We happen to know that this is George Hopkin and his son Sidney. In his



turn Sidney was the father of Eric Hopkin, known to many, making three generations of village residents. George Hopkin died in 1909 when Sidney was 14 which would place this photo at about 1905. George is holding the steam regulator lever that is like an accelerator on a car. Sidney is proudly holding some other lever – no doubt he had a job to do!

Book Review

'The Bees' by Laline Paull

Genre: Animal Fantasy is probably the best description, like *Watership Down* or *Animal Farm*.

This is a tale of courage and conflict in a totalitarian state, set entirely in a beehive. It follows the life of Flora 717, born into the lowest caste of bees, sanitation workers whose role is to clean the hive. It also describes the dangers posed to the hive by outside factors (pesticides, wasps, urban development) but also from inside the hive itself. Flora manages to break out of her role, first caring for the Royal Babies, then becoming a skilled forager for the hive, and communicating her knowledge to the other foragers through dance. After displaying great courage, she is allowed to attend the Queen Bee, the only bee who is allowed to breed. However, Flora finds herself committing the ultimate sin by delivering an egg herself. In this way Flora embodies the greatest threat to her hive; however, she may also be their only way out of the final breakdown of the hive.

There were mixed reactions to the book from our group – from a score out of ten, nine gave it a score between seven and 10, four scored it between four and eight and one scored below three.

COMMUNITY ORCHARD Winter Pruning Instruction



As reported in an earlier article on the subject of the Community Orchard, many of the fruit trees have made appreciable growth, although some are yet to bear fruit. Although formative pruning has been carried out, perhaps best described as tentative pruning as it takes confidence to make a bold cut, Willingham Action Group (WAG) Enviro volunteers have been pleased to take up the offer of instruction from Ray Manning. Ray explained the basic choice between creating a more upright tree with a main leader and an open bowl shape encouraging outward spreading growth. As the trees are planted on an 8m square grid, the latter has been chosen with a view to creating the appearance of a more traditional orchard.

Ray has kindly spent two Saturday mornings providing pruning instruction to WAG Enviro volunteer groups enabling us to undertake some pruning in between for his appraisal. What is second nature to Ray takes a leap of faith for those learning when removal of significant growth is required, especially as the label bears the sponsors name. Sponsors, rest assured the effect is instantly evident as a pleasing shape is created! The accompanying photo shows Ray instructing the second group.

The apples and pears have now had their winter prune with the stone fruits waiting for the growing season to reduce the risk of spreading disease. We appreciate the help received from Ray and his offer to be available to advise in the future.

Orchard Survey – Orchards East

Orchards East (OE) has been set up with the aim of discovering and understanding, the past, present and future of orchards in the East of England. OE is funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund and based in the School of History at the University of East Anglia. OE is surveying and recording orchard sites (old and new) across the East of England, as well as researching the social, cultural and economic history of fruit and nut growing in the region. The project extends initiatives already developed by Suffolk Traditional Orchard Group, the East of England Apples and Orchards Project and individual county orchard groups. WAG represents the Willingham Community Orchard in the Cambridge Orchard Group which has already undertaken orchard survey work in Cambridgeshire.

Obituary Rosemary Mumford



Rosemary Mumford's death in the night of 22/23 February came as a huge shock to her family and her great circle of friends in Willingham.

Rosemary's husband, Mick, had died suddenly in 1968, leaving her to care alone for her then young children, Steven and Lynn. She coped very well, establishing excellent relations with her children and grandchildren. At the same time, she built up a very wide circle of friends in the village.

Over many years she also made many major contributions to village life. She ran the Brownies and served on the Scout committee. Many remember the work which she did with the late Joan Smail's play group. For several years she helped with the delivery of Meals on Wheels in the village.

For a number of years, she was a member of the Parish Council, and for many years – in fact until just days before her death – she managed, as a volunteer, the lettings for the Octagon.

For a time after Mick's death she continued to run the butcher's shop which they owned, but after giving that up she started working as a librarian. She continued her library work for many years and moved, after experience in Cottenham library, to the Central Library in Cambridge.

