Asparagus Harvest

The Bushel Box Farm Shop in Willingham is enjoying a bumper crop of asparagus grown on the family farm, so it also comes with very low food miles.

Wendy Jones, the owner, comments:

'We got off to a bit of a slow start with the harvest due to the long winter and cool start to the spring, but the recent prolonged spell of warm weather has given the spears the push they needed. We are now out every day to ensure a constant supply.'

The asparagus season lasts just eight weeks, traditionally running from St George's Day until the Summer Solstice. However, it is a delicate vegetable so the dates vary from year to year and are very dependent on the weather.

Wendy remembers that 2017 was very different:

'Last year, we had some lovely weather in early April and we started selling on 6th which was two weeks early. Then a cold snap, with overnight frosts, at the end of April meant the bed stopped cropping and we had to stop selling by the second week of May.'

Growing and harvesting asparagus is a real labour of love for Wendy's mother, Marion. Once a new bed is planted, it takes a few years to get established and produce a viable crop. Then every day the bed must be cut. This is a timeconsuming process with each spear being harvested by hand when it reaches the right height. It is necessary to check and cut daily, as the spears can grow up to 10 centimetres in just one day.

The cutting of the one acre bed takes up to four hours and then each spear is trimmed, sorted and graded by length and thickness, with the stringy pieces being discarded. This process can take a further four to five hours before the asparagus can be weighed, bundled and stored like cut flowers in the cold store.

There are plenty of ways to enjoy this local, seasonal vegetable including steamed, griddled, barbecued, boiled or roasted, along with plenty more adventurous recipes such as: Tempura Tiger Prawns with Soy and Sesame Asparagus; Asparagus, Pancetta and Parmesan Linguine with Chive Cream; Asparagus Mac 'n' Cheese with Bacon Crumble or Asparagus Soup.

However you eat yours, you should probably get it quickly as you never know how long it will be available for!

A big thank you to all residents of the villages of Over and Willingham who voted for us on 3 May; we have been overwhelmed with kind messages of support and goodwill. We cannot promise to enact every wish (however worthy) or solve every problem but we will be honest as to what is achievable, given the constraints of budget and wider priorities. Whatever happens, we will never forget that we are elected to serve and to serve everyone.

Willingham Craft Beer Festival, 28 June – 1 July Ploughman Hall

Elderflower Harvesting - Saturday and Sunday, 1 and 2 June

For the Craft Beer Festival at the end of June, we are going to brew a special beer in collaboration with the Three Blind Mice brewery in Ely. Last year, the elderflower pale ale was very popular, so we are having it back again. Now that we have some experience, we think that this year's beer will be even better than last year's.

The new beer will be brewed the day after we finish harvesting the elderflowers because we are aiming for maximum freshness. We are going to tweak the recipe slightly from last year, but it will still be a pale ale around the 4.5% ABV mark. So far, we haven't decided which hops to use, but we want a soft, easy drinking flavour, with some citrussy, lemony zestiness to complement the elderflower.

Timing is everything. Last year, we just managed to hit the end of the flowering season. With the cold spring we have been having, we have our fingers crossed that the elderflower window of opportunity will be open over the first weekend in June. Can you help?

We are setting up a collection point behind The Bank pub between 12 noon and 4 pm on **Saturday and Sunday**, **1 and 2 June**; please bring as much elderflower as you can and we will add it to the brew. We will be trimming the flowers from the stems, so it is helpful if the cuttings you bring are easy to handle.

Festival Plans

At the time of writing we still have some gaps in our schedule, but there is much that has been booked as well. On the food front we have Guerrilla Kitchen bringing Chinese Bao buns on Thursday and Friday, with Kura Kura joining them on Friday to provide Sri Lankan and Southern Indian street food. On Saturday we have Fired Up Pizza bringing their wood-fired pizzeria, and on Sunday afternoon we have a barbecue provided by the Longhorn Farmshop at Cuckoo Hill Farm. Watch our Twitter and Facebook pages for details of more foody delights as they are confirmed.

