The magnificent gardens were started 200 years ago by the De Vere family and are now managed by English Heritage. The 90-acre site has French, Italian, Dutch and English style gardens. The house has three exhibition rooms and one furnished, all open to the public. Catering facilities available.

The gardens include among other features: the Italian Garden covering four acres and featuring the Pompeian Wall and classical statuary; the rose garden with over 4000 roses; the Tudor Garden; two mazes, a lake and a Japanese Tea House Folly. Catering facilities available.

The annual Jousting Tournament will take place during our visit with the Knights of Royal England putting on a thrilling display of action, stunts, falls and fights in an authentic arena – no extra charge unless you require seating.

District and Parish Council Elections

Nominations have now closed for the District and Parish Council elections. These will be held on **Thursday 3 May**. District-wide reorganisation and reduction in the overall Councillor numbers means that you will have the opportunity of voting for only two incoming District Councillors rather than the three of recent years. At the time of writing it does not seem that there will be Parish Council elections this year, with all the nominated candidates being returned unopposed.

Willingham's Annual Parish Meeting will be held on 23 May and is open to all residents. It will offer residents the chance to meet the members of its new Parish Council and the opportunity to discover what the Parish Council has been working on over the last year. Future challenges that the Council might address will be discussed. Reports will also be available from the many community groups that the Council has supported over the last 12 months.

South Cambridgeshire Planning Open Days

Members of South Cambridgeshire's Planning Team will be visiting communities to help residents develop a better understanding of the planning process and to respond to concerns about local development activity. Included in the programme will be talks on the planning process, how to submit a planning application, the challenges of developing listed buildings and sites in conservation areas and works to trees. A successful first Open Day was held in Northstowe in March – the next will be held at Whittlesford Memorial Hall on **Saturday 9 June** between 10 am and 2 pm. Further dates will be published on the SCDC website (www.scambs.gov.uk).

Street Lighting Upgrade

The County Council, working with Balfour Beatty as its lighting service provider, will be implementing a lantern replacement programme. Apart from replacing existing street lighting lanterns with more energy efficient LED lanterns, no disruption such as road or footpath excavation is promised. The streets in Willingham that will benefit are Covent Garden and Bourneys Manor Close. Residents in the affected streets will be advised before work commences. Any questions about this work should be directed to: Street.Lighting@ cambridgeshire.gov.uk.

The A14 Time Truck

The archaeological finds unearthed during the A14 excavation work have made national news recently. Opportunities to visit individual sites will become available. A 'Time Truck' family archaeology day will be held on **Thursday 31 May**, (10 30 am to 4 pm) at the Bar Hill Tesco Extra car park. The opportunity to discover the archaeological remains uncovered along the route of the A14 project, with displays and activities for all the family, will be available.

News for local walkers

Firstly, the Parish Council understands that Flat Bridge has been demolished. Although a privately owned bridge, it has long offered access to social and recreational activities on the north bank of the Great Ouse. The closest crossings to the north bank are now on the Causeway or at Earith. Secondly, a formal notice has also been distributed advising of the stopping up and re-routing of Public Bridleway (262/12). This runs from the northern end of West Fen Road towards Earith. A new length of this Public Bridleway will be built as a replacement.

Meeting dates are published on the website, the notice board outside the public hall in the High Street, at the library and are listed below. Members of the public are welcome to attend and speak briefly or ask questions. Names will be taken down at the beginning of each meeting, together with the electoral register number to ensure everyone has a fair chance to speak within the allowed time (15 minutes in total for all speakers – three minutes maximum per person).

Meeting Dates: **16 May** and **23 May** (Annual Parish Meeting). The meetings are held in the Octagon and start at 7 30 pm.

The Parish Council Office is open Monday to Thursday from 10 am to 1 pm except Bank Holidays and there is an answerphone service outside office hours.

Working with the Scouts

Willingham Craft Beer Festival – 28 June to 1 July

At the end of June the Ploughman Hall will be the venue for a Craft Beer Festival that promises to bring over 40 beers and ciders, plus gourmet food trucks to Willingham. Craft beers are brewed in small batches by independent brewers who create everything from traditional cask ales right through to the most modern sours and lambics. In Willingham, we punch a long way above our weight with The Bank pub, which is one of the leading craft beer pubs in the region. The Bank frequently serves beer from some of the best-known and most sought-after breweries around the country. Jolly Good Beer is a craft beer distribution company, run by people who are obsessive about high quality beer, and who are very well known in the craft beer world. We are fortunate to have Yvan Seth, the owner of Jolly Good Beer, living in the village. Both The Bank pub and Jolly Good Beer have lent their expertise to the organisation of this event, along with a small committee of volunteers.