Rosemary was always busy and committed, but however busy she was, she always found time to spend with her many individual friends. She was widely loved, and greatly respected, and she will be very much missed, and remembered with great affection.

The 'Beast From The East' was just blowing into our village on a cold February Monday evening, and whilst the weather was having major impacts elsewhere, the hardy and committed bunch who frequent the Jam Club each month were not going to be deterred and the show certainly went on!

The customary Scratch band was organised swiftly for the finale and included the very able and experienced Phil Butcher on drums and Marcus Aldred on guitar who played with confidence and skill beyond his years. The band rounded the night off with a number of crowd pleasers.

Alan (The Duke of Northumberland!) Slater on saxophone was a constant presence on stage for much of the night and his talent, versatility and experience shines through each and every month.

This was another great night in Willingham and it was a reminder of how much musical talent exists locally.

PASTORAL LETTER

DEBTS, DEBTS, DEBTS...

Then Peter came up and said to him, 'Lord, how often will my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? As many as seven times?' Jesus said to him, 'I do not say to you seven times, but seventy-seven times' – Matthew 18, 21-22.

And it all needs to be taken care of before the death of the debtor, because if not, someone else needs to be reconciled with an irreparable loss or asserts the claims against the debtor's family. No one takes account of the fact that every debt has no meaning in eternity. After all, the King, presented by Jesus in the Parable of the Unforgiving Servant (Matthew 18, 22-35), is definitely the King for ever and ever and over the ages to come - He cancels any debt He wishes, as completely irrelevant as to the quality and its amount in the Kingdom of Heaven. How would the debt which anyone draws in life be a problem for the King? It is equally the case for the King as the value of all acquired riches, lottery winnings, number of diplomas, intelligence and personal charm. Whether I'm rich in talents or whether I'm in debt up to my ears, means nothing in Heaven. Only the attitude towards them, the value of which is hidden in the heart. God, as the King of time and eternity, can donate whatever he wants because for him gold and mud have the same value. His divine love is equally for the wise as the fool, the handsome as the ugly, those who are good and those who are bad.

Only in the perspective of Heaven and eternity can you learn how to forgive without regret. The ability to forgive any debt introduced in the earthly life is transforming the man; the man who forgives of course.

One more thing: the expression 'seventy times seven' is often translated differently, that you should forgive 'not as much as seven times' but 'until seventy times seven' i.e. 490 times.

It does not matter if it is 77 or 490 times. Jesus says clearly: there are no limits to the amount of times of forgiveness with God. Infinity is the only appropriate term for the number of awarded forgiveness. There should also be no limit of repeated pardons among us!

HGV traffic

Dear Editor,

I have recently written to Lucy Frazer (QC MP) at the House of Commons about the phenomenal amount of HGV traffic using the B1050 through Willingham. Lucy has been very eager to help and has since written to Sonia Hansen at Cambridgeshire County Council to see if it is possible to have a weight limit applied to the road through Willingham to deter HGV through-traffic (although the road would still be accessible for HGV deliveries within the village so as not to affect local businesses).

Sonia confirmed that there is a process to impose a weight limit on a particular road which involves a legal process before a final decision by a board of members. The reason this has not been done so far is that the cost of the legal process is £1,000 and the council will not allocate funding for this cause. Sonia did say it is possible for an external third party to fund these expenses which would then mean the process could go ahead.

Every month I read letters from people, tired of the constant stream of HGVs through Willingham, all of whom are suffering the negative effects of the road being used as a rat-run for lorries that should be using the A14 and other major roads. It's only going to get worse over time as Northstowe matures. I urge everyone reading this to email and call your Councillor to make them aware of the effects the traffic problems are having.

In the interest of making something happen sooner, how about we hold an event to raise the $\pounds1,000$ legal fees so there is no excuse for the council to avoid applying for the weight restriction any further? If 100 people all paid $\pounds10$ we'd have the funds we need to make this happen. A pub night, a quiz night, a fete, any ideas welcome...