We have booked some live music. On Saturday evening, we have Queen Bee Blues Band who are a well-known Cambridge Blues band and on Sunday afternoon, we have Willingham resident Luke, from Blackbird Music, playing guitar and singing.

The evening sessions on Thursday, Friday and Saturday will be for over-18s but Saturday and Sunday afternoon will both be family-friendly. There will be soft drinks available, wine and bubbly for the non-beer drinkers, along with live music in the marquee.

Old Willingham



This is 'The Limes,' which stands at the end of Newington looking down the road towards Rampton. The photo date is unknown but is probably about 100 years ago. Today it is tucked away behind a high hedge but not much altered. The building on the right contained the kitchen and, perhaps in older times, the servants' quarters. 'The Limes' has long been the largest and grandest house in the village and was owned by Ingle Thoday, who also owned the huge fruit nursery almost opposite, on Long Lane. Later, it was the doctor's residence. Reputedly, Dr Cane didn't like the name as he thought it sounded like 'Slime', and he changed it to 'Berrycroft', but it reverted back to the original name later.

From the Parish Council

The May meeting of the Parish Council was delayed because of the local elections, so had not taken place before the *Willingham News* deadline. Please therefore accept our apologies for the sparse report.

District Council Elections

There were new arrangements for the District Council this year. The total number of councillors has been reduced to 45 (from 57), and the new ward of Over and Willingham (mostly the same as the old ward of Willingham and Over) now has two councillors instead of three. Also, instead of electing one third of councillors each year (with one year off), all councillors are now elected together.

In a result which was repeated over almost all of South Cambridgeshire, both our District Councillors are now Liberal Democrats – Bill Handley and Dawn Percival. Congratulations to them both and we look forward to their participation in future Parish Council meetings. Our longstanding District Councillor, and previously County Councillor, Ray Manning will no longer be representing the village at District level but remains on the Parish Council. We would like to thank him for his service over many years, particularly in the recent Over border negotiations.

Parish Council

Parish Council elections are now aligned with District Council elections and will take place on the same day every four years. Willingham Parish Council was already due this year, so there was no change here. The election was uncontested (there are two vacancies, see below) so the council will retain all its existing members, with the exception of Andrew Cook, who is stepping down. Andrew has been a Parish Councillor for many years, including a spell as Chairman, and his contributions, both in practical terms and through his extensive knowledge of local history, will be sorely missed. We thank him sincerely for his efforts, and would like to hope that this is only a temporary absence.

Second Defibrillator

A second village defibrillator has been installed at the library and on 12 April there was a training session given by Tom Miller, a First Responder in the village. Thanks to the library for hosting the session, Tom for the training, and all those who attended.

Traffic Monitoring

Observant users of Earith Road will have



seen a temporary interactive traffic sign when entering the village. This was part of a traffic survey, monitoring speeds both with and without the new sign. The data gathered shows that, except for some (extreme) outliers, average traffic speeds did not markedly exceed the speed limit for most of the day and the interactive sign had only a minor impact on reductions in average traffic speeds.

90 YEARS OF THE WOMEN'S INSTITUTE IN WILLINGHAM

Willingham WI was founded in 1928 by around 50 members and straight away threw itself into a hectic round of charity fund raising, talks and meetings. It also took an active part in wider village life. For example in 1934, after the Parish Council had turned down electric lighting for the parish, members complained and asked that the streets should be lit by either gas or electricity. During World War II, the WI purchased a stirrup pump for village use in case of fire. Talks covered a wide variety of topics, one in 1943 was on the drying of rabbit skins, presumably for gloves and coats.

Our WI has always enjoyed strong support from its members over the years and the late Joan Smail, who was a member throughout her time in the village, also became a member of the County Federation and organised the planting of the wood near the County headquarters in Girton. She is commemorated in Willingham by a tree, planted by her fellow members, at the Ploughman Hall.