Once again there will be a beer brewed especially for the festival. Last year, the elderflower pale ale was very popular, so it is going to come back again. The recipe will probably be changed a little, maybe towards an easy drinking New England style pale ale that is so popular these days, and the beer will again be brewed by the Three Blind Mice brewery in Ely.

Of course, elderflower beer will need elderflowers and the organising committee are asking for volunteers to collect bunches of elderflowers and to drop them off at The Bank pub over the weekend of **2 and 3 June**.

Anyone who is interested in volunteering to help at the festival itself should email volunteer@willingham.beer or just drop in to The Bank and leave your name at the bar. No experience is necessary as everyone will be trained and will be supported by experienced people.

This year the main sponsor of the Craft Beer Festival is a well-known Willingham business: Uttridge Accounting, based in Church Street and additional sponsorship comes from Cambridge Medical Communication on the High Street. Because of the generosity of its sponsors, Willingham Craft Beer Festival expects to raise a significant sum from entrance tickets for local charities. The organisers have thought long and hard about this and have decided to support the Over Day Centre and Willingham Youth Trust. They feel that Over Day Centre is an important community service that is used by very many Willingham residents, and Willingham Youth Trust provides much-needed activities and events for a more youthful age group.

Talk about waiting for a bus and two come along at once – later this year, the Social Club will be hosting another beer festival as part of the Willingham Feast. It's great news that so many people are giving up their time to organise these community events and we wish both events great success.

PASTORAL LETTER

Easter, for some it has been a time to relax, for others celebrating the 'Real Meaning of Easter', and for others time to escape and get away – to go on a journey.

The Emmaus Road story (Luke 24: 13-35) a journey that two people made, has all the hallmarks of a good movie script. It has intrigue, as we wait for the disciples to recognise Jesus. It has emotion, as the disciples move from broken-hearted to overjoyed. It has a climactic, dramatic moment, when the disciples recognise Jesus in the breaking of the bread. It also has a strong comedy element, as the disciples do not recognise Jesus, even as they are telling the story of Jesus to Jesus himself.

It may seem like Jesus decided to appear to the two dumbest disciples on the face of the earth. How could they not recognise Jesus? But to get bogged down in such details, is to miss the point of the story.

Two disciples are travelling down from Jerusalem to Emmaus following the shattering of their dreams, by the crucifixion and death of their master Jesus. They 'had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel'. Instead they saw the chief priest and leaders hand him over to be crucified. Their hopes that he might be the Messiah were not fulfilled. They are obviously broken-hearted and depressed.

As they walked along Jesus explained to them what Moses and the prophets had said concerning how the Messiah must suffer, before he entered into his glory. It was a walking 'Sunday School class'. Later, the two disciples said to one another, 'Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?'

Jesus' words on the road opened up a new understanding, bringing hope into what they thought was a hopeless situation. His words reframed the events of their past few days, which enabled them to see a glorious victory, instead of crushing defeat.

While sharing supper, they finally recognised him in the 'breaking of the bread'. After he vanished from their sight, they were excited and rushed back to Jerusalem to tell the others. (Though filled with joy at the realisation of Jesus' resurrection, you know that they also had to feel a little bit stupid.)

As our lives are a journey, we are all on the road to some place. The truth of the gospel is that wherever we are in our journey, the risen Jesus comes to journey with us. He is still the ultimate and perfect teacher, opening up the scriptures to our understanding just when we need it most. Sometimes, we are as clueless as Cleopas and the unnamed disciple, recognising him only after he is gone. And just like these two disciples we have the joy and excitement that moves us to share the news with others.

These are the stories I like best, the ones that have happy endings.

Helping your hospital to help you

Cambridge University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust reported that this winter saw more patients than ever before enter the doors of A&E. Waiting times were reaching seven and a half hours in A&E. Patients can help the hospital by understanding the circumstances in which they should attend. A&E deals with life-threatening emergencies, such as:

- Loss of consciousness
- Acute, confused state and fits that are not stopping
- Persistent, severe chest pain
- Breathing difficulties
- Severe bleeding that cannot be stopped
- Severe allergic reactions
- Severe burns or scalds

Less severe injuries can be treated in urgent care centres or minor injuries units (MIUs). Details are available on the Cambridge and Peterborough CCG 'choose well' web pages. Minor injury units can treat problems such as sprains and strains, broken bones, wound infections, minor burns and scalds, minor head injuries, insect and animal bites, minor eye injuries and injuries to the back, shoulder and chest.

