colds a year, and a cough can last at least three weeks before it starts to improve. Visiting your GP and getting medication on prescription, which could be easily bought over the counter, costs the local NHS approximately £45 each time you visit.

Stock up your medicine cabinet! Autumn is a good time of the year to give your medicine cabinet a review, before winter comes. Below is a good basic First Aid kit that all homes should have and it will to save you a trip to the pharmacy if you're not feeling well.

Your First Aid kit could include:

- plasters
- small, medium and large sterile gauze dressings and sticky tape
- at least two sterile eye dressings
- triangular bandages
- disposable sterile gloves
- tweezers, scissors and safety pins
- alcohol-free cleansing wipes
- thermometer (preferably digital)

Police News

Public Urged to Help Combat Hare Coursing

Members of the public are urged to be the eyes and ears of the county's rural communities by reporting hare coursing incidents. Fields across Cambridgeshire have been harvested and ploughed, making them the perfect ground for this illegal blood sport.

The hare coursing season traditionally begins in September and causes damage to crops, harms animal welfare and threatens the rural community. It can result in intimidation and even violence.

Last year, officers were called to 1069 incidents of hare coursing, an increase of 44% on the previous year when there were 742 incidents.

Chief Inspector James Sutherland from the Rural Crime Action Team (RCAT) said: 'Hare coursing remains one of the biggest crimes to affect our rural communities between September and February, particularly in South Cambridgeshire, East Cambridgeshire and Fenland.'

'Driving hare coursing out of the county is a priority for RCAT and we will do all we can to catch those responsible and bring them to justice.'

The Hunting Act 2004 made have coursing illegal and anyone convicted of the offence can be fined. Have coursers may also face a criminal behaviour order, seizure of vehicles and other property and a driving ban.

The most obvious sign of hare coursing is a group of vehicles parked in a rural area, perhaps by a gateway to farmland, on a grass verge, or on a farm track or bridle path.

Landowners are urged to consider blocking entrances to their fields with ditches, fencing, trees or even barriers, such as barrels filled with concrete.

Anyone who sees hare coursing taking place is asked to contact police immediately on 999 and provide officers with a description of the people involved, registration numbers and vehicle descriptions and the location and direction of travel.

It is important that members of the public do not confront people hare coursing or put themselves at risk.

Tool Thefts

We have recently had a spate of tool thefts in South Cambridgeshire. Most of these have been thefts from vans, but we have seen a couple of building sites broken into. Call 101 if you notice any suspicious behaviour or 999 if you see a break-in in progress.

Prevention:

• Store your tools sensibly and, if you can, remove them from your vehicle overnight. The harder your tools are to get to, the less likely thieves are to make the effort to steal them.

- Park for prevention. If you can't bring your tools in overnight, or will be leaving your van unattended for a prolonged period during the day, it's a good idea to park in a way that will prevent or deter thieves. Park in a busy, well-lit area, preferably in view of CCTV cameras so that, if someone does break into your van, they may be seen or caught on camera.
- Check your insurance. If you don't have tools insurance as part of your insurance policy, think about adding it, to cover replacement costs. Check your policy wording to find out exactly what's covered, what the limits and excesses are, and if there are any conditions. For example, some insurers will require you to have certain alarms fitted in your van for tools stolen from it to be covered by the policy.
- Mark your property. If your tools are stolen, having identification marks on them will increase your chances of getting them back. You can use paint or permanent marker to add your name or another identifying feature, or for something harder to remove, etch it in. If you want to hide the mark, you can use ultra-violent pens so that it will only show up under the right kind of light.
- Joining a register such as Immobilise can help police identify your property.
- Keep a note of serial numbers and other data. You will need as much information as possible if items are taken. Serial numbers, or at least an itemised list with the make and model of everything taken, will help police identify your tools if they're found as well as easing the process of making an insurance claim.

If your tools are stolen:

- Take photographs of the crime scene, both for the police and your insurer.
- File a police report the police can't do anything to help until the crime is reported. You can do this by calling 101 or on-line at <u>www.contactcambspolice.uk/report</u>. Not only will this help with the recovery of your tools but, should you spot them for sale, you'll have your report to back you up.
- Claim on your insurance using your itemised list which will form part of your supporting documentation.
- Keep your eyes peeled for dodgy deals! If you see someone selling tools for a suspiciously low price, the chances are they might be stolen. You can keep an eye out for your own tools this way, or you might find someone else's. If you are part of a local tradesmen's group you can let them know, to help others find their stolen tools. If in doubt contact the police or www.contactcambspolice.uk/report

Library News

Engage in the Afternoon

Special sessions for adults on the first Wednesday of each month from 2 to 3 30 pm. There are speakers, tea/coffee/ biscuits and a chance to change books.

In October we had a disappointing turnout for a really interesting talk. Hannah Vandridge from the Norris Museum in St Ives came to speak about Shopping Through the Ages. The talk was mainly based around the history of St Ives, from the medieval market to modern shopping. Originally St Ives was called 'Slepe' meaning 'muddy' which probably described it very well, as pilgrims had to ford the river to visit the bones of St Ivo in the St Ivo Priory. As a place of pilgrimage, Slepe grew quickly and was renamed St Ives in honour of the saint. In medieval times, St Ives hosted one of the biggest markets in England and still has a large market today. One of the oldest shops in more recent times, Wadsworth's, has been in St Ives since 1869 when John Wadsworth opened his shop on Bridge Street as an 'aerated water manufacturer'. Years later the shop moved to its present position, opposite the Norris Museum, and started to sell wines and spirits as it continues to do today.



Hannah brought some of the museum's artefacts for us to look at (see photo) including bottles from the original Wadsworth's shop, some old scales used for gemstones, an embrocation bottle and some old Kelly's Business directories. We also looked at a sovereign measure, which was used to test whether sovereigns were genuine. They became smaller and lighter as people shaved the edges off for the gold!

Nature Notes

No swallows! In our previous article, we mentioned that the swallows had re-located a short distance to nest under the verandah of the Sports Pavilion. Unfortunately, on a subsequent visit, we found that this second nest had also been destroyed, hopefully not because they make a little mess on the floor! We hope they will return next year and be more successful.

Fewer insects now, as the temperatures drop and the days shorten. Recently, on a sunny day, Common, Red Darter and migrant Hawker dragonflies and damselflies have been spotted in the Orchard. Butterflies seen are mostly the 'Whites' but also a few Tortoiseshells, Peacocks and Red Admirals.

Our summer migrant birds, having replenished their body fat after breeding, are now quietly dispersing to their wintering grounds, mostly to southern Europe and different parts of Africa. These birds include various warblers, too many to mention here, and hirundines (swallows and martins) and, of course, swifts (not a hirundine but a separate species – apodidae). Other 'passage' migrant birds are also passing through. These birds breed further north but also over-winter further south. Many of them can be seen if you look to the sky or over water bodies such as our local lakes, even in your gardens, particularly if you feed the birds.

As well as some birds leaving our country now, others are returning from their breeding grounds in the north. These include many species of ducks, geese and swans which prefer our winters to the harsher winters on the continent and we should soon see these roaming our countryside for berries and insects on farmland and in orchards. The extent of this inward migration depends on a number of factors, including abundance of food, temperature and success of breeding. Watch out for Fieldfares and Redwings in the countryside and occasionally, your garden. You may not know it but your 'resident' robin, blackbird or thrush may be nothing of the sort. They are just as likely to be migrant birds from northern Europe, displacing what you thought were the same birds as in the summer. All very interesting and complicated!

Enjoy the fresh air and beauty of Autumn!