Our modern-day WI is carrying on in a similar vein and provided the village sign in 1989. The range of talks and activities is wide and varied, covering such topics as a visit from the Raptor Centre, when Barn Owls flew around the meeting room (no members or visitors were taken as prey!), talks on the Enigma machine and an escape from Burma. We also enjoy social evenings and parties at Christmas and in the summer. We organise an Annual Quiz Night and have two very successful Darts Teams, a Mixed Craft group and a Lunch Club. In 2003, members produced a local WI

Cook Book. The emphasis is on social enjoyment and helping each other but alongside this, taking part in the national WI campaigns. Perhaps the best way to end is to show how one of our members perceives modern day Willingham WI:

W is for Wivelingham meaning the home of the people of Wifel. The village has been in existence for more than a thousand years.

I is for an Insight into Willingham WI.

L is for the 'Ladies do Lunch' group. Members meet every other month at one of the many pubs and restaurants in the area.

L is for Local. We meet every month with good facilities and comfy chairs. The refreshments and social time are valued by all.

I is for Information in the form of a newsletter, emailed to each member every month with all the important information about our own WI as well as County and National news. These are also delivered to absent members, to keep them in touch.

N is for the New Year which starts with our ever-popular annual fund raising quiz night.

G is for the Group Meeting. Every year the group meets with Over, Swavesey, Longstanton and Elsworth WIs, hosted by each in turn, and this is a great opportunity to socialise more widely.

H is for the Horticultural Show. We make lunch for the judges and serve drinks and home-made cakes to visitors in the afternoon. We also help at other events in the village.

A is for A warm welcome to new members. We currently have 68 members with five new members joining this year.

M is for Making things. As well as the monthly Mixed Craft group, there is a weekly art group and we have had a talk on flower arranging by one of our members.

In conclusion, Willingham WI is welcoming, informative, local, helpful and busy. There is another adjective that could be used, 'wonderful', but we can't blow our own trumpet, we are British after all!

PASTORAL LETTER

Give a pastor a drill and what could possibly go wrong? Well, last week I was inspired to do a little DIY and put up some hooks in our utility room. After measuring up carefully, I went to drill a hole, looking at the wall and rashly deciding there wouldn't be any cables so no need for a cable detector. As I drilled through the wall there was a loud bang and I jumped a mile. What I hadn't considered was that the electricity meter was the other side of the wall and I had severed the main supply cable for the house. Fortunately my heart was still beating... very quickly as it happens! I did however need to sit down for a while afterwards! Until the wonderful electrician came, we had to live without power. No heat, no light, no kettle, no computer, no phone. It's amazing how we struggle without electric power.

God's presence and power in each Christian comes in the form of the Holy Spirit. That is why on the 20 May we celebrated Pentecost, the coming of the Holy Spirit 2000 years ago. The arrival of the Holy Spirit was spectacular. In the book of Acts, it describes a sound like a violent wind filling the house, something like tongues of fire over each disciple and all of them starting to speak in different languages, so that everyone could understand them. A remarkable time in the early church that was the start of a vast expansion of the church.

Nowadays, the fact that the Holy Spirit is among us is still amazing. He is God's presence with us and in us. Stop and think about that. As we follow Jesus as our Lord, God comes to reside in us. This is not a weird thing but a comforting presence, a guide rather than a force, gentle yet powerful. Jesus described the Holy Spirit in terms of water. In John 4:15, he says: 'whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life.'

The Holy Spirit sustains us. He brings life in all its abundance and he is an assurance of life beyond the grave. He is the power of God living in each follower of Jesus, transforming us, if we let him, and helping us to live life as it was meant to be lived.

Pentecost is worth celebrating as it recognizes the reality of God in each of our lives rather than just as a historic fact. Without the Holy Spirit, we miss something so important but with the Holy Spirit, we know the presence of God. If this is not your experience I urge you to invite God into your life – come and tell me what happens next!

I pray that you would know the reality of God in your lives.

In March, there were 51 missed GP appointments in Willingham and 20 in our Longstanton Surgery. The resulting cost of this is approximately £1775, with an average GP appointment costing £25.