We are monitoring our patient numbers closely and have plans in place to ensure we will continue to meet the clinical needs of our existing patients at Willingham and Longstanton Branch Surgery as the development grows. Testing for Prostate Cancer

We have received a number of enquiries about screening and testing for Prostate Cancer. If this is something you are considering, please collect a leaflet from reception which explains the PSA test and the reliability of such testing. No notional screening programme exists in the UK for prostate cancer and experts disagree on the reliability of the PSA test. If you wish to have the test, you need to discuss family history, symptoms and reasoning with a GP so they can assess whether the PSA test would be suitable for you.

Book Review

My Name is Lucy Barton by Elizabeth Strout

The novel takes places over five nights in the mid-1980s. Lucy Barton has been in hospital for three weeks with an undiagnosed illness. She is separated from her husband and two young daughters, whom she misses desperately. Unexpectedly, her mother, from whom she has been estranged for years, arrives at her bedside. Lucy is now a successful writer, but her mother's presence reignites memories of her childhood – of poverty, abuse and social exclusion.

Lucy's relationship with her mother is one of the central themes of the book. Lucy appears to feel anger towards her mother for her difficult childhood while the mother is emotionally unavailable. Lucy and her mother reminisce about what has happened to people they remember from the past, and this seems to bridge a gap between them.

Our group of 16 had mixed reactions to the book, scores out of 10 ranging from 2 to 10. Those who gave it a high score praised the brilliance of the writing, and applauded the descriptions of Lucy's childhood as being particularly powerful. Others, however, described it as 'bitty' and didn't feel engaged with the story or the characters.

So see what you think – give it a go, it is only 190 pages long!

HGV traffic

Dear Editor

Reference M Dixon's letter (*Willingham News* – April 2018 edition) and, no doubt, many other epistles on this topic, I would like to offer strong support to 'make something happen' about the scourge of heavy traffic through Willingham during many hours of each day.

Certainly, the quantity of regular HGV traffic through Willingham needs to be controlled for all sorts of reasons and the best solution of all would be the construction of a village bypass. One has only to look at the effect that a bypass has had on neighbouring Longstanton's traffic (or lack of). Longstanton's case for a bypass rode on the back of the Northstowe development so that its high street is now relatively calm and safe.

A bypass for Willingham would significantly reduce the excessive traffic – mostly to and from Earith and beyond – that uses Willingham High Street and Church Street. At the moment Willingham gets 95% of the traffic that used to pass through Longstanton – and it is increasing.

In addition, as a final thought, how about some trafficcalming measures for Church Street as well!

Dear Editor

I write on behalf of the Parish Council with respect to Mr Dixon's letter published in last month's magazine. The Parish Council shares villagers' frustrations regarding the volume of traffic in Willingham. At every available opportunity it advocates improvements, including a bypass.

Some points made by Mr Dixon require clarification. Firstly, the Parish Council has already used its funds to successfully promote a Traffic Regulation Order extending the current 30 mph speed limit on Station Road to Westfield. The Parish Council sought this Order despite discouragement from officers of the County Council Highways Department. Secondly, Kingswater Lindum (developers of the land adjacent to 77 Station Road) have agreed to fund the implementation of the Order as a contribution to highway safety. Site development is now imminent and delivery on this agreement by Kingswater Lindum is a priority for the Council. Thirdly, discussions with County Council officers about imposing a weight limit on traffic through Willingham have been unproductive.

The funding to implement the extension of the current 30 mph speed limit on Station Road has been used to address the following traffic-related issues:

- 1. Working in partnership with Willingham Primary School a successful application has been made through the County Council's Local Highways Improvement Scheme to introduce parking control measures around the Primary School. After a successful trial these are now planned to be introduced during the summer.
- 2. A structured programme of pollution monitoring is being introduced. This is initially focusing on nitrous oxide levels on the High Street and Station Road. Consideration is being given also to assessing levels of traffic noise.
- 3. The Council has taken part with other Parish Councils in a short trial of interactive signs. Traffic speeds were measured on Earith Road to ascertain the signs' effectiveness in reducing these. Depending on feedback from other Parishes, the Council hopes to take part in developing a joint funding bid allowing ongoing access to these signs.

Arguments for change are stronger with supporting evidence. A group of volunteers propose to survey the number of daily HGV movements in the village. It is hoped this will be carried out shortly. Residents' initiatives such as this help to build the evidence base to address Willingham's many traffic issues and their negative impacts on village life.