Don't let Hay Fever Spoil your Summer

Did you know you don't need to see your GP for hay fever treatment? Hay fever and seasonal allergy treatments such as tablets, eye drops and nasal sprays are all easily available at low cost from your local pharmacy or supermarket – no prescription from your GP required! Antihistamines are usually the best treatment for hay fever and a packet of 30 tablets can cost as little as £2. You will be saving yourself time and money, freeing up GP appointments for people with more urgent needs and doing your bit to help the NHS save money on unnecessary prescription costs. Top tips to help ease hay fever symptoms:

- Keep house and car windows closed, especially when the pollen count is high (early morning 7 9 am and evenings 5 7 pm).
- Avoid large grassy areas, woodland, cutting the grass and car fumes.
- Wear wrap-around sunglasses.
- Use petroleum jelly inside your nose to block inhalation of pollen.
- Don't dry washing outside to avoid pollen sticking to your clothes.
- When coming in from outside, wash your hands, face, hair, rinse your eyes and change your clothes.

Anyone who lives on High Street, George Street, Station Road or Earith Road will know only too well what a pothole looks like and also how their houses feel when the lorries thunder past their doors day after day. In fact, I find it quite scary walking in the High Street these days or visiting the Community Orchard. It is fraught with danger to ride a bike or motorbike down the High Street, or even avoid the holes while driving a car. Negotiating the road along the river to Earith, which is repeatedly disintegrating, is also dangerous. What can we do?

Some of us, with the blessing of the Parish Council, have organised a lorry survey, with supporting photographs which will take place in the next few weeks. Hopefully, it will give up-to-date proof of lorry traffic for the Parish Council to use when dealing with the County Council. But we need more than that. Exposure to the local media might help: local radio, television and the *Cambridge News*. Maybe we should organise a human chain across the High Street to highlight our plight. In the long run, the only lasting solution will be a bypass. Everyone knows that. It has been discussed ever since we came to Willingham in 1970, and it never happens.

What are the actual criteria required to justify a bypass? What else can we do to help the Parish Council make their case at higher levels?

Fen Edge Archaeology Group

Fen Edge Archaeology Group (FEAG) is a group for people in the Fen Edge villages who have an interest in archaeology and history.

We have seven talks a year about historical or archaeological subjects. These are usually held at Cottenham Village College but sometimes in one of the other villages. So far this year we have had a talk on a Roman site found during building work in Bedford and another about Roman glass, held at the Baptist Church. Last month, we welcomed Mike Parker-Pearson, a renowned expert on Neolithic Archaeology, talking about new discoveries at Stonehenge. We are looking forward to future talks by Stephen Macaulay, a local archaeologist, on a lost Roman settlement at Waterbeach and Andrew Wallace-Hadrill on Herculaneum.

One of our activities is to arrange visits to archaeological sites and digs. These are usually led by experts or the lead archaeologist on the site. We visited Must Farm Bronze Age settlement near Peterborough, where many unique finds were made including the remains of several burnt out round houses and a wheel dating from 1100-800 BCE. We have also spent an interesting afternoon looking at finds and excavations on the route of the A14 project.

Perhaps the most interesting activity for many of our members is taking part in archaeological digs. This involves unearthing ancient sites including Roman and Anglo-Saxon settlements. We were recently invited to take part in a dig with a professional archaeology company at a site in Cottenham. Other activities include field walking - looking for artefacts on the surface of farm fields by invitation of the land owner and carrying out Geophysical Surveying, which involves the use of various electronic instruments to examine what lies under the ground without having to dig. This sometimes leads to carrying out a dig at a later date.

H is for Hawk by Helen Macdonald

This is the story of how Helen deals with grief after the sudden death of her beloved father. Helen has always loved birds of prey and has flown falcons over the years.

She decided to find a goshawk to train and buys one on a Scottish quayside for £800. She is fascinated and taken aback by how reptilian the bird looks. Goshawks can be vicious predators, deadly and fierce-looking. She decides to call her Mabel which makes her seem rather cute and cuddly. Mabel is anything but. She is sulky, stubborn, temperamental and difficult to train and Helen comes to realise exactly what she has done.

Throughout the book you feel much of Helen's sadness from her bereavement and the taking on of this fierce creature is, to her, a kind of a challenge and wanting to get out there and do probably what her father would have done. Helen is often sad but her joy and disbelief when Mabel flies to her and on to the glove is undoubtedly an astounding moment.
